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## **Preface**

It is essential to lay a solid foundation in mathematics if a student is to be competitive in today's global market. The importance of algebra, in particular, cannot be overstated, as it is the basis of all mathematical modeling used in applications found in all disciplines. Traditionally, the study of algebra is separated into a two parts, elementary algebra and intermediate algebra. This textbook, *Elementary Algebra*, is the first part, written in a clear and concise manner, making no assumption of prior algebra experience. It carefully guides students from the basics to the more advanced techniques required to be successful in the next course.

This text is, by far, the best elementary algebra textbook offered under a Creative Commons license. It is written in such a way as to maintain maximum flexibility and usability. A modular format was carefully integrated into the design. For example, certain topics, like functions, can be covered or omitted without compromising the overall flow of the text. An introduction of square roots in Chapter 1 is another example that allows for instructors wishing to include the quadratic formula early to do so. Topics such as these are carefully included to enhance the flexibility throughout. This textbook will effectively enable traditional or nontraditional approaches to elementary algebra. This, in addition to robust and diverse exercise sets, provides the base for an excellent individualized textbook instructors can use free of needless edition changes and excessive costs! A few other differences are highlighted below:

# **Chapter 1**

# **Real Numbers and Their Operations**

### 1.1 Real Numbers and the Number Line

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Construct a number line and graph points on it.
- 2. Use a number line to determine the order of real numbers.
- 3. Determine the opposite of a real number.
- 4. Determine the absolute value of a real number.

#### **Definitions**

A set is a collection of objects, typically grouped within braces  $\{\}$ , where each object is called an element. For example,  $\{\text{red}, \text{green}, \text{blue}\}$  is a set of colors. A subset is a set consisting of elements that belong to a given set. For example,  $\{\text{green}, \text{blue}\}$  is a subset of the color set above. A set with no elements is called the empty set and has its own special notation,  $\{\}$  or  $\emptyset$ . When studying mathematics, we focus on special sets of numbers. The set of natural (or counting) numbers, denoted  $\mathbb{N}$ , is combined with zero.

The three periods (...) is called an ellipsis and indicates that the numbers continue without bound. The set of whole numbers, denoted W, is the set of natural numbers combined with zero.

The set of integers, denoted Z, consists of both positive and negative whole numbers, as well as zero.

$$\{..., -3, -2, -1, 0, 1, 2, 3, ...\}$$
 Integers

Notice that the sets of natural and whole numbers are both subsets of the set of integers.

Rational numbers, denoted Q, are defined as any number of the form ab, where a and b are integers and b is nonzero. Decimals that repeat or terminate are rational. For example,

$$0.7 = \frac{7}{10}$$
 and  $0.\overline{3} = 0.3333... = \frac{1}{3}$ 

The set of integers is a subset of the set of rational numbers because every integer can be expressed as a ratio of the integer and 1. In other words, any integer can be written over 1 and can be considered a rational number. For example,


$$5 = \frac{5}{1}$$

Irrational numbers are defined as any number that cannot be written as a ratio of two integers. Nonterminating decimals that do not repeat are irrational. For example,

$$\pi = 3.14159...$$
 and  $\sqrt{2} = 1.41421...$ 

The set of real numbers, denoted  $\mathbf{R}$ , is defined as the set of all rational numbers combined with the set of all irrational numbers. Therefore, all the numbers defined so far are subsets of the set of real numbers. In summary,

# Real Numbers




#### **Number Line**

A real number line, or simply number line, allows us to visually display real numbers by associating them with unique points on a line. The real number associated with a point is called a coordinate. A point on the real number line that is associated with a coordinate is called its graph.


To construct a number line, draw a horizontal line with arrows on both ends to indicate that it continues without bound.

Next, choose any point to represent the number zero; this point is called the origin.





Mark off consistent lengths on both sides of the origin and label each tick mark to define the scale. Positive real numbers lie to the right of the origin and negative real numbers lie to the left. The number zero (0) is neither positive nor negative.

Typically, each tick represents one unit.




As illustrated below, the scale need not always be one unit. In the first number line, each tick mark represents two units. In the second, each tick mark represents 17.






The graph of each real number is shown as a dot at the appropriate point on the number line. A partial graph of the set of integers **Z** follows:




**Example 1:** Graph the following set of real numbers:  $\{-1, -13, 0, 53\}$ .

Solution: Graph the numbers on a number line with a scale where each tick mark represents 13 unit.



## **Ordering Real Numbers**

When comparing real numbers on a number line, the larger number will always lie to the right of the smaller one. It is clear that 15 is greater than 5, but it may not be so clear to see that -1 is greater than -5 until we graph each number on a number line.



We use symbols to help us efficiently communicate relationships between numbers on the number line. The symbols used to describe an equality relationship between numbers follow:

These symbols are used and interpreted in the following manner:

$$5=5$$
 5 is equal to:

$$5 = 5$$
 5 is equal to 5  
  $0 \neq 5$  0 is not equal to 5

$$\pi \approx 3.14$$
 pi is approximately equal to 3.14

We next define symbols that denote an order relationship between real numbers.

< Less than

> Greater than

≤ Less than or equal to

≥ *Greater than or equal to* 

These symbols allow us to compare two numbers. For example,

Since the graph of -120 is to the left of the graph of -10 on the number line, that number is less than -10. We could write an equivalent statement as follows:

$$-10 > -120$$
 *Negative* 10 *is greater than negative* 120.

Similarly, since the graph of zero is to the right of the graph of any negative number on the number line, zero is greater than any negative number.

$$0 > -50$$
 Zero is greater than negative fifty.

The symbols < and > are used to denote strict inequalities, and the symbols  $\le$  and  $\ge$  are used to denote inclusive inequalities. In some situations, more than one symbol can be correctly applied. For example, the following two statements are both true:

$$-10 < 0$$
 and  $-10 \le 0$ 


In addition, the "or equal to" component of an inclusive inequality allows us to correctly write the following:

$$-10 \le -10$$

The logical use of the word "or" requires that only one of the conditions need be true: the "less than" or the "equal to."

**Example 2:** Fill in the blank with <, =, or >: -2 \_\_\_\_\_ -12.

**Solution:** Use > because the graph of -2 is to the right of the graph of -12 on a number line. Therefore, -2 > -12, which reads "negative two is greater than negative twelve."




Answer: -2 > -12

In this text, we will often point out the equivalent notation used to express mathematical quantities electronically using the standard symbols available on a keyboard. We begin with the equivalent textual notation for inequalities:

Many calculators, computer algebra systems, and programming languages use this notation.


### **Opposites**

The opposite of any real number a is -a. Opposite real numbers are the same distance from the origin on a number line, but their graphs lie on opposite sides of the origin and the numbers have opposite signs.



For example, we say that the opposite of 10 is -10.

Next, consider the opposite of a negative number. Given the integer -7, the integer the same distance from the origin and with the opposite sign is +7, or just 7.



Therefore, we say that the opposite of -7 is -(-7) = 7. This idea leads to what is often referred to as the double-negative property. For any real number a,

$$-(-a) = a$$

**Example 3:** What is the opposite of -34?

Solution: Here we apply the double-negative property.

$$-\left(-\frac{3}{4}\right) = \frac{3}{4}$$

Answer: 34

**Example 4:** Simplify: -(-(4)).

**Solution:** Start with the innermost parentheses by finding the opposite of +4.

$$-(-(4)) = -(-(4))$$
  
= -(-4)  
= 4

Answer: 4

Example 5: Simplify: -(-(-2)).

Solution: Apply the double-negative property starting with the innermost parentheses.

$$-(-(-2)) = -(-(-2))$$

$$= -(2)$$

$$= -2$$

Answer: -2

#### Tip

If there is an even number of consecutive negative signs, then the result is positive. If there is an odd number of consecutive negative signs, then the result is negative.

**Try this!** Simplify: -(-(-(5))).

Answer: -5

#### **Absolute Value**

The absolute value of a real number a, denoted |a|, is defined as the distance between zero (the origin) and the graph of that real number on the number line. Since it is a distance, it is always positive. For example,

$$\left|-4\right| = 4$$
 and  $\left|4\right| = 4$ 

Both 4 and -4 are four units from the origin, as illustrated below:



Example 6: Simplify:

a. |-12|

b. |12|

Solution: Both -12 and 12 are twelve units from the origin on a number line. Therefore,

$$|-12| = 12$$
 and  $|12| = 12$ 

Answers: a. 12; b. 12

Also, it is worth noting that

$$|0| = 0$$

The absolute value can be expressed textually using the notation abs(a). We often encounter negative absolute values, such as -|3| or -abs(3). Notice that the negative sign is in front of the absolute value symbol. In this case, work the absolute value first and then find the opposite of the result.

$$\begin{vmatrix}
-|3| & -|-3| \\
\downarrow & \text{and} & \downarrow \\
=-3 & =-3
\end{vmatrix}$$

Try not to confuse this with the double-negative property, which states that -(-7)=+7.

**Example 7:** Simplify: -|-(-7)|.

Solution: First, find the opposite of -7 inside the absolute value. Then find the opposite of the result.

$$-\left|-\left(-7\right)\right| = -\left|7\right|$$
$$= -7$$

Answer: -7

At this point, we can determine what real numbers have a particular absolute value. For example,

Think of a real number whose distance to the origin is 5 units. There are two solutions: the distance to the right of the origin and the distance to the left of the origin, namely, {±5}. The symbol (±) is read "plus or minus" and indicates that there are two answers, one positive and one negative.

$$|-5| = 5$$
 and  $|5| = 5$ 

Now consider the following:

$$|?| = -5$$

Here we wish to find a value for which the distance to the origin is negative. Since negative distance is not defined, this equation has no solution. If an equation has no solution, we say the solution is the empty set: Ø.


## 1.2 Adding and Subtracting Integers

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**


- 1. Add and subtract signed integers.
- 2. Translate English sentences involving addition and subtraction into mathematical statements.
- 3. Calculate the distance between two numbers on a number line.

## Addition and Subtraction (+, -)

Visualize adding 3 + 2 on the number line by moving from zero three units to the right then another two units to the right, as illustrated below:




The illustration shows that 3 + 2 = 5. Similarly, visualize adding two negative numbers (-3) + (-2) by first moving from the origin three units to the left and then moving another two units to the left.



In this example, the illustration shows (-3) + (-2) = -5, which leads to the following two properties of real numbers.

positive number + positive number = positive number negative number + negative number = negative number

Next, we will explore addition of numbers with unlike signs. To add 3 + (-7), first move from the origin three units to the right, then move seven units to the left as shown:



In this case, we can see that adding a negative number is equivalent to subtraction:

$$3 + (-7) = 3 - 7 = -4$$

It is tempting to say that a positive number plus a negative number is negative, but that is not always true: 7+(-3)=7-3=4. The result of adding numbers with unlike signs may be positive or negative. The sign of the result is the same as the sign of the number with the greatest distance from the origin. For example, the following results depend on the sign of the number 12 because it is farther from zero than 5:

$$12 + (-5) = 7$$
$$-12 + 5 = -7$$

**Example 1:** Simplify: 14+(-25).

Solution: Here -25 is the greater distance from the origin. Therefore, the result is negative.

$$14 + (-25) = 14 - 25$$
$$= -11$$

Answer: -11

Example 2: Simplify:

a. 5+0

b. 10+(-10)

#### Solution:

a. Adding zero to any real number results in the same real number.

$$5 + 0 = 5$$

b. Adding opposites results in zero.

$$10 + (-10) = 10 - 10$$
$$= 0$$

Answers: a. 5; b. 0

Example 3: Simplify:

a. (3+7)+4

b. 3+(7+4)

Solution: Parentheses group the operations that are to be performed first.

a.

$$(3+7)+4=10+4$$
  
= 14

b.

$$3 + (7 + 4) = 3 + 11$$
$$= 14$$

These two examples both result in 14: changing the grouping of the numbers does not change the result.

$$(3+7)+4=3+(7+4)=14$$

Answers: a. 14; b. 14

At this point, we highlight the fact that addition is commutative: the order in which we add does not matter and yields the same result.

$$2 + 9 = 9 + 2$$
  
 $11 = 11$ 

On the other hand, subtraction is not commutative.

$$2-9 \neq 9-2$$
$$-7 \neq 7$$

We will use these properties, along with the double-negative property for real numbers, to perform more involved sequential operations. To simplify things, we will make it a general rule to first replace all sequential operations with either addition or subtraction and then perform each operation in order from left to right.

**Example 4:** Simplify: 4-(-10)+(-5).

Solution: Replace the sequential operations and then perform them from left to right.

$$4-(-10)+(-5)=4+10-5$$
 Replace  $-(-)$  with addition  $(+)$ .  
Replace  $+(-)$  with subtraction  $(-)$ .  
 $=14-5$   
 $=9$ 

Answer: 9

**Example 5:** Simplify: -3+(-8)-(-7).

Solution:

$$-3 + (-8) - (-7) = -3 - 8 + 7$$
 Replace  $+(-)$  with  $-$ .

Replace  $-(-)$  with  $+$ .

 $= -11 + 7$ 
 $= -4$ 

Answer: -4

**Try this!** Simplify: 12-(-9)+(-6).

Answer: 15

Often we find the need to translate English sentences involving addition and subtraction to mathematical statements. Listed

below are some key words that translate to the given operation.

Key Words	Operation
<b>Sum</b> , increased by, more than, plus, added to, total	+
<b>Difference</b> , decreased by, subtracted from, less, minus	_

**Example 6:** What is the difference of 7 and -3?

Solution: The key word "difference" implies that we should subtract the numbers.

$$7 - (-3) = 7 + 3$$
$$= 10$$

Answer: The difference of 7 and -3 is 10.

Example 7: What is the sum of the first five positive integers?

**Solution:** The initial key word to focus on is "sum"; this means that we will be adding the five numbers. The first five positive integers are {1, 2, 3, 4, 5}. Recall that 0 is neither positive nor negative.

$$1+2+3+4+5=15$$

Answer: The sum of the first five positive integers is 15.

Example 8: What is 10 subtracted from the sum of 8 and 6?

**Solution:** We know that subtraction is not commutative; therefore, we must take care to subtract in the correct order. First, add 8 and 6 and then subtract 10 as follows:

the sum of 8 and 6 subtract 10 from the sum 
$$(8 + 6)$$
  $-10$ 

It is important to notice that the phrase "10 subtracted from" does not translate to a mathematical statement in the order it appears. In other words, 10–(8+6)would be an incorrect translation and leads to an incorrect answer. After translating the sentence, perform the operations.


$$(8+6)-10=14-10$$
  
= 4

Answer: Ten subtracted from the sum of 8 and 6 is 4.

### **Distance on a Number Line**


One application of the absolute value is to find the distance between any two points on a number line. For real numbers a and b, the distance formula for a number line is given as,

$$d = |b - a|$$



Example 9: Determine the distance between 2 and 7 on a number line.

**Solution:** On the graph we see that the distance between the two given integers is 5 units.



Using the distance formula we obtain the same result.

$$d = |7 - 2|$$
$$= |5|$$
$$= 5$$

Answer: 5 units

**Example 10:** Determine the distance between -4 and 7 on a number line.

**Solution:** Use the distance formula for a number line d=|b-a|, where a=-4 and b=7.

$$d = |7 - (-4)|$$

$$= |7 + 4|$$

$$= |11|$$

$$= 11$$

Answer: 11 units

It turns out that it does not matter which points are used for a and b; the absolute value always ensures a positive result.

Using $a = -4$ and $b = 7$	Using $a = 7$ and $b = -4$
d= 7-(-4) = 7+4 = 11 =11	d= -4-7 = -11 =11

Try this! Determine the distance between -12 and -9 on the number line.

Answer: 3

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

## 1.3 Multiplying and Dividing Integers

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Multiply and divide signed integers.
- 2. Translate English sentences involving multiplication and division into mathematical statements.
- 3. Determine the prime factorization of composite numbers.
- 4. Interpret the results of quotients involving zero.

#### **Multiplication and Division**

We begin with a review of what it means to multiply and divide signed numbers. The result of multiplying real numbers is called the product and the result of dividing is called the quotient. Recall that multiplication is equivalent to adding:

$$3 \cdot 4 = 4 + 4 + 4 = 12$$

Clearly, the product of two positive numbers is positive. Similarly, the product of a positive number and negative number can be written as shown:

$$3 \cdot (-4) = (-4) + (-4) + (-4) = -12$$

We see that the product of a positive number and a negative number is negative. Next, explore the results of multiplying two negative numbers. Consider the products in the following illustration and try to identify the pattern:

$$3(-3) = -9$$
  
 $2(-3) = -6$   
 $1(-3) = -3$ 
The products increase by 3.

$$0(-3) = 0$$
 Zero times any real number is zero.

$$(-1) (-3) = 3$$

$$(-2) (-3) = 6$$

$$(-3) (-3) = 9$$
The pattern continues by increasing the products by 3.

This shows that the product of two negative numbers is positive. To summarize,

$$positive \times positive = positive$$
  
 $positive \times negative = negative$   
 $negative \times negative = positive$ 

The rules for division are the same because division can always be rewritten as multiplication:

$$\frac{-10}{2} = -10 \cdot \frac{1}{2} = -5$$
 and  $\frac{-10}{-2} = -10 \cdot \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) = 5$ 

The rules for multiplication and division should not be confused with the fact that the sum of two negative numbers is negative.

Example 1: Simplify:

a. (-3)+(-5)

b. (-3)(-5)

**Solution:** Here we add and multiply the same two negative numbers.

a. The result of adding two negative numbers is negative.

$$(-3) + (-5) = -3 - 5$$
$$= -8$$

b. The result of multiplying two negative numbers is positive.

$$(-3)(-5) = 15$$

Answers: a. -8; b. 15

Given any real numbers a, b, and c, we have the following properties of multiplication:

## Solution:

a. Multiplying by zero results in zero.

$$5 \cdot 0 = 0$$

b. Multiplying any real number by one results in the same real number.

$$10 \cdot 1 = 10$$

Answers: a. 0; b. 10

## Example 3: Simplify:

a. (3·7)·2

b. 3·(7·2)

#### Solution:

a.

$$(3 \cdot 7) \cdot 2 = 21 \cdot 2$$
$$= 42$$

b.

$$3 \cdot (7 \cdot 2) = 3 \cdot 14$$
$$= 42$$

The value of each expression is 42. Changing the grouping of the numbers does not change the result.

$$(3 \cdot 7) \cdot 2 = 3 \cdot (7 \cdot 2) = 42$$

Answers: a. 42; b. 42

At this point, we highlight that multiplication is commutative: the order in which we multiply does not matter and yields the same result.

$$2 \cdot 9 = 9 \cdot 2$$

$$18 = 18$$

On the other hand, division is not commutative.

$$10 \div 5 \neq 5 \div 10$$

$$2 \neq \frac{1}{2}$$

Use these properties to perform sequential operations involving multiplication and division. When doing so, it is important to perform these operations in order from left to right.

**Example 4:** Simplify: 3(-2)(-5)(-1).

 $\textbf{Solution:} \ \textbf{Multiply two numbers at a time as follows:}$ 

$$3 (-2) (-5) (-1) = 3 (-2) (-5) (-1)$$

$$= -6 (-5) (-1)$$

$$= 30 (-1)$$

$$= -30$$

Answer: -30

Because multiplication is commutative, the order in which we multiply does not affect the final answer. When sequential operations involve multiplication and division, order does matter; hence we must work the operations from *left to right* to obtain a correct result.

**Example 5:** Simplify:  $10 \div (-2)(-5)$ .

Solution: Perform the division first; otherwise, the result will be incorrect.

Incorrect!	Correct!
$10 \div (-2)(-5) = 10 \div (-2)(-5)$ $= 10 \div 10$ $= 1 \times$	$10 \div (-2) (-5) = \underbrace{10 \div (-2)}_{division \ first} (-5)$ $= (-5)(-5)$ $= 25  \checkmark$

Answer: 25

Notice that the order in which we multiply and divide does affect the final result. Therefore, it is important to perform the operations of multiplication and division as they appear from left to right.

**Example 6:** Simplify:  $-6(3) \div (-2)(-3)$ .

Solution: Work the operations one at a time from left to right.

$$-6(3) \div (-2)(-3)$$

$$= -18 \div (-2)(-3)$$

$$= 9(-3)$$

$$= -27$$

**Try this!** Simplify:  $-5 \div 5 \cdot 2(-3)$ .

Answer: 6

Within text-based applications, the symbol used for multiplication is the asterisk (\*) and the symbol used for division is the forward slash (/).

$$5*3$$
 and  $14/2 = 7$ 

The set of even integers is the set of all integers that are evenly divisible by 2. We can also obtain the set of even integers by multiplying each integer by 2.

The set of odd integers is the set of all integers that are not evenly divisible by 2.

A prime number is an integer greater than 1 that is divisible only by 1 and itself. The smallest prime number is 2 and the rest are necessarily odd.

Any integer greater than 1 that is not prime is called a composite number and can be written as a product of primes. When a composite number, such as 30, is written as a product, 30=2·15, we say that 2·15 is a factorization of 30 and that 2 and 15

are factors. Note that factors divide the number evenly. We can continue to write composite factors as products until only a product of primes remains.

$$= 2.15$$

$$= 2.3.5$$

The prime factorization of 30 is  $2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$ .

**Example 7:** Determine the prime factorization of 70.

**Solution:** Begin by writing 70 as a product with 2 as a factor. Then express any composite factor as a product of prime numbers.

$$70 = 2 \cdot 35$$
$$= 2 \cdot 5 \cdot 7$$

Since the prime factorization is unique, it does not matter how we choose to initially factor the number because the end result is the same.

$$70 = 7 \cdot 10$$
$$= 7 \cdot 2 \cdot 5$$
$$= 2 \cdot 5 \cdot 7$$

Answer: The prime factorization of 70 is 2.5.7.

Some tests (called divisibility tests) useful for finding prime factors of composite numbers follow:

- 1. If the integer is even, then 2 is a factor.
- 2. If the sum of the digits is evenly divisible by 3, then 3 is a factor.
- 3. If the last digit is a 5 or 0, then 5 is a factor.

Often we find the need to translate English sentences that include multiplication and division terms to mathematical statements. Listed below are some key words that translate to the given operation.

Key Words	Operation
Product, multiplied by, of, times	* or ·
Quotient, divided by, ratio, per	/ or ÷

Example 8: Calculate the quotient of 20 and -10.

 $\textbf{Solution:} \ The \ key \ word \ "quotient" implies \ that \ we \ should \ divide.$ 

$$20 \div (-10) = -2$$

Answer: The quotient of 20 and -10 is -2.

Example 9: What is the product of the first three positive even integers?

Solution: The first three positive even integers are {2, 4, 6} and the key word "product" implies that we should multiply.

$$2 \cdot 4 \cdot 6 = 8 \cdot 6$$
$$= 48$$

Answer: The product of the first three positive even integers is 48.

Example 10: Joe is able to drive 342 miles on 18 gallons of gasoline. How many miles per gallon of gas is this?

Solution: The key word "per" indicates that we must divide the number of miles driven by the number of gallons used:

$$\frac{342 \,\text{miles}}{18 \,\text{gallons}} = 19 \,\text{miles per gallon (mpg)}$$

Answer: Joe gets 19 miles per gallon from his vehicle.

In everyday life, we often wish to use a single value that typifies a set of values. One way to do this is to use what is called the arithmetic mean or average. To calculate an average, divide the sum of the values in the set by the number of values in that set.

Example 11: A student earns 75, 86, and 94 on his first three exams. What is the student's test average?

Solution: Add the scores and divide the sum by 3.

$$\frac{75 + 86 + 94}{3} = \frac{255}{3}$$
$$= 85$$

Answer: The student's test average is 85.

#### **Zero and Division**

Recall the relationship between multiplication and division:

$$\underbrace{12}_{\text{dividend divisor quotient}} \div \underbrace{6}_{\text{quotient}} = \underbrace{2}_{\text{dividend divisor}} \text{ because } 6 \cdot 2 = 12$$

In this case, the dividend 12 is evenly divided by the divisor 6 to obtain the quotient, 2. It is true in general that if we multiply the divisor by the quotient we obtain the dividend. Now consider the case where the dividend is zero and the divisor is nonzero:

$$0 \div 6 = 0$$
 since  $6 \cdot 0 = 0$ 

This demonstrates that zero divided by any nonzero real number must be zero. Now consider a nonzero number divided by zero:

$$12 \div 0 = ?$$
 or  $0 \cdot ? = 12$ 

The zero-factor property of multiplication states that any real number times 0 is 0. We conclude that there is no real number such that 0·?=12 and thus, the quotient is left undefined. Try 12÷0 on a calculator. What does it say? For our purposes, we will simply write "undefined."

To summarize, given any real number a=0, then

$$0 \div a = \frac{0}{a} = 0$$
 zero and  $a \div 0 = \frac{a}{0}$  undefined

We are left to consider the case where the dividend and divisor are both zero.



$$0 \div 0 = ?$$
 or  $0 \cdot ? = 0$ 

Here any real number seems to work. For example, 0.5=0 and 0.3=0. Therefore, the quotient is uncertain or indeterminate.

$$0 \div 0 = \frac{0}{0}$$
 is indeterminate.

In this course, we state that 0÷0 is undefined.

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**



## 1.4 Fractions

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Reduce a fraction to lowest terms.
- 2. Multiply and divide fractions.
- 3. Add and subtract fractions.

## Reducing

A fraction is a real number written as a quotient, or ratio, of two integers a and b, where  $b\neq 0$ .

Numerator 
$$\longrightarrow \frac{a}{b}$$
  
Denominator  $\longrightarrow \frac{b}{b}$ 

The integer above the fraction bar is called the numerator and the integer below is called the denominator. The numerator is often called the "part" and the denominator is often called the "whole." Equivalent fractions are two equal ratios expressed using different numerators and denominators. For example,

$$\frac{50}{100} = \frac{1}{2}$$

Fifty parts out of 100 is the same ratio as 1 part out of 2 and represents the same real number. Consider the following factorizations of 50 and 100:

$$50 = 2 \cdot 25$$

$$100 = 4 \cdot 25$$

The numbers 50 and 100 share the factor 25. A shared factor is called a common factor. We can rewrite the ratio 50100 as follows:

$$\frac{50}{100} = \frac{2 \cdot 25}{4 \cdot 25}$$

Making use of the multiplicative identity property and the fact that 2525=1, we have

$$\frac{50}{100} = \frac{2 \cdot 25}{4 \cdot 25} = \frac{2}{4} \cdot 1 = \frac{2}{4}$$

Dividing 2525 and replacing this factor with a 1 is called canceling. Together, these basic steps for finding equivalent fractions define the process of reducing. Since factors divide their product evenly, we achieve the same result by dividing both the numerator and denominator by 25 as follows:

$$\frac{50 \div 25}{100 \div 25} = \frac{2}{4}$$

Finding equivalent fractions where the numerator and denominator have no common factor other than 1 is called reducing to lowest terms. When learning how to reduce to lowest terms, it is helpful to first rewrite the numerator and denominator as a product of primes and then cancel. For example,

$$\frac{50}{100} = \frac{\cancel{\cancel{2}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}}}{2 \cdot \cancel{\cancel{2}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}}}$$
$$= \frac{1}{2}$$

We achieve the same result by dividing the numerator and denominator by the greatest common factor (GCF). The GCF is the largest number that divides both the numerator and denominator evenly. One way to find the GCF of 50 and 100 is to list all the factors of each and identify the largest number that appears in both lists. Remember, each number is also a factor of itself.

Common factors are listed in bold, and we see that the greatest common factor is 50. We use the following notation to indicate the GCF of two numbers: GCF(50, 100) = 50. After determining the GCF, reduce by dividing both the numerator and the denominator as follows:

$$\frac{50 \div 50}{100 \div 50} = \frac{1}{2}$$

Example 1: Reduce to lowest terms: 105300.

Solution: Rewrite the numerator and denominator as a product of primes and then cancel.

$$\frac{105}{300} = \frac{\cancel{\cancel{3}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}} \cdot 7}{2 \cdot 2 \cdot \cancel{\cancel{3}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}} \cdot 5}$$
$$= \frac{7}{20}$$

Alternatively, we achieve the same result if we divide both the numerator and denominator by the GCF(105, 300). A quick way to find the GCF of the two numbers requires us to first write each as a product of primes. The GCF is the product of all the common prime factors.

$$\begin{cases}
 105 = 3 \cdot 5 \cdot 7 \\
 300 = 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5 \cdot 5
 \end{cases}
 \qquad
 GCF(105, 300) = 3 \cdot 5 = 15$$

In this case, the common prime factors are 3 and 5 and the greatest common factor of 105 and 300 is 15.

$$\frac{105}{300} = \frac{105 \div 15}{300 \div 15} = \frac{7}{20}$$

Answer: 720

Try this! Reduce to lowest terms: 3296.

Answer: 13

An improper fraction is one where the numerator is larger than the denominator. A mixed number is a number that represents the sum of a whole number and a fraction. For example,  $5_{12}$  is a mixed number that represents the sum  $5_{12}$ . Use long division to convert an improper fraction to a mixed number; the remainder is the numerator of the fractional part.

Example 2: Write 235 as a mixed number.

**Solution:** Notice that 5 divides into 23 four times with a remainder of 3.

$$5)\frac{4}{23}$$

$$\frac{-20}{3}$$

We then can write

$$\frac{23}{5} = 4 + \frac{3}{5}$$
$$= 4\frac{3}{5}$$

Note that the denominator of the fractional part of the mixed number remains the same as the denominator of the original fraction.

Answer: 435

To convert mixed numbers to improper fractions, multiply the whole number by the denominator and then add the numerator; write this result over the original denominator.

Example 3: Write 357 as an improper fraction.

**Solution:** Obtain the numerator by multiplying 7 times 3 and then add 5.

$$3\frac{5}{7} = \frac{7 \cdot 3 + 5}{7}$$
$$= \frac{21 + 5}{7}$$
$$= \frac{26}{7}$$

Answer: 267

It is important to note that converting to a mixed number is not part of the reducing process. We consider improper fractions, such as 267, to be reduced to lowest terms. In algebra it is often preferable to work with improper fractions, although in some applications, mixed numbers are more appropriate.

Try this! Convert 1012 to an improper fraction.

Answer: 212

## **Multiplying and Dividing Fractions**

In this section, assume that a, b, c, and d are all nonzero integers. The product of two fractions is the fraction formed by the product of the numerators and the product of the denominators. In other words, to multiply fractions, multiply the numerators and multiply the denominators:

$$\frac{a}{b} \cdot \frac{c}{d} = \frac{ac}{bd}$$

Example 4: Multiply: 23.57.

Solution: Multiply the numerators and multiply the denominators.

$$\frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{5}{7} = \frac{2 \cdot 5}{3 \cdot 7}$$
$$= \frac{10}{21}$$

Answer: 1021

Example 5: Multiply: 59(-14).

**Solution:** Recall that the product of a positive number and a negative number is negative.

$$\frac{5}{9}\left(-\frac{1}{4}\right) = -\frac{5\cdot 1}{9\cdot 4}$$
$$= -\frac{5}{36}$$

Answer: -536

Example 6: Multiply: 23.534.

**Solution:** Begin by converting 534 to an improper fraction.

$$\frac{2}{3} \cdot 5\frac{3}{4} = \frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{23}{4}$$

$$= \frac{\cancel{2}}{3} \cdot \frac{\cancel{2}}{\cancel{4}}$$

$$= \frac{23}{6}$$

$$= 3\frac{5}{6}$$

In this example, we noticed that we could reduce before we multiplied the numerators and the denominators. Reducing in this way is called cross canceling, and can save time when multiplying fractions.

Answer: 356

Two real numbers whose product is 1 are called reciprocals. Therefore, ab and ba are reciprocals because  $ab \cdot ba = abab = 1$ . For example,

$$\frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{3}{2} = \frac{6}{6} = 1$$

Because their product is 1, 23 and 32 are reciprocals. Some other reciprocals are listed below:

$$\frac{5}{8}$$
 and  $\frac{8}{5}$ 

7 and 
$$\frac{1}{7}$$

$$-\frac{4}{5}$$
 and  $-\frac{5}{4}$ 

This definition is important because dividing fractions requires that you multiply the dividend by the reciprocal of the divisor.

$$\frac{a}{b} \div \frac{c}{d} = \frac{a}{b} \cdot \frac{d}{c} = \frac{ad}{bc}$$

Example 7: Divide: 23÷57.

Solution: Multiply 23 by the reciprocal of 57.

$$\frac{2}{3} \div \frac{5}{7} = \frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{7}{5}$$
$$= \frac{2 \cdot 7}{3 \cdot 5}$$
$$= \frac{14}{15}$$

Answer: 1415

You also need to be aware of other forms of notation that indicate division: / and —. For example,

$$5/(1/2) = 5*(2/1) = (5/1)*(2/1) = 10/1 = 10$$

Or

$$\frac{\frac{7}{8}}{\frac{2}{3}} = \frac{7}{8} \div \frac{2}{3} = \frac{7}{8} \cdot \frac{3}{2} = \frac{21}{16}$$

The latter is an example of a complex fraction, which is a fraction whose numerator, denominator, or both are fractions.

## **Note**

Students often ask why dividing is equivalent to multiplying by the reciprocal of the divisor. A mathematical explanation comes from the fact that the product of reciprocals is 1. If we apply the multiplicative identity property and multiply numerator and denominator by the reciprocal of the denominator, then we obtain the following:

$$\frac{\frac{7}{8}}{\frac{2}{3}} = \frac{\frac{7}{8}}{\frac{2}{3}} \cdot 1 = \frac{\frac{7}{8}}{\frac{2}{3}} \cdot \frac{\frac{3}{2}}{\frac{2}{3}} = \frac{\frac{7}{8} \cdot \frac{3}{2}}{1} = \frac{7}{8} \cdot \frac{3}{2}$$

Before multiplying, look for common factors to cancel; this eliminates the need to reduce the end result.

Example 8: Divide: 5274.

Solution:

$$\frac{\frac{5}{2}}{\frac{7}{4}} = \frac{5}{2} \div \frac{7}{4}$$

$$= \frac{5}{2} \cdot \frac{4}{7}$$

$$= \frac{5}{2} \cdot \frac{\cancel{4}}{7}$$

$$= \frac{5 \cdot 2}{1 \cdot 7}$$

$$= \frac{10}{7}$$

Answer: 107

When dividing by an integer, it is helpful to rewrite it as a fraction over 1.

Example 9: Divide: 23÷6.

Solution: Rewrite 6 as 61 and multiply by its reciprocal.

$$\frac{2}{3} \div 6 = \frac{2}{3} \div \frac{6}{1}$$

$$= \frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{6}$$

$$= \frac{\cancel{2}}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{\cancel{6}}$$

$$= \frac{1 \cdot 1}{3 \cdot 3}$$

$$= \frac{1}{9}$$

Answer: 19

Also, note that we only cancel when working with multiplication. Rewrite any division problem as a product before canceling.

Try this! Divide: 5÷235.

Answer: 11213

# **Adding and Subtracting Fractions**

Negative fractions are indicated with the negative sign in front of the fraction bar, in the numerator, or in the denominator.

All such forms are equivalent and interchangeable.

$$\frac{-3}{4} = -\frac{3}{4} = \frac{3}{-4}$$

Adding or subtracting fractions requires a common denominator. In this section, assume the common denominator c is a nonzero integer.

$$\frac{a}{c} + \frac{b}{c} = \frac{a+b}{c}$$
 and  $\frac{a}{c} - \frac{b}{c} = \frac{a-b}{c}$ 

It is good practice to use positive common denominators by expressing negative fractions with negative numerators. In short, avoid negative denominators.

Example 10: Subtract: 1215-315.

**Solution:** The two fractions have a common denominator 15. Therefore, subtract the numerators and write the result over the common denominator:

$$\frac{12}{15} - \frac{3}{15} = \frac{12 - 3}{15}$$

$$= \frac{9}{15}$$

$$= \frac{9 \div 3}{15 \div 3}$$

$$= \frac{3}{5}$$
Reduce.

Answer: 35

Most problems that you are likely to encounter will have unlike denominators. In this case, first find equivalent fractions with a common denominator before adding or subtracting the numerators. One way to obtain equivalent fractions is to divide the numerator and the denominator by the same number. We now review a technique for finding equivalent fractions by multiplying the numerator and the denominator by the same number. It should be clear that 5/5 is equal to 1 and that 1 multiplied times any number is that number:

$$\frac{1}{2} = \frac{1}{2} \cdot 1 = \frac{1}{2} \cdot \frac{5}{5} = \frac{5}{10}$$

We have equivalent fractions 12=510. Use this idea to find equivalent fractions with a common denominator to add or subtract fractions. The steps are outlined in the following example.

Example 11: Subtract: 715-310.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Determine a common denominator. To do this, use the least common multiple (LCM) of the given denominators. The LCM of 15 and 10 is indicated by LCM(15, 10). Try to think of the smallest number that both denominators divide into evenly. List the multiples of each number:

Common multiples are listed in bold, and the least common multiple is 30.

$$LCM(10, 15) = 30$$

**Step 2:** Multiply the numerator and the denominator of each fraction by values that result in equivalent fractions with the determined common denominator.

$$\frac{7}{15} - \frac{3}{10} = \frac{7 \cdot 2}{15 \cdot 2} - \frac{3 \cdot 3}{10 \cdot 3}$$
$$= \frac{14}{30} - \frac{9}{30}$$

Step 3: Add or subtract the numerators, write the result over the common denominator and then reduce if possible.

$$\frac{14}{30} - \frac{9}{30} = \frac{14 - 9}{30}$$

$$= \frac{5}{30}$$

$$= \frac{5 \div 5}{30 \div 5}$$

$$= \frac{1}{6}$$

Answer: 16

The least common multiple of the denominators is called the least common denominator (LCD). Finding the LCD is often the difficult step. It is worth finding because if any common multiple other than the least is used, then there will be more steps involved when reducing.

**Example 12:** Add: 510+118.

Solution: First, determine that the LCM(10, 18) is 90 and then find equivalent fractions with 90 as the denominator.

$$\frac{5}{10} + \frac{1}{18} = \frac{5 \cdot 9}{10 \cdot 9} + \frac{1 \cdot 5}{18 \cdot 5}$$

$$= \frac{45}{90} + \frac{5}{90}$$

$$= \frac{45 + 5}{90}$$

$$= \frac{50}{90}$$

$$= \frac{50 \div 10}{90 \div 10}$$

$$= \frac{5}{9}$$

Answer: 59

Try this! Add: 230+521.

Answer: 32105

Example 13: Simplify: 213+35-12.

Solution: Begin by converting 213 to an improper fraction.

$$2\frac{1}{3} + \frac{3}{5} - \frac{1}{2} = \frac{7}{3} + \frac{3}{5} - \frac{1}{2}$$

$$= \frac{7 \cdot 10}{3 \cdot 10} + \frac{3 \cdot 6}{5 \cdot 6} - \frac{1 \cdot 15}{2 \cdot 15}$$

$$= \frac{70}{30} + \frac{18}{30} - \frac{15}{30}$$

$$= \frac{70 + 18 - 15}{30}$$

$$= \frac{73}{30}$$

$$= 2\frac{13}{30}$$

$$= 2\frac{13}{30}$$
Convert to improper fractions.

LCM(3, 5, 2) = 30

Equivalent fractions with a common denominator

Convert to improper fractions.

Answer: 21330

In general, it is preferable to work with improper fractions. However, when the original problem involves mixed numbers, if appropriate, present your answers as mixed numbers. Also, mixed numbers are often preferred when working with numbers on a number line and with real-world applications.

Try this! Subtract: 57-217.

Answer: -137

Example 14: How many 12 inch thick paperback books can be stacked to fit on a shelf that is 112 feet in height?

**Solution:** First, determine the height of the shelf in inches. To do this, use the fact that there are 12 inches in 1 foot and multiply as follows:

$$1\frac{1}{2} \text{ ft} = 1\frac{1}{2} \text{ ft} \cdot \left(\frac{12 \text{ in}}{1 \text{ ft}}\right)$$
$$= \frac{3}{\cancel{2}} \cdot \frac{\cancel{12}}{1} \text{ in}$$
$$= 18 \text{ in}$$

Next, determine how many notebooks will fit by dividing the height of the shelf by the thickness of each book.

$$18 \text{ in} \div \frac{1}{2} \text{ in} = 18 \cdot \frac{2}{1}$$
$$= 18 \cdot 2$$
$$= 36$$

Answer: 36 books can be stacked on the shelf.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Fractions are not unique; there are many ways to express the same ratio. Find equivalent fractions by multiplying or dividing the numerator and the denominator by the same real number.
- Equivalent fractions in lowest terms are generally preferred. It is a good practice to always reduce.
- In algebra, improper fractions are generally preferred. However, in real-life applications, mixed number equivalents are often preferred. We may present answers as improper fractions unless the original question contains mixed numbers, or it is an answer to a real-world or geometric application.
- Multiplying fractions does not require a common denominator; multiply the numerators and multiply the denominators to obtain the
  product. It is a best practice to cancel any common factors in the numerator and the denominator before multiplying.
- Reciprocals are rational numbers whose product is equal to 1. Given a fraction ab, its reciprocal is ba.
- Divide fractions by multiplying the dividend by the reciprocal of the divisor. In other words, multiply the numerator by the reciprocal
  of the denominator.
- Rewrite any division problem as a product before canceling.

- Adding or subtracting fractions requires a common denominator. When the denominators of any number of fractions are the same,
   simply add or subtract the numerators and write the result over the common denominator.
- Before adding or subtracting fractions, ensure that the denominators are the same by finding equivalent fractions with a common denominator. Multiply the numerator and the denominator of each fraction by the appropriate value to find the equivalent fractions.
- Typically, it is best to convert all mixed numbers to improper fractions before beginning the process of adding, subtracting, multiplying, or dividing.


## 1.5 Review of Decimals and Percents

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Convert fractions to decimals and back.

#### **Decimals**

In this section, we provide a brief review of the decimal system. A real number in decimal form, a decimal consists of a decimal point, digits (0 through 9) to the left of the decimal point representing the whole number part, and digits to the right of the decimal point representing the fractional part. The digits represent powers of 10 as shown in the set {..., 1,000, 100, 10, 1, 1/10, 1/100, 1/1,000, ...} according to the following diagram:



For example, the decimal 538.3 can be written in the following expanded form:

$$5 \cdot 100 + 3 \cdot 10 + 8 \cdot 1 + 3 \cdot \frac{1}{10}$$

After simplifying, we obtain the mixed number 538310. Use this process to convert decimals to mixed numbers.

Example 1: Write as a mixed number: 32.15.

**Solution:** In this example, 32 is the whole part and the decimal ends in the hundredths place. Therefore, the fractional part will be 15/100, and we can write

$$32.15 = 32 + \frac{15}{100}$$
 Reduce.  
=  $32 + \frac{3}{20}$   
=  $32 \frac{3}{20}$ 

Answer: 32.15=32320

To convert fractions to decimal equivalents, divide.

Example 2: Write as a decimal: 34.

Solution: Use long division to convert to a decimal.

$$\begin{array}{r}
0.75 \\
4)3.00 \\
-28 \\
20 \\
-20 \\
0
\end{array}$$

Answer: 34=0.75

If the division never ends, then use a bar over the repeating digit (or block of digits) to indicate a repeating decimal.

Example 3: Write as a decimal: 256.

Solution: Use long division to convert the fractional part to a decimal and then add the whole part.

$$\begin{array}{r}
0.833...\\
6) 5.0000\\
-48 \\
\hline
20\\
-18 \\
\hline
20\\
-18\\
\hline
20
\end{array}$$

At this point, we can see that the long division will continue to repeat. When this is the case, use a bar over the repeating digit to indicate that it continues forever:

$$\frac{5}{6} = 0.8\overline{3}$$

Then write

$$2\frac{5}{6} = 2 + \frac{5}{6}$$
$$= 2 + 0.8\overline{3}$$
$$= 2.8\overline{3}$$

Answer: 256=2.83

To add or subtract decimals, align them vertically with the decimal point and add corresponding place values. Recall that sometimes you need to borrow from or carry over to the adjoining column (regrouping).

**Example 4:** Subtract: 54.328–23.25.

**Solution:** Note that trailing zeros to the right of the decimal point do not change the value of the decimal, 23.25 = 23.250. In this case, you need to borrow from the tenths place (regroup) to subtract the digits in the hundredths place.

$$54.\cancel{3}\cancel{2}^{12} 8$$

$$- 23.250$$

$$31.078$$

Answer: 31.078

Multiply decimals the same way you multiply whole numbers. The number of decimal places in the product will be the sum of the decimal places found in each of the factors.

**Example 5:** Multiply: 5.36×7.4.

**Solution:** The total number of decimal places of the two factors is 2 + 1 = 3. Therefore, the result has 3 decimal places.

$$5.36 \times \frac{7.4}{2144} + \frac{3752}{39.664} \leftarrow 3 \text{ decimal places}$$

Answer: 39.664

When dividing decimals, move the decimal points of both the dividend and the divisor so that the divisor is a whole number.

Remember to move the decimal the same number of places for both the dividend and divisor.

Example 6: Divide: 33.3216÷6.24.

**Solution:** Move the decimal point to turn the divisor into a whole number: 624. Move the decimal points of both the divisor and dividend two places to the right.

Next, divide.

Answer: 5.34

It is often necessary to round off decimals to a specified number of decimal places. Rounding off allows us to approximate decimals with fewer significant digits. To do this, look at the digit to the right of the specified place value.

- 1. If the digit to the right of the specified place is 4 or less, then leave the specified digit unchanged and drop all subsequent digits.
- 2. If the digit to the right of the specified place is 5 or greater, then increase the value of the digit in the specified place by 1 and drop all subsequent digits.

Recall that decimals with trailing zeros to the right of the decimal point can be dropped. For example, round 5.635457 to the nearest thousandth:

Thousandth
$$5.635457 \quad Round down.$$

$$\approx 5.635$$

Round the same number 5.635457 to the nearest hundredth:

Hundredth
$$5.635457 \quad Round up.$$

$$\approx 5.64$$

After rounding off, be sure to use the appropriate notation ( $\approx$ ) to indicate that the number is now an approximation. When working with US currency, we typically round off to two decimal places, or the nearest hundredth.

Example 7: Calculate and round off to the nearest hundredth.

- a. 1/3 of \$10.25.
- b. 1/4 of \$10.25.

Solution: In this context, the key word "of" indicates that we should multiply.

a. Multiplying by 13 is equivalent to dividing by 3.

$$\frac{\frac{1}{3}}{3} \cdot \$10.25 = \frac{\$10.25}{3}$$

$$= \$3.41\overline{6} \qquad Round up.$$

$$\approx \$3.42$$

b. Multiplying by 14 is equivalent to dividing by 4.

$$\frac{1}{4} \cdot \$10.25 = \frac{\$10.25}{4}$$
= \\$2.5625 Round down.
\approx \\$2.56

Answers: a. \$3.42; b. \$2.56

#### **Definition of Percent**

A percent is a representation of a number as a part of one hundred. The word "percent" can be written "per cent" which means "per 100" or "/ 100." We use the symbol (%) to denote a percentage:

$$N\% = \frac{N}{100}$$

For example,

$$5\% = \frac{5}{100} = 0.05$$


$$100\% = \frac{100}{100} = 1$$

$$72\% = \frac{72}{100} = 0.72$$

$$135\% = \frac{135}{100} = 1.35$$

Percents are an important part of our everyday life and show up often in our study of algebra. Percents can be visualized using a pie chart (or circle graph), where each sector gives a visual representation of a percentage of the whole. For example, the following pie chart shows the percentage of students in certain age categories of all US community colleges.

## US Community Colleges 2009 Age Demographics



Source: American Association of Community Colleges.

Each sector is proportional to the size of the part out of the whole. The sum of the percentages presented in a pie chart must be 100%. To work with percentages effectively, you have to know how to convert percents to decimals or fractions and back again.

#### **Percents to Decimals**

Applying the definition of percent, you see that 58%=58100=0.58. The same result can be obtained by moving the *decimal two* places to the left. To convert percents to decimals, either apply the definition or move the decimal two places to the left.

Example 8: Convert to a decimal: 152%.

**Solution:** Treat 152% as 152.0% and move the decimal two places to the left.

Answer: 1.52

Example 9: Convert to a decimal: 234%.

Solution: First, write the decimal percent equivalent,

$$2\frac{3}{4}\% = 2.75\%$$

Next, move the decimal two places to the left,

At this point, fill in the tenths place with a zero.

$$2.75\% = 0.0275$$

Answer: 0.0275

Try this! Convert to a decimal: 215%.

Answer: 2.15

#### **Decimals and Fractions to Percents**

To convert a decimal to a percent, convert the decimal to a fraction of 100 and apply the definition of percent, or equivalently, move the decimal to the right two places and add a percent sign.

**Example 10:** Convert 0.23 to a percent.

Solution: First, convert the decimal to a fraction of 100 and apply the definition.

$$0.23 = \frac{23}{100} = 23\%$$

You can achieve the same result by moving the decimal two places to the right and adding a percent sign.

$$0.23 = 23\%$$

Answer: 23%.

Alternatively, you can multiply by 1 in the form of 100%.

**Example 11:** Convert 2.35 to a percent.

**Solution:** Recall that 1 = 100%.

$$2.35 = 2.35 \cdot 1$$
  
=  $2.35 \cdot 100\%$   
=  $235\%$ 

You can achieve the same result by moving the decimal two places to the right and adding a percent sign.

Answer: 235%

Example 12: Convert 515 to a percent.

Solution:

$$5\frac{1}{5} = 5.20$$
$$= 520\%$$

Answer: 520%

Sometimes we can use the definition of percent and find an equivalent fraction with a denominator of 100.

Example 13: Convert 1325 to a percent.

**Solution:** Notice that the denominator 25 is a factor of 100. Use the definition of percent by finding an equivalent fraction with 100 in the denominator.

$$\frac{13}{25} = \frac{13 \cdot 4}{25 \cdot 4} = \frac{52}{100} = 52\%$$

Answer: 52%

This is a very specialized technique because 100 may not be a multiple of the denominator.

Example 14: Convert 13 to a percent.

Solution: Notice that the denominator 3 is not a factor of 100. In this case, it is best to multiply by 1 in the form of 100%.

$$\frac{1}{3} = \frac{1}{3} \cdot 100\%$$

$$= \frac{100}{3} \%$$

$$= 33\frac{1}{3} \%$$

Answer: 3313%

Try this! Convert to a percent: 23.

Answer: 6623%

### **Percents to Fractions**

When converting percents to fractions, apply the definition of percent and then reduce.

Example 15: Convert to a fraction: 28%.

Solution:

$$28\% = \frac{28}{100}$$

$$= \frac{28 \div 4}{100 \div 4}$$

$$= \frac{7}{25}$$

Answer: 725

Applying the definition of percent is equivalent to removing the percent sign and multiplying by 1100.

Example 16: Convert to a fraction: 6623%.

Solution: First, convert to an improper fraction and then apply the definition of percent.

$$66\frac{2}{3}\% = \frac{200}{3}\%$$

$$= \frac{200}{3} \div 100$$

$$= \frac{200}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{100}$$

$$= \frac{2}{3}$$

Answer: 23


Try this! Convert to a fraction: 3731%.

Answer: 131

**Example 17:** Using the given pie chart, calculate the total number of students that were 21 years old or younger if the total US community college enrollment in 2009 was 11.7 million.

Solution: From the pie chart we can determine that 47% of the total 11.7 million students were 21 years old or younger.

Convert 47% to a decimal and multiply as indicated by the key word "of."

 $0.47 \cdot 11.7 \approx 5.5$ 

Answer: In 2009, approximately 5.5 million students enrolled in US community colleges were 21 years old or younger.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- To convert a decimal to a mixed number, add the appropriate fractional part indicated by the digits to the right of the decimal point to the whole part indicated by the digits to the left of the decimal point and reduce if necessary.
- To convert a mixed number to a decimal, convert the fractional part of the mixed number to a decimal using long division and then
   add it to the whole number part.


- To add or subtract decimals, align them vertically with the decimal point and add corresponding place values.
- To multiply decimals, multiply as usual for whole numbers and count the number of decimal places of each factor. The number of decimal places in the product will be the sum of the decimal places found in each of the factors.
- To divide decimals, move the decimal in both the divisor and dividend until the divisor is a whole number and then divide as usual.
- When rounding off decimals, look to the digit to the right of the specified place value. If the digit to the right is 4 or less, round down by leaving the specified digit unchanged and dropping all subsequent digits. If the digit to the right is 5 or more, round up by increasing the specified digit by one and dropping all subsequent digits.
- A percent represents a number as part of 100: N%=N100.
- To convert a percent to a decimal, apply the definition of percent and write that number divided by 100. This is equivalent to moving the decimal two places to the left.
- To convert a percent to a fraction, apply the definition of percent and then reduce.
- To convert a decimal or fraction to a percent, multiply by 1 in the form of 100%. This is equivalent to moving the decimal two places to the right and adding a percent sign.
- Pie charts are circular graphs where each sector is proportional to the size of the part out of the whole. The sum of the percentages must total 100%.







## 1.6 Exponents and Square Roots

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Interpret exponential notation with positive integer exponents.
- 2. Calculate the *n*th power of a real number.
- 3. Calculate the exact and approximate value of the square root of a real number.

#### **Exponential Notation and Positive Integer Exponents**

If a number is repeated as a factor numerous times, then we can write the product in a more compact form using exponential notation. For example,

$$5 \cdot 5 \cdot 5 \cdot 5 = 5^4$$

The base is the factor, and the positive integer exponent indicates the number of times the base is repeated as a factor. In the above example, the base is 5 and the exponent is 4. In general, if a is the base that is repeated as a factor n times, then

$$a^n = \underbrace{a \cdot a \cdot a \cdot \dots \cdot a}_{n \text{ factors of } a}$$

When the exponent is 2, we call the result a square. For example,

$$3^2 = 3 \cdot 3 = 9$$

The number 3 is the base and the integer 2 is the exponent. The notation 32 can be read two ways: "three squared" or "3 raised to the second power." The base can be any real number.

$$(3.2)^{2} = (3.2) (3.2) = 10.24$$

$$\left(\frac{3}{5}\right)^{2} = \left(\frac{3}{5}\right) \left(\frac{3}{5}\right) = \left(\frac{9}{25}\right)$$

$$(-7)^{2} = (-7) (-7) = 49$$

$$-5^{2} = -5 \cdot 5 = -25$$

It is important to study the difference between the ways the last two examples are calculated. In the example  $(-7)_2$ , the base is -7 as indicated by the parentheses. In the example  $-5_2$ , the base is 5, not -5, so only the 5 is squared and the result remains negative. To illustrate this, write

$$-5^2 = -1 \cdot 5^2 = -1 \cdot 5 \cdot 5 = -25$$

This subtle distinction is very important because it determines the sign of the result.

The textual notation for exponents is usually denoted using the caret (^) symbol as follows:

$$8^2 = 8 ^2 = 8 * 8 = 64$$
  
-5.1<sup>2</sup> = -5.1<sup>2</sup> = -5.1\*5.1 = -26.01

The square of an integer is called a perfect square. The ability to recognize perfect squares is useful in our study of algebra.

The squares of the integers from 1 to 15 should be memorized. A partial list of perfect squares follows:

$$\{0, 1, 4, 9, 16, 25, 36, 49, 64, 81, 100, 121, 144, 169, 196, 225, ...\}$$

Try this! Simplify (-12)2.

Answer: 144

When the exponent is 3 we call the result a cube. For example,

$$3^3 = 3 \cdot 3 \cdot 3 = 27$$

The notation 33 can be read two ways: "three cubed" or "3 raised to the third power." As before, the base can be any real number.

$$\left(\frac{2}{5}\right)^3 = \left(\frac{2}{5}\right)\left(\frac{2}{5}\right)\left(\frac{2}{5}\right) = \frac{8}{125}$$

$$(-7)^3 = (-7)(-7)(-7) = -343$$

$$-4^3 = -4 \cdot 4 \cdot 4 = -64$$

Note that the result of cubing a negative number is negative. The cube of an integer is called a perfect cube. The ability to recognize perfect cubes is useful in our study of algebra. The cubes of the integers from 1 to 10 should be memorized. A partial list of perfect cubes follows:

$$\{0, 1, 8, 27, 64, 125, 216, 343, 512, 729, 1000, ...\}$$

Try this! Simplify (-2)3.

Answer: -8

If the exponent is greater than 3, then the notation  $a_n$  is read "a raised to the nth power."

$$10^{6} = 10 \cdot 10 \cdot 10 \cdot 10 \cdot 10 \cdot 10 = 1,000,000$$

$$(-1)^{4} = (-1)(-1)(-1)(-1) = 1$$

$$\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^{5} = \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3} = \frac{1}{243}$$

Notice that the result of a negative base with an even exponent is positive. The result of a negative base with an odd exponent

is negative. These facts are often confused when negative numbers are involved. Study the following four examples carefully:

The base is (-2)	The base is 2
$(-2)4 = (-2) \cdot (-2) \cdot (-2) \cdot (-2) = +16(-2)3 = (-2) \cdot (-2) \cdot (-2) = -8$	-24=-2·2·2-16-23=-2·2·2=-8

The parentheses indicate that the negative number is to be used as the base.

Example 1: Calculate:

a. (-13)3

b. (-13)4

**Solution:** The base is -13 for both problems.

a. Use the base as a factor three times.

$$\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)^3 = \left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)$$
$$= -\frac{1}{27}$$

b. Use the base as a factor four times.

$$\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)^4 = \left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)\left(-\frac{1}{3}\right)$$
$$= +\frac{1}{81}$$

Answers: a. -127; b. 181

Try this! Simplify: -104 and (-10)4.

Answers: -10,000 and 10,000

#### Square Root of a Real Number

Think of finding the square root of a number as the inverse of squaring a number. In other words, to determine the square root of 25 the question is, "What number squared equals 25?" Actually, there are two answers to this question, 5 and -5.

$$5^2 = 25$$
 and  $(-5)^2 = 25$ 

When asked for the square root of a number, we implicitly mean the principal (nonnegative) square root. Therefore we have,

$$\sqrt{a^2} = a$$
, if  $a \ge 0$  or more generally  $\sqrt{a^2} = |a|$ 

As an example, 25— $\sqrt{-5}$ , which is read "square root of 25 equals 5." The symbol  $\sqrt{}$  is called the radical sign and 25 is called the radicand. The alternative textual notation for square roots follows:

$$\sqrt{16} = \text{sqrt}(16) = 4$$



It is also worthwhile to note that

$$\sqrt{1} = 1$$
 and  $\sqrt{0} = 0$ 

This is the case because 12=1 and 02=0.

**Example 2:** Simplify: 10,000——— $\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** 10,000 is a perfect square because 100·100=10,000.

$$\sqrt{10,000} = \sqrt{(100)^2}$$
$$= 100$$

Answer: 100

**Example 3:** Simplify:  $19--\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Here we notice that 19 is a square because 13·13=19.

$$\sqrt{\frac{1}{9}} = \sqrt{\left(\frac{1}{3}\right)^2}$$
$$= \frac{1}{3}$$

Answer: 13

Given a and b as positive real numbers, use the following property to simplify square roots whose radicands are not squares:

$$\sqrt{a \cdot b} = \sqrt{a} \cdot \sqrt{b}$$

The idea is to identify the largest square factor of the radicand and then apply the property shown above. As an example, to simplify  $8\sqrt{\text{notice}}$  that 8 is not a perfect square. However,  $8=4\cdot2$  and thus has a perfect square factor other than 1. Apply the property as follows:

$$\sqrt{8} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 2}$$

$$= \sqrt{4} \cdot \sqrt{2}$$

$$= 2 \cdot \sqrt{2}$$

$$= 2\sqrt{2}$$

Here  $22\sqrt{}$  is a simplified irrational number. You are often asked to find an approximate answer rounded off to a certain decimal place. In that case, use a calculator to find the decimal approximation using either the original problem or the simplified equivalent.

$$\sqrt{8} = 2\sqrt{2} \approx 2.83$$

On a calculator, try 2.83<sup>2</sup>. What do you expect? Why is the answer not what you would expect?

It is important to mention that the radicand must be positive. For example, -9——vis undefined since there is no real number that when squared is negative. Try taking the square root of a negative number on your calculator. What does it say? Note: taking the square root of a negative number is defined later in the course.

**Example 4:** Simplify and give an approximate answer rounded to the nearest hundredth:  $75-\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** The radicand 75 can be factored as  $25 \cdot 3$  where the factor 25 is a perfect square.

$$\sqrt{75} = \sqrt{25 \cdot 3}$$
The largest perfect square
$$= \sqrt{25} \cdot \sqrt{3}$$
factor of 75 is 25.
$$= 5 \cdot \sqrt{3}$$

$$= 5\sqrt{3}$$
Exact answer
$$\approx 8.66$$
Approximate answer

Answer: 75--√≈8.66

As a check, calculate 75— $\sqrt{}$  and 53 $\sqrt{}$  on a calculator and verify that the both results are approximately 8.66.

**Example 5:** Simplify: 180— $-\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$\sqrt{180} = \sqrt{36 \cdot 5}$$

$$= \sqrt{36} \cdot \sqrt{5}$$

$$= 6 \cdot \sqrt{5}$$

$$= 6\sqrt{5}$$

Since the question did not ask for an approximate answer, we present the exact answer.

Answer: 65√

**Example 5:** Simplify: -5162— $-\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$-5\sqrt{162} = -5 \cdot \sqrt{81 \cdot 2}$$

$$= -5 \cdot \sqrt{81} \cdot \sqrt{2}$$

$$= -5 \cdot 9 \cdot \sqrt{2}$$

$$= -45 \cdot \sqrt{2}$$


$$= -45\sqrt{2}$$

Answer: -452√

Try this! Simplify and give an approximate answer rounded to the nearest hundredth: 128—√.


Answer: 82√≈11.31

A right triangle is a triangle where one of the angles measures 90°. The side opposite the right angle is the longest side, called the hypotenuse, and the other two sides are called legs. Numerous real-world applications involve this geometric figure. The Pythagorean theorem states that given any right triangle with legs measuring a and b units, the square of the measure of the hypotenuse c is equal to the sum of the squares of the measures of the legs: a2+b2=c2. In other words, the hypotenuse of any right triangle is equal to the square root of the sum of the squares of its legs.



Example 6: If the two legs of a right triangle measure 3 units and 4 units, then find the length of the hypotenuse.

**Solution:** Given the lengths of the legs of a right triangle, use the formula  $c=a2+b2-\cdots-1$  to find the length of the hypotenuse.




$$c = \sqrt{a^2 + b^2}$$
$$= \sqrt{3^2 + 4^2}$$
$$= \sqrt{9 + 16}$$
$$= \sqrt{25}$$
$$= 5$$

Answer: c = 5 units

When finding the hypotenuse of a right triangle using the Pythagorean theorem, the radicand is not always a perfect square.

**Example 7:** If the two legs of a right triangle measure 2 units and 6 units, find the length of the hypotenuse.

Solution:



$$c = \sqrt{a^2 + b^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{2^2 + 6^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{4 + 36}$$

$$= \sqrt{40}$$

$$= \sqrt{4 \cdot 10}$$

$$= \sqrt{4} \cdot \sqrt{10}$$

$$= 2 \cdot \sqrt{10}$$

Answer:  $c=210--\sqrt{\text{units}}$ 

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- When using exponential notation  $a_n$ , the base a is used as a factor n times.
- When the exponent is 2, the result is called a square. When the exponent is 3, the result is called a cube.
- Memorize the squares of the integers up to 15 and the cubes of the integers up to 10. They will be used often as you progress in your study of algebra.






# 1.7 Order of Operations

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

#### **Grouping Symbols**

In a computation where more than one operation is involved, grouping symbols help tell us which operations to perform first. The grouping symbols commonly used in algebra are



All of the above grouping symbols, as well as absolute value, have the same order of precedence. Perform operations inside the innermost grouping symbol or absolute value first.

**Example 1:** Simplify: 5–(4–12).

Solution: Perform the operations within the parentheses first. In this case, first subtract 12 from 4.

$$5 - (4 - 12) = 5 - (-8)$$
  
=  $5 + 8$   
= 13

Answer: 13

**Example 2:** Simplify:  $3\{-2[-(-3-1)]\}$ .

Solution:

$$3\{-2[-(-3-1)]\} = 3\{-2[-(-4)]\}$$

$$= 3\{-2[4]\}$$

$$= 3\{-8\}$$

$$= -24$$

Answer: -24

**Example 3:** Simplify: 5-||4-(-3)||||-3||-(5-7).

Solution: The fraction bar groups the numerator and denominator. They should be simplified separately.

$$\frac{5 - |4 - (-3)|}{|-3| - (5 - 7)} = \frac{5 - |4 + 3|}{|-3| - (-2)}$$

$$= \frac{5 - |7|}{|-3| + 2}$$

$$= \frac{5 - 7}{3 + 2}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{5}$$

$$= -\frac{2}{5}$$

Answer: -25

Try this! Simplify: -[-3(2+3)].

Answer: 15

# **Order of Operations**

When several operations are to be applied within a calculation, we must follow a specific order to ensure a single correct result.

- 1. Perform all calculations within the innermost **parentheses** or grouping symbols.
- 2. Evaluate all exponents.

- 3. Perform multiplication and division operations from left to right.
- 4. Finally, perform all remaining addition and subtraction operations from left to right.

Caution: Note that multiplication and division operations must be worked from left to right.

Example 4: Simplify:  $52-4\cdot 3\div 12$ .

Solution: First, evaluate 52 and then perform multiplication and division as they appear from left to right.

$$5^{2} - 4 \cdot 3 \div 12 = 25 - 4 \cdot 3 \div 12$$
$$= 25 - 12 \div 12$$
$$= 25 - 1$$
$$= 24$$

Answer: 24

Because multiplication and division operations should be worked from left to right, it is sometimes correct to perform division before multiplication.

**Example 5:** Simplify: 24–12÷3·2+11.

**Solution:** Begin by evaluating the exponent,  $24=2\cdot2\cdot2\cdot2=16$ .

$$2^{4} - 12 \div 3 \cdot 2 + 11 = 16 - 12 \div 3 \cdot 2 + 11$$

$$= 16 - 4 \cdot 2 + 11$$

$$= 16 - 8 + 11$$

$$= 8 + 11$$

$$= 19$$

Multiplying first leads to an incorrect result.

$$2^{4} - 12 \div 3 \cdot 2 + 11 = 16 - 12 \div 3 \cdot 2 + 11$$

$$= 16 - 12 \div 6 + 11$$

$$= 16 - 2 + 11$$

$$= 14 + 11$$

$$= 25$$

**Example 6:** Simplify: -3-52+(-7)2.

Solution: Take care to correctly identify the base when squaring.

$$-3-5^{2} + (-7)^{2} = -3-25+49$$
$$= -28+49$$
$$= 21$$

Answer: 21

**Example 7:** Simplify: 5-3[23-5+7(-3)].

**Solution:** It is tempting to first subtract 5 – 3, but this will lead to an incorrect result. The order of operations requires us to simplify within the brackets first.

$$5-3[2^{3}-5+7(-3)] = 5-3[8-5-21]$$

$$= 5-3[-18]$$

$$= 5+54$$

$$= 59$$

Subtracting 5 - 3 first leads to an incorrect result.

$$5-3 \ 2^{3} \left[ -5+7 \left( -3 \right) \right] = \underbrace{5-3}_{Incorrect} \left[ 8-5-21 \right]$$
$$= 2 \left[ -18 \right]$$
$$= -36 \quad \times$$

**Example 8:** Simplify: -32-[5-(42-10)].

Solution: Perform the operations within the innermost parentheses first.

$$-3^{2} - [5 - (4^{2} - 10)] = -3^{2} - [5 - (16 - 10)]$$

$$= -3^{2} - [5 - 6]$$

$$= -3^{2} - [-1]$$

$$= -9 + 1$$

$$= -8$$

Answer: -8

**Example 9:** Simplify: (-23)2÷[53-(-12)3].

Solution:

$$\left(-\frac{2}{3}\right)^{2} \div \left[\frac{5}{3} - \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)^{3}\right] = \left(-\frac{2}{3}\right)^{2} \div \left[\frac{5}{3} - \left(-\frac{1}{8}\right)\right]$$

$$= \left(-\frac{2}{3}\right)^{2} \div \left[\frac{5}{3} + \frac{1}{8}\right]$$

$$= \left(-\frac{2}{3}\right)^{2} \div \left[\frac{40}{24} + \frac{3}{24}\right]$$

$$= \left(-\frac{2}{3}\right)^{2} \div \frac{43}{24}$$

$$= \frac{4}{\cancel{9}} \cdot \frac{\cancel{24}}{\cancel{43}}$$

$$= \frac{32}{129}$$

We are less likely to make a mistake if we work one operation at a time. Some problems may involve an absolute value, in which case we assign it the same order of precedence as parentheses.

**Example 10:** Simplify: 2-4|-4-3|+(-2)4.

**Solution:** We begin by evaluating the absolute value and then the exponent (-2)4=(-2)(-2)(-2)=+16.

$$2-4|-4-3| + (-2)^{4} = 2-4|-7| + (-2)^{4}$$

$$= 2-4 \cdot 7 + 16$$

$$= 2-28+16$$

$$= -26+16$$

$$= -10$$

Answer: -10

**Try this!** Simplify:  $10 \div 5 \cdot 2|(-4) + |-3|| + (-3)2$ .

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Grouping symbols indicate which operations to perform first. We usually group mathematical operations with parentheses, brackets, braces, and the fraction bar. We also group operations within absolute values. All groupings have the same order of precedence: the operations within the innermost grouping are performed first.
- When applying operations within a calculation, follow the order of operations to ensure a single correct result.
- 1. Address innermost parentheses or groupings first.
- 2. Simplify all exponents.
- 3. Perform multiplication and division operations from left to right.
- 4. Finally, perform addition and subtraction operations from left to right.
- It is important to highlight the fact that multiplication and division operations should be applied as they appear from left to right. It is a common mistake to always perform multiplication before division, which, as we have seen, in some cases produces incorrect results.





# 2.1 Introduction to Algebra

### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- Identify an algebraic expression and its parts.
- Evaluate algebraic expressions.
- Use formulas to solve problems in common applications.

### **Preliminary Definitions**

In algebra, letters are used to represent numbers. The letters used to represent these numbers are called variables.

Combinations of variables and numbers along with mathematical operations form algebraic expressions, or just expressions.

The following are some examples of expressions with one variable, x:

$$2x + 3$$

$$x^2 - 9$$

$$2x+3$$
  $x^2-9$   $3x^2+2x-1$ 

$$\frac{x-5}{x^2-25}$$

Terms in an algebraic expression are separated by addition operators, and factors are separated by multiplication operators.

The numerical factor of a term is called the coefficient. For example, the algebraic expression 3x2+2x-1can be thought of as  $3x^2+2x+(-1)$  and has three terms. The first term,  $3x^2$ , represents the quantity  $3x \cdot x$ , where 3 is the coefficient and x is the variable. All of the variable factors, with their exponents, form the variable part of a term. If a term is written without a

variable factor, then it is called a constant term. Consider the components of  $3x_2+2x-1$ ,

Terms	Coefficient	Variable Part
3x2	3	<i>x</i> 2
2 <i>x</i>	2	х
-1	-1	

The third term in this expression, -1, is a constant term because it is written without a variable factor. While a variable represents an unknown quantity and may change, the constant term does not change.

**Example 1:** List all coefficients and variable parts of each term: 5x2-4xy-y2.

Solution: Think of the third term in this example, -y2, as -1y2.

Terms	Coefficient	Variable Part
5 <i>x</i> 2	5	<i>x</i> 2
-4 <i>xy</i>	-4	xy
-y2	-1	<i>y</i> 2

Answer: Coefficients: {-4, -1, 5}; variable parts: {x2, xy, y2}

Some terms, such as y<sub>2</sub> and -y<sub>2</sub>, appear not to have a coefficient. The multiplicative identity property states that 1 times anything is itself and occurs so often that it is customary to omit this factor and write

$$1y^2 = y^2$$
$$-1y^2 = -y^2$$

Therefore, the coefficient of  $y_2$  is actually 1 and the coefficient of  $-y_2$  is -1. In addition, you will encounter terms that have variable parts composed of algebraic expressions as factors.

**Example 2:** List all coefficients and variable parts of each term: -3(x+y)3+(x+y)2.

**Solution:** This is an expression with two terms:

Terms	Coefficient	Variable Part
$-3(x+y)_3$	-3	(x+y)3
(x+y)2	1	(x+y)2

Answer: Coefficients:  $\{-3, 1\}$ ; variable parts:  $\{(x+y)_3, (x+y)_2\}$ 

In our study of algebra, we will encounter a wide variety of algebraic expressions. Typically, expressions use the two most common variables, x and y. However, expressions may use any letter (or symbol) for a variable, even Greek letters, such as alpha ( $\alpha$ ) and beta ( $\beta$ ). Some letters and symbols are reserved for constants, such as  $\pi \approx 3.14159$  and  $\epsilon \approx 2.71828$ . Since there is only a limited number of letters, you will also use subscripts,  $x_1, x_2, x_3, x_4, \ldots$ , to indicate different variables.

**Try this!** List all coefficients and variable parts of the expression: -5a2+ab-2b2-3.

Answer: Coefficients:  $\{-5, -3, -2, 1\}$ ; variable parts:  $\{a2, ab, b2\}$ 

#### **Evaluating Algebraic Expressions**

Think of an algebraic expression as a generalization of particular arithmetic operations. Performing these operations after substituting given values for variables is called evaluating. In algebra, a variable represents an unknown value. However, if the problem specifically assigns a value to a variable, then you can replace that letter with the given number and evaluate using the order of operations.

Example 3: Evaluate:

a. 2x+3, where x=-4

b. 23y, where y=9

**Solution:** To avoid common errors, it is a best practice to first replace all variables with parentheses and then replace, or substitute, the given value.

a.

$$2x+3=2()+3$$
  
= 2(-4)+3  
= -8+3  
= -5

b.

$$\frac{2}{3}y = \frac{2}{3}(9)$$

$$= \frac{2}{3}(9)$$

$$= 2 \cdot 3$$

$$= 6$$

Answers: a. -5; b. 6

If parentheses are not used in part (a) of the previous example, the result is quite different: 2x+3=2-4+4. Without parentheses, the first operation is subtraction, which leads to an incorrect result.

**Example 4:** Evaluate: -2x-y, where x=-5 and y=-3.

Solution: After substituting the given values for the variables, simplify using the order of operations.

$$-2x-y=-2($$
 )-( ) Replace variables with parentheses.  
 $=-2(-5)-(-3)$  Substitute values for x and y.  
 $=10+3$  Simplify.  
 $=13$ 

Answer: 13

**Example 5:** Evaluate: 9a2-b2, where a=2 and b=-5.

Solution:

$$9a^{2}-b^{2} = 9 ( )^{2}-( )^{2}$$

$$= 9 (2)^{2}-(-5)^{2}$$

$$= 9 \cdot 4-25$$

$$= 36-25$$

$$= 11$$

**Example 6:** Evaluate:  $-x_2-4x+1$ , where x=-12.

Solution:

$$-x^{2} - 4x + 1 = -()^{2} - 4() + 1$$

$$= -\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)^{2} - 4\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) + 1$$

$$= -\left(\frac{1}{4}\right) + 2 + 1$$

$$= -\frac{1}{4} + 3$$

$$= -\frac{1}{4} + \frac{12}{4}$$

$$= \frac{11}{4}$$
Apply the exponent first.
$$\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)^{2} = \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) = \frac{1}{4}$$

Answer: 11/4

The answer to the previous example is 114, which can be written as a mixed number 234. In algebra, improper fractions are generally preferred. Unless the original problem has mixed numbers in it, or it is an answer to a real-world application, solutions will be expressed as reduced improper fractions.

**Example 7:** Evaluate: (3x-2)(x-7), where x=23.

Solution: The order of operations requires us to perform the operations within the parentheses first.

$$(3x-2)(x-7) = (3(2)-2)((3)-7)$$

$$= \left(3\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)-2\right)\left(\left(\frac{2}{3}\right)-7\right)$$

$$= (2-2)\left(\frac{2}{3}-\frac{21}{3}\right)$$

$$= (0)\left(-\frac{19}{3}\right)$$

$$= 0$$

Answer: 0

**Example 8:** Evaluate: b2-4ac, where a=-1, b=-3, and c=2.

**Solution:** The expression  $b_2$ –4ac is called the discriminant; it is an essential quantity seen later in our study of algebra.

$$b^{2}-4ac = ()^{2}-4()()$$
 Exponents first, then multiplication  
 $= (-3)^{2}-4(-1)(2)$   $(-3)^{2} = (-3)(-3) = +9$   
 $= 9+4(2)$   
 $= 9+8$   
 $= 17$ 

Answer: 17

**Try this!** Evaluate  $a_3-b_3$ , where a=2 and b=-3.

Answer: 35

#### **Using Formulas**

The main difference between algebra and arithmetic is the organized use of variables. This idea leads to reusable formulas, which are mathematical models using algebraic expressions to describe common applications. For example, the area of a rectangle is modeled by the formula:

$$A = l \cdot w$$

In this equation, variables are used to describe the relationship between the area of a rectangle and the length of its sides.

The area is the product of the length and width of the rectangle. If the length of a rectangle measures 3 meters and the width measures 2 meters, then the area can be calculated using the formula as follows:

$$A = l \cdot w$$
  
= 3 m (2 m)  
= 6 square meters (m<sup>2</sup>)

**Example 9:** The cost of a daily truck rental is \$48.00 plus an additional \$0.45 for every mile driven. This cost in dollars can be modeled by the formula *cost*=0.45*x*+48, where *x* represents the number of miles driven in one day. Use this formula to calculate the cost to rent the truck for a day and drive it 120 miles.

**Solution:** Use the formula to find the cost when the number of miles x=120.

$$cost = 0.45x + 48$$

Substitute 120 into the given formula for x and then simplify.

$$cost = 0.45( )+48$$
$$= 0.45 (120) + 48$$
$$= 54 + 48$$
$$= 102$$

Answer: The rental costs \$102.

Uniform motion is modeled by the formula D=rt, which expresses distance D in terms of the average rate r, or speed, and the time t traveled at that rate. This formula, D=rt, is used often and is read "distance equals rate times time."

Example 10: Jim's road trip takes 212 hours at an average speed of 66 miles per hour. How far does he travel?

Solution: Substitute the appropriate values into the formula and then simplify.

$$D = r \cdot t$$

$$= \left( 66 \frac{mi}{hr} \right) \cdot \left( 2 \frac{1}{2} hr \right)$$


$$= \frac{66}{1} \cdot \frac{5}{2} mi$$

$$= 33 \cdot 5 mi$$

$$= 165 mi$$

Answer: Jim travels 165 miles.

The volume in cubic units of a rectangular box is given by the formula V=lwh, where l represents the length, w represents the width, and h represents the height.



Example 11: A wooden box is 1 foot in length, 5 inches wide, and 6 inches high. Find the volume of the box in cubic inches.

Solution: Take care to ensure that all the units are consistent and use 12 inches for the length instead of 1 foot.

$$V = lwh$$
  
 $V = ()()()$   
 $= (12in) (5in) (6in)$   
 $= 360$  cubic inches (in<sup>3</sup>)

Answer: The volume of the box is 360 cubic inches.

Simple interest I is given by the formula I=prt, where p represents the principal amount invested at an annual interest rate r for t years.

Example 12: Calculate the simple interest earned on a 2-year investment of \$1,250 at an annual interest rate of 334%.

Solution: Convert 334% to a decimal number before using it in the formula.

$$r = 3\frac{3}{4}\% = 3.75\% = 0.0375$$

Use this value for r and the fact that p = \$1,250 and t = 2 years to calculate the simple interest.

$$I = prt$$
= (1,250) (0.0375)(2)
= 93.75

Answer: The simple interest earned is \$93.75.

Try this! The perimeter of a rectangle is given by the formula P=2l+2w, where l represents the length and w represents the width. Use the formula to calculate the perimeter of a rectangle with a length of 5 feet and a width of 212 feet.

Answer: 15 feet

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Think of algebraic expressions as generalizations of common arithmetic operations that are formed by combining numbers, variables,
   and mathematical operations.
- It is customary to omit the coefficient if it is 1, as in  $x_2=1x_2$ .
- To avoid common errors when evaluating, it is a best practice to replace all variables with parentheses and then substitute the appropriate values.
- The use of algebraic expressions allows us to create useful and reusable formulas that model common applications.

# 2.2 Simplifying Algebraic Expressions

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Apply the distributive property to simplify an algebraic expression.
- 2. Identify and combine like terms.

### **Distributive Property**

The properties of real numbers are important in our study of algebra because a variable is simply a letter that represents a real number. In particular, the distributive property states that given any real numbers a, b, and c,

$$a(b+c) = ab + ac$$

This property is applied when simplifying algebraic expressions. To demonstrate how it is used, we simplify 2(5–3) in two ways, and observe the same correct result.

Working parentheses first.

Using the distributive property. 2(5-3)=2(2) = 4  $2(5-3)=2\cdot 5-2\cdot 3$  =10-6 = 4

Certainly, if the contents of the parentheses can be simplified, do that first. On the other hand, when the contents of parentheses cannot be simplified, multiply every term within the parentheses by the factor outside of the parentheses using the distributive property. Applying the distributive property allows you to multiply and remove the parentheses.

**Example 1:** Simplify: 5(7y+2).

**Solution:** Multiply 5 times each term inside the parentheses.

$$5(7y+2) = 5 \cdot 7y + 5 \cdot 2$$
$$= 35y + 10$$

Answer: 35y+10

**Example 2:** Simplify: -3(2x2+5x+1).



Solution: Multiply -3 times each of the coefficients of the terms inside the parentheses.

$$-3(2x^{2} + 5x + 1) = (-3)2x^{2} + (-3)5x + (-3)1$$
$$= -6x^{2} - 15x - 3$$

Answer:  $-6x_2-15x-3$ 

**Example 3:** Simplify: 5(-2a+5b)-2c.

Solution: Apply the distributive property by multiplying only the terms grouped within the parentheses by 5.

$$5(-2a+5b)-2c$$
= 5 \cdot (-2a) + 5 \cdot 5b - 2c  
= -10a + 25b - 2c

Answer: -10a+25b-2c

Because multiplication is commutative, we can also write the distributive property in the following manner: (b+c)a=ba+ca.

**Example 4:** Simplify:  $(3x-4y+1)\cdot 3$ .

**Solution:** Multiply each term within the parentheses by 3.

$$(3x-4y+1)\cdot 3 = 3x\cdot 3 - 4y\cdot 3 + 1\cdot 3$$
$$= 9x - 12y + 3$$

Answer: 9x-12y+3

Division in algebra is often indicated using the fraction bar rather than with the symbol (÷). And sometimes it is useful to rewrite expressions involving division as products:

$$\frac{x}{5} = \frac{1x}{5} = \frac{1}{5} \cdot x$$

$$\frac{3ab}{7} = \frac{3}{7} \cdot \frac{ab}{1} = \frac{3}{7} \cdot ab$$

$$\frac{x+y}{3} = \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{(x-y)}{1} = \frac{1}{3} \cdot (x+y)$$

Rewriting algebraic expressions as products allows us to apply the distributive property.

**Example 5:** Divide: 25x2-5x+105.

Solution: First, treat this as 15 times the expression in the numerator and then distribute.

$$\frac{25x^2 - 5x + 10}{5} = \frac{1}{5} \cdot \frac{(25x^2 - 5x + 10)}{1}$$

$$= \frac{1}{5} \cdot (25x^2 - 5x + 10) \qquad Multiply each term by \frac{1}{5}.$$

$$= \frac{1}{5} \cdot 25x^2 - \frac{1}{5} \cdot 5x + \frac{1}{5} \cdot 10 \qquad Simplify.$$

$$= 5x^2 - x + 2$$

Alternate Solution: Think of 5 as a common denominator and divide each of the terms in the numerator by 5:

$$\frac{25x^2 - 5x + 10}{5} = \frac{25x^2}{5} - \frac{5x}{5} + \frac{10}{5}$$
$$= 5x^2 - x + 2$$

Answer:  $5x_2-x+2$ 

We will discuss the division of algebraic expressions in more detail as we progress through the course.

**Try this!** Simplify: 13(-9x+27y-3).

Answer: -3x+9y-1

# **Combining Like Terms**

Terms with the same variable parts are called like terms, or similar terms. Furthermore, constant terms are considered to be like terms. If an algebraic expression contains like terms, apply the distributive property as follows:

$$2a+3a = (2+3)a = 5a$$
$$7xy-5xy = (7-5)xy = 2xy$$
$$10x^2 + 4x^2 - 6x^2 = (10+4-6)x^2 = 8x^2$$

In other words, if the variable parts of terms are *exactly the same*, then we may add or subtract the coefficients to obtain the coefficient of a single term with the same variable part. This process is called combining like terms. For example,

$$3a^2b + 2a^2b = 5a^2b$$

Notice that the variable factors and their exponents do not change. Combining like terms in this manner, so that the expression contains no other similar terms, is called simplifying the expression. Use this idea to simplify algebraic expressions with multiple like terms.

**Example 6:** Simplify: 3a+2b-4a+9b.

Solution: Identify the like terms and combine them.

$$3a+2b-4a+9b=3a-4a+2b+9b$$
 Commutative property of addition  
=-1a+11b Combine like terms.  
=-a+11b

Answer: -a+11b

In the previous example, rearranging the terms is typically performed mentally and is not shown in the presentation of the solution.

**Example 7:** Simplify:  $x_2+3x+2+4x_2-5x-7$ .

Solution: Identify the like terms and add the corresponding coefficients.

$$\frac{1x^{2} + 3x + 2 + 4x^{2} - 5x - 7}{== 5x^{2} - 2x - 5}$$
Identify like terms.

Combine like terms.

Answer:  $5x_2-2x-5$ 

**Example 8:** Simplify: 5*x*2*y*-3*xy*2+4*x*2*y*-2*xy*2.

Solution: Remember to leave the variable factors and their exponents unchanged in the resulting combined term.

$$\frac{5x^{2}y - 3xy^{2} + 4x^{2}y - 2xy^{2}}{= 9x^{2}y - 5xy^{2}}$$

Answer: 9x2y-5xy2

**Example 9:** Simplify: 12a-13b+34a+b.

Solution: To add the fractional coefficients, use equivalent coefficients with common denominators for each like term.

$$\frac{1}{2}a - \frac{1}{3}b + \frac{3}{4}a + 1b = \frac{1}{2}a + \frac{3}{4}a - \frac{1}{3}b + 1b$$
$$= \frac{2}{4}a + \frac{3}{4}a - \frac{1}{3}b + \frac{3}{3}b$$
$$= \frac{5}{4}a + \frac{2}{3}b$$

Answer: 54a+23b

**Example 10:** Simplify: -12x(x+y)3+26x(x+y)3.

**Solution:** Consider the variable part to be x(x+y)3. Then this expression has two like terms with coefficients -12 and 26.

$$-12x(x+y)^{3} + 26x(x+y)^{3}$$
 Add the coefficients.  
=  $14x(x+y)^{3}$ 

Answer: 14x(x+y)3

**Try this!** Simplify: -7x+8y-2x-3y.

Answer: -9x+5y

# **Distributive Property and Like Terms**

When simplifying, we will often have to combine like terms after we apply the distributive property. This step is consistent with the order of operations: multiplication before addition.

**Example 11:** Simplify: 2(3a-b)-7(-2a+3b).

Solution: Distribute 2 and -7 and then combine like terms.

$$2(3a-b)-7(-2a+3b)$$
= 2 · 3a - 2 · b + (-7)(-2a) + (-7)(3b)  
= 6a - 2b + 14a - 21b  
= 20a - 23b

Answer: 20*a*–23*b* 

In the example above, it is important to point out that you can remove the parentheses and collect like terms because you multiply the second quantity by -7, not just by 7. To correctly apply the distributive property, think of this as adding -7 times the given quantity, 2(3a-b)+(-7)(-2a+3b).

**Try this!** Simplify: -5(2x-3)+7x.

Answer: -3x+15

Often we will encounter algebraic expressions like +(a+b) or -(a+b). As we have seen, the coefficients are actually implied to be +1 and -1, respectively, and therefore, the distributive property applies using +1 or -1 as the factor. Multiply each term within the parentheses by these factors:

$$+(a+b) = +1(a+b) = (+1)a + (+1)b = a+b$$
  
 $-(a+b) = -1(a+b) = (-1)a + (-1)b = -a-b$ 

This leads to two useful properties,

$$+(a+b) = a+b$$
$$-(a+b) = -a-b$$

**Example 12:** Simplify:  $5x-(-2x^2+3x-1)$ .

Solution: Multiply each term within the parentheses by -1 and then combine like terms.

$$5x - (-2x^{2} + 3x - 1)$$

$$= 5x + 2x^{2} - 3x + 1$$

$$= 2x^{2} + 2x + 1$$

Answer:  $2x^2+2x+1$ 

When distributing a negative number, all of the signs within the parentheses will change. Note that 5x in the example above is a separate term; hence the distributive property does not apply to it.

**Example 13:** Simplify:  $5-2(x_2-4x-3)$ .

Solution: The order of operations requires that we multiply before subtracting. Therefore, distribute -2 and then combine the constant terms. Subtracting 5 - 2 first leads to an incorrect result, as illustrated below:

Incorrect!	Correct!
$5-2(x^2-4x-3)$	$5-2(x^2-4x-3)$
$=3(x^2-4x-3)$	$= 5 - 2x^2 + 8x + 6$
$=3x^2-12x-9$ *	$=-2x^2+8x+11$

Answer:  $-2x^2 + 8x + 11$ 

#### Caution

It is worth repeating that you must follow the order of operations: multiply and divide before adding and subtracting!

**Try this!** Simplify:  $8-3(-x_2+2x-7)$ .

Answer:  $3x_2-6x+29$ 

**Example 14:** Subtract 3x-2 from twice the quantity -4x2+2x-8.

Solution: First, group each expression and treat each as a quantity:

$$(3x-2)$$
 and  $(-4x^2+2x-8)$ 

Next, identify the key words and translate them into a mathematical expression.

Twice the quantity... Subtract from... 
$$2 \cdot (-4x^2 + 2x - 8) - (3x - 2)$$

Finally, simplify the resulting expression.

$$2(-4x^2 + 2x - 8) - (3x - 2)$$
 Distribute 2 and -1.  
=  $-8x^2 + 4x - 16 - 3x + 2$  Combine like terms.  
=  $-8x^2 + x - 14$ 

Answer:  $-8x_2+x-14$ 

# **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- The properties of real numbers apply to algebraic expressions, because variables are simply representations of unknown real numbers.
- Combine like terms, or terms with the same variable part, to simplify expressions.
- Use the distributive property when multiplying grouped algebraic expressions, a(b+c)=ab+ac.
- It is a best practice to apply the distributive property only when the expression within the grouping is completely simplified.
- After applying the distributive property, eliminate the parentheses and then combine any like terms.

Always use the order of operations when simplifying.



# 2.3 Solving Linear Equations: Part I

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Identify linear equations with one variable and verify their solutions.
- 2. Use the properties of equality to solve basic linear equations.
- 3. Use multiple steps to solve linear equations by isolating the variable.
- 4. Solve linear equations where the coefficients are fractions or decimals.

### **Linear Equations with One Variable and Their Solutions**

Learning how to solve various algebraic equations is one of the main goals in algebra. This section introduces the basic techniques used for solving linear equations with one variable.

An equation is a statement indicating that two algebraic expressions are equal. A linear equation with one variable, x, is an equation that can be written in the general form ax+b=0, where a and b are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ . Here are some examples of linear equations, all of which are solved in this section:

$$x + 3 = -5$$
  $2x - 5 = 15$   $\frac{5}{3}x + 2 = -8$ 

A solution to a linear equation is any value that can replace the variable to produce a true statement. The variable in the linear equation 2x+3=13 is x, and the solution is x=5. To verify this, substitute the value 5 for x and check that you obtain a true statement.

$$2x+13=13$$
  
 $2(5)+3=13$   
 $10+3=13$   
 $13=13$ 

Alternatively, when an equation is equal to a constant, we can verify a solution by substituting the value for the variable and show that the result is equal to that constant. In this sense, we say that solutions satisfy the equation.

**Example 1:** Is x=3 a solution to -2x-3=-9?

$$-2x-3=-2(3)-3=-6-3=-9$$

Answer: Yes, it is a solution, because x=3 satisfies the equation.

**Example 2:** Is a=-12 a solution to -10a+5=25?

$$-10a + 5 = -10\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) + 5 = 5 + 5 = 10 \neq 25$$

Answer: No, it is not a solution, because a=-12 does not satisfy the equation.

Recall that when evaluating expressions, it is a good practice to first replace all variables with parentheses, then substitute the appropriate values. By making use of parentheses we avoid some common errors when working the order of operations.

**Example 3:** Is y=-3 a solution to 2y-5=-y-14?

Solution:

$$2y-5=-y-14$$
  
2( )-5=-( )-14 Replace variables with parentheses.

$$2(-3)-5=-(-3)-14$$
 Substitute the appropriate values.  
 $-6-5=3-14$  Simplify.  
 $-11=-11$   $\checkmark$  True

Answer: Yes, it is a solution, because y=-3 produces a true statement.

**Try this!** Is x=-3 a solution to -2x+5=-1?

Answer: No

#### **Solving Basic Linear Equations**

We begin by defining equivalent equations as equations with the same solution set. Consider the following two linear equations and check to see if the solution is x=7.

$$3x-5=16$$
  $3x = 21$   
 $3(7)-5=16$   $3(7) = 21$   
 $21-5=16$   $21=21$ 

Here we can see that the two linear equations 3x–5=16 and 3x=21 are equivalent because they share the same solution set, namely,  $\{7\}$ . The goal is to develop a systematic process to find equivalent equations until the variable is isolated:

$$3x-5=16$$

$$3x=21$$

$$x=7$$
Equivalent equations

To do this, use the properties of equality. Given algebraic expressions A and B, where c is a real number, we have the following:

Addition Property of Equality: If A = B, then A + c = B + c

Subtraction Property of Equality: If A = B, then A - c = B - c

**Multiplication Property of Equality:** If A = B, then cA = cB

**Division Property of Equality:** If A = B, then  $\frac{A}{c} = \frac{B}{c}$   $c \neq 0$ 

#### **Note**

Multiplying or dividing both sides of an equation by 0 is carefully avoided. Dividing by 0 is undefined and multiplying both sides by 0 results in the equation 0 = 0.

To summarize, equality is retained and you obtain an equivalent equation if you add, subtract, multiply, or divide both sides of an equation by any nonzero real number. The technique for solving linear equations involves applying these properties in order to isolate the variable on one side of the equation. If the linear equation has a constant term, then we add to or subtract it from both sides of the equation to obtain an equivalent equation where the variable term is isolated.

**Example 4:** Solve: x+3=-5.

**Solution:** To isolate the variable x on the left side, subtract 3 from both sides.

$$x+3=-5$$

$$x+3-3=-5-3$$
 Subtract 3 from both sides.
$$x+0=-8$$

$$x=-8$$

Answer: The solution is x=-8. To check that this is true, substitute -8 into the original equation and simplify to see that it is satisfied: x+3=-8+3=-5  $\checkmark$ .

In the previous example, after subtracting 3 from both sides, you get x+0=-8. By the additive identity property of real numbers, this is equivalent to x=-8. This step is often left out in the presentation of the solution.

If the *variable term* of the equation (including the coefficient) is isolated, then apply the multiplication or division property of equality to obtain an equivalent equation with the *variable* isolated. In other words, our goal is to obtain an equivalent equation with x or 1x isolated on one side of the equal sign.

**Example 5:** Solve: -5x = -35.

**Solution:** The coefficient of x is -5, so divide both sides by -5.

$$-5x = -35$$

$$\frac{-5x}{-5} = \frac{-35}{-5}$$
Divide both sides by -5.
$$1x = 7$$
Here  $\frac{-5}{-5} = 1$  and  $\frac{-35}{-5} = +7$ .
$$x = 7$$

Answer: The solution is x=7. Perform the check mentally by substituting 7 for x in the original equation.

In the previous example, after dividing both sides by -5, x is left with a coefficient of 1, because -5-5=1. In fact, when we say "isolate the variable," we mean to change the coefficient of the variable to 1, because 1x=7 is equivalent to x=7. This step is

often left out of the instructional examples even though its omission is sometimes a source of confusion.

Another important property is the symmetric property: for any algebraic expressions A and B,

If 
$$A = B$$
, then  $B = A$ 

The equation 2=x is equivalent to x=2. It does not matter on which side we choose to isolate the variable.

**Example 6:** Solve: 2=5+x.

**Solution:** Isolate the variable *x* by subtracting 5 from both sides of the equation.

2 = 5 + x

2-5=5+x-5 Subtract 5 from both sides.

-3 = x

x=-3 Apply the symmetric property.

Answer: The solution is -3, and checking the solution shows that 2 = 5 - 3.

Try this! Solve: 6=x-4.

Answer: x=10

# **Isolating the Variable in Two Steps**

A linear equation of the form ax+b=c takes two steps to solve. First, use the appropriate equality property of addition or subtraction to isolate the variable term. Next, isolate the variable using the equality property of multiplication or division.

Checking solutions in the following examples is left to the reader.

**Example 7:** Solve: 2x-5=15.

Solution:

$$2x-5=15$$

$$2x-5+5=15+5$$

$$2x = 20$$

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{20}{2}$$
Divide both sides by 2.
$$x=10$$

Answer: The solution is 10.

**Example 8:** Solve: -3x-2=9.

Solution:

$$-3x-2=9$$

$$-3x-2+2=9+2$$

$$-3x = 11$$

$$\frac{-3x}{-3} = \frac{11}{-3}$$
Divide both sides by -3.
$$x = -\frac{11}{3}$$

Answer: The solution is -113.

**Example 9:** Solve: 6-5*y*=-14.

**Solution:** When no sign precedes the term, it is understood to be positive. In other words, think of this as +6-5y=-14. Begin by subtracting 6 from both sides of the equal sign.

$$6-5y = -14$$

$$6-5y-6 = -14-6$$

$$-5y = -20$$

$$\frac{-5y}{-5} = \frac{-20}{-5}$$
Divide both sides by -5.
$$y = 4$$

Answer: The solution is 4.

**Example 10 :** Solve: 3x+12=23.

Solution:

$$3x + \frac{1}{2} = \frac{2}{3}$$

$$3x + \frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{2} = \frac{2}{3} - \frac{1}{2}$$

$$3x = \frac{2 \cdot 2}{3 \cdot 2} - \frac{1 \cdot 3}{2 \cdot 3}$$

$$3x = \frac{4}{6} - \frac{3}{6}$$

$$3x = \frac{1}{6}$$

$$3x = \frac{1}{6}$$
Divide both sides by 3.
$$x = \frac{1}{6} \div 3 = \frac{1}{6} \cdot \frac{1}{3} = \frac{1}{18}$$

Answer: The solution is 118.

**Example 11:** Solve: 3-y=1.

Solution:

$$3-y=1$$

$$3-y-3=1-3$$

$$-y=-2$$

Recall that -y is equivalent to -1y; divide both sides of the equation by -1.

$$-y = -2$$
$$\frac{-1y}{-1} = \frac{-2}{-1}$$
$$y = 2$$

Alternatively, multiply both sides of -y=-2 by -1 and achieve the same result:

$$-y = -2$$
  
(-1) (-y) = (-1) (-2)  
 $y = 2$ 

Answer: The solution is 2.

In summary, to retain equivalent equations, we must perform the same operation on both sides of the equation. First, apply the addition or subtraction property of equality to isolate the variable term and then apply the multiplication or division property of equality to isolate the variable on one side of the equation.

**Try this!** Solve: -7x+6=27.

Answer: x=-3

# **Multiplying by the Reciprocal**

To solve an equation like 34x=1, we can isolate the variable by dividing both sides by the coefficient. For example,

$$\frac{3}{4}x = 1$$

$$\frac{3}{4}\frac{x}{4} = \frac{1}{3}$$

$$x = 1 \cdot \frac{4}{3}$$

$$x = \frac{4}{3}$$

On the left side of the equal sign, the fraction cancels. On the right side, we have a complex fraction and multiply by the reciprocal of the coefficient. You can save a step by recognizing this and start by multiplying both sides of the equation by the reciprocal of the coefficient.

$$\frac{3}{4}x = 1$$

$$\frac{4}{3} \cdot \frac{3}{4}x = \frac{4}{3} \cdot 1$$

$$x = \frac{4}{3}$$

Recall that the product of reciprocals is 1, in this case 43·34=1, leaving the variable isolated.

**Example 12:** Solve: 53x+2=-8.

**Solution:** Isolate the variable term using the addition property of equality and then multiply both sides of the equation by the reciprocal of the coefficient 53.

$$\frac{5}{3}x + 2 = -8$$

$$\frac{5}{3}x + 2 - 2 = -8 - 2$$
Subtract 2 from both sides.
$$\frac{5}{3}x = -10$$

$$\frac{3}{5} \cdot \frac{5}{3}x = \frac{3}{5} \cdot (-10)$$
Multiply both sides by  $\frac{3}{5}$ .
$$1x = 3 \cdot (-2)$$

$$x = -6$$

Answer: The solution is -6.

**Example 13:** Solve: -45*x*-5=15.

Solution:

$$-\frac{4}{5}x - 5 = 15$$
$$-\frac{4}{5}x - 5 + 5 = 15 + 5$$
$$-\frac{4}{5}x = 20$$

The reciprocal of -45 is -54 because (-54)(-45)=+2020=1. Therefore, to isolate the variable x, multiply both sides by -54.

$$-\frac{5}{4} \cdot \left(-\frac{4}{5}x\right) = -\frac{5}{4} \cdot (20)$$
$$1x = -5 \cdot 5$$
$$x = -25$$

Answer: The solution is -25.

**Try this!** Solve: 23*x*-9=-4.

Answer: x=152

# **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

# 2.4 Solving Linear Equations: Part II

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Solve general linear equations.
- 2. Identify and solve conditional equations, identities, and contradictions.

# **Combining Like Terms and Simplifying**

Linear equations typically are not given in standard form, so solving them requires additional steps. These additional steps include simplifying expressions on each side of the equal sign using the order of operations.

#### Same-Side Like Terms

We will often encounter linear equations where the expressions on each side of the equal sign can be simplified. Typically, this involves combining same-side like terms. If this is the case, then it is best to simplify each side first before solving.

**Example 1:** Solve: -4a+2-a=3-2.

Solution: First, combine the like terms on each side of the equal sign.

$$-4a+2-a=3-2$$
 Combine like terms on the same side.  

$$-5a+2=1$$

$$-5a+2-2=1-2$$
 Subtract 2 from both sides.  

$$-5a=-1$$

$$\frac{-5a}{-5}=\frac{-1}{-5}$$
 Divide both sides by  $-5$ .  

$$a=\frac{1}{5}$$

Answer: The solution is 15.

### **Opposite-Side Like Terms**

Given a linear equation in the form ax+b=cx+d, we begin by combining like terms on opposite sides of the equal sign. To combine opposite-side like terms, use the addition or subtraction property of equality to effectively "move terms" from one side to the other so that they can be combined.

**Example 2:** Solve: -2y-3=5y+11.

Solution: To "move" the term 5y to the left side, subtract it on both sides.

$$-2y-3 = 5y+11$$
  
 $-2y-3-5y = 5y+11-5y$  Subtract 5y from both sides.  
 $-7y-3 = 11$ 

From here, solve using the techniques developed previously.

$$-7y-3+3=11+3$$

$$-7y=14$$

$$\frac{-7y}{-7} = \frac{14}{-7}$$

$$y=-2$$
Add 3 to both sides.

Divide both sides by -7.

Always check to see that the solution is correct by substituting the solution back into the original equation and simplifying to see if you obtain a true statement.

$$-2y-3 = 5y+11$$

$$-2(-2)-3 = 5(-2)+1$$

$$4-3 = -10+11$$

$$1 = 1$$

Answer: The solution is -2.

# **General Guidelines for Solving Linear Equations**

When solving linear equations, the goal is to determine what value, if any, will produce a true statement when substituted in the original equation. Do this by isolating the variable using the following steps:

Step 1: Simplify both sides of the equation using the order of operations and combine all same-side like terms.

**Step 2:** Use the appropriate properties of equality to combine opposite-side like terms with the variable term on one side of the equation and the constant term on the other.

Step 3: Divide or multiply as needed to isolate the variable.

Step 4: Check to see if the answer solves the original equation.

**Example 3:** Solve: -12(10y-2)+3=14.

Solution: Simplify the linear expression on the left side before solving.

$$-\frac{1}{2}(10y-2)+3=14$$

$$-5y+1+3=14$$

$$-5y+4=14$$

$$-5y+4-4=14-4$$

$$-5y=10$$

$$\frac{-5y}{-5}=\frac{10}{-5}$$

$$y=-2$$
Distribute.

Combine same-side like terms.

Solve.

To check,

$$-\frac{1}{2}(10(-2)-2)+3=14$$

$$-\frac{1}{2}(-20-2)+3=14$$

$$-\frac{1}{2}(-22)+3=14$$

$$11+3=14$$

$$14=14$$

Answer: The solution is -2.

**Example 4:** Solve: 5(3x+2)-2=-2(1-7x).

Solution: First, simplify the expressions on both sides of the equal sign.

$$5(3x+2)-2 = -2(1-7x)$$
 Distribute.  
 $15x+10-2 = -2+14x$  Combine same-side like terms.  
 $15x+8 = -2+14x$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $x+8=-2$  Solve.  
 $x+8-8 = -2-8$   
 $x=-10$ 

Answer: The solution is −10. The check is left as an exercise.

**Try this!** Solve: 6-3(4x-1)=4x-7.

Answer: x=1

# **Conditional Equations, Identities, and Contradictions**

There are three different types of equations. Up to this point, we have been solving conditional equations. These are equations that are true for particular values. An identity is an equation that is true for all possible values of the variable. For example,

$$x = x$$
 *Identity*

has a solution set consisting of all real numbers, **R**. A contradiction is an equation that is never true and thus has no solutions. For example,

$$x+1=x$$
 Contradiction

has no solution. We use the empty set,  $\emptyset$ , to indicate that there are no solutions.

If the end result of solving an equation is a true statement, like 0 = 0, then the equation is an identity and any real number is a solution. If solving results in a false statement, like 0 = 1, then the equation is a contradiction and there is no solution.

**Example 5:** Solve: 4(x+5)+6=2(2x+3).

Solution:

$$4(x+5)+6=2(2x+3)$$
 Distribute.  
 $4x+20+6=4x+6$  Combine same-side like terms.  
 $4x+26=4x+6$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $4x+26-4x=4x+6-4x$   
 $26=6$  False

Answer: Ø. Solving leads to a false statement; therefore, the equation is a contradiction and there is no solution.

**Example 6:** Solve: 3(3y+5)+5=10(y+2)-y.

Solution:

$$3(3y+5)+5=10(y+2)-y$$
 Distribute.  
 $9y+15+5=10y+20-y$  Combine same-side like terms.  
 $9y+20=9y+20$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $9y+20-9y=9y+20-9y$   
 $20=20$  True

Answer: R. Solving leads to a true statement; therefore, the equation is an identity and any real number is a solution.

If it is hard to believe that any real number is a solution to the equation in the previous example, then choose your favorite real number, and substitute it in the equation to see that it leads to a true statement. Choose *x*=7 and check:

$$3(3y+5)+5=10(y+2)-y$$
  
 $3(3\cdot7+5)+5=10(7+2)-7$   
 $3\ 26\ +5=10(9)-7$   
 $78+5=90-7$   
 $83=83$ 

**Try this!** Solve: -2(3x+1)-(x-3)=-7x+1.

Answer: R

**Clearing Decimals and Fractions** 

The coefficients of linear equations may be any real number, even decimals and fractions. When decimals and fractions are

used, it is possible to use the multiplication property of equality to clear the coefficients in a single step. If given decimal

coefficients, then multiply by an appropriate power of 10 to clear the decimals. If given fractional coefficients, then multiply

both sides of the equation by the least common multiple of the denominators (LCD).

**Example 7:** Solve: 2.3x+2.8=-1.2x+9.8.

Solution: Notice that all decimal coefficients are expressed with digits in the tenths place; this suggests that we can clear the

decimals by multiplying both sides by 10. Take care to distribute 10 to each term on both sides of the equation.

$$10 \cdot (2.3x + 2.8) = 10 \cdot (-1.2x + 9.8)$$
 Multiply both sides by 10.

$$10 \cdot 2.3x + 10 \cdot 2.8 = 10 \cdot (-1.2x) + 10 \cdot 9.8$$

23x + 28 = -12x + 98 Integer coefficients

$$23x + 28 + 12x = -12x + 98 + 12x$$
 Solve.

$$35x + 28 = 98$$

$$35x + 28 - 28 = 98 - 28$$

$$35x = 70$$

$$\frac{35x}{35} = \frac{70}{35}$$

$$x = 2$$

Answer: The solution is 2.

**Example 8:** Solve: 13x+15=15x-1.

Solution: Clear the fractions by multiplying both sides by the least common multiple of the given denominators. In this

case, the LCM(3, 5)=15.

$$15 \cdot \left(\frac{1}{3}x + \frac{1}{5}\right) = 15 \cdot \left(\frac{1}{5}x - 1\right)$$

$$15 \cdot \frac{1}{3}x + 15 \cdot \frac{1}{5} = 15 \cdot \frac{1}{5}x - 15 \cdot 1$$

$$5x + 3 = 3x - 15$$

$$5x + 3 - 3x = 3x - 15 - 3x$$

$$2x + 3 = -15$$

$$2x - 3 - 3 = -15 - 3$$

$$2x = -18$$

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{-18}{2}$$

$$x = -9$$
Multiply both sides by 15.

Simplify.

Solve.

Answer: The solution is −9.

It is important to know that these techniques only work for equations. Do not try to clear fractions when simplifying expressions. As a reminder,

Expression	Equation
$\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3}$	$\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3} = 0$

Solve equations and simplify expressions. If you multiply an expression by 6, you will change the problem. However, if you multiply both sides of an equation by 6, you obtain an equivalent equation.

Incorrect	Correct
$\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3}$	$\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3} = 0$
(1 5)	
$\neq 6 \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3}\right)$	$6 \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{5}{3}\right) = 6 \cdot 0$
=3x+10	$3x+10=0  \checkmark$

# **Literal Equations (Linear Formulas)**

Algebra lets us solve whole classes of applications using literal equations, or formulas. Formulas often have more than one variable and describe, or model, a particular real-world problem. For example, the familiar formula *D=rt* describes the distance traveled in terms of the average rate and time; given any two of these quantities, we can determine the third. Using algebra, we can solve the equation for any one of the variables and derive two more formulas.

$$D = rt$$

$$\frac{D}{r} = \frac{rt}{r}$$
Divide both sides by r.
$$\frac{D}{r} = t$$

If we divide both sides by r, we obtain the formula t=Dr. Use this formula to find the time, given the distance and the rate.

$$D = rt$$

$$\frac{D}{t} = \frac{rt}{t}$$
Divide both sides by t.
$$\frac{D}{t} = r$$

If we divide both sides by t, we obtain the formula r=Dt. Use this formula to find the rate, given the distance traveled and the time it takes to travel that distance. Using the techniques learned up to this point, we now have three equivalent formulas relating distance, average rate, and time:

$$D = rt t = \frac{D}{r} r = \frac{D}{t}$$

When given a literal equation, it is often necessary to solve for one of the variables in terms of the others. Use the properties of equality to isolate the indicated variable.

**Example 9:** Solve for a: P=2a+b.

**Solution:** The goal is to isolate the variable *a*.

$$P = 2a + b$$

$$P - b = 2a + b - b$$
Subtract b from both sides.
$$P - b = 2a$$

$$\frac{P - b}{2} = \frac{2a}{2}$$
Divide both sides by 2.
$$\frac{P - b}{2} = a$$

Answer: a=P-b2

**Example 10:** Solve for y: z=x+y2.

**Solution:** The goal is to isolate the variable y.

$$z = \frac{x+y}{2}$$

$$2 \cdot z = 2 \cdot \frac{x+y}{2}$$

$$2z = x+y$$

$$2z - x = x + y - x$$

$$2z - x = y$$
Subtract x from both sides.
$$2z - x = y$$

Answer: y=2z-x

**Try this!** Solve for b: 2a-3b=c.

Answer: b=2a-c3

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

# 2.5 Applications of Linear Equations

# Key Words, Translation, and Strategy

Algebra simplifies the process of solving real-world problems. This is done by using letters to represent unknowns, restating problems in the form of equations, and offering systematic techniques for solving those equations. To solve problems using algebra, first translate the wording of the problem into mathematical statements that describe the relationships between the given information and the unknowns. Usually, this translation to mathematical statements is the difficult step in the process.

The key to the translation is to carefully read the problem and identify certain key words and phrases.

Key Words	Translation
Sum, increased by, more than, plus, added to, total	+
<b>Difference</b> , decreased by, subtracted from, less, minus	-
<b>Product</b> , multiplied by, of, times, twice	*
Quotient, divided by, ratio, per	/
Is, total, result	=

Here are some examples of translated key phrases.

Key Phrases	Translation
The <b>sum of</b> a number <i>and</i> 7.	
Seven more than a number.	x+7
The <b>difference of</b> a number <i>and</i> 7.	
Seven less than a number.	x-7

Key Phrases	Translation
Seven <b>subtracted from</b> a number.	
The <b>product of</b> 2 <i>and</i> a number.	
Twice a number.	2 <i>x</i>
One-half <b>of</b> a number.	12 <i>X</i>
The <b>quotient</b> of a number and 7.	x/7

When translating sentences into mathematical statements, be sure to read the sentence several times and identify the key words and phrases.

Example 1: Translate: Four less than twice some number is 16.

Solution: First, choose a variable for the unknown number and identify the key words and phrases.

Let x represent the unknown indicated by "some number."

twice some four less than 
$$2x$$
  $-4$   $=$  16

Remember that subtraction is not commutative. For this reason, take care when setting up differences. In this example, 4-2x=16 is an incorrect translation.

Answer: 2x-4=16

It is important to first identify the variable—*let x represent*...—and state in words what the unknown quantity is. This step not only makes your work more readable but also forces you to think about what you are looking for. Usually, if you know what you are asked to find, then the task of finding it is achievable.

**Example 2:** Translate: When 7 is subtracted from 3 times the sum of a number and 12, the result is 20.

**Solution:** Let n represent the unknown number.

Answer: 3(n+12)-7=20

To understand why parentheses are needed, study the structures of the following two sentences and their translations:

"3 times the sum of a number and 12"	3(n+12)
"the sum of <b>3 times a number</b> and 12"	3n+12

The key is to focus on the phrase "3 times the sum." This prompts us to group the sum within parentheses and then multiply by 3. Once an application is translated into an algebraic equation, solve it using the techniques you have learned.

#### **Guidelines for Setting Up and Solving Word Problems**

Step 1: Read the problem several times, identify the key words and phrases, and organize the given information.

Step 2: Identify the variables by assigning a letter or expression to the unknown quantities.

Step 3: Translate and set up an algebraic equation that models the problem.

Step 4: Solve the resulting algebraic equation.

Step 5: Finally, answer the question in sentence form and make sure it makes sense (check it).

For now, set up all of your equations using only one variable. Avoid two variables by looking for a relationship between the unknowns.

# **Problems Involving Relationships between Real Numbers**

We classify applications involving relationships between real numbers broadly as number problems. These problems can sometimes be solved using some creative arithmetic, guessing, and checking. Solving in this manner is not a good practice and should be avoided. Begin by working through the basic steps outlined in the general guidelines for solving word problems.

Example 3: A larger integer is 2 less than 3 times a smaller integer. The sum of the two integers is 18. Find the integers.

Solution:

Identify variables: Begin by assigning a variable to the smaller integer.

# Let *x* represent the smaller integer.

Use the first sentence to identify the larger integer in terms of the variable x: "A larger integer is 2 less than 3 times a smaller."

# Let 3x-2 represent the larger integer.

Set up an equation: Add the expressions that represent the two integers, and set the resulting expression equal to 18 as indicated in the second sentence: "The sum of the two integers is 18."

$$x + (3x - 2) = 18$$

Solve: Solve the equation to obtain the smaller integer x.

$$x+(3x-2)=18$$

$$x+3x-2=18$$

$$4x-2=18$$

$$4x-2+2=18+2$$

$$4x=20$$

$$\frac{4x}{4} = \frac{20}{4}$$

$$x = 5$$

Back substitute: Use the expression 3x-2 to find the larger integer—this is called back substituting.

$$3x-2=3(5)-2=15-2=13$$

Answer the question: The two integers are 5 and 13.

Check: 5 + 13 = 18. The answer makes sense.

Example 4: The difference between two integers is 2. The larger integer is 6 less than twice the smaller. Find the integers.

Solution: Use the relationship between the two integers in the second sentence, "The larger integer is 6 less than twice the smaller," to identify the unknowns in terms of one variable.

Let x represent the smaller integer. Let 2x - 6 represent the larger integer.

Since the difference is positive, subtract the smaller integer from the larger.

$$(2x-6)-x=2$$

Solve.

$$2x-6-x=2$$

$$x-6=2$$

$$x-6+6=2+6$$

$$x=8$$

Use 2x - 6 to find the larger integer.

$$2x - 6 = 2(8) - 6 = 16 - 6 = 10$$

Answer: The two integers are 8 and 10. These integers clearly solve the problem.

It is worth mentioning again that you can often find solutions to simple problems by guessing and checking. This is so because the numbers are chosen to simplify the process of solving, so that the algebraic steps are not too tedious. You learn how to set up algebraic equations with easier problems, so that you can use these ideas to solve more difficult problems later.

Example 5: The sum of two consecutive even integers is 46. Find the integers.

Solution: The key phrase to focus on is "consecutive even integers."

Let x represent the first even integer. Let x + 2 represent the next even integer. Add the even integers and set them equal to 46.

$$x + (x+2) = 46$$

Solve.

$$x+x+2=46$$

$$2x+2=46$$

$$2x+2-2=46-2$$

$$2x=44$$


$$x=22$$

Use x + 2 to find the next even integer.

$$x + 2 = 22 + 2 = 24$$

Answer: The consecutive even integers are 22 and 24.

It should be clear that consecutive even integers are separated by two units. However, it may not be so clear that odd integers are as well.



**Example 6:** The sum of two consecutive odd integers is 36. Find the integers.

Solution: The key phrase to focus on is "consecutive odd integers."

Let x represent the first odd integer. Let x + 2 represent the next odd integer.

Add the two odd integers and set the expression equal to 36.

$$x + (x + 2) = 36$$

Solve.

$$x+x+2=36$$

$$2x+2=36$$

$$2x+2-2=36-2$$

$$2x=34$$

$$\frac{2x}{2}=\frac{34}{2}$$

$$x=17$$

Use x + 2 to find the next odd integer.

$$x + 2 = 17 + 2 = 19$$

Answer: The consecutive odd integers are 17 and 19.

The algebraic setup for even and odd integer problems is the same. A common mistake is to use x and x + 3 when identifying the variables for consecutive odd integers. This is incorrect because adding 3 to an odd number yields an even number: for example, 5 + 3 = 8. An incorrect setup is very likely to lead to a decimal answer, which may be an indication that the problem was set up incorrectly.

Example 7: The sum of three consecutive integers is 24. Find the integers.

Solution: Consecutive integers are separated by one unit.

Let x represent the first integer. Let x + 1 represent the next integer. Let x + 2 represent the third integer.

Add the integers and set the sum equal to 24.

$$x + (x + 1) + (x + 2) = 24$$

Solve.

$$x+x+1+x+2=24$$

$$3x+3=24$$

$$3x+3-3=24-3$$

$$3x=21$$

$$x=7$$

Back substitute to find the other two integers.

$$x+1=7+1=8$$
  
 $x+2=7+2=9$ 

Answer: The three consecutive integers are 7, 8 and 9, where 7 + 8 + 9 = 24.

**Try this!** The sum of three consecutive odd integers is 87. Find the integers.

Answer: The integers are 27, 29, and 31.

## **Geometry Problems (Perimeter)**

Recall that the perimeter of a polygon is the sum of the lengths of all the outside edges. In addition, it is helpful to review the


following perimeter formulas ( $\pi \approx 3.14159$ ).

Perimeter of a rectangle:	P=2l+2w
Perimeter of a square:	P=4s
Perimeter of a triangle:	P=a+b+c
Perimeter of a circle (circumference):	C=2πr

Keep in mind that you are looking for a relationship between the unknowns so that you can set up algebraic equations using only one variable. When working with geometry problems, it is often helpful to draw a picture.

**Example 8:** A rectangle has a perimeter measuring 64 feet. The length is 4 feet more than 3 times the width. Find the dimensions of the rectangle.

Solution: The sentence "The length is 4 feet more than 3 times the width" gives the relationship between the two variables.



Let w represent the width of the rectangle. Let 3w + 4 represent the length.

The sentence "A rectangle has a **perimeter** measuring **64** feet" suggests an algebraic setup. Substitute 64 for the perimeter and the expression for the length into the appropriate formula as follows:

$$P = 2l + 2w$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \qquad \downarrow$$

$$64 = 2(3w + 4) + 2w$$

Once you have set up an algebraic equation with one variable, solve for the width, w.

$$64 = 6w + 8 + 2w$$

$$64 = 8w + 8$$

$$64 - 8 = 8w + 8 - 8$$

$$56 = 8w$$

$$\frac{56}{8} = \frac{8w}{8}$$

$$7 = w$$


Use 3w + 4 to find the length.

$$l = 3w + 4 = 3(7) + 4 = 21 + 4 = 25$$

Answer: The rectangle measures 7 feet by 25 feet. To check, add all of the sides:

$$P = 7 \text{ ft} + 7 \text{ ft} + 25 \text{ ft} + 25 \text{ ft} = 64 \text{ ft}$$

**Example 9:** Two sides of a triangle are 5 and 7 inches longer than the third side. If the perimeter measures 21 inches, find the length of each side.



**Solution:** The first sentence describes the relationships between the unknowns.

Let x represent the length of the third side. Let x + 5 and x + 7 represent the lengths of the other two sides.

Substitute these expressions into the appropriate formula and use 21 for the perimeter P.

$$P = a + b + c$$

$$21 = x + (x + 5) + (x + 7)$$

You now have an equation with one variable to solve.

$$21 = x + x + 5 + x + 7$$

$$21 = 3x + 12$$

$$21 - 12 = 3x + 12 - 12$$

$$9 = 3x$$

$$\frac{9}{3} = \frac{3x}{3}$$

$$3 = x$$

Back substitute.

$$x + 5 = 3 + 5 = 8$$

$$x + 7 = 3 + 7 = 10$$

Answer: The three sides of the triangle measure 3 inches, 8 inches, and 10 inches. The check is left to the reader.

Try this! The length of a rectangle is 1 foot less than twice its width. If the perimeter is 46 feet, find the dimensions.

Answer: Width: 8 feet; length: 15 feet

### **Problems Involving Money and Percents**

Whenever setting up an equation involving a percentage, we usually need to convert the percentage to a decimal or fraction.

If the question asks for a percentage, then do not forget to convert your answer to a percent at the end. Also, when money is involved, be sure to round off to two decimal places.

**Example 10:** If a pair of shoes costs \$52.50 including a 7<sub>14</sub>% tax, what is the original cost of the item before taxes are added? **Solution:** Begin by converting 7<sub>14</sub>% to a decimal.

$$7\frac{1}{4}\% = 7.25\% = 0.0725$$

The amount of tax is this rate times the original cost of the item. The original cost of the item is what you are asked to find.

Let c represent the cost of the item <u>before taxes</u> are added.

amount of 
$$tax = tax \ rate \cdot cost \ of \ item$$
  
=  $0.0725 \cdot c$   
 $total \ cost = cost \ of \ item + amount \ of \ tax$   
 $52.50 = c + 0.0725 \ c$ 

Use this equation to solve for c, the original cost of the item.

$$52.50 = 1c + 0.0725c$$

$$52.50 = 1.0725c$$

$$\frac{52.50}{1.0725} = \frac{1.0725c}{1.0725}$$

$$48.95 \approx c$$

Answer: The cost of the item before taxes is \$48.95. Check this by multiplying \$48.95 by 0.0725 to obtain the tax and add it to this cost.

**Example 11:** Given a 5<sub>18</sub>% annual interest rate, how long will it take \$1,200 to yield \$307.50 in simple interest?

Solution:

Let t represent the time needed to earn \$307.50 at 5.125%.

Organize the data needed to use the simple interest formula *I=prt*.

Given interest for the time period:	<i>I</i> =\$307.50
Given principal:	p=\$1200
Given rate:	r=518%=5.125%=0.05125

Next, substitute all of the known quantities into the formula and then solve for the only unknown, t.

$$I = prt$$

$$307.50 = 1200 (0.05125)t$$

$$307.50 = 61.5t$$

$$\frac{307.50}{61.5} = \frac{61.5t}{61.5}$$

$$5 = t$$

Answer: It takes 5 years for \$1,200 invested at 518% to earn \$307.50 in simple interest.

**Example 12:** Mary invested her total savings of \$3,400 in two accounts. Her mutual fund account earned 8% last year and her CD earned 5%. If her total interest for the year was \$245, how much was in each account?

**Solution:** The relationship between the two unknowns is that they total \$3,400. When a total is involved, a common technique used to avoid two variables is to represent the second unknown as the difference of the total and the first unknown.

Let x represent the amount invested in the mutual fund at 8% = 0.08.

Let 
$$3,400 - x$$
 represent the remaining amount invested in the CD at  $5\% = 0.05$ .

The total interest is the sum of the interest earned from each account.

Interest earned in the mutual fund:	$I=Prt=x\cdot0.08\cdot1=0.08x$
Interest earned in the CD:	$I=Prt=(3,400-x)\cdot0.05\cdot1=0.05(3,400-x)$

mutual fund interest + 
$$CD$$
 interest = total interest  
 $0.08x + 0.05(3,400-x) = 245$ 

This equation models the problem with one variable. Solve for x.

$$0.08x + 0.05 (3,400 - x) = 245$$

$$0.08x + 170 - 0.05x = 245$$

$$0.03x + 170 - 170 = 245 - 170$$

$$0.03x = 75$$

$$\frac{0.03x}{0.03} = \frac{75}{0.03}$$

$$x = 2,500$$

Back substitute.

$$3,400 - x = 3,400 - 2,500 = 900$$

Answer: Mary invested \$2,500 at 8% in a mutual fund and \$900 at 5% in a CD.

**Example 13:** Joe has a handful of dimes and quarters that values \$5.30. He has one fewer than twice as many dimes than quarters. How many of each coin does he have?

Solution: Begin by identifying the variables.

Let q represent the number of quarters Joe is holding. Let 2q - 1 represent the number of dimes.

To determine the total value of a number of coins, multiply the number of coins by the value of each coin. For example, 5 quarters have a value  $\$0.25 \cdot 5 = \$1.25$ .

value in quarters + value in dimes = total value of coins  

$$0.25q + 0.10(2q-1) = 5.30$$

Solve for the number of quarters, q.

$$0.25q + 0.10(2q - 1) = 5.30$$

$$0.25q + 0.20q - 0.10 = 5.30$$

$$0.45q - 0.10 = 5.30$$

$$0.45q - 0.10 + 0.10 = 5.30 + 0.10$$

$$0.45q = 5.40$$

$$\frac{0.45q}{0.45} = \frac{5.40}{0.45}$$

$$q = 12$$

Back substitute into 2q - 1 to find the number of dimes.

$$2q-1=2(12)-1=24-1=23$$

Answer: Joe has 12 quarters and 23 dimes. Check by multiplying  $\$0.25 \cdot 12 = \$3.00$  and  $\$0.10 \cdot 23 = \$2.30$ . Then add to obtain the correct amount: \$3.00 + \$2.30 = \$5.30.

**Try this!** A total amount of \$5,900 is invested in two accounts. One account earns 3.5% interest and another earns 4.5%. If the interest for 1 year is \$229.50, then how much is invested in each account?

Answer: \$3,600 is invested at 3.5% and \$2,300 at 4.5%.


## **Uniform Motion Problems (Distance Problems)**

Uniform motion refers to movement at a speed, or rate that does not change. We can determine the distance traveled by multiplying the average rate by the time traveled at that rate with the formula *D=r-t*. Applications involving uniform motion usually have a lot of data, so it helps to first organize the data in a chart and then set up an algebraic equation that models the problem.

Example 14: Two trains leave the station at the same time traveling in opposite directions. One travels at 70 miles per hour and the other at 60 miles per hour. How long does it take for the distance between them to reach 390 miles?

Solution: First, identify the unknown quantity and organize the data.

Let *t* represent the time it takes to separate 390 miles.



The given information is filled in on the following chart. The time for each train is equal.

	Distance =	Rate	× Time
Train 1		70 mph	t
Train 2		60 mph	t
Total	390 mi		

To avoid introducing two more variables, use the formula D=rt to fill in the unknown distances traveled by each train.

Distance traveled by train 1:  $D = r \cdot t = 70 \cdot t$ 

Distance traveled by train 2:  $D = r \cdot t = 60 \cdot t$ 

We can now completely fill in the chart.

	Distance =	Rate ×	Time
Train 1	70 <i>t</i>	70 mph	t
Train 2	60 <i>t</i>	60 mph	t
Total	390 mi		

The algebraic setup is defined by the distance column. The problem asks for the time it takes for the total distance to reach 390 miles.

75	Distance =	= Rate ×	Time
Train 1	70 <i>t</i>	70 mph	t
Train 2	60 <i>t</i>	60 mph	t
Total	390 mi		
70	t + 60t = 3	90	

Solve for *t*.


$$70t + 60t = 390$$
$$130t = 390$$
$$\frac{130t}{130} = \frac{390}{130}$$
$$t = 3$$

Answer: It takes 3 hours for the distance between the trains to reach 390 miles.

**Example 15:** A train traveling nonstop to its destination is able to make the trip at an average speed of 72 miles per hour. On the return trip, the train makes several stops and is only able to average 48 miles per hour. If the return trip takes 2 hours longer than the initial trip to the destination, then what is the travel time each way?

Solution: First, identify the unknown quantity and organize the data.

Let t represent the time it takes to arrive at the destination. Let t + 2 represent the time it takes for the return trip.



The given information is filled in the following chart:

	Distance =	Rate	× Time
To Destination		72 mph	t
Return Trip		48 mph	t+2
Total			

Use the formula  $D=r \cdot t$  to fill in the unknown distances.

Distance traveled to the destination:  $D = r \cdot t = 72 \cdot t$ 

Distance traveled on the return trip:  $D = r \cdot t = 48 \cdot (t+2)$ 

Use these expressions to complete the chart.

	Distance =	Rate >	Time
To Destination	72 <i>t</i>	72 mph	t
Return Trip	48(t+2)	48 mph	t+2
Total			

The algebraic setup is again defined by the distance column. In this case, the distance to the destination and back is the same, and the equation is

$$72t = 48(t+2)$$

Solve for *t*.

$$72t = 48(t+2)$$

$$72t = 48t + 96$$

$$72t - 48t = 48t + 96 - 48t$$

$$24t = 96$$

$$\frac{24t}{24} = \frac{96}{24}$$

$$t = 4$$

The return trip takes t+2=4+2=6 hours.

Answer: It takes 4 hours to arrive at the destination and 6 hours to return.

Try this! Mary departs for school on a bicycle at an average rate of 6 miles per hour. Her sister Kate, running late, leaves 15 minutes later and cycles at twice that speed. How long will it take Kate to catch up to Mary? Be careful! Pay attention to the units given in the problem.

Answer: It takes 15 minutes for Kate to catch up.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Simplify the process of solving real-world problems by creating mathematical models that describe the relationship between unknowns. Use algebra to solve the resulting equations.
- Guessing and checking for solutions is a poor practice. This technique might sometimes produce correct answers, but is unreliable,
   especially when problems become more complex.
- Read the problem several times and search for the key words and phrases. Identify the unknowns and assign variables or expressions to the unknown quantities. Look for relationships that allow you to use only one variable. Set up a mathematical model for the situation and use algebra to solve the equation. Check to see if the solution makes sense and present the solution in sentence form.
- Do not avoid word problems: solving them can be fun and rewarding. With lots of practice you will find that they really are not so bad after all. Modeling and solving applications is one of the major reasons to study algebra.
- Do not feel discouraged when the first attempt to solve a word problem does not work. This is part of the process. Try something different and learn from incorrect attempts.

### 2.6 Ratio and Proportion Applications

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Understand the difference between a ratio and a proportion.
- 2. Solve proportions using cross multiplication.
- 3. Solve applications involving proportions, including similar triangles.

#### **Definitions**

A ratio is a relationship between two numbers or quantities usually expressed as a quotient. Ratios are typically expressed using the following notation:

$$\frac{a}{b}$$
 ato b  $a:b$ 

All of the above are equivalent forms used to express a ratio. However, the most familiar way to express a ratio is in the form of a fraction. When writing ratios, it is important to pay attention to the units. If the units are the same, then the ratio can be written without them.

**Example 1:** Express the ratio 12 feet to 48 feet in reduced form.

Solution:

12 feet to 48 feet = 
$$\frac{12 \text{ feet}}{48 \text{ feet}}$$
  
=  $\frac{12 \div 12}{48 \div 12}$  Reduce.  
=  $\frac{1}{4}$ 

Answer: 1 to 4

If the units are different, then we must be sure to include them because the ratio represents a rate.

Example 2: Express the ratio 220 miles to 4 hours in reduced form.

Solution:

220 miles to 4 hours = 
$$\frac{220 \text{ miles}}{4 \text{ hours}}$$
  
=  $\frac{55 \text{ miles}}{1 \text{ hour}}$   
= 55 miles/hour

Answer: 55 miles to 1 hour (or 55 miles per hour)

Rates are useful when determining unit cost, or the price of each unit. We use the unit cost to compare values when the quantities are not the same. To determine the unit cost, divide the cost by the number of units.

**Example 3:** A local supermarket offers a pack of 12 sodas for \$3.48 on sale, and the local discount warehouse offers the soda in a 36-can case for \$11.52. Which is the better value?

Solution: Divide the cost by the number of cans to obtain the unit price.

Supermarket	Discount warehouse
\$3.4812 cans=\$0.29/can	\$11.5236 cans=\$0.32/can

Answer: The supermarket sale price of \$3.48 for a 12-pack is a better value at \$0.29 per can.

A proportion is a statement of equality of two ratios.

$$\frac{a}{b} = \frac{c}{d}$$

This proportion is often read "a is to b as c is to d." Here is an example of a simple proportion,

$$\frac{1}{2} = \frac{2}{4}$$

If we clear the fractions by multiplying both sides of the proportion by the product of the denominators, 8, then we obtain the following true statement:

$$8 \cdot \frac{1}{2} = 8 \cdot \frac{2}{4}$$
$$4 \cdot 1 = 2 \cdot 2$$
$$4 = 4$$

Given any nonzero real numbers a, b, c, and d that satisfy a proportion, multiply both sides by the product of the denominators to obtain the following:

$$\frac{a}{b} = \frac{c}{d}$$

$$bd \cdot \frac{a}{b} = bd \cdot \frac{c}{d}$$

$$ad = bc$$

This shows that cross products are equal, and is commonly referred to as cross multiplication.


If 
$$\frac{a}{b} = \frac{c}{d}$$
 then  $ad = bc$ 

#### **Solving Proportions**

Cross multiply to solve proportions where terms are unknown.

Example 4: Solve: 58=n4.

Solution: Cross multiply and then solve for n.



Answer: n=52

**Example 5:** Solve: 15*x*=56.

**Solution:** Cross multiply then solve for x.

$$\frac{15}{x} = \frac{5}{6}$$

$$15 \cdot 6 = x \cdot 5$$

$$15 \cdot 6 = 5x$$

$$\frac{15 \cdot 6}{5} = \frac{5x}{5}$$

$$3 \cdot 6 = 1x$$

$$18 = x$$

Answer: x=18

**Example 6:** Solve: *n*+35=72.

**Solution:** When cross multiplying, be sure to group n+3. Apply the distributive property in the next step.

$$\frac{n+3}{5} = \frac{7}{2}$$

$$(n+3) \cdot 2 = 5 \cdot 7$$

$$2n+6=35$$

$$2n+6-6=35-6$$

$$2n=29$$

$$\frac{2n}{2} = \frac{29}{2}$$

$$n = \frac{29}{2}$$

Answer: *n*=292

Try this! Solve: 53=3n-12.

Answer: *n*=139

#### **Applications**

When setting up proportions, consistency with the units of each ratio is critical. Units for the numerators should be the same and units for the denominators should also be the same.

**Example 7:** It is claimed that 2 out of 3 dentists prefer a certain brand of toothpaste. If 600 dentists are surveyed, then how many will say they prefer that brand?

Solution: First, identify the unknown and assign it a variable.

# Let *n* represent the number of dentists surveyed who prefer the brand name.

Since you are looking for the number of dentists who prefer the brand name out of a total of 600 surveyed, construct the ratios with the number of dentists who prefer the brand in the numerator and the total number surveyed in the denominator.

$$\frac{2}{3} = \frac{n}{600} \leftarrow number of dentists who prefer the brand \\ \leftarrow total number of dentists surveyed$$

Cross multiply and solve for n,

$$2 \cdot 600 = 3 \cdot n$$

$$\frac{2 \cdot 600}{3} = \frac{3 \cdot n}{3}$$

$$2 \cdot 200 = 1n$$

$$400 = n$$

Answer: The claim suggests that 400 out of 600 dentists surveyed prefer the brand name.

**Example 8:** In Tulare County, 3 out of every 7 voters said **yes** to Proposition 40. If 42,000 people voted, how many said **no** to Proposition 40?

Solution: The problem gives the ratio of voters who said yes, but it asks for the number who said no.

## Let *n* represent the number of voters who said no.

If 3 out of 7 said yes, then we can assume 4 out of 7 said no. Set up the ratios with the number of voters who said no in the numerator and the total number of voters in the denominator.

$$\frac{4}{7} = \frac{n}{42,000} \leftarrow voters who voted no$$

$$\leftarrow total number of voters$$

Cross multiply and solve for n.

$$4 \cdot 42,000 = 7 \cdot n$$
$$\frac{4 \cdot 42,000}{7} = \frac{7 \cdot n}{7}$$
$$24,000 = n$$

Answer: 24,000 voters out of 42,000 said no.

Example 9: The sum of two integers in the ratio of 4 to 5 is 27. Find the integers.

**Solution:** The sum of two integers is 27; use this relationship to avoid two variables.

Let n represent one of the integers. Let 27 - n represent the other integer

The integers are given to be in the ratio of 4 to 5. Set up the following proportion:

$$\frac{4}{5} = \frac{n}{27 - n}$$

$$4 \cdot (27 - n) = 5 \cdot n$$

$$108 - 4n = 5n$$

$$108 - 4n + 4n = 5n + 4n$$

$$108 = 9n$$

$$\frac{108}{9} = \frac{9n}{9}$$

$$12 = n$$

Use 27 - n to determine the other integer.

$$27 - n = 27 - 12 = 15$$

Answer: The integers are 12 and 15.

Try this! A recipe calls for 5 tablespoons of sugar for every 8 cups of flour. How many tablespoons of sugar are required for


32 cups of flour?

Answer: 20 tablespoons of sugar



#### **Similar Triangles**

We will often encounter proportion problems in geometry and trigonometry. One application involves similar triangles, which have the same shape, but not necessarily the same size. The measures of the corresponding angles of similar triangles are equal, and the measures of the corresponding sides are proportional. Given similar triangles ABC and RST,



We may write  $ABC \sim RST$  and conclude that all of the corresponding angles are equal. The notation indicates that angle A corresponds to angle R and that the measures of these angles are equal: A = R.

$$\overrightarrow{ABC} \sim \overrightarrow{RST}$$

In addition, the measures of other pairs of corresponding angles are equal: B = S and C = T.


$$\overrightarrow{ABC} \sim \overrightarrow{RST}$$
  $\overrightarrow{ABC} \sim \overrightarrow{RST}$ 

Use uppercase letters for angles and a lowercase letter to denote the side opposite of the given angle. Denote the proportionality of the sides as follows:

$$\frac{a}{r} = \frac{b}{s} = \frac{c}{t}$$

**Example 10:** If triangle ABC is similar to RST, where a=3, b=4, c=5, and r=9, then find the remaining two sides.

**Solution:** Draw a picture and identify the variables pictorially. Represent the remaining unknown sides by s and t. Set up proportions and solve for the missing sides.



Find s
$\frac{4}{s} = \frac{3}{9}$
$4 \cdot 9 = s \cdot 3$ $4 \cdot 9 \qquad s \cdot 3$
$\overline{3} = \overline{3}$
$4 \cdot 3 = s$ $12 = s$

Answer: The two remaining sides measure 12 units and 15 units.

The reduced ratio of any two corresponding sides of similar triangles is called the scale factor. In the previous example, the ratio of the two given sides a and r is

$$\frac{3}{9} = \frac{1}{3}$$

Therefore, triangle *ABC* is similar to triangle *RST* with a scale factor of 1/3. This means that each leg of triangle *ABC* is 1/3 of the measure of the corresponding legs of triangle *RST*. Also, another interesting fact is that the perimeters of similar triangles are in the same proportion as their sides and share the same scale factor.

**Example 11:** If a triangle *ABC* has a perimeter of 12 units and is similar to *RST* with a scale factor of 1/3, then find the perimeter of triangle *RST*.

Solution:

## Let x represent the perimeter of triangle RST.

Scale factor 1/3 implies that the perimeters are in proportion to this ratio. Set up a proportion as follows:

$$\frac{1}{3} = \frac{12}{x} \leftarrow perimeter of ABC$$
$$\leftarrow perimeter of RST$$

Cross multiply and solve for x.

$$1 \cdot x = 3 \cdot 12$$
$$x = 36$$

Answer: The perimeter of triangle RST is 36 units.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Solve proportions by multiplying both sides of the equation by the product of the denominators, or cross multiply.
- When setting up a proportion, it is important to ensure consistent units in the numerators and denominators.
- The corresponding angles of similar triangles are equal and their corresponding sides are proportional. The ratio of any two

corresponding sides determines the scale factor, which can be used to solve many applications involving similar triangles.

### 2.7 Introduction to Inequalities and Interval Notation

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Graph the solutions of a single inequality on a number line and express the solutions using interval notation.
- 2. Graph the solutions of a compound inequality on a number line, and express the solutions using interval notation.


#### **Unbounded Intervals**

An algebraic inequality, such as  $x \ge 2$ , is read "x is greater than or equal to 2." This inequality has infinitely many solutions for x. Some of the solutions are 2, 3, 3.5, 5, 20, and 20.001. Since it is impossible to list all of the solutions, a system is needed that allows a clear communication of this infinite set. Two common ways of expressing solutions to an inequality are by graphing them on a number line and using interval notation.

To express the solution graphically, draw a number line and shade in all the values that are solutions to the inequality.

Interval notation is textual and uses specific notation as follows:


"x is greater than or equal to 2"  $x \ge 2$ 



Corresponding interval notation:  $[2, \infty)$ 

Determine the interval notation after graphing the solution set on a number line. The numbers in interval notation should be written in the same order as they appear on the number line, with smaller numbers in the set appearing first. In this example, there is an inclusive inequality, which means that the lower-bound 2 is included in the solution. Denote this with a closed dot on the number line and a square bracket in interval notation. The symbol  $(\infty)$  is read as infinity and indicates that the set is unbounded to the right on a number line. Interval notation requires a parenthesis to enclose infinity. The square bracket indicates the boundary is included in the solution. The parentheses indicate the boundary is not included. *Infinity* is an upper bound to the real numbers, but is not itself a real number: it cannot be included in the solution set.

Now compare the interval notation in the previous example to that of the strict, or noninclusive, inequality that follows:



Strict inequalities imply that solutions may get very close to the boundary point, in this case 2, but not actually include it.

Denote this idea with an open dot on the number line and a round parenthesis in interval notation.

**Example 1:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent: *x*<3.

**Solution:** Use an open dot at 3 and shade all real numbers strictly less than 3. Use negative infinity  $(-\infty)$  to indicate that the solution set is unbounded to the left on a number line.



Answer: Interval notation:  $(-\infty, 3)$ 

**Example 2:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent:  $x \le 5$ .

Solution: Use a closed dot and shade all numbers less than and including 5.

-2 -1 0 1 2 3 4 5 6

Answer: Interval notation: (-∞, 5]

It is important to see that  $5 \ge x$  is the same as  $x \le 5$ . Both require values of x to be smaller than or equal to 5. To avoid confusion, it is good practice to rewrite all inequalities with the variable on the left. Also, when using text, use "inf" as a shortened form of infinity. For example,  $(-\infty, 5]$  can be expressed textually as  $(-\inf, 5]$ .

A compound inequality is actually two or more inequalities in one statement joined by the word "and" or by the word "or."

Compound inequalities with the logical "or" require that either condition must be satisfied. Therefore, the solution set of this type of compound inequality consists of all the elements of the solution sets of each inequality. When we join these

individual solution sets it is called the union, denoted  $\cup$ . For example, the solutions to the compound inequality x < 3 or  $x \ge 6$  can be graphed as follows:

$$x < 3 \text{ or } x \ge 6$$

# Corresponding interval notation: $(-\infty,3) \cup [6,\infty)$

Sometimes we encounter compound inequalities where the separate solution sets overlap. In the case where the compound inequality contains the word "or," we combine all the elements of both sets to create one set containing all the elements of each.

**Example 3:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent:  $x \le -1$  or  $x \le 3$ .

**Solution:** Combine all solutions of both inequalities. The solutions to each inequality are sketched above the number line as a means to determine the union, which is graphed on the number line below.

$$x < 3$$
 $x < -1$ 
 $x$ 


$$x \le -1$$
 or  $x < 3$ 

Answer: Interval notation:  $(-\infty, 3)$ 

Any real number less than 3 in the shaded region on the number line will satisfy at least one of the two given inequalities.

**Example 4:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent: x < 3 or  $x \ge -1$ .


Solution: Both solution sets are graphed above the union, which is graphed below.



Answer: Interval notation:  $\mathbf{R} = (-\infty, \infty)$ 

When you combine both solution sets and form the union, you can see that all real numbers satisfy the original compound inequality.

In summary,



and

$$x \le 3 \text{ or } x > 6 \quad (-\infty, 3] \cup (6, \infty)$$

#### **Bounded Intervals**

An inequality such as

$$-1 \le x < 3$$

reads "-1 one is less than or equal to x and x is less than three." This is a compound inequality because it can be decomposed as follows:

$$-1 \le x$$
 and  $x < 3$ 

The logical "and" requires that both conditions must be true. Both inequalities are satisfied by all the elements in the intersection, denoted  $\cap$ , of the solution sets of each.

**Example 5:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent: x < 3 and  $x \ge -1$ .

**Solution:** Determine the intersection, or overlap, of the two solution sets. The solutions to each inequality are sketched above the number line as a means to determine the intersection, which is graphed on the number line below.

$$x < 3$$
 $x \ge -1$ 
 $x$ 


Here x=3 is not a solution because it solves only one of the inequalities.

Answer: Interval notation: [-1, 3)

Alternatively, we may interpret  $-1 \le x < 3$  as all possible values for x between or bounded by -1 and 3 on a number line. For example, one such solution is x=1. Notice that 1 is between -1 and 3 on a number line, or that -1 < 1 < 3. Similarly, we can see that other possible solutions are -1, -0.99, 0, 0.0056, 1.8, and 2.99. Since there are infinitely many real numbers between -1 and 3, we must express the solution graphically and/or with interval notation, in this case [-1, 3).

**Example 6:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent: -32 < x < 2.

**Solution:** Shade all real numbers bounded by, or strictly between, -32=-112 and 2.



Answer: Interval notation: (-32, 2)

**Example 7:** Graph and give the interval notation equivalent:  $-5 < x \le 15$ .


Solution: Shade all real numbers between -5 and 15, and indicate that the upper bound, 15, is included in the solution set by



Answer: Interval notation: (-5, 15]

In the previous two examples, we did not decompose the inequalities; instead we chose to think of all real numbers between the two given bounds.

#### **Set-Builder Notation**

In this text, we use interval notation. However, other resources that you are likely to encounter use an alternate method for describing sets called set-builder notation. We have used set notation to list the elements such as the integers

$$\{..., -3, -2, -1, 0, 1, 2, 3, ...\}$$

The braces group the elements of the set and the ellipsis marks indicate that the integers continue forever. In this section, we wish to describe intervals of real numbers—for example, the real numbers greater than or equal to 2.




Since the set is too large to list, set-builder notation allows us to describe it using familiar mathematical notation. An example of set-builder notation follows:

$$\{x \in \mathbb{R} \mid x \ge 2\}$$

Here  $x \in \mathbb{R}$  describes the type of number, where the symbol ( $\in$ ) is read "element of." This implies that the variable x represents a real number. The vertical bar (|) is read "such that." Finally, the statement  $x \ge 2$  is the condition that describes the set using

mathematical notation. At this point in our study of algebra, it is assumed that all variables represent real numbers. For this reason, you can omit the " $\in \mathbb{R}$ " and write  $\{x|x\geq 2\}$ , which is read "the set of all real numbers x such that x is greater than or equal to 2."



# Corresponding set-builder notation: $\{x \mid x \ge 2\}$

To describe compound inequalities such as x < 3 or  $x \ge 6$ , write  $\{x \mid x < 3 \text{ or } x \ge 6\}$ , which is read "the set of all real numbers x such that x is less than 3 or x is greater than or equal to 6."

$$x < 3$$
 or  $x \ge 6$ 

Corresponding set-builder notation:  $\{x \mid x < 3 \text{ or } x \ge 6\}$ 

Write bounded intervals, such as  $-1 \le x < 3$ , as  $\{x \mid -1 \le x < 3\}$ , which is read "the set of all real numbers x such that x is greater than or equal to -1 and less than 3."

$$-1 \le x < 3$$

Corresponding set-builder notation:  $\{x \mid -1 \le x < 3\}$ 

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Inequalities usually have infinitely many solutions, so rather than presenting an impossibly large list, we present such solutions sets either graphically on a number line or textually using interval notation.
- Inclusive inequalities with the "or equal to" component are indicated with a closed dot on the number line and with a square bracket using interval notation.

- Strict inequalities without the "or equal to" component are indicated with an open dot on the number line and a parenthesis using interval notation.
- Compound inequalities that make use of the logical "or" are solved by solutions of either inequality. The solution set is the union of each individual solution set.
- Compound inequalities that make use of the logical "and" require that all inequalities are solved by a single solution. The solution set is the intersection of each individual solution set.
- Compound inequalities of the form n < A < m can be decomposed into two inequalities using the logical "and." However, it is just as valid to consider the argument A to be bounded between the values n and m.

### 2.8 Linear Inequalities (One Variable)

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Identify linear inequalities and check solutions.
- 2. Solve linear inequalities and express the solutions graphically on a number line and in interval notation.
- 3. Solve compound linear inequalities and express the solutions graphically on a number line and in interval notation.
- 4. Solve applications involving linear inequalities and interpret the results.

#### **Definition of a Linear Inequality**

A linear inequality is a mathematical statement that relates a linear expression as either less than or greater than another. The following are some examples of linear inequalities, all of which are solved in this section:

$$3x + 7 < 16$$
  $-2x + 1 \ge 21$   $-7(2x + 1) < 1$ 

A solution to a linear inequality is a real number that will produce a true statement when substituted for the variable. Linear inequalities have either infinitely many solutions or no solution. If there are infinitely many solutions, graph the solution set on a number line and/or express the solution using interval notation.

**Example 1:** Are x=-2 and x=4 solutions to 3x+7<16?

**Solution:** Substitute the values for x, simplify, and check to see if we obtain a true statement.

Check $x = -2$	Check $x = 4$
3(-2)+7<16	3(4) + 7 < 16
-6+7<16	12+7<16
1<16	19<16 *
1 10	

Answer: x=-2 is a solution and x=4 is not.

#### **Algebra of Linear Inequalities**

All but one of the techniques learned for solving linear equations apply to solving linear inequalities. You may add or subtract any real number to both sides of an inequality, and you may multiply or divide both sides by any *positive* real number to create equivalent inequalities. For example,

$$10 > -5$$

$$10 - 7 > -5 - 7$$

$$3 > -12 \checkmark True$$

$$10 > -5$$

$$\frac{10}{5} > \frac{-5}{5}$$

$$2 > -1 \checkmark True$$
Subtract 7 from both sides.
$$True$$
Divide both sides by 5.

Both subtracting 7 from each side and dividing each side by +5 results in an equivalent inequality that is true.

**Example 2:** Solve and graph the solution set: 3x+7<16.

#### Solution:

$$3x+7<16$$

$$3x+7-7<16-7$$

$$3x<9$$

$$\frac{3x}{3}<\frac{9}{3}$$

$$x<3$$

It is helpful to take a minute and choose a few values in and out of the solution set, substitute them into the original

inequality, and then verify the results. As indicated, you should expect x=0 to solve the original inequality, but x=5should not.

Check $x = 0$	Check $x = 5$
3(0) + 7 < 16	3(5)+7<16
7<16 <b>✓</b>	15+7<16
	22<16 *

Checking in this manner gives a good indication that the inequality is solved correctly. This can be done mentally.

Answer: Interval notation:  $(-\infty, 3)$ 

When working with linear inequalities, a different rule applies when multiplying or dividing by a negative number. To illustrate the problem, consider the true statement 10>-5 and divide both sides by -5.

$$\frac{10}{-5} > \frac{-5}{-5}$$

$$\frac{10}{-5} > \frac{-5}{-5}$$

$$\frac{10}{-2} > 1 \times False$$

Dividing by -5 results in a false statement. To retain a true statement, the inequality must be reversed.

$$\frac{10}{-5} < \frac{-5}{-5}$$
Reverse the inequality.
$$-2 < 1$$

True

The same problem occurs when multiplying by a negative number. This leads to the following new rule: when multiplying or dividing by a negative number, reverse the inequality. It is easy to forget to do this so take special care to watch for negative coefficients.

In general, given algebraic expressions A and B, where c is a positive nonzero real number, we have the following properties of inequalities:

Addition property of inequalities: If A < B then, A + c < B + c

Subtraction property of inequalities: If A < B, then A - c < B - c

Multiplication property of inequalities: If A < B, then cA < cB

If A < B, then -cA > -cB

**Division property of inequalities:** If A < B, then  $\frac{A}{c} < \frac{B}{c}$ 

If 
$$A < B$$
, then  $\frac{A}{-c} > \frac{B}{-c}$ 

We use these properties to obtain an equivalent inequality, one with the same solution set, where the variable is isolated. The process is similar to solving linear equations.

**Example 3:** Solve:  $-2x+1 \ge 21$ .

Solution:

$$-2x+1 \ge 21$$

$$-2x+1-1 \ge 21-1$$

$$-2x \ge 20$$

$$\frac{-2x}{-2} \le \frac{20}{-2}$$

$$x \le -10$$
Reverse the inequality.



-20

-15


-10

Answer: Interval notation:  $(-\infty, -10]$ 

**Example 4:** Solve: -7(2x+1)<1.

Solution:

$$-7(2x+1) < 1$$
 Distribute.  
 $-14x-7 < 1$   
 $-14x-7+7 < 1+7$   
 $-14x < 8$   
 $\frac{-14x}{-14} > \frac{8}{-14}$  Reverse the inequality.  
 $x > -\frac{8 \div 2}{14 \div 2}$  Reduce.  
 $x > -\frac{4}{7}$ 



Answer: Interval notation: (−47, ∞)

**Example 5:** Solve:  $5x-3(2x-1) \ge 2(x-3)$ .

Solution:

$$5x-3(2x-1) \ge 2(x-3)$$
 Distribute.  
 $5x-6x+3 \ge 2x-6$  Combine same-side like terms.  
 $-x+3 \ge 2x-6$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $-3x+3 \ge -6$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $-3x+3 \ge -6$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $-3x+3-3 \ge -6-3$  Combine opposite-side like terms.  
 $-3x+3-3 \ge -6-3$  Reverse the inequality.  
 $x \le 3$ 



Answer: Interval notation: (-∞, 3]

**Try this!** Solve:  $3-5(x-1) \le 28$ .

Answer:  $[-4, \infty)$ 

#### **Compound Inequalities**

Following are some examples of compound linear inequalities:

$$-3 < 2x + 5 < 17$$

$$-1 \le \frac{1}{2}x - 3 < 1$$

$$3x + 1 < 10 \quad or \quad 2x - 1 \ge 11$$

These compound inequalities are actually two inequalities in one statement joined by the word "and" or by the word "or." For example,

$$-3 < 2x + 5 < 17$$

is a compound inequality because it can be decomposed as follows:


$$-3 < 2x + 5$$
 and  $2x + 5 < 17$ 

Solve each inequality individually, and the intersection of the two solution sets solves the original compound inequality.

While this method works, there is another method that usually requires fewer steps. Apply the properties of this section to all three parts of the compound inequality with the goal of isolating the variable in the middle of the statement to determine the bounds of the solution set.

**Example 6:** Solve: -3<2*x*+5<17.


Solution:



Answer: Interval notation: (-4, 6)

**Example 7:** Solve:  $-1 \le 12x - 3 < 1$ .

Solution:



Answer: Interval notation: [4, 8)

It is important to note that when multiplying or dividing all three parts of a compound inequality by a negative number, you must reverse all of the inequalities in the statement. For example,

$$-10 < -2x < 20$$

$$\frac{-10}{-2} > \frac{-2x}{-2} > \frac{20}{-2}$$

$$5 > x > -10$$

The answer above can be written in an equivalent form, where smaller numbers lie to the left and the larger numbers lie to the right, as they appear on a number line.

$$-10 < x < 5$$

Using interval notation, write (-10, 5).

**Try this!** Solve:  $-8 \le 2(-3x+5) < 34$ .


Answer: (-4, 3]

For compound inequalities with the word "or" you *must* work both inequalities separately and then consider the union of the solution sets. Values in this union solve either inequality.

**Example 8:** Solve:  $3x+1<10 \text{ or } 2x-1\ge 11$ 

Solution: Solve each inequality and form the union by combining the solution sets.

$$3x+1<10$$
  $2x-1 \ge 11$   
 $3x+1-1<10-1$   $2x-1+1 \ge 11+1$   
 $3x < 9$  or  $2x \ge 12$   
 $\frac{3x}{3} < \frac{9}{3}$  or  $\frac{2x}{2} \ge \frac{12}{2}$   
 $x < 3$   $x \ge 6$ 



Answer: Interval notation:  $(-\infty, 3) \cup [6, \infty)$ 

**Try this!** Solve: 4x-1<-5 or 4x-1>5.

Answer:  $(-\infty,-1)$  $\cup$  $(32,\infty)$

Example 9: Translate: Five less than twice a number is at most 25.

Solution: First, choose a variable for the unknown number and identify the key words and phrases.

twice a number five less than is at most 
$$\leq 2n$$
  $\leq 25$ 

Answer: 2n-5≤25. The key phrase "is at most" indicates that the quantity has a maximum value of 25 or smaller.

**Example 10:** The temperature in the desert can range from  $10^{\circ}$ C to  $45^{\circ}$ C in one 24-hour period. Find the equivalent range in degrees Fahrenheit, F, given that C=59(F-32).

**Solution:** Set up a compound inequality where the temperature in Celsius is inclusively between  $10\,^{\circ}$ C and  $45\,^{\circ}$ C. Then substitute the expression equivalent to the Celsius temperature in the inequality and solve for F.

$$10^{\circ}C \leq temperature in Celsius \leq 45^{\circ}C$$

$$10 \leq \frac{5}{9}(F - 32) \leq 45$$

$$\frac{9}{5} \cdot 10 \leq \frac{9}{5} \cdot \frac{5}{9}(F - 32) \leq \frac{9}{5} \cdot 45$$

$$18 \leq F - 32 \leq 81$$

$$18 + 32 \leq F - 32 + 32 \leq 81 + 32$$

$$50 \leq F \leq 113$$

Answer: The equivalent Fahrenheit range is from 50°F to 113°F.

**Example 11:** In the first four events of a meet, a gymnast scores 7.5, 8.2, 8.5, and 9.0. What must she score on the fifth event to average at least 8.5?

**Solution:** The average must be at least 8.5; this means that the average must be greater than or equal to 8.5.

$$average \ge 8.5$$

$$\frac{7.5 + 8.2 + 8.5 + 9.0 + x}{5} \ge 8.5$$

$$\frac{33.2 + x}{5} \ge 8.5$$

$$5 \cdot \frac{33.2 + x}{5} \ge 5 \cdot 8.5$$

$$33.2 + x \ge 42.5$$

$$33.2 + x - 33.2 \ge 42.5 - 33.2$$

$$x \ge 9.3$$
Multiply both sides by 5.

Answer: She must score at least 9.3 on the fifth event.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Inequalities typically have infinitely many solutions. The solutions are presented graphically on a number line or using interval
   notation or both.
- All but one of the rules for solving linear inequalities are the same as for solving linear equations. If you divide or multiply an
  inequality by a negative number, reverse the inequality to obtain an equivalent inequality.

## **Chapter 3**

## **Graphing Lines**


#### 3.1 Rectangular Coordinate System

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**



#### **Rectangular Coordinate System**

The rectangular coordinate system consists of two real number lines that intersect at a right angle. The horizontal number line is called the x-axis, and the vertical number line is called the y-axis. These two number lines define a flat surface called a plane, and each point on this plane is associated with an ordered pair of real numbers (x, y). The first number is called the x-coordinate, and the second number is called the y-coordinate. The intersection of the two axes is known as the origin, which corresponds to the point (0, 0).




An ordered pair (x, y) represents the position of a point relative to the origin. The x-coordinate represents a position to the right of the origin if it is positive and to the left of the origin if it is negative. The y-coordinate represents a position above the origin if it is positive and below the origin if it is negative. Using this system, every position (point) in the plane is uniquely identified. For example, the pair (2, 3) denotes the position relative to the origin as shown:



This system is often called the Cartesian coordinate system, named after the French mathematician René Descartes (1596–1650).


The x- and y-axes break the plane into four regions called quadrants, named using roman numerals I, II, III, and IV, as pictured. In quadrant I, both coordinates are positive. In quadrant II, the x-coordinate is negative and the y-coordinate is positive. In quadrant III, both coordinates are negative. In quadrant IV, the x-coordinate is positive and the y-coordinate is negative.



Example 1: Plot the ordered pair (-3, 5) and determine the quadrant in which it lies.

**Solution:** The coordinates x=-3 and y=5 indicate a point 3 units to the left of and 5 units above the origin.




Answer: The point is plotted in quadrant II (QII) because the x-coordinate is negative and the y-coordinate is positive.

Ordered pairs with 0 as one of the coordinates do not lie in a quadrant; these points are on one axis or the other (or the point is the origin if both coordinates are 0). Also, the scale indicated on the *x*-axis may be different from the scale indicated on the *y*-axis. Choose a scale that is convenient for the given situation.



**Solution:** Each tick mark on the x-axis represents 2 units and each tick mark on the y-axis represents 3 units.







Graphs are used in everyday life to display data visually. A line graph consists of a set of related data values graphed on a coordinate plane and connected by line segments. Typically, the independent quantity, such as time, is displayed on the *x*-axis and the dependent quantity, such as distance traveled, on the *y*-axis.

**Example 4:** The following line graph shows the number of mathematics and statistics bachelor's degrees awarded in the United States each year since 1970.

# US Bachelor's Degrees in Mathematics and Statistics





### Solution:

a. The scale on the x-axis represents time since 1970, so to determine the number of degrees awarded in 1975, read the y-value of the graph at x = 5.

# US Bachelor's Degrees in Mathematics and Statistics



The y-value corresponding to x = 5 is 18. The graph indicates that this is in thousands; there were 18,000 mathematics and statistics degrees awarded in 1975.

b. To find the year a particular number of degrees was awarded, first look at they-axis. In this case, 11,000 degrees is represented by 11 on the *y*-axis; look to the right to see in which years this occurred.

The y-value of 11 occurs at two data points, one where x = 10 and the other where x = 30. These values correspond to the years 1980 and 2000, respectively.


#### Answers:

a. In the year 1975, 18,000 mathematics and statistics degrees were awarded.

b. In the years 1980 and 2000, the lows of 11,000 mathematics and statistics degrees were awarded.


# **Distance Formula**

Frequently you need to calculate the distance between two points in a plane. To do this, form a right triangle using the two points as vertices of the triangle and then apply the Pythagorean theorem. Recall that the Pythagorean theorem states that if given any right triangle with legs measuring a and b units, then the square of the measure of the hypotenuse c is equal to the sum of the squares of the legs: a2+b2=c2. In other words, the hypotenuse of any right triangle is equal to the square root of the sum of the squares of its legs.



**Example 5:** Find the distance between (-1, 2) and (3, 5).

**Solution:** Form a right triangle by drawing horizontal and vertical lines through the two points. This creates a right triangle as shown below:



The length of leg b is calculated by finding the distance between the x-values of the given points, and the length of leg a is calculated by finding the distance between the given y-values.

$$a = 5 - 2 = 3$$
 units


$$b = 3 - (-1) = 3 + 1 = 4$$
 units

Next, use the Pythagorean theorem to find the length of the hypotenuse.

$$c = \sqrt{3^2 + 4^2}$$
$$= \sqrt{9 + 16}$$
$$= \sqrt{25}$$
$$= 5 \text{ units}$$

Answer: The distance between the two points is 5 units.

Generalize this process to produce a formula that can be used to algebraically calculate the distance between any two given points.



Given two points,  $(x_1, y_1)$  and  $(x_2, y_2)$ , then the distance, d, between them is given by the distance formula:

$$d=(x_2-x_1)_2+(y_2-y_1)_2-----\sqrt{}$$

Example 6: Calculate the distance between (-3, -1) and (-2, 4).

Solution: Use the distance formula.

$$(x_1, y_1)$$
  $(x_2, y_2)$   
 $(-3, -1)$   $(-2, 4)$ 

$$(-3, -1)$$
  $(-2, 4)$ 

It is a good practice to include the formula in its general form as a part of the written solution before substituting values for the variables. This improves readability and reduces the chance for errors.

$$d = \sqrt{(x_2 - x_1)^2 + (y_2 - y_1)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(-2 - (-3))^2 + (4 - (-1))^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(-2 + 3)^2 + (4 + 1)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(1)^2 + (5)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{1 + 25}$$

$$= \sqrt{26}$$

Answer: 26--√ units

**Try this!** Calculate the distance between (-7, 5) and (-1, 13).

Answer: 10 units

Example 7: Do the three points (1, -1), (3, -3), and (3, 1) form a right triangle?

**Solution:** The Pythagorean theorem states that having side lengths that satisfy the property a2+b2=c2 is a necessary and sufficient condition of right triangles. In other words, if you can show that the sum of the squares of the leg lengths of the triangle is equal to the square of the length of the hypotenuse, then the figure must be a right triangle. First, calculate the length of each side using the distance formula.

# Calculation

Points: (1, -1) and (3, -3)

$$a = \sqrt{(3-1)^2 + (-3-(-1))^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(2)^2 + (-3+1)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{4+(-2)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{8}$$

Points: (1, -1) and (3, 1)

$$b = \sqrt{(3-1)^2 + (1-(-1))^2}$$

$$\sqrt{64} + \sqrt{64} = 16$$

$$8 + 8 = 16$$

$$16 = 16$$

Answer: Yes, the three points form a right triangle. In fact, since two of the legs are equal in length, the points form an isosceles right triangle.

# **Midpoint Formula**

The point that bisects the line segment formed by two points,  $(x_1, y_1)$  and  $(x_2, y_2)$ , is called the midpoint and is given by the following formula:

$$\left(\frac{x_1 + x_2}{2}, \frac{y_1 + y_2}{2}\right)$$

The midpoint is an ordered pair formed by finding the average of the x-values and the average of the y-values of the given points.

Example 8: Calculate the midpoint between (-1, -2) and (7, 4).

Solution: First, calculate the average of the x- and y-values of the given points.

$$(x_1, y_1) \quad (x_2, y_2)$$

$$(-1, -2) \quad (7, 4)$$

$$\frac{x_1 + x_2}{2} = \frac{-1 + 7}{2} = \frac{6}{2} = 3$$


$$\frac{y_1 + y_2}{2} = \frac{-2 + 4}{2} = \frac{2}{2} = 1$$

Next, form the midpoint as an ordered pair using the averaged coordinates.

$$\left(\frac{x_1 + x_2}{2}, \frac{y_1 + y_2}{2}\right)$$
(3, 1)

Answer: (3, 1)

To verify that this is indeed the midpoint, calculate the distance between the two given points and verify that the result is equal to the sum of the two equal distances from the endpoints to this midpoint. This verification is left to the reader as an exercise.



Try this! Find the midpoint between (-6, 5) and (6, -11).

Answer: (0, -3)

# **KEY TAKEAWAYS**





# 3.2 Graph by Plotting Points

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Verify solutions to linear equations with two variables.
- 2. Graph lines by plotting points.
- 3. Identify and graph horizontal and vertical lines.

# **Solutions to Equations with Two Variables**

A linear equation with two variables has standard form ax+by=c, where a,b, and c are real numbers and a and b are not both 0. Solutions to equations of this form are ordered pairs (x, y), where the coordinates, when substituted into the equation, produce a true statement.

**Example 1:** Determine whether (1, -2) and (-4, 1) are solutions to 6x-3y=12.

Solution: Substitute the x- and y-values into the equation to determine whether the ordered pair produces a true statement.

Check $(1,-2)$	Check (-4, 1)
6x - 3y = 12	6x - 3y = 12
6(1)-3(-2)=12	6(-4)-3(1)=12
6 + 6 = 12	-24-3=12
12=12 ✓	−27 = 12 ×

Answer: (1, -2) is a solution, and (-4, 1) is not.

It is often the case that a linear equation is given in a form where one of the variables, usually y, is isolated. If this is the case, then we can check that an ordered pair is a solution by substituting in a value for one of the coordinates and simplifying to see if we obtain the other.

**Example 2:** Are (12, -3) and (-5, 14) solutions to y=2x-4?

**Solution:** Substitute the x-values and simplify to see if the corresponding y-values are obtained.

Answer: (12, -3) is a solution, and (-5, 14) is not.

**Try this!** Is (6, -1) a solution to y=-23x+3?

Answer: Yes

When given linear equations with two variables, we can solve for one of the variables, usually y, and obtain an equivalent equation as follows:

$$6x-3y = 12$$

$$6x-3y-6x = 12-6x$$

$$-3y = -6x+12$$

$$\frac{-3y}{-3} = \frac{-6x+12}{-3}$$

$$y = \frac{-6x}{-3} + \frac{12}{-3}$$
Divide both sides by -3.
$$y = \frac{-6x}{-3} + \frac{12}{-3}$$
Distribute and divide.
$$y = 2x-4$$

Written in this form, we can see that y depends on x. Here x is the independent variable and y is the dependent variable.

$$6x - 3y = 12$$

$$y = 2x - 4$$
Equivalent equations

The linear equation y=2x-4 can be used to find ordered pair solutions. If we substitute any real number for x, then we can simplify to find the corresponding y-value. For example, if x=3, then y=2(3)-4=6-4=2, and we can form an ordered pair

solution, (3, 2). Since there are infinitely many real numbers to choose for x, the linear equation has infinitely many ordered pair solutions (x, y).

**Example 3:** Find ordered pair solutions to the equation 5x-y=14 with the given x-values  $\{-2, -1, 0, 4, 6\}$ .

**Solution:** First, solve for y.

$$5x - y = 14$$

$$5x - y - 5x = 14 - 5x$$

$$-y = -5x + 14$$

$$-1(-y) = -1(-5x + 14)$$

$$y = 5x - 14$$

Next, substitute the x-values in the equation y=5x-14 to find the corresponding y-values.

<b>x</b> -value	<b>y</b> -value	Solution
x = -2	y = 5 (-2) - 14 $= -10 - 14$ $= -24$	(-2, -24)
x = -1	y = 5(-1) - 14 $= -5 - 14$ $= -19$	(-1, -19)
x = 0	y = 5(0) - 14 $= 0 - 14$ $= -14$	(0, -14)
<i>x</i> = 4	y = 5(4) - 14 $= 20 - 14$ $= 6$	(4, 6)
<i>x</i> = 6	y = 5(6) - 14 $= 30 - 14$ $= 16$	(6, 16)

Answer:  $\{(-2, -24), (-1, -19), (0, -14), (4, 6), (6, 16)\}$ 

In the previous example, certain x-values are given, but that is not always going to be the case. When treating x as the independent variable, we can choose any values for x and then substitute them into the equation to find the corresponding y-values. This method produces as many ordered pair solutions as we wish.

**Example 4:** Find five ordered pair solutions to 6x+2y=10.

**Solution:** First, solve for y.

$$6x + 2y = 10$$

$$6x + 2y - 6x = 10 - 6x$$

$$2y = -6x + 10$$

$$\frac{2y}{2} = \frac{-6x + 10}{2}$$

$$y = \frac{-6x}{2} + \frac{10}{2}$$

$$y = -3x + 5$$

Next, choose any set of x-values. Usually we choose some negative values and some positive values. In this case, we will find the corresponding y-values when x is  $\{-2, -1, 0, 1, 2\}$ . Make the substitutions required to fill in the following table (often referred to as a t-chart):

x	y		Solutions
-2	11	y = -3(-2) + 5 = 6 + 5 = 11	(-2, 11)
-1	8	y = -3(-1) + 5 = 3 + 5 = 8	(-1, 8)
0	5	y = -3(0) + 5 = 0 + 5 = 5	(0, 5)
1	2	y = -3(1) + 5 = -3 + 5 = 2	(1, 2)
2	-1	y = -3(2) + 5 = -6 + 5 = -1	(2, -1)

Answer:  $\{(-2, 11), (-1, 8), (0, 5), (1, 2), (2, -1)\}$ . Since there are infinitely many ordered pair solutions, answers may vary depending on the choice of values for the independent variable.


**Try this!** Find five ordered pair solutions to 10x-2y=2.

Answer:  $\{(-2, -11), (-1, -6), (0, -1), (1, 4), (2, 9)\}$  (answers may vary)


# **Graph by Plotting Points**

Since the solutions to linear equations are ordered pairs, they can be graphed using the rectangular coordinate system. The set of all solutions to a linear equation can be represented on a rectangular coordinate plane using a straight line connecting at least two points; this line is called its graph. To illustrate this, plot five ordered pair solutions,  $\{(-2, 11), (-1, 8), (0, 5), (1, 2), (2, -1)\}$ , to the linear equation 6x+2y=10.


y



Notice that the points are collinear; this will be the case for any linear equation. Draw a line through the points with a straightedge, and add arrows on either end to indicate that the graph extends indefinitely.



1,



The resulting line represents all solutions to 6x+2y=10, of which there are infinitely many. The steps for graphing lines by plotting points are outlined in the following example.

**Example 5:** Find five ordered pair solutions and graph: 10x-5y=10.

Solution:

Step 1: Solve for y.

$$10x - 5y = 10$$

$$10x - 5y - 10x = 10 - 10x$$

$$-5y = -10x + 10$$

$$\frac{-5y}{-5} = \frac{-10x + 10}{-5}$$

$$y = \frac{-10x}{-5} + \frac{10}{-5}$$

$$y = 2x - 2$$


**Step 2**: Choose at least two x-values and find the corresponding y-values. In this section, we will choose five real numbers to use as x-values. It is a good practice to choose 0 and some negative numbers, as well as some positive numbers.

x	y	y = 2x - 2
-2	-6	y = 2(-2) - 2 = -4 - 2 = -6
-1	-4	y = 2(-1) - 2 = -2 - 2 = -4
0	-2	y = 2(0) - 2 = 0 - 2 = -2
1	0	y = 2(1) - 2 = 2 - 2 = 0
2	2	y = 2(2) - 2 = 4 - 2 = 2

Five ordered pair solutions are  $\{(-2, -6), (-1, -4), (0, -2), (1, 0), (2, 2)\}$ 

**Step 3:** Choose an appropriate scale, plot the points, and draw a line through them using a straightedge. In this case, choose a scale where each tick mark on the y-axis represents 2 units because all the y-values are multiples of 2.

Answer:



It will not always be the case that y can be solved in terms of x with integer coefficients. In fact, the coefficients often turn out to be fractions.

**Example 6:** Find five ordered pair solutions and graph: -5x+2y=10.

Solution:

$$-5x+2y=10$$

$$-5x+2y+5x=10+5x$$

$$2y=5x+10$$

$$\frac{2y}{2} = \frac{5x+10}{2}$$

$$y = \frac{5x}{2} + \frac{10}{2}$$


$$y = \frac{5}{2}x+5$$

Remember that you can choose any real number for the independent variable x, so choose wisely here. Since the denominator of the coefficient of the variable x is 2, you can avoid fractions by choosing multiples of 2 for the x-values. In this case, choose the set of x-values  $\{-6, -4, -2, 0, 2\}$  and find the corresponding y-values.

$$\begin{array}{c|ccccc}
x & y \\
\hline
-6 & -10 & y = \frac{5}{2}(-6) + 5 = -15 + 5 = -10 \\
-4 & -5 & y = \frac{5}{2}(-4) + 5 = -10 + 5 = -5 \\
-2 & 0 & y = \frac{5}{2}(-2) + 5 = -5 + 5 = 0 \\
0 & 5 & y = \frac{5}{2}(0) + 5 = 0 + 5 = 5 \\
2 & 10 & y = \frac{5}{2}(2) + 5 = 5 + 5 = 10
\end{array}$$


Five solutions are  $\{(-6, -10), (-4, -5), (-2, 0), (0, 5), (2, 10)\}$ . Here we choose to scale the x-axis with multiples of 2 and the y-axis with multiples of 5.

Answer:

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# **Horizontal and Vertical Lines**

We need to recognize by inspection linear equations that represent a vertical or horizontal line.

**Example 7:** Graph by plotting five points: *y*=–2.

**Solution:** Since the given equation does not have a variable x, we can rewrite it with a 0 coefficient for x.


$$y = 0x - 2$$

Choose any five values for x and see that the corresponding y-value is always -2.

<u>x</u>	y	
-2	-2	y = 0 (-2) - 2 = 0 - 2 = -2
-1	-2	y = 0 (-1) - 2 = 0 - 2 = -2
0	-2	y = 0 (0) - 2 = 0 - 2 = -2

We now have five ordered pair solutions to plot  $\{(-2, -2), (-1, -2), (0, -2), (1, -2), (2, -2)\}.$ 

Answer:



When the coefficient for the variable x is 0, the graph is a horizontal line. In general, the equation for a horizontal line can be written in the form y=k, where k represents any real number.

**Example 8:** Graph by plotting five points: x = 3.

**Solution:** Since the given equation does not have a variable y, rewrite it with a 0 coefficient for y.


$$x = 0y + 3$$

Choose any five values for y and see that the corresponding x-value is always 3.

3	-2	x = 0(-2) + 3 = 0 + 3 = 3
3	-1	x = 0(-1) + 3 = 0 + 3 = 3
3	0	x = 0(0) + 3 = 0 + 3 = 3

We now have five ordered pair solutions to plot:  $\{(3, -2), (3, -1), (3, 0), (3, 1), (3, 2)\}$ .

When the coefficient for the variable y is 0, the graph is a vertical line. In general, the equation for a vertical line can be written as x=k, where k represents any real number.

To summarize, if k is a real number,

$$y = k$$
 Horizontal line

$$x = k$$
 Vertical line

**Try this!** Graph y=5 and x=-2 on the same set of axes and determine where they intersect.


























































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# 3.3 Graph Using Intercepts

### LEARNING OBJECTIVES


- 1. Identify and find x- and y-intercepts of a graph.

# Definition of x- and y-Intercepts

The <em class="emphasis">x-intercept</em class="emphasis"> is the point where the graph of a line intersects the x-axis.

The<em class="emphasis">y-intercept</em class="emphasis"> is the point where the graph of a line intersects the y-axis.

These points have the form (x, 0) and (0, y), respectively.



To find the x- and y-intercepts algebraically, use the fact that all x-intercepts have a y-value of zero and all y-intercepts have an x-value of zero. To find the y-intercept, set x=0 and determine the corresponding y-value. Similarly, to find the x-intercept, set y=0 and determine the corresponding x-value.

**Example 1:** Find the x- and y-intercepts: -3x+2y=12.

**Solution:** To find the *x*-intercept, set y = 0.



$$-3x + 2y = 12$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \qquad To find the x-intercept,$$

$$set y = 0.$$

$$-3x + 2(0) = 12$$

$$-3x = 12$$

$$x = -4$$

Therefore, the *x*-intercept is (-4, 0). To find the *y*-intercept, set x = 0.

$$-3x + 2y = 12$$

$$\downarrow$$

$$-3(0) + 2y = 12$$

$$2y = 12$$

$$y = 6$$
To find the y-intercept,
set  $x = 0$ .

Hence the y-intercept is (0, 6). Note that this linear equation is graphed above.

Answer: x-intercept: (-4, 0); y-intercept: (0, 6)

**Example 2:** Find the x- and y-intercepts: y=-3x+9.

**Solution:** Begin by finding the *x*-intercept.

$$y = -3x + 9$$
 Set  $y = 0$ .  

$$\downarrow$$

$$0 = -3x + 9$$
 Solve for  $x$ .  

$$3x = 9$$

$$x = 3$$

The x-intercept is (3, 0). Next, determine the y-intercept.

$$y = -3x + 9$$

$$\downarrow$$


$$y = -3(0) + 9$$

$$y = 9$$
Set  $x = 0$ .
Solve for  $y$ .


The y-intercept is (0, 9).

Answer: x-intercept: (3, 0); y-intercept: (0, 9)

Keep in mind that the intercepts are ordered pairs and not numbers. In other words, the x-intercept is not x=2 but rather (2,0). In addition, not all graphs necessarily have both intercepts: for example,



The horizontal line graphed above has a y-intercept of (0, -2) and no x-intercept.



The vertical line graphed above has an x-intercept (3, 0) and no y-intercept.

**Try this!** Find the x- and y-intercepts: 4x-y=2.

Answer: x-intercept: (1/2, 0); y-intercept: (0, -2)

# **Graphing Lines Using Intercepts**

Since two points determine a line, we can use the *x*- and *y*-intercepts to graph linear equations. We have just outlined an easy method for finding intercepts; now we outline the steps for graphing lines using the intercepts.

**Example 3:** Graph using intercepts: 2x-3y=12.


Solution:

**Step 1:** Find the x- and y-intercepts.

To find the x-intercept, set $y = 0$ .	To find the y-intercept, set $x = 0$ .
2x-3y=12	2x - 3y = 12
2x-3(0)=12	2(0)-3y=12
2x = 12	-3y = 12
x = 6	y = -4
x-intercept: $(6,0)$	y-intercept: $(0,-4)$

**Step 2:** Plot the intercepts and draw the line through them. Use a straightedge to create a nice straight line. Add an arrow on either end to indicate that the line continues indefinitely in either direction.

Answer:




**Example 4:** Graph using intercepts: y=-15x+3.

**Solution:** Begin by determining the *x*- and *y*-intercepts.



To summarize, any linear equation can be graphed by finding two points and connecting them with a line drawn with a straightedge. Two important and useful points are the x- and y-intercepts; find these points by substituting y = 0 and x = 0, respectively. This method for finding intercepts will be used throughout our study of algebra.

**Try this!** Graph using intercepts: 3x-5y=15.



# **Finding Intercepts Given the Graph**

The x- and y-intercepts are important points on any graph. This chapter will focus on the graphs of linear equations.

However, at this point, we can use these ideas to determine intercepts of nonlinear graphs. Remember that intercepts are ordered pairs that indicate where the graph intersects the axes.

**Example 6:** Find the x- and y-intercepts given the following graph:




**Solution:** We see that the graph intersects the x-axis in two places. This graph has two x-intercepts, namely, (-4, 0) and (2, 0). Furthermore, the graph intersects the y-axis in one place. The only y-intercept is (0, -3).

Answer: x-intercepts: (-4, 0), (2, 0); y-intercept: (0, -3)

In our study of algebra, we will see that some graphs have many intercepts. Also, we will see that some graphs do not have any.

**Example 7:** Given the following graph, find the x- and y-intercepts:



**Solution:** This is a graph of a circle; we can see that it does not intersect either axis. Therefore, this graph does not have any intercepts.


# 3.4 Graph Using the y-Intercept and Slope

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Identify and find the slope of a line.
- 2. Graph a line using the slope and *y*-intercept.

## Slope

The steepness of any incline can be measured as the ratio of the vertical change to the horizontal change. For example, a 5% incline can be written as 5/100, which means that for every 100 feet forward, the height increases 5 feet.




In mathematics, we call the incline of a line the slope and use the letter m to denote it. The vertical change is called the rise and the horizontal change is called the run.

Slope 
$$m = \frac{\text{vertical change}}{\text{horizontal change}} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

The rise and the run can be positive or negative. A positive rise corresponds to a vertical change up and a negative rise corresponds to a vertical change down. A positive run denotes a horizontal change to the right and a negative run corresponds to a horizontal change to the left. Given the graph, we can calculate the slope by determining the vertical and horizontal changes between any two points.

Example 1: Find the slope of the given line:




**Solution:** From the given points on the graph, count 3 units down and 4 units right.


$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{-3 \text{ units}}{4 \text{ units}} = -\frac{3}{4}$$

Answer: m=-34

Here we have a negative slope, which means that for every 4 units of movement to the right, the vertical change is 3 units downward. There are four geometric cases for the value of the slope.



Reading the graph from left to right, we see that lines with an upward incline have positive slopes and lines with a downward incline have negative slopes.



If the line is horizontal, then the rise is 0:


$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{0}{run} = 0$$

The slope of a horizontal line is 0. If the line is vertical, then the run is 0:

$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{rise}{0}$$
 Undefined


The slope of a vertical line is undefined.

Try this! Find the slope of the given line:



Answer: m=23

Calculating the slope can be difficult if the graph does not have points with integer coordinates. Therefore, we next develop a formula that allows us to calculate the slope algebraically. Given any two points  $(x_1, y_1)$  and  $(x_2, y_2)$ , we can obtain the rise and run by subtracting the corresponding coordinates.



This leads us to the slope formula. Given any two points (x1, y1) and (x2, y2), the slope is given by

$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$

**Example 2:** Find the slope of the line passing through (-3, -5) and (2, 1).

**Solution:** Given (-3, -5) and (2, 1), calculate the difference of the y-values divided by the difference of the x-values. Since subtraction is not commutative, take care to be consistent when subtracting the coordinates.

$$(x_1, y_1)$$
  $(x_2, y_2)$   
 $(-3, -5)$   $(2, 1)$ 

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$


$$= \frac{1 - (-5)}{2 - (-3)}$$

$$= \frac{1 + 5}{2 + 3}$$

$$= \frac{6}{5}$$

Answer: m=65

We can graph the line described in the previous example and verify that the slope is 6/5.



Certainly the graph is optional; the beauty of the slope formula is that we can obtain the slope, given two points, using only algebra.

**Example 3:** Find the slope of the line passing through (-4, 3) and (-1, -7).

Solution:

$$(x_1, y_1)$$
  $(x_2, y_2)$   
 $(-4,3)$   $(-1,-7)$ 

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1} = \frac{-7 - (3)}{-1 - (-4)} = \frac{-7 - 3}{-1 + 4} = \frac{-10}{3}$$

Answer: m=-103

When using the slope formula, take care to be consistent since order does matter. You must subtract the coordinates of the first point from the coordinates of the second point for both the numerator and the denominator in the *same order*.

**Example 4:** Find the slope of the line passing through (7, -2) and (-5, -2).

Solution:

$$(x_1, y_1)$$

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1} = \frac{5 - (-3)}{-4 - (-4)} = \frac{5 + 3}{-4 + 4} = \frac{8}{0}$$
 Undefined

Answer: The slope m is undefined. As an exercise, plot the given two points and verify that they lie on a vertical line.


**Try this!** Calculate the slope of the line passing through (-2, 3) and (5, -5).

Answer: m=-87

When considering the slope as a rate of change it is important to include the correct units.

**Example 6:** A Corvette Coupe was purchased new in 1970 for about \$5,200 and depreciated in value over time until it was sold in 1985 for \$1,300. At this point, the car was beginning to be considered a classic and started to increase in value. In the

year 2000, when the car was 30 years old, it sold at auction for \$10,450. The following line graph depicts the value of the car over time.



- a. Determine the rate at which the car depreciated in value from 1970 to 1985.
- b. Determine the rate at which the car appreciated in value from 1985 to 2000.

Solution: Notice that the value depends on the age of the car and that the slope measures the rate in dollars per year.

a. The slope of the line segment depicting the value for the first 15 years is

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1} = \frac{\$1,300 - \$5,200}{15 \text{ years} - 0 \text{ years}} = \frac{-\$3,900}{15 \text{ years}} = -\$260 \text{ per year}$$

Answer: The value of the car depreciated \$260 per year from 1970 to 1985.

b. The slope of the line segment depicting the value for the next 15 years is

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1} = \frac{\$10,450 - \$1,300}{30 \text{ years} - 15 \text{ years}} = \frac{\$9,150}{15 \text{ years}} = \$610 \text{ per year}$$


Answer: The value of the car appreciated \$610 per year from 1985 to 2000.

## Slope-Intercept Form of a Line

To this point, we have learned how to graph lines by plotting points and by using the x- and y-intercepts. In addition, we have seen that we need only two points to graph a line. In this section, we outline a process to easily determine two points using the y-intercept and the slope. The equation of any nonvertical line can be written in slope-intercept form y=mx+b. In this form, we can identify the slope, m, and the y-intercept, (0,b).

**Example 7:** Determine the slope and y-intercept: y=-45x+7.

**Solution:** In this form, the coefficient of x is the slope, and the constant is the y-value of the y-intercept. Therefore, by inspection, we have



Answer: The y-intercept is (0, 7), and the slope is m=-45.

It is not always the case that the linear equation is given in slope-intercept form. When it is given in standard form, you have to first solve for y to obtain slope-intercept form.

**Example 8:** Express 3x+5y=30 in slope-intercept form and then identify the slope and y-intercept.

**Solution:** Begin by solving for y. To do this, apply the properties of equality to first isolate 5y and then divide both sides by 5.

$$3x + 5y = 30$$

$$3x + 5y - 3x = 30 - 3x$$

$$5y = -3x + 30$$

$$\frac{5y}{5} = \frac{-3x + 30}{5}$$

$$y = \frac{-3x}{5} + \frac{30}{5}$$

$$y = -\frac{3}{5}x + 6$$

Answer: Slope-intercept form: y=-35x+6; y-intercept: (0, 6); slope: m=-35


Once the equation is in slope-intercept form, we immediately have one point to plot, the y-intercept. From the intercept, you can mark off the slope to plot another point on the line. From the previous example we have

$$y = -\frac{3}{5}x + 6$$

y-intercept: (0,6)

slope: 
$$m = -\frac{3}{5} = \frac{-3}{5} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

Starting from the point (0, 6), use the slope to mark another point 3 units down and 5 units to the right.



It is not necessary to check that the second point, (5, 3), solves the original linear equation. However, we do it here for the sake of completeness.

$$3x + 5y = 30$$
  
 $3(5) + 5(3) = 30$   
 $15 + 15 = 30$   
 $30 = 30$ 

Marking off the slope in this fashion produces as many ordered pair solutions as we desire. Notice that if we mark off the slope again, from the point (5, 3), then we obtain the *x*-intercept, (10, 0).

**Example 9:** Graph: -x+2y=4.

Solution: In this example, we outline the general steps for graphing a line using slope-intercept form.

**Step 1:** Solve for y to obtain slope-intercept form.

$$-x+2y=4$$

$$-x+2y+x=4+x$$

$$2y=x+4$$

$$\frac{2y}{2} = \frac{x+4}{2}$$

$$y = \frac{1x}{2} + \frac{4}{2}$$


$$y = \frac{1}{2}x+2$$

**Step 2:** Identify the *y*-intercept and slope.

y-intercept: 
$$(0,2)$$


slope: 
$$m = \frac{1}{2} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

**Step 3:** Plot the *y*-intercept and use the slope to find another ordered pair solution. Starting from the *y*-intercept, mark off the slope and identify a second point. In this case, mark a point after a rise of 1 unit and a run of 2 units.



**Step 4:** Draw the line through the two points with a straightedge.

Answer:




In this example, we notice that we could get the x-intercept by marking off the slope in a different but equivalent manner.

Consider the slope as the ratio of two negative numbers as follows:

$$m = \frac{1}{2} = \frac{-1}{-2} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

We could obtain another point on the line by marking off the equivalent slope down 1 unit and left 2 units. We do this twice to obtain the x-intercept, (-4, 0).




Marking off the slope multiple times is not necessarily always going to give us the *x*-intercept, but when it does, we obtain a valuable point with little effort. In fact, it is a good practice to mark off the slope multiple times; doing so allows you to obtain more points on the line and produce a more accurate graph.

**Example 10:** Graph and find the x-intercept: y=34x-2.

**Solution:** The equation is given in slope-intercept form. Therefore, by inspection, we have the y-intercept and slope.

y-intercept: 
$$(0, -2)$$

slope: 
$$m = \frac{3}{4} = \frac{rise}{run}$$



We can see that the x-value of the x-intercept is a mixed number between 2 and 3. To algebraically find x-intercepts, recall that we must set y = 0 and solve for x.

$$y = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

$$0 = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

$$0 = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

$$-\frac{3}{4}x = -2$$

$$-\frac{4}{3} \cdot \left(-\frac{3}{4}x\right) = -\frac{4}{3} \cdot (-2)$$

$$x = \frac{8}{3} \text{ or } 2\frac{2}{3}$$
To find x-intercepts, set y equal to 0.

$$0 = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$
Solve for x.

Answer: The x-intercept is (223, 0).

**Example 11:** Graph: *x*-*y*=0.

**Solution:** Begin by solving for y.

$$x-y=0$$

$$x-y-x=0-x$$

$$-y=-x$$

$$-1 \cdot (-y) = -1 \cdot (-x)$$


$$y = x$$

The equation y=x can be written y=1x+0, and we have

y-intercept: 
$$(0,0)$$


slope: 
$$m=1=\frac{1}{1}=\frac{rise}{run}$$




- Slope measures the steepness of a line as *rise over run*. A positive rise denotes a vertical change up, and a negative rise denotes a vertical change down. A positive run denotes a horizontal change right, and a negative run denotes a horizontal change left.































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















# 3.5 Finding Linear Equations

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Given a graph, identify the slope and *y*-intercept.
- 2. Find the equation of the line using the slope and *y*-intercept.
- 3. Find the equation of the line using point-slope form.

## **Finding Equations Using Slope-Intercept Form**

Given the algebraic equation of a line, we are able to graph it in a number of ways. In this section, we will be given a geometric description of a line and be asked to find the algebraic equation. Finding the equation of a line can be accomplished in a number of ways, the first of which makes use of slope-intercept form, y=mx+b. If we know the slope, m, and the y-intercept, (0, b), we can construct the equation.

**Example 1:** Find the equation of a line with slope m=-58 and y-intercept (0, 1).

**Solution:** The given y-intercept implies that b=1. Substitute the slope m and the y-value of the y-intercept b into the equation y=mx+b.

$$y = mx + b$$


$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$y = -\frac{5}{8}x + 1$$

Answer: y=-58x+1

Finding a linear equation is very straightforward if the slope and y-intercept are given. This is certainly not always the case; however, the example demonstrates that the algebraic equation of a line depends on these two pieces of information. If the graph is given, then we can often read it to determine the y-intercept and slope.

Example 2: Find the equation of the line given the graph:



**Solution:** By reading the graph, we can see that the y-intercept is (0, 4), and thus

$$b = 4$$

Furthermore, from the points (0, 4) to (4, 2), we can see that the rise is -2 units and the run is 4 units.

$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{-2}{4} = -\frac{1}{2}$$

Now substitute m and b into slope-intercept form:

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{2}x + 4$$

Answer: y=-12x+4

Often the y-intercept and slope will not be given or are not easily discernible from the graph. For this reason, we will develop some algebraic techniques that allow us to calculate these quantities.

**Example 3:** Find the equation of the line with slope m=-23 passing through (-6, 3).

Solution: Begin by substituting the given slope into slope-intercept form.

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{2}{3}x + b$$

For the ordered pair (-6, 3) to be a solution, it must solve the equation. Therefore, we can use it to find b. Substitute the appropriate x- and y-values as follows:

$$y = -\frac{2}{3}x + b$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \qquad \downarrow$$

$$(3) = -\frac{2}{3}(-6) + b$$

After substituting the appropriate values, solve for the only remaining variable, b.

$$3 = -\frac{2}{3}(-6) + b$$
$$3 = -2(-2) + b$$
$$3 = 4 + b$$
$$-1 = b$$

Once we have b, we can then complete the equation:

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{2}{3}x - 1$$

As a check, verify that (-6, 3) solves this linear equation as follows:

$$y = -\frac{2}{3}x - 1$$

$$3 = -\frac{2}{3}(-6) - 1$$


$$3 = -2 \cdot (-2) - 1$$

$$3 = 4 - 1$$

$$3 = 3$$

Answer: y=-23x-1

**Example 4:** Find the equation of the line given the graph:



**Solution:** Use the graph to determine the slope. From the points (-5, 2) to (-1, 0), we can see that the rise between the points is -2 units and the run is 4 units. Therefore, we calculate the slope as follows:

$$m = \frac{rise}{run} = \frac{-2}{4} = -\frac{1}{2}$$

Substitute the slope into slope-intercept form.

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{2}x + b$$

Now substitute the coordinates of one of the given points to find b. It does not matter which one you choose. Here choose (-1,0):

$$y = -\frac{1}{2}x + b$$

$$0 = -\frac{1}{2}(-1) + b$$

$$0 = \frac{1}{2} + b$$

$$-\frac{1}{2} = b$$

Next, put it all together.

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{2}x - \frac{1}{2}$$

Answer: y=-12x-12

As an exercise, substitute the coordinates of the point (-5, 2) to see that b will turn out to be the same value. In fact, you can substitute any ordered pair solution of the line to find b. We next outline an algebraic technique for finding the equation of a nonvertical line passing through two given points.

**Example 5:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-4, -2) and (1, 3).

**Solution:** When finding a linear equation using slope-intercept form y=mx+b, the goal is to find m and then b.

**Step 1:** Find the slope m. In this case, given two points, use the slope formula.

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$

$$= \frac{3 - (-2)}{1 - (-4)}$$

$$= \frac{3 + 2}{1 + 4}$$

$$= \frac{5}{5}$$

$$= 1$$

Substitute *m*=1 into slope-intercept form.

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = 1x + b$$

**Step 2:** Find b. To do this, substitute the coordinates of any given ordered pair solution. Use (1, 3):


$$y = 1x + b$$
$$3 = 1(1) + b$$
$$3 = 1 + b$$
$$2 = b$$

Step 3: Finish building the equation by substituting in the value for b. In this case, we use b=2.

$$y = 1x + b$$
$$y = 1x + 2$$

Answer: y=x+2

These three steps outline the process for finding the equation of any nonvertical line in slope-intercept form. This is a completely algebraic method, but always keep in mind the geometry behind the technique.



Note that the line has a y-intercept at (0, 2), with slope m=1.

**Example 6:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-1, 3) and (5, 1).

**Solution:** First, find m, the slope. Given two points, use the slope formula as follows:

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$

$$= \frac{1 - (3)}{5 - (-1)}$$

$$= \frac{1 - 3}{5 + 1}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{6}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{3}$$

Substitute m=-13 into slope-intercept form.

$$y = mx + b$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{3}x + b$$

Next, find b. Substitute the coordinates of the point (-1, 3).

$$y = -\frac{1}{3}x + b$$

$$3 = -\frac{1}{3}(-1) + b$$

$$3 = \frac{1}{3} + b$$

$$3 - \frac{1}{3} = b$$

$$\frac{3 \cdot 3}{1 \cdot 3} - \frac{1}{3} = b$$

$$\frac{8}{3} = b$$

Finally, substitute b=83 into the equation.

$$y = -\frac{1}{3}x + b$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{3}x + \frac{8}{3}$$

Answer: y=-13x+83

**Try this!** Find the equation of the line passing through (-3, 4) and (6, -2).

Answer: y=-23x+2

## Finding Equations Using a Point and the Slope

Given any point on a line and its slope, we can find the equation of that line. Begin by applying the slope formula with a given point  $(x_1, y_1)$  and a variable point (x, y).

$$m = \frac{y - y_1}{x - x_1}$$

$$\frac{m}{1} = \frac{y - y_1}{x - x_1}$$

$$m(x - x_1) = y - y_1$$

$$y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$$
Cross multiply.

Apply the symmetric property.

The equation  $y-y_1 = m(x-x_1)$  is called the point-slope form of a line. Any nonvertical linear equation can be written in this form. It is useful for finding the equation of a line given the slope and any ordered pair solution.

**Example 7:** Find the equation of the line with slope m=12 passing through (4, -1).

**Solution:** Use point-slope form, where m=12 and  $(x_1, y_1)=(4,-1)$ .

$$y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$$
  
 $y - (-1) = \frac{1}{2}(x - 4)$  Distribute  $\frac{1}{2}$ .  
 $y + 1 = \frac{1}{2}x - 2$ 

At this point, we must choose to present the equation of our line in either standard form or slope-intercept form

Standard form	Slope-intercept form
$y+1=\frac{1}{2}x-2$	$y+1=\frac{1}{2}x-2$
$y+1-1=\frac{1}{2}x-2-1$	$y+1-1=\frac{1}{2}x-2-1$
$y - \frac{1}{2}x = \frac{1}{2}x - 3 - \frac{1}{2}x$	$y = \frac{1}{2}x - 3$
$-\frac{1}{2}x+y=-3$	

In this textbook, we will present our lines in slope-intercept form. This facilitates future graphing.

Answer: y=12x-3

**Example 8:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-5, 3) with slope m=-25.

**Solution:** Substitute (-5, 3) and m=-25 into point-slope form.

$$y - y_{1} = m (x - x_{1})$$

$$y - (3) = -\frac{2}{5}(x - (-5)) \qquad Solve for y.$$

$$y - 3 = -\frac{2}{5}(x + 5) \qquad Distribute -\frac{2}{5}.$$


$$y - 3 = -\frac{2}{5}x - 2$$

$$y - 3 + 3 = -\frac{2}{5}x - 2 + 3$$

$$y = -\frac{2}{5}x + 1$$

Answer: y=-25x+1


It is always important to understand what is occurring geometrically. Compare the answer for the last example to the corresponding graph below.



The geometric understanding is important because you will often be given graphs from which you will need to determine a point on the line and the slope.

Example 9: Find an equation of the given graph:

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**Solution:** Between the points (1, 1) to (3, 0), we can see that the rise is -1 unit and the run is 2 units. The slope of the line is m=riserum=-12=-12. Use this and the point (3, 0) to find the equation as follows:

$$y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$$
$$y - 0 = -\frac{1}{2}(x - 3)$$
$$y = -\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{3}{2}$$

Answer: y=-12x+32

**Example 10:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-1, 1) and (7, -1).

**Solution:** Begin by calculating the slope using the slope formula.

$$m = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$

$$= \frac{-1 - 1}{7 - (-1)}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{7 + 1}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{8}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{4}$$

Next, substitute into point-slope form using one of the given points; it does not matter which point is used. Use m=-14 and the point (-1, 1).

$$y - y_1 = m (x - x_1)$$

$$y - 1 = -\frac{1}{4} (x - (-1))$$

$$y - 1 = -\frac{1}{4} (x + 1)$$

$$y - 1 = -\frac{1}{4} x - \frac{1}{4}$$

$$y = -\frac{1}{4} x - \frac{1}{4} + 1$$

$$y = -\frac{1}{4} x + \frac{3}{4}$$

Answer: y=-14x+34

Try this! Find the equation of the line passing through (4, -5) and (-4, 1).

Answer: y=-34x-2

# **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

• Given the graph of a line, you can determine the equation in two ways, using slope-intercept form, y=mx+b, or point-slope

form,  $y-y_1 = m(x-x_1)$ .

- The slope and one point on the line is all that is needed to write the equation of a line.

# 3.6 Parallel and Perpendicular Lines

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**



## **Definition of Parallel and Perpendicular**

Parallel lines are lines in the same plane that never intersect. Two nonvertical lines in the same plane, with slopes  $m_1$  and  $m_2$ , are parallel if their slopes are the same,  $m_1=m_2$ . Consider the following two lines:

$$\begin{cases} y = \frac{3}{4}x + 1 \\ y = \frac{3}{4}x - 3 \end{cases}$$

Consider their corresponding graphs:



Both lines have a slope m=34 and thus are parallel.

Perpendicular lines are lines in the same plane that intersect at right angles (90 degrees). Two nonvertical lines in the same plane, with slopes  $m_1$  and  $m_2$ , are perpendicular if the product of their slopes is -1:  $m_1 \cdot m_2 = -1$ . We can solve for  $m_1$  and obtain  $m_1 = -1m_2$ . In this form, we see that perpendicular lines have slopes that are **negative reciprocals**, or opposite reciprocals. For example, if given a slope

$$m = -\frac{5}{8}$$


then the slope of a perpendicular line is the opposite reciprocal:

$$m_{\perp} = \frac{8}{5}$$

The mathematical notation  $m_{\perp}$  reads "m perpendicular." We can verify that two slopes produce perpendicular lines if their product is -1.

$$m \cdot m_{\perp} = -\frac{5}{8} \cdot \frac{8}{5} = -\frac{40}{40} = -1$$

Geometrically, we note that if a line has a positive slope, then any perpendicular line will have a negative slope. Furthermore, the rise and run between two perpendicular lines are interchanged.



Perpendicular lines have slopes that are opposite reciprocals, so remember to find the reciprocal and change the sign. In other words,

If 
$$m = \frac{a}{b}$$
, then  $m_{\perp} = -\frac{b}{a}$ 

Determining the slope of a perpendicular line can be performed mentally. Some examples follow.

Determining	the slope of a perpendicular
Given slope	Slope of perpendicular line
m=12	<i>m</i> ±=−2
m=-34	<i>m</i> ±=43
m=3	<i>m</i> ⊥=−13
m=-4	<i>m</i> ⊥=14

**Example 1:** Determine the slope of a line parallel to y=-5x+3.

**Solution:** Since the given line is in slope-intercept form, we can see that its slope is m=-5. Thus the slope of any line parallel to the given line must be the same, m=-5. The mathematical notation m reads "m parallel."

Answer: m = -5

**Example 2:** Determine the slope of a line perpendicular to 3x-7y=21.

**Solution:** First, solve for y and express the line in slope-intercept form.

$$3x-7y = 21$$

$$3x-7y-3x = 21-3x$$

$$-7y = -3x+21$$

$$\frac{-7y}{-7} = \frac{-3x+21}{-7}$$

$$y = \frac{-3x}{-7} + \frac{21}{-7}$$

$$y = \frac{3}{7}x-3$$

In this form, we can see that the slope of the given line is m=37, and thus  $m_{\perp}=-73$ .

Answer:  $m_{\perp}=-73$ 

**Try this!** Find the slope of the line perpendicular to 15x+5y=20.

Answer:  $m_{\perp}=13$ 

### **Finding Equations of Parallel and Perpendicular Lines**

We have seen that the graph of a line is completely determined by two points or one point and its slope. Often you will be asked to find the equation of a line given some geometric relationship—for instance, whether the line is parallel or perpendicular to another line.


**Example 3:** Find the equation of the line passing through (6, -1) and parallel to y=12x+2.

**Solution:** Here the given line has slope m=12, and the slope of a line parallel is m=12. Since you are given a point and the slope, use the point-slope form of a line to determine the equation.

Point 
$$(6,-1)$$
  $m_{\parallel} = \frac{1}{2}$   $y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$  Point-slope form  $y - (-1) = \frac{1}{2}(x - 6)$   $y + 1 = \frac{1}{2}x - 3$   $y + 1 - 1 = \frac{1}{2}x - 3 - 1$   $y = \frac{1}{2}x - 4$ 

Answer: y=12x-4

It is important to have a geometric understanding of this question. We were asked to find the equation of a line parallel to another line passing through a certain point.



Through the point (6, -1) we found a parallel line, y=12x-4, shown dashed. Notice that the slope is the same as the given line, but the y-intercept is different. If we keep in mind the geometric interpretation, then it will be easier to remember the process needed to solve the problem.


**Example 4:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-1, -5) and perpendicular to y=-14x+2.

**Solution:** The given line has slope m=-14, and thus  $m\perp=+41=4$ . Substitute this slope and the given point into point-slope form.

Point Slope  

$$(-1,-5)$$
  $m_{\perp} = 4$   
 $y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$   
 $y - (-5) = 4(x - (-1))$   
 $y + 5 = 4x + 1$   
 $y + 5 = 4x + 4$   
 $y = 4x - 1$ 

Geometrically, we see that the line y=4x-1, shown dashed below, passes through (-1, -5) and is perpendicular to the given line.



It is not always the case that the given line is in slope-intercept form. Often you have to perform additional steps to determine the slope. The general steps for finding the equation of a line are outlined in the following example.

**Example 5:** Find the equation of the line passing through (8, -2) and perpendicular to 6x+3y=1.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Find the slope m. First, find the slope of the given line. To do this, solve for y to change standard form to slope-intercept form, y=mx+b.

$$6x+3y=1$$

$$6x+3y-6x=1-6x$$

$$3y=-6x+1$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{-6x+1}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{-6x}{3} + \frac{1}{3}$$

$$y = -2x + \frac{1}{3}$$

In this form, you can see that the slope is m=-2=-21, and thus  $m_{\perp}=-1-2=+12$ .

Step 2: Substitute the slope you found and the given point into the point-slope form of an equation for a line. In this case, the slope is  $m_{\perp}=12$  and the given point is (8, -2).

$$y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$$
$$y - (-2) = \frac{1}{2}(x - 8)$$

**Step 3:** Solve for y.

$$y + 2 = \frac{1}{2}x - 4$$
$$y + 2 - 2 = \frac{1}{2}x - 4 - 2$$
$$y = \frac{1}{2}x - 6$$

Answer: y=12x-6

**Example 6:** Find the equation of the line passing through (72, 1) and parallel to 2x+14y=7.

**Solution:** Find the slope m by solving for y.

$$2x+14y = 7$$

$$2x+14y-2x = 7-2x$$

$$14y = -2x+7$$

$$\frac{14y}{14} = \frac{-2x+7}{14}$$

$$y = \frac{-2x}{14} + \frac{7}{14}$$

$$y = -\frac{1}{7}x + \frac{1}{2}$$

The given line has the slope m=-17, and so m=-17. We use this and the point (72, 1) in point-slope form.

$$y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$$

$$y - 1 = -\frac{1}{7} \left( x - \frac{7}{2} \right)$$

$$y - 1 = -\frac{1}{7} x + \frac{1}{2}$$

$$y - 1 + 1 = -\frac{1}{7} x + \frac{1}{2} + 1$$

$$y = -\frac{1}{7} x + \frac{1}{2} + \frac{2}{2}$$

$$y = -\frac{1}{7} x + \frac{3}{2}$$

Answer: y=-17x+32


Try this! Find the equation of the line perpendicular to x-3y=9 and passing through (-12, 2).

Answer: y=-3x+12

When finding an equation of a line perpendicular to a horizontal or vertical line, it is best to consider the geometric interpretation.

**Example 7:** Find the equation of the line passing through (-3, -2) and perpendicular to y=4.

**Solution:** We recognize that y=4 is a horizontal line and we want to find a perpendicular line passing through (-3, -2).



If we draw the line perpendicular to the given horizontal line, the result is a vertical line.

x = -3 y = 4 y =

Equations of vertical lines look like x=k. Since it must pass through (-3, -2), we conclude that x=-3 is the equation. All ordered pair solutions of a vertical line must share the same x-coordinate.

Answer: x=-3

We can rewrite the equation of any horizontal line, y=k, in slope-intercept form as follows:

$$y = 0x + k$$

Written in this form, we see that the slope is m=0=01. If we try to find the slope of a perpendicular line by finding the opposite reciprocal, we run into a problem:  $m_{\perp}=-10$ , which is undefined. This is why we took care to restrict the definition to two nonvertical lines. Remember that horizontal lines are perpendicular to vertical lines.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Parallel lines have the same slope.
- Perpendicular lines have slopes that are opposite reciprocals. In other words, if m=ab, then  $m\perp=-ba$ .
- To find an equation of a line, first use the given information to determine the slope. Then use the slope and a point on the line to find the equation using point-slope form.

# 3.7 Introduction to Functions

## Relations, Functions, Domain, and Range

Relationships between sets occur often in everyday life. For example, for each month in Cape Canaveral, we can associate an average amount of rainfall. In this case, the amount of precipitation depends on the month of the year, and the data can be written in tabular form or as a set of ordered pairs.


We define a relation as any set of ordered pairs. Usually we write the independent component of the relation in the first column and the dependent component in the second column. In the opening example, notice that it makes sense to relate the average amount of precipitation as dependent on the month of year. The set of all elements in the first column of a relation is called the domain. The set of all elements that compose the second column is called the range. In this example, the domain consists of the set of all months of the year, and the range consists of the values that represent the average rainfall for each month.


In the context of algebra, the relations of interest are sets of ordered pairs (x, y) in the rectangular coordinate plane. In this case, the x-values define the domain and the y-values define the range. Of special interest are relations where every x-value corresponds to exactly one y-value; these relations are called functions.

**Example 1:** Determine the domain and range of the following relation and state whether or not it is a function:  $\{(-1, 4), (0, 7), (2, 3), (3, 3), (4, -2)\}$ .

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Solution: Here we separate the domain and range and depict the correspondence between the values with arrows.







Answer: The domain is  $\{-1, 0, 2, 3, 4\}$ , and the range is  $\{-2, 3, 4, 7\}$ . The relation is a function because each x-value corresponds to exactly one y-value.

**Example 2:** Determine the domain and range of the following relation and state whether or not it is a function:  $\{(-4, -3),$ (-2,6), (0,3), (3,5), (3,7).

#### Solution:






Answer: The domain is {-4, -2, 0, 3}, and the range is {-3, 3, 5, 6, 7}. This relation is not a function because the x-value 3 has two corresponding y-values.


In the previous example, the relation is not a function because it contains ordered pairs with the same x-value, (3, 5) and (3, 7). We can recognize functions as relations where no x-values are repeated.

In algebra, equations such as y=34x-2 define relations. This linear equation can be graphed as follows:




The graph is a relation since it represents the infinite set of ordered pair solutions to y=34x-2. The domain is the set of all x-values, and in this case consists of all real numbers. The range is the set of all possible y-values, and in this case also consists of all real numbers. Furthermore, the graph is a function because for each x-value there is only one corresponding y-value. In fact, any nonvertical or nonhorizontal line is a function with domain and range consisting of all real numbers.

Any graph is a set of ordered pairs and thus defines a relation. Consider the following graph of a circle:




Here the graph represents a relation where many x-values in the domain correspond to two y-values. If we draw a vertical line, as illustrated, we can see that (3, 2) and (3, -2) are two ordered pairs with the same x-value. Therefore, the x-value 3 corresponds to two y-values; hence the graph does not represent a function. The illustration suggests that if any vertical line intersects a graph more than once, then the graph does not represent a function. This is called the vertical line test.

Example 3: Given the following graph, determine the domain and range and state whether or not it is a function.




**Solution:** The given shape is called a parabola and extends indefinitely to the left and right as indicated by the arrows. This suggests that if we choose any x-value, then we will be able to find a corresponding point on the graph; therefore, the domain consists of all real numbers. Furthermore, the graph shows that -1 is the minimum y-value, and any y-value greater than that is represented in the relation. Hence the range consists of all y-values greater than or equal to -1, or in interval notation,  $[-1,\infty)$ .



Lastly, any vertical line will intersect the graph only once; therefore, it is a function.

Answer: The domain is all real numbers  $\mathbf{R} = (-\infty, \infty)$ , and the range is  $[-1, \infty)$ . The graph represents a function because it passes the vertical line test.

**Try this!** Given the graph, determine the domain and range and state whether or not it is a function:



Answer: Domain:  $[-4, \infty)$ ; range:  $(-\infty, \infty)$ ; function: no

### **Function Notation and Linear Functions**

With the definition of a function comes special notation. If we consider each *x*-value to be the input that produces exactly one output, then we can use the notation

$$f(x) = y$$

The notation f(x) reads "f of x" and should not be confused with multiplication. Most of our study of algebra involves functions, so the notation becomes very useful when performing common tasks. Functions can be named with different letters; some common names for functions are g(x), h(x), C(x), and R(x). First, consider nonvertical lines that we know can be expressed using slope-intercept form, y=mx+b. For any real numbers m and b, the equation defines a function, and we can replace y with the new notation f(x) as follows:

$$y = mx + b$$
$$f(x) = mx + b$$



Therefore, a linear function is any function that can be written in the form f(x)=mx+b. In particular, we can write the following:

$$y = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

$$f(x) = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

The notation also shows values to evaluate in the equation. If the value for x is given as 8, then we know that we can find the corresponding y-value by substituting 8 in for x and simplifying. Using function notation, this is denoted f(8) and can be interpreted as follows:

$$f(x) = \frac{3}{4}x - 2$$

$$f(8) = \frac{3}{4}(8) - 2$$

Finally, simplify:

$$f(8) = \frac{3}{4}(8) - 2$$
  
= 3 \cdot 2 - 2  
= 6 - 2  
= 4

We have f(8)=4. This notation tells us that when x=8 (the input), the function results in 4 (the output).

**Example 4:** Given the linear function f(x) = -5x + 7, find f(-2).

**Solution:** In this case, f(-2) indicates that we should evaluate when x=-2.

$$f(x) = -5x + 7$$
  
 $f(-2) = -5(-2) + 7$  Replace x with -2.  
 $= 10 + 7$   
 $= 17$ 

Answer: f(-2)=17

**Example 5:** Given the linear function f(x)=-5x+7, find x when f(x)=10.

**Solution:** In this case, f(x)=10 indicates that the function should be set equal to 10.

$$f(x) = -5x + 7$$

$$10 = -5x + 7$$

$$10 - 7 = -5x + 7 - 7$$

$$3 = -5x$$


$$\frac{3}{-5} = \frac{-5x}{-5}$$

$$-\frac{3}{5} = x$$
Replace  $f(x)$  with 10.
Solve for  $x$ .

Answer: Here x=-35, and we can write f(-35)=10.



**Example 7:** Graph the linear function f(x) = -53x + 6 and state the domain and range.

**Solution:** From the function, we see that b = 6 and thus the y-intercept is (0, 6). Also, we can see that the slope is m = -53 = -53 = riserum. Starting from the y-intercept, mark a second point down 5 units and right 3 units.



Given any coordinate on the x-axis, we can find a corresponding point on the graph; the domain consists of all real numbers.

Also, for any coordinate on they-axis, we can find a point on the graph; the range consists of all real numbers.

Answer: Both the domain and range consist of all real numbers R.




## KEY TAKEAWAYS


- A relation is any set of ordered pairs. However, in the context of this course, we will be working with sets of ordered pairs (x, y) in the rectangular coordinate system. The set of x-values defines the domain and the set of y-values defines the range.
- Special relations where every x-value (input) corresponds to exactly one y-value (output) are called functions.

# 3.8 Linear Inequalities (Two Variables)

## LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Identify and check solutions to linear inequalities with two variables.
- 2. Graph solution sets of linear inequalities with two variables.

## **Solutions to Linear Inequalities**

We know that a linear equation with two variables has infinitely many ordered pair solutions that form a line when graphed.

A linear inequality with two variables, on the other hand, has a solution set consisting of a region that defines half of the plane.



Linear Equation	Linear Inequality
$y = \frac{3}{2}x + 3$	$y \le \frac{3}{2}x + 3$
-4 -3 -2 -1 1 2 x	y

For the inequality, the line defines one boundary of the region that is shaded. This indicates that any ordered pair that is in the shaded region, including the boundary line, will satisfy the inequality. To see that this is the case, choose a few test points and substitute them into the inequality.

Test point	$y \le \frac{3}{2}x + 3$
(0, 0)	$0 \le \frac{3}{2}(0) + 3$ $0 \le 3  \checkmark$
(2, 1)	$1 \le \frac{3}{2}(2) + 3$ $1 \le 3 + 3$ $1 \le 6  \checkmark$
(-2, -1)	$-1 \le \frac{3}{2} (-2) + 3$ $-1 \le -3 + 3$ $-1 \le 0  \checkmark$

Also, we can see that ordered pairs outside the shaded region do not solve the linear inequality.

Test point	$y \le \frac{3}{2}x + 3$
(-2, 3)	$3 \le \frac{3}{2}(-2) + 3$ $3 \le -3 + 3$ $3 \le 0  \times$

The graph of the solution set to a linear inequality is always a region. However, the boundary may not always be included in that set. In the previous example, the line was part of the solution set because of the "or equal to" part of the inclusive inequality  $\leq$ . If we have a strict inequality  $\leq$ , we would then use a dashed line to indicate that those points are not included in the solution set.

Non-Inclusive Boundary	Inclusive Boundary
$y < \frac{3}{2}x + 3$	$y \le \frac{3}{2}x + 3$
y	y  5  4  3  2  1  4  3  x

Consider the point (0, 3) on the boundary; this ordered pair satisfies the linear equation. It is the "or equal to" part of the inclusive inequality that makes it part of the solution set.

$$y < \frac{3}{2}x + 3$$

$$y \le \frac{3}{2}x + 3$$

$$3 < \frac{3}{2}(0) + 3$$

$$3 < 0 + 3$$


$$3 < 3 \times 3$$

$$3 \le 3 \times 4$$

$$3 \le 3 \times 4$$


## **Graphing Solutions to Linear Inequalities**

Solutions to linear inequalities are a shaded half-plane, bounded by a solid line or a dashed line. This boundary is either included in the solution or not, depending on the given inequality. If we are given a strict inequality, we use a dashed line to indicate that the boundary is not included. If we are given an inclusive inequality, we use a solid line to indicate that it is included. The steps for graphing the solution set for an inequality with two variables are outlined in the following example.

**Example 1:** Graph the solution set: y > -3x+1.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Graph the boundary line. In this case, graph a dashed line y=-3x+1 because of the strict inequality. By inspection, we see that the slope is m=-3=-31=r and the y-intercept is (0, 1).




**Step 2:** Test a point *not* on the boundary. A common test point is the origin (0, 0). The test point helps us determine which half of the plane to shade.

Test point	y > -3x + 1
(0, 0)	0 > -3(0) + 1
	0 > 1 *

Step 3: Shade the region containing the solutions. Since the test point (0,0) was not a solution, it does not lie in the region containing all the ordered pair solutions. Therefore, shade the half of the plane that does not contain this test point. In this case, shade above the boundary line.

Answer:



Consider the problem of shading above or below the boundary line when the inequality is in slope-intercept form. If y>mx+b, then shade above the line. If y< mx+b, then shade below the line. Use this with caution; sometimes the boundary is given in standard form, in which case these rules do not apply.

**Example 2:** Graph the solution set:  $2x-5y \ge -10$ .

**Solution:** Here the boundary is defined by the line 2*x*–5*y*=–10. Since the inequality is inclusive, we graph the boundary using a solid line. In this case, graph the boundary line using intercepts.

# To find the *x*-intercept, set y = 0.

To find the *y*-intercept, set x = 0.

$$2x - 5y = -10$$

$$2x - 5(0) = -10$$

$$2x = -10$$

$$x = -5$$

$$x$$
-intercept:  $(-5, 0)$ 


$$2x - 5y = -10$$

$$2(0) - 5y = -10$$

$$-5y = -10$$

$$y = 2$$

y-intercept: (0, 2)




Next, test a point; this helps decide which region to shade.

Test point	$2x - 5y \ge -10$
(0, 0)	$2(0) - 5(0) \ge -10$
	0 ≥ -10 ✓

Since the test point is in the solution set, shade the half of the plane that contains it.

Answer:



In this example, notice that the solution set consists of all the ordered pairs below the boundary line. This may be counterintuitive because of the original  $\geq$  in the inequality. This illustrates that it is a best practice to actually test a point. Solve for y and you see that the shading is correct.

$$2x-5y \ge -10$$

$$2x-5y-2x \ge -10-2x$$


$$-5y \ge -2x-10$$

$$\frac{-5y}{-5} \le \frac{-2x-10}{-5}$$
Reverse the inequality.
$$y \le \frac{2}{5}x+2$$

In slope-intercept form, you can see that the region below the boundary line should be shaded. An alternate approach is to first express the boundary in slope-intercept form, graph it, and then shade the appropriate region.

**Example 3:** Graph the solution set: y<2.

**Solution:** First, graph the boundary line y=2 with a dashed line because of the strict inequality.




Next, test a point.

Test point	<i>y</i> < 2
(0, 0)	0 < 2



# **Chapter 4 Solving Linear Systems**

# 4.1 Solving Linear Systems by Graphing

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Check solutions to systems of linear equations.
- 2. Solve linear systems using the graphing method.
- 3. Identify dependent and inconsistent systems.

#### **Definition of a Linear System**

Real-world applications are often modeled using more than one variable and more than one equation.

A system of equations consists of a set of two or more equations with the same variables. In this section, we will study linear systems consisting of two linear equations each with two variables. For example,

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases}$$

A solution to a linear system, or simultaneous solution, to a linear system is an ordered pair (x, y) that solves both of the equations. In this case, (3, 2) is the only solution. To check that an ordered pair is a solution, substitute the corresponding x-and y-values into each equation and then simplify to see if you obtain a true statement for both equations.

Check: 
$$(3, 2)$$

Equation 1:  $2x-3y=0$ 

$$2(3)-3(2)=0$$

$$6-6=0$$

$$0=0$$

Equation 2:  $-4x+2y=-8$ 

$$-4(3)+2(2)=-8$$

$$-12+4=-8$$

$$-8=-8$$

**Example 1:** Determine whether (1, 0) is a solution to the system  $\{x-y=1-2x+3y=5.$ 

Solution: Substitute the appropriate values into both equations.

# Check: (1, 0)

Equation 1: 
$$x-y=1$$

$$(1)-(0)=1$$

$$1-0=1$$

$$1=1 \checkmark$$
Equation 2:  $-2x+3y=5$ 

$$-2(1)+3(0)=5$$

$$-2+0=5$$

$$-2=5 \times$$

Answer: Since (1,0) does not satisfy *both* equations, it is not a solution.

**Try this!** Is (-2, 4) a solution to the system { x-y=-6-2x+3y=16?

Answer: Yes

# **Solve by Graphing**

Geometrically, a linear system consists of two lines, where a solution is a point of intersection. To illustrate this, we will graph the following linear system with a solution of (3, 2):

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases}$$

First, rewrite the equations in slope-intercept form so that we may easily graph them.

$$2x-3y = 0$$

$$-4x + 2y = -8$$

$$2x-3y-2x = 0-2x$$

$$-3y = -2x$$

$$\frac{-3y}{-3} = \frac{-2x}{-3}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x$$

$$-4x + 2y + 4x = -8 + 4x$$

$$2y = 4x - 8$$

$$\frac{2y}{2} = \frac{4x - 8}{2}$$


$$y = 2x - 4$$

Next, replace these forms of the original equations in the system to obtain what is called an equivalent system. Equivalent systems share the same solution set.

# 

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = \frac{2}{3}x \\ y = 2x - 4 \end{cases}$$

If we graph both of the lines on the same set of axes, then we can see that the point of intersection is indeed (3, 2), the solution to the system.



To summarize, linear systems described in this section consist of two linear equations each with two variables. A solution is an ordered pair that corresponds to a point where the two lines in the rectangular coordinate plane intersect. Therefore, we can solve linear systems by graphing both lines on the same set of axes and determining the point where they cross. When graphing the lines, take care to choose a good scale and use a straightedge to draw the line through the points; accuracy is very important here. The steps for solving linear systems using the graphing method are outlined in the following example.

**Example 2:** Solve by graphing:  $\{x-y=-42x+y=1.$ 

Solution:

Step 1: Rewrite the linear equations in slope-intercept form.

$$x-y=-4$$

$$x-y-x=-4-x$$

$$-y=-x-4$$

$$\frac{-y}{-1} = \frac{-x-4}{-1}$$

$$y=x+4$$

$$2x+y=1$$

$$2x+y-2x=1-2x$$

$$y=-2x+1$$

Step 2: Write the equivalent system and graph the lines on the same set of axes.

$$\begin{cases} x - y = -4 \\ 2x + y = 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = x + 4 \\ y = -2x + 1 \end{cases}$$


$$\begin{array}{c} \text{Line 1: } y = x + 4 \\ y \text{-intercept: } (0, 4) \end{cases}$$

$$y = -2x + 1$$

$$y \text{-intercept: } (0, 1)$$

$$slope: \ m = 1 = \frac{1}{1} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

$$slope: \ m = -2 = \frac{-2}{1} = \frac{rise}{run}$$



Step 3: Use the graph to estimate the point where the lines intersect and check to see if it solves the original system. In the above graph, the point of intersection appears to be (-1, 3).

Check: 
$$(-1, 3)$$

Line 1:  $x - y = -4$ 
 $(-1) - (3) = -4$ 
 $-1 - 3 = -4$ 
 $-4 = -4$ 

Line 2:  $2x + y = 1$ 
 $2(-1) + (3) = 1$ 
 $-2 + 3 = 1$ 
 $1 = 1$ 


Answer: (-1, 3)

**Example 3:** Solve by graphing:  $\{2x+y=2-2x+3y=-18.$ 

**Solution:** We first solve each equation for y to obtain an equivalent system where the lines are in slope-intercept form.

$$\begin{cases} 2x + y = 2 \\ -2x + 3y = -18 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = -2x + 2 \\ y = \frac{2}{3}x - 6 \end{cases}$$

Graph the lines and determine the point of intersection.



$$2x + y = 2$$

$$2(3) + (-4) = 2$$

$$6 - 4 = 2$$

$$2 = 2$$

$$-2x + 3y = -18$$

$$-2(3) + 3(-4) = -18$$

$$-6 - 12 = -18$$


$$-18 = -18$$

Answer: (3, -4)

**Example 4:** Solve by graphing:  $\{3x+y=6y=-3.$ 

Solution:

$$\begin{cases} 3x + y = 6 \\ y = -3 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = -3x + 6 \\ y = -3 \end{cases}$$



# *Check:* (3, -3)

$$3x + y = 6$$
  $y = -3$   
 $3(3) + (-3) = 6$   $(-3) = -3$   
 $9 - 3 = 6$   $-3 = -3$ 

Answer: (3, -3)

The graphing method for solving linear systems is not ideal when the solution consists of coordinates that are not integers.


There will be more accurate algebraic methods in sections to come, but for now, the goal is to understand the geometry involved when solving systems. It is important to remember that the solutions to a system correspond to the point, or points, where the graphs of the equations intersect.


**Try this!** Solve by graphing:  $\{-x+y=6\ 5x+2y=-2.$ 

Answer: (-2, 4)

#### **Dependent and Inconsistent Systems**

Systems with at least one solution are called consistent systems. Up to this point, all of the examples have been of consistent systems with exactly one ordered pair solution. It turns out that this is not always the case. Sometimes systems consist of two linear equations that are equivalent. If this is the case, the two lines are the same and when graphed will coincide. Hence the solution set consists of all the points on the line. This is a dependent system. Given a consistent linear system with two variables, there are two possible results:





The solutions to independent systems are ordered pairs (x, y). We need some way to express the solution sets to dependent systems, since these systems have infinitely many solutions, or points of intersection. Recall that any line can be written in slope-intercept form, y=mx+b. Here, y depends on x. So we may express all the ordered pair solutions (x, y) in the form (x, mx+b), where x is any real number.

**Example 5:** Solve by graphing:  $\{-2x+3y=-9 \ 4x-6y=18.$ 

Solution: Determine slope-intercept form for each linear equation in the system.

$$-2x+3y = -9$$

$$-2x+3y+2x = -9+2x$$

$$3y = 2x-9$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{2x-9}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x-3$$

$$4x-6y=18$$

$$4x-6y-4x=18-4x$$

$$-6y=-4x+18$$

$$\frac{-6y}{-6} = \frac{-4x+18}{-6}$$


$$y = \frac{-4}{-6}x + \frac{18}{-6}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x-3$$


$$\begin{cases} -2x + 3y = -9 \\ 4x - 6y = 18 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = \frac{2}{3}x - 3 \\ y = \frac{2}{3}x - 3 \end{cases}$$

In slope-intercept form, we can easily see that the system consists of two lines with the same slope and same y-intercept.

They are, in fact, the same line. And the system is dependent.



In this example, it is important to notice that the two lines have the same slope and same y-intercept. This tells us that the two equations are equivalent and that the simultaneous solutions are all the points on the line y=23x-3. This is a dependent system, and the infinitely many solutions are expressed using the form (x, mx+b). Other resources may express this set using set notation,  $\{(x, y) \mid y=23x-3\}$ , which reads "the set of all ordered pairs (x, y) such that y equals two-thirds x minus 3." Sometimes the lines do not cross and there is no point of intersection. Such systems have no solution,  $\emptyset$ , and are called inconsistent systems.



**Example 6:** Solve by graphing:  $\{-2x+5y=-15-4x+10y=10.$ 

Solution: Determine slope-intercept form for each linear equation.


$$-2x+5y=-15 
-2x+5y+2x=-15+2x 
5y=2x-15 
$$\frac{5y}{5} = \frac{2x-15}{5} 
y = \frac{2}{5}x-3$$

$$-4x+10y=10 
-4x+10y=10 
-4x+10y=10 
$$\frac{10y}{10} = \frac{4x+10}{10} 
y = \frac{2}{5}x+1$$

$$\begin{cases}
-2x+5y=-15 \\

In slope-intercept form, we can easily see that the system consists of two lines with the same slope and different y-intercepts.

Therefore, they are parallel and will never intersect.



Answer: There is no simultaneous solution, Ø.

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- In this section, we limit our study to systems of two linear equations with two variables. Solutions to such systems, if they exist, consist of ordered pairs that satisfy both equations. Geometrically, solutions are the points where the graphs intersect.
- The graphing method for solving linear systems requires us to graph both of the lines on the same set of axes as a means to determine where they intersect.
- The graphing method is not the most accurate method for determining solutions, particularly when the solutions have coordinates that are not integers. It is a good practice to always check your solutions.
- Some linear systems have no simultaneous solution. These systems consist of equations that represent parallel lines with different *y*-intercepts and do not intersect in the plane. They are called inconsistent systems and the solution set is the empty set, Ø.

• Some linear systems have infinitely many simultaneous solutions. These systems consist of equations that are equivalent and represent the same line. They are called dependent systems and their solutions are expressed using the notation (x, mx+b), where x is any real number.

## 4.1 Solving Linear Systems by Graphing

## **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Check solutions to systems of linear equations.
- 2. Solve linear systems using the graphing method.
- 3. Identify dependent and inconsistent systems.

## **Definition of a Linear System**

Real-world applications are often modeled using more than one variable and more than one equation.

A system of equations consists of a set of two or more equations with the same variables. In this section, we will study linear systems consisting of two linear equations each with two variables. For example,

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases}$$

A solution to a linear system, or simultaneous solution, to a linear system is an ordered pair (x, y) that solves both of the equations. In this case, (3, 2) is the only solution. To check that an ordered pair is a solution, substitute the corresponding x-and y-values into each equation and then simplify to see if you obtain a true statement for both equations.

# Check: (3, 2)

Equation 1: 
$$2x-3y=0$$
 Equation 2:  $-4x+2y=-8$   
 $2(3)-3(2)=0$   $-4(3)+2(2)=-8$   
 $6-6=0$   $-12+4=-8$   
 $0=0$   $\checkmark$ 

**Example 1:** Determine whether (1, 0) is a solution to the system  $\{x-y=1-2x+3y=5.$ 

**Solution:** Substitute the appropriate values into both equations.

## Check: (1, 0)

Equation 1: 
$$x-y=1$$

$$(1)-(0)=1$$

$$1-0=1$$

$$1=1 \checkmark$$
Equation 2:  $-2x+3y=5$ 

$$-2(1)+3(0)=5$$

$$-2+0=5$$

$$-2=5 \times$$

Answer: Since (1, 0) does not satisfy both equations, it is not a solution.

**Try this!** Is (-2, 4) a solution to the system { x-y=-6-2x+3y=16?

Answer: Yes

#### **Solve by Graphing**

Geometrically, a linear system consists of two lines, where a solution is a point of intersection. To illustrate this, we will graph the following linear system with a solution of (3, 2):

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases}$$

First, rewrite the equations in slope-intercept form so that we may easily graph them.

$$2x-3y = 0$$

$$-4x+2y = -8$$

$$2x-3y-2x = 0-2x$$

$$-3y = -2x$$

$$\frac{-3y}{-3} = \frac{-2x}{-3}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x$$

$$-4x+2y+4x = -8+4x$$

$$2y = 4x-8$$


$$\frac{2y}{2} = \frac{4x-8}{2}$$

$$y = 2x-4$$

Next, replace these forms of the original equations in the system to obtain what is called an equivalent system. Equivalent systems share the same solution set.

$$\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 0 \\ -4x + 2y = -8 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = \frac{2}{3}x \\ y = 2x - 4 \end{cases}$$

If we graph both of the lines on the same set of axes, then we can see that the point of intersection is indeed (3, 2), the solution to the system.



To summarize, linear systems described in this section consist of two linear equations each with two variables. A solution is an ordered pair that corresponds to a point where the two lines in the rectangular coordinate plane intersect. Therefore, we can solve linear systems by graphing both lines on the same set of axes and determining the point where they cross. When graphing the lines, take care to choose a good scale and use a straightedge to draw the line through the points; accuracy is very important here. The steps for solving linear systems using the graphing method are outlined in the following example.

**Example 2:** Solve by graphing:  $\{x-y=-42x+y=1.$ 

#### Solution:

Step 1: Rewrite the linear equations in slope-intercept form.

$$x-y=-4$$

$$x-y-x=-4-x$$

$$-y=-x-4$$

$$\frac{-y}{-1} = \frac{-x-4}{-1}$$

$$y=x+4$$

$$2x+y=1$$

$$2x+y-2x=1-2x$$

$$y=-2x+1$$

Step 2: Write the equivalent system and graph the lines on the same set of axes.

$$\begin{cases} x - y = -4 \\ 2x + y = 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = x + 4 \\ y = -2x + 1 \end{cases}$$


$$\begin{array}{c} \text{Line 1: } y = x + 4 \\ y \text{-intercept: (0,4)} \end{cases}$$

$$y = -2x + 1$$

$$y \text{-intercept: (0,1)}$$

$$slope: \ m = 1 = \frac{1}{1} = \frac{rise}{run}$$

$$slope: \ m = -2 = \frac{-2}{1} = \frac{rise}{run}$$



Step 3: Use the graph to estimate the point where the lines intersect and check to see if it solves the original system. In the above graph, the point of intersection appears to be (-1, 3).

Check: 
$$(-1, 3)$$

Line 1:  $x - y = -4$ 
 $(-1) - (3) = -4$ 
 $-1 - 3 = -4$ 
 $-4 = -4$ 

Line 2:  $2x + y = 1$ 
 $2(-1) + (3) = 1$ 
 $-2 + 3 = 1$ 
 $1 = 1$ 


Answer: (-1, 3)

**Example 3:** Solve by graphing:  $\{2x+y=2-2x+3y=-18.$ 

**Solution:** We first solve each equation for y to obtain an equivalent system where the lines are in slope-intercept form.

$$\begin{cases} 2x + y = 2 \\ -2x + 3y = -18 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = -2x + 2 \\ y = \frac{2}{3}x - 6 \end{cases}$$

Graph the lines and determine the point of intersection.



$$2x + y = 2$$

$$2(3) + (-4) = 2$$

$$6 - 4 = 2$$

$$2 = 2$$

$$-2x + 3y = -18$$

$$-2(3) + 3(-4) = -18$$

$$-6 - 12 = -18$$


$$-18 = -18$$

Answer: (3, -4)

**Example 4:** Solve by graphing:  $\{3x+y=6y=-3.$ 

Solution:

$$\begin{cases} 3x + y = 6 \\ y = -3 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = -3x + 6 \\ y = -3 \end{cases}$$



# *Check:* (3, -3)

$$3x + y = 6$$
  $y = -3$   
 $3(3) + (-3) = 6$   $(-3) = -3$   
 $9 - 3 = 6$   $-3 = -3$ 

Answer: (3, -3)


There will be more accurate algebraic methods in sections to come, but for now, the goal is to understand the geometry involved when solving systems. It is important to remember that the solutions to a system correspond to the point, or points, where the graphs of the equations intersect.


**Try this!** Solve by graphing:  $\{-x+y=6\ 5x+2y=-2.$ 

Answer: (-2, 4)

#### **Dependent and Inconsistent Systems**

Systems with at least one solution are called consistent systems. Up to this point, all of the examples have been of consistent systems with exactly one ordered pair solution. It turns out that this is not always the case. Sometimes systems consist of two linear equations that are equivalent. If this is the case, the two lines are the same and when graphed will coincide. Hence the solution set consists of all the points on the line. This is a dependent system. Given a consistent linear system with two variables, there are two possible results:





The solutions to independent systems are ordered pairs (x, y). We need some way to express the solution sets to dependent systems, since these systems have infinitely many solutions, or points of intersection. Recall that any line can be written in slope-intercept form, y=mx+b. Here, y depends on x. So we may express all the ordered pair solutions (x, y) in the form (x, mx+b), where x is any real number.

**Example 5:** Solve by graphing:  $\{-2x+3y=-9 \ 4x-6y=18.$ 

Solution: Determine slope-intercept form for each linear equation in the system.

$$-2x+3y = -9$$

$$-2x+3y+2x = -9+2x$$

$$3y = 2x-9$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{2x-9}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x-3$$

$$4x-6y=18$$

$$4x-6y-4x=18-4x$$

$$-6y=-4x+18$$

$$\frac{-6y}{-6} = \frac{-4x+18}{-6}$$


$$y = \frac{-4}{-6}x + \frac{18}{-6}$$

$$y = \frac{2}{3}x - 3$$


$$\begin{cases} -2x+3y=-9\\ 4x-6y=18 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y=\frac{2}{3}x-3\\ y=\frac{2}{3}x-3 \end{cases}$$

In slope-intercept form, we can easily see that the system consists of two lines with the same slope and same y-intercept.

They are, in fact, the same line. And the system is dependent.



In this example, it is important to notice that the two lines have the same slope and same y-intercept. This tells us that the two equations are equivalent and that the simultaneous solutions are all the points on the line y=23x-3. This is a dependent system, and the infinitely many solutions are expressed using the form (x, mx+b). Other resources may express this set using set notation,  $\{(x, y) \mid y=23x-3\}$ , which reads "the set of all ordered pairs (x, y) such that y equals two-thirds x minus 3." Sometimes the lines do not cross and there is no point of intersection. Such systems have no solution,  $\emptyset$ , and are called inconsistent systems.



**Example 6:** Solve by graphing:  $\{-2x+5y=-15-4x+10y=10.$ 

Solution: Determine slope-intercept form for each linear equation.


$$-2x + 5y = -15 
-2x + 5y + 2x = -15 + 2x 
5y = 2x - 15 
$$\frac{5y}{5} = \frac{2x - 15}{5} 
y = \frac{2}{5}x - 3$$

$$-4x + 10y = 10 
-4x + 10y + 4x = 10 + 4x 
10y = 4x + 10 
$$\frac{10y}{10} = \frac{4x + 10}{10} 
y = \frac{2}{5}x + 1$$

$$\begin{cases}
-2x + 5y = -15 \\
-4x + 10y = 10
\end{cases}
\Rightarrow
\begin{cases}
y = \frac{2}{5}x - 3 \\
y = \frac{2}{5}x + 1
\end{cases}$$$$$$

In slope-intercept form, we can easily see that the system consists of two lines with the same slope and different y-intercepts.

Therefore, they are parallel and will never intersect.



Answer: There is no simultaneous solution, Ø.

**Try this!** Solve by graphing:  $\{x+y=-1-2x-2y=2.$ 

Answer: (x, -x-1)

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- In this section, we limit our study to systems of two linear equations with two variables. Solutions to such systems, if they exist, consist of ordered pairs that satisfy both equations. Geometrically, solutions are the points where the graphs intersect.
- The graphing method for solving linear systems requires us to graph both of the lines on the same set of axes as a means to determine where they intersect.
- The graphing method is not the most accurate method for determining solutions, particularly when the solutions have coordinates that are not integers. It is a good practice to always check your solutions.
- Some linear systems have no simultaneous solution. These systems consist of equations that represent parallel lines with different *y*-intercepts and do not intersect in the plane. They are called inconsistent systems and the solution set is the empty set, Ø.

• Some linear systems have infinitely many simultaneous solutions. These systems consist of equations that are equivalent and represent the same line. They are called dependent systems and their solutions are expressed using the notation (x, mx+b), where x is any real number.

## 4.2 Solving Linear Systems by Substitution

## LEARNING OBJECTIVE

1. Solve linear systems using the substitution method.

## The Substitution Method

In this section, we will define a completely algebraic technique for solving systems. The idea is to solve one equation for one of the variables and substitute the result into the other equation. After performing this substitution step, we will be left with a single equation with one variable, which can be solved using algebra. This is called the substitution method, and the steps are outlined in the following example.

**Example 1:** Solve by substitution:  $\{2x+y=73x-2y=-7.$ 

Solution:

Step 1: Solve for either variable in either equation. If you choose the first equation, you can isolate y in one step.

$$2x + y = 7$$
$$2x + y - 2x = 7 - 2x$$
$$y = -2x + 7$$

**Step 2:** Substitute the expression -2x+7 for the y variable in the *other* equation.

$$\begin{cases} 2x + y = 7 \Rightarrow y = -2x + 7 \\ 3x - 2y = -7 \end{cases}$$

$$3x - 2(-2x + 7) = -7$$

This leaves you with an equivalent equation with one variable, which can be solved using the techniques learned up to this point.

**Step 3:** Solve for the remaining variable. To solve for x, first distribute -2:

$$3x-2(-2x+7) = -7$$

$$3x+4x-14 = -7$$

$$7x-14 = -7$$

$$7x-14+14 = -7+14$$

$$7x = 7$$

$$\frac{7x}{7} = \frac{7}{7}$$

$$x = 1$$

**Step 4:** Back substitute to find the value of the other coordinate. Substitute x = 1 into either of the original equations or their equivalents. Typically, we use the equivalent equation that we found when isolating a variable in step 1.

$$y = -2x + 7$$
$$= -2(1) + 7$$
$$= -2 + 7$$
$$= 5$$


The solution to the system is (1, 5). Be sure to present the solution as an ordered pair.

Step 5: Check. Verify that these coordinates solve both equations of the original system:

## Check: (1, 5)

Equation 1: Equation 2: 
$$2x + y = 7$$
$$2(1) + (5) = 7$$
$$2 + 5 = 7$$
$$7 = 7 \checkmark$$
Equation 2: 
$$3x - 2y = -7$$
$$3(1) - 2(5) = -7$$
$$3 - 10 = -7$$
$$-7 = -7 \checkmark$$

The graph of this linear system follows:



The substitution method for solving systems is a completely algebraic method. Thus graphing the lines is not required.

Answer: (1, 5)

**Example 2:** Solve by substitution:  $\{2x-y=12x-y=3.$ 

**Solution:** In this example, we can see that x has a coefficient of 1 in the second equation. This indicates that it can be isolated in one step as follows:

$$x-y=3$$

$$x-y+y=3+y$$

$$x=3+y$$

$$\begin{cases} 2x - y = 12 \\ x - y = 3 \end{cases} \Rightarrow x = 3 + y$$

Substitute 3+y for x in the first equation. Use parentheses and take care to distribute.

$$2x-y=12$$

$$2(3+y)-y=12$$

$$6+2y-y=12$$

$$6+y=12$$

$$6+y-6=12-6$$

$$y=6$$

Use x=3+y to find x.

$$x = 3 + y$$
$$= 3 + 6$$
$$= 9$$

Answer: (9, 6). The check is left to the reader.

**Example 3:** Solve by substitution:  $\{3x-5y=17x=-1.$ 

**Solution:** In this example, the variable x is already isolated. Hence we can substitute x=-1 into the first equation.

$$3x-5y = 17$$

$$3(-1)-5y = 17$$

$$-3-5y+3 = 17+3$$

$$-5y = 20$$

$$\frac{-5y}{-5} = \frac{20}{-5}$$

$$y = -4$$

Answer: (-1, -4). It is a good exercise to graph this particular system to compare the substitution method to the graphing method for solving systems.

**Try this!** Solve by substitution:  $\{3x+y=48x+2y=10.$ 

Answer: (1, 1)

Solving systems algebraically frequently requires work with fractions.

**Example 4:** Solve by substitution:  $\{2x+8y=524x-4y=-15.$ 

**Solution:** Begin by solving for x in the first equation.

$$2x+8y=5$$

$$2x+8y-8y=5-8y$$

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{-8y+5}{2}$$

$$x = \frac{-8y}{2} + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$x = -4y + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$\begin{cases} 2x + 8y = 5 \implies x = -4y + \frac{5}{2} \\ 24x - 4y = -15 \end{cases}$$

Next, substitute into the second equation and solve for y.

$$24x - 4y = -15$$

$$24\left(-4y + \frac{5}{2}\right) - 4y = -15$$

$$-96y + 60 - 4y = -15$$

$$-100y + 60 - 60 = -15 - 60$$

$$\frac{-100y}{-100} = \frac{-75}{-100}$$

$$y = \frac{3}{4}$$

Back substitute into the equation used in the substitution step:

$$x = -4y + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$= -4\left(\frac{3}{4}\right) + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$= -3 + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$= -\frac{6}{2} + \frac{5}{2}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{2}$$

Answer: (-1/2, 3/4)

As we know, not all linear systems have only one ordered pair solution. Recall that some systems have infinitely many ordered pair solutions and some do not have any solutions. Next, we explore what happens when using the substitution method to solve a dependent system.

**Example 5:** Solve by substitution:  $\{-5x+y=-110x-2y=2.$ 

Solution: Since the first equation has a term with coefficient 1, we choose to solve for that first.

$$-5x + y = -1$$
$$-5x + y + 5x = -1 + 5x$$
$$y = 5x - 1$$

$$\begin{cases}
-5x + y = -1 & \Rightarrow y = 5x - 1 \\
10x - 2y = 2
\end{cases}$$

Next, substitute this expression in for y in the second equation.

$$10x-2y = 2$$

$$10x-2 (5x-1) = 2$$

$$10x-10x+2=2$$


$$2 = 2$$
True

This process led to a true statement; hence the equation is an identity and any real number is a solution. This indicates that the system is dependent. The simultaneous solutions take the form (x, mx + b), or in this case, (x, 5x - 1), where x is any real number.

Answer: (x, 5x-1)

To have a better understanding of the previous example, rewrite both equations in slope-intercept form and graph them on the same set of axes.

$$\begin{cases} -5x + y = -1 \\ 10x - 2y = 2 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = 5x - 1 \\ y = 5x - 1 \end{cases}$$



We can see that both equations represent the same line, and thus the system is dependent. Now explore what happens when solving an inconsistent system using the substitution method.

**Example 6:** Solve by substitution:  $\{-7x+3y=314x-6y=-16.$ 

**Solution:** Solve for y in the first equation.

$$-7x+3y=3$$

$$-7x+3y+7x=3+7x$$

$$3y=7x+3$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{7x+3}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{7}{3}x+1$$

$$\begin{cases} -7x + 3y = 3 & \Rightarrow y = \frac{7}{3}x + 1\\ 14x - 6y = -16 \end{cases}$$

Substitute into the second equation and solve.

$$14x - 6y = -16$$

$$14x - 6\left(\frac{7}{3}x + 1\right) = -16$$

$$14x - 6\left(\frac{7}{3}x + 1\right) = -16$$

$$14x - 6\left(\frac{7}{3}x + 1\right) = -16$$

$$14x - 6 = -16$$

$$14x - 14x - 6 = -16$$


$$-6 = -16$$
False

Solving leads to a false statement. This indicates that the equation is a contradiction. There is no solution for x and hence no solution to the system.

Answer: No solution, Ø

A false statement indicates that the system is inconsistent, or in geometric terms, that the lines are parallel and do not intersect. To illustrate this, determine the slope-intercept form of each line and graph them on the same set of axes.

$$\begin{cases} -7x + 3y = 3 \\ 14x - 6y = -16 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y = \frac{7}{3}x + 1 \\ y = \frac{7}{3}x + \frac{8}{3} \end{cases}$$



In slope-intercept form, it is easy to see that the two lines have the same slope but different y-intercepts.

**Try this!** Solve by substitution:  $\{2x-5y=34x-10y=6.$ 

Answer: (x, 25x-35)

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

The substitution method is a completely algebraic method for solving a system of equations.

- The substitution method requires that we solve for one of the variables and then substitute the result into the other equation. After performing the substitution step, the resulting equation has one variable and can be solved using the techniques learned up to this point.
- When the value of one of the variables is determined, go back and substitute it into one of the original equations, or their equivalent equations, to determine the corresponding value of the other variable.
- Solutions to systems of two linear equations with two variables, if they exist, are ordered pairs (x, y).

# 4.3 Solving Linear Systems by Elimination

## LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Solve linear systems using the elimination method.
- 2. Solve linear systems with fractions and decimals.
- 3. Identify the weaknesses and strengths of each method for solving linear systems.



#### The Elimination Method

In this section, the goal is to develop another completely algebraic method for solving a system of linear equations. We begin by defining what it means to add equations together. In the following example, notice that if we add the expressions on both sides of the equal sign, we obtain another true statement.

$$2+3=5 
+ 1+7=8 
3+10=13 
13=13$$

This is true in general: if A, B, C, and D are algebraic expressions, then we have the following addition property of equations:

If 
$$A = B$$
 and  $C = D$ , then  $A + C = B + D$ .

For the system

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 5 \\ x - y = 1 \end{cases}$$

we add the two equations together:

$$x+y=5$$

$$+ x-y=1$$

$$2x = 6$$

The sum of y and -y is zero and that term is eliminated. This leaves us with a linear equation with one variable that can be easily solved:

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{6}{2}$$

$$x = 3$$

At this point, we have the x coordinate of the simultaneous solution, so all that is left to do is back substitute to find the corresponding y-value.

$$x + y = 5$$
$$3 + y = 5$$
$$y = 2$$

Hence the solution to the system is (3, 2). This process describes the elimination (or addition) method for solving linear systems. Of course, the variable is not always so easily eliminated. Typically, we have to find an equivalent system by applying the multiplication property of equality to one or both of the equations as a means to line up one of the variables to eliminate. The goal is to arrange that either the x terms or the y terms are opposites, so that when the equations are added, the terms eliminate. The steps for the elimination method are outlined in the following example.

**Example 1:** Solve by elimination:  $\{2x+y=73x-2y=-7.$ 

Solution:

**Step 1:** Multiply one, or both, of the equations to set up the elimination of one of the variables. In this example, we will eliminate the variable y by multiplying both sides of the first equation by 2. Take care to distribute.

$$2(2x + y) = 2(7)$$
$$4x + 2y = 14$$

This leaves us with an equivalent system where the variable y is lined up to eliminate.

$$\begin{cases} 2x + y = 7 & \stackrel{\times^2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 3x - 2y = -7 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 4x + 2y = 14 \\ 3x - 2y = -7 \end{cases}$$

Step 2: Add the equations together to eliminate one of the variables.

$$4x+2y=14$$

$$+ 3x-2y=-7$$

$$7x = 7$$

Step 3: Solve for the remaining variable.

$$\frac{7x}{7} = \frac{7}{7}$$
$$x = 1$$

Step 3: Back substitute into either equation or its equivalent equation.


$$2x + y = 7$$

$$2(1) + y = 7$$

$$2 + y - 2 = 7 - 2$$

$$y = 5$$

Step 4: Check. Remember that the solution must solve both of the original equations.



Answer: (1, 5)

Occasionally, we will have to multiply both equations to line up one of the variables to eliminate. We want the resulting equivalent equations to have terms with opposite coefficients.

**Example 2:** Solve by elimination:  $\{5x-3y=-13x+2y=7.$ 

**Solution:** We choose to eliminate the terms with variable y because the coefficients have different signs. To do this, we first determine the least common multiple of the coefficients; in this case, the LCM(3, 2) is 6. Therefore, multiply both sides of both equations by the appropriate values to obtain coefficients of -6 and 6.

$$2(5x-3y) = 2(-1)$$
 Multiply both sides of the first equation by 2.  
 $10x-6y=-2$ 

$$3(3x+2y) = 3(7)$$
 Multiply both sides of the second equation by 3.

This results in the following equivalent system:

$$\begin{cases} 5x - 3y = -1 & \stackrel{\times 2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 3x + 2y = 7 & \stackrel{\times 3}{\Rightarrow} \end{cases} \begin{cases} 10x - 6y = -2 \\ 9x + 6y = 21 \end{cases}$$

The y terms are now lined up to eliminate.

$$10x - 6y = -2$$

$$+ 9x + 6y = 21$$

$$19x = 19$$

$$\frac{19x}{19} = \frac{19}{19}$$

$$x = 1$$

Back substitute.

$$3x+2y=7$$

$$3(1)+2y=7$$

$$3+2y-3=7-3$$

$$2y=4$$

$$y=2$$

Answer: (1, 2)

Sometimes linear systems are not given in standard form. When this is the case, it is best to first rearrange the equations before beginning the steps to solve by elimination.

**Example 3:** Solve by elimination:  $\{5x+12y=113y=4x+1.$ 

Solution: First, rewrite the second equation in standard form.

$$3y = 4x+1$$
$$3y-4x = 4x+1-4x$$
$$-4x+3y=1$$

This results in the following equivalent system where like terms are aligned in columns:

$$\begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ 3y = 4x + 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ -4x + 3y = 1 \end{cases}$$

We can eliminate the term with variable y if we multiply the second equation by -4.

$$\begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ -4x + 3y = 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ 16x - 12y = -4 \end{cases}$$

Next, we add the equations together,

$$5x+12y=11$$

$$+ 16x-12y=-4$$

$$21x = 7$$

$$\frac{21x}{21} = \frac{7}{21}$$

$$x = \frac{1}{3}$$

Back substitute.

$$3y = 4x + 1$$

$$3y = 4\left(\frac{1}{3}\right) + 1$$

$$3y = \frac{4}{3} + \frac{3}{3}$$

$$3y = \frac{7}{3}$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{\frac{7}{3}}{\frac{3}{3}}$$

$$y = \frac{7}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{7}{9}$$

Answer: (1/3, 7/9)

**Try this!** Solve by elimination:  $\{2x+y=-3-3x-2y=4.$ 

Answer: (-2, 1)

At this point, we explore what happens when solving dependent and inconsistent systems using the elimination method.

**Example 4:** Solve by elimination:  $\{3x-y=76x-2y=14.$ 

**Solution:** To eliminate the variable x, we could multiply the first equation by -2.

$$\begin{cases} 3x - y = 7 & \stackrel{\times (-2)}{\Rightarrow} \\ 6x - 2y = 14 & \begin{cases} -6x + 2y = -14 \\ 6x - 2y = 14 \end{cases} \end{cases}$$

Now adding the equations we have

$$-6x+2y = -14$$

$$+ 6x-2y=14$$

$$0 = 0 True$$

A true statement indicates that this is a dependent system. The lines coincide, and we need y in terms of x to present the solution set in the form (x, mx+b). Choose one of the original equations and solve for y. Since the equations are equivalent, it does not matter which one we choose.

$$3x - y = 7$$

$$3x - y - 3x = 7 - 3x$$

$$-y = -3x + 7$$

$$-1(-y) = -1(-3x + 7)$$

$$y = 3x - 7$$

Answer: (x, 3x-7)

**Example 5:** Solve by elimination:  $\{-x+3y=9\ 2x-6y=12.$ 

**Solution:** We can eliminate x by multiplying the first equation by 2.

$$\begin{cases} -x + 3y = 9 & \stackrel{\times 2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 2x - 6y = 12 & \end{cases} \begin{cases} -2x + 6y = 18 \\ 2x - 6y = 12 \end{cases}$$

Now adding the equations we have

$$-2x+6y=18$$

$$+ 2x-6y=12$$

$$0=30 False$$

A false statement indicates that the system is inconsistent. The lines are parallel and do not intersect.

Answer: No solution, Ø

**Try this!** Solve by elimination:  $\{3x+15y=-152x+10y=30.$ 

Answer: No solution, Ø

## **Clearing Fractions and Decimals**

Given a linear system where the equations have fractional coefficients, it is usually best to clear the fractions before beginning the elimination method.

Example 6: Solve:  $\left\{ \left\{ -\frac{1}{10x+12y=45}, \frac{17x+13y=-221}{17x+13y=-221}, \right. \right\}$ 

**Solution:** Recall that we can clear fractions by multiplying both sides of an equation by the least common denominator (LCD). Take care to distribute and then simplify.

Equation 1: Equation 2: 
$$10\left(-\frac{1}{10}x + \frac{1}{2}y\right) = 10\left(\frac{4}{5}\right)$$
$$10 \cdot \left(-\frac{1}{10}x\right) + 10 \cdot \frac{1}{2}y = 10 \cdot \frac{4}{5}$$
$$-x + 5y = 8$$
$$21\left(\frac{1}{7}x + \frac{1}{3}y\right) = 21\left(-\frac{2}{21}\right)$$
$$21 \cdot \frac{1}{7}x + 21 \cdot \frac{1}{3}y = 21\left(-\frac{2}{21}\right)$$
$$3x + 7y = -2$$

This results in an equivalent system where the equations have integer coefficients,

$$\begin{cases} -\frac{1}{10}x + \frac{1}{2}y = \frac{4}{5} & \Rightarrow \\ \frac{1}{7}x + \frac{1}{3}y = -\frac{2}{21} & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} -x + 5y = 8 \\ 3x + 7y = -2 \end{cases}$$

Solve using the elimination method.

$$\begin{cases}
-x+5y=8 & \Rightarrow \\
3x+7y=-2
\end{cases} \begin{cases}
-3x+15y=24 \\
3x+7y=-2
\end{cases}$$

$$\frac{-3x+15y=24}{22y=22}$$

$$\frac{22y}{22} = \frac{22}{22}$$

$$y=1$$

Back substitute.

$$3x + 7y = -2$$

$$3x + 7(1) = -2$$

$$3x + 7 - 7 = -2 - 7$$

$$3x = -9$$

$$\frac{3x}{3} = \frac{-9}{3}$$

$$x = -3$$

Answer: (-3, 1)

We can use a similar technique to clear decimals before solving.

**Example 7:** Solve:  $\{3x-0.6y=-0.9-0.5x+0.12y=0.16.$ 

**Solution:** Multiply each equation by the lowest power of 10 necessary to result in integer coefficients. In this case, multiply the first equation by 10 and the second equation by 100.

Equation 1: Equation 2:  

$$10(3x-0.6y) = 10 (-0.9)$$

$$30x-6y = -9$$

$$100 (-0.5x+0.12y) = 100 (0.16)$$

$$-50x+12y = 16$$

This results in an equivalent system where the equations have integer coefficients:

$$\begin{cases} 3x - 0.6y = -0.9 & \Rightarrow \\ -0.5x + 0.12y = 0.16 & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} 30x - 6y = -9 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases}$$

Solve using the elimination method.

$$\begin{cases} 30x - 6y = -9 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 60x - 12y = -18 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases}$$

$$60x-12y = -18$$

$$+ -50x+12y = 16$$

$$10x = -2$$

$$\frac{10x}{10} = -\frac{2}{10}$$

$$x = -\frac{1}{5} = -0.2$$

Back substitute.

$$3x-0.6y = -0.9$$

$$3(-0.2)-0.6y = -0.9$$

$$-0.6-0.6y+0.6 = -0.9+0.6$$

$$\frac{-0.6y}{-0.6} = \frac{-0.3}{-0.6}$$

$$y = 0.5$$

Answer: (-0.2, 0.5)

**Try this!** Solve using elimination:  $\left\{ \begin{array}{c} \\ \\ \\ \\ \\ \end{array} \right\}_{13x-23y=313x-12y=83}$ 


Answer: (5, -2)

## **Summary of the Methods for Solving Linear Systems**

We have developed three methods for solving linear systems of two equations with two variables. In this section, we summarize the strengths and weaknesses of each method.

The graphing method is useful for understanding what a system of equations is and what the solutions must look like. When the equations of a system are graphed on the same set of axes, we can see that the solution is the point where the graphs intersect. The graphing is made easy when the equations are in slope-intercept form. For example,

$$\begin{cases} y = 5x + 15 \\ y = -5x + 5 \end{cases}$$



The simultaneous solution (-1, 10) corresponds to the point of intersection. One drawback of this method is that it is very inaccurate. When the coordinates of the solution are not integers, the method is practically unusable. If we have a choice, we typically avoid this method in favor of the more accurate algebraic techniques.

The substitution method, on the other hand, is a completely algebraic method. It requires you to solve for one of the variables and substitute the result into the other equation. The resulting equation has one variable for which you can solve. This method is particularly useful when there is a variable within the system with coefficient of 1. For example,

$$\begin{cases} 10x + y = 20 \\ 7x + 5y = 14 \end{cases}$$
 Choose the substitution method.

In this case, it is easy to solve for y in the first equation and then substitute the result into the other equation. One drawback of this method is that it often leads to equivalent equations with fractional coefficients, which are tedious to work with. If there is not a coefficient of 1, then it usually is best to choose the elimination method.

The elimination method is a completely algebraic method that makes use of the addition property of equations. We multiply one or both of the equations to obtain equivalent equations where one of the variables is eliminated if we add them together. For example,

 $\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 9 \\ 5x - 8y = -16 \end{cases}$  Choose the elimination method.

Here we multiply both sides of the first equation by 5 and both sides of the second equation by -2. This results in an equivalent system where the variable x is eliminated when we add the equations together. Of course, there are other combinations of numbers that achieve the same result. We could even choose to eliminate the variable y. No matter which variable is eliminated first, the solution will be the same. Note that the substitution method, in this case, would require tedious calculations with fractional coefficients. One weakness of the elimination method, as we will see later in our study of algebra, is that it does not always work for nonlinear systems.

# 4.3 Solving Linear Systems by Elimination

## **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

1. Solve linear systems using the elimination method.



- 2. Solve linear systems with fractions and decimals.
- 3. Identify the weaknesses and strengths of each method for solving linear systems.

## **The Elimination Method**

In this section, the goal is to develop another completely algebraic method for solving a system of linear equations. We begin by defining what it means to add equations together. In the following example, notice that if we add the expressions on both sides of the equal sign, we obtain another true statement.

$$2+3=5 
+ 1+7=8 
3+10=13 
13=13$$

This is true in general: if A, B, C, and D are algebraic expressions, then we have the following addition property of equations:

If 
$$A = B$$
 and  $C = D$ , then  $A + C = B + D$ .

For the system

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 5 \\ x - y = 1 \end{cases}$$

we add the two equations together:

$$x+y=5$$

$$+ x-y=1$$

$$2x = 6$$

The sum of y and -y is zero and that term is eliminated. This leaves us with a linear equation with one variable that can be easily solved:

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{6}{2}$$
$$x = 3$$

At this point, we have the x coordinate of the simultaneous solution, so all that is left to do is back substitute to find the corresponding y-value.

$$x + y = 5$$
$$3 + y = 5$$
$$y = 2$$

Hence the solution to the system is (3, 2). This process describes the elimination (or addition) method for solving linear systems. Of course, the variable is not always so easily eliminated. Typically, we have to find an equivalent system by applying the multiplication property of equality to one or both of the equations as a means to line up one of the variables to eliminate. The goal is to arrange that either the x terms or the y terms are opposites, so that when the equations are added, the terms eliminate. The steps for the elimination method are outlined in the following example.

**Example 1:** Solve by elimination:  $\{2x+y=73x-2y=-7.$ 

Solution:

**Step 1:** Multiply one, or both, of the equations to set up the elimination of one of the variables. In this example, we will eliminate the variable y by multiplying both sides of the first equation by 2. Take care to distribute.

$$2(2x + y) = 2(7)$$
$$4x + 2y = 14$$

This leaves us with an equivalent system where the variable y is lined up to eliminate.

$$\begin{cases} 2x + y = 7 & \stackrel{\times 2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 3x - 2y = -7 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 4x + 2y = 14 \\ 3x - 2y = -7 \end{cases}$$

Step 2: Add the equations together to eliminate one of the variables.

$$4x + 2y = 14$$

$$+ 3x - 2y = -7$$

$$7x = 7$$

Step 3: Solve for the remaining variable.

$$\frac{7x}{7} = \frac{7}{7}$$
$$x = 1$$

Step 3: Back substitute into either equation or its equivalent equation.


$$2x + y = 7$$

$$2(1) + y = 7$$

$$2 + y - 2 = 7 - 2$$

$$y = 5$$

Step 4: Check. Remember that the solution must solve both of the original equations.



Answer: (1, 5)

Occasionally, we will have to multiply both equations to line up one of the variables to eliminate. We want the resulting equivalent equations to have terms with opposite coefficients.

**Example 2:** Solve by elimination:  $\{5x-3y=-13x+2y=7.$ 

**Solution:** We choose to eliminate the terms with variable y because the coefficients have different signs. To do this, we first determine the least common multiple of the coefficients; in this case, the LCM(3, 2) is 6. Therefore, multiply both sides of both equations by the appropriate values to obtain coefficients of -6 and 6.

$$2(5x-3y) = 2(-1)$$
 Multiply both sides of the first equation by 2.  
 $10x-6y=-2$ 

$$3(3x+2y) = 3(7)$$
 Multiply both sides of the second equation by 3.

This results in the following equivalent system:

$$\begin{cases} 5x - 3y = -1 & \stackrel{\times 2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 3x + 2y = 7 & \stackrel{\times 3}{\Rightarrow} \end{cases} \begin{cases} 10x - 6y = -2 \\ 9x + 6y = 21 \end{cases}$$

The y terms are now lined up to eliminate.

$$10x - 6y = -2$$

$$+ 9x + 6y = 21$$

$$19x = 19$$

$$\frac{19x}{19} = \frac{19}{19}$$

$$x = 1$$

Back substitute.

$$3x+2y=7$$

$$3(1)+2y=7$$

$$3+2y-3=7-3$$

$$2y=4$$

$$y=2$$

Answer: (1, 2)

Sometimes linear systems are not given in standard form. When this is the case, it is best to first rearrange the equations before beginning the steps to solve by elimination.

**Example 3:** Solve by elimination:  $\{5x+12y=113y=4x+1.$ 

Solution: First, rewrite the second equation in standard form.

$$3y = 4x+1$$
$$3y-4x = 4x+1-4x$$
$$-4x+3y=1$$

This results in the following equivalent system where like terms are aligned in columns:

$$\begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ 3y = 4x + 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ -4x + 3y = 1 \end{cases}$$

We can eliminate the term with variable y if we multiply the second equation by -4.

$$\begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ -4x + 3y = 1 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 5x + 12y = 11 \\ 16x - 12y = -4 \end{cases}$$

Next, we add the equations together,

$$5x+12y=11$$

$$+ 16x-12y=-4$$

$$21x = 7$$

$$\frac{21x}{21} = \frac{7}{21}$$

$$x = \frac{1}{3}$$

Back substitute.

$$3y = 4x + 1$$

$$3y = 4\left(\frac{1}{3}\right) + 1$$

$$3y = \frac{4}{3} + \frac{3}{3}$$

$$3y = \frac{7}{3}$$

$$\frac{3y}{3} = \frac{\frac{7}{3}}{\frac{3}{3}}$$

$$y = \frac{7}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{3}$$

$$y = \frac{7}{9}$$

Answer: (1/3, 7/9)

**Try this!** Solve by elimination:  $\{2x+y=-3-3x-2y=4.$ 

Answer: (-2, 1)

At this point, we explore what happens when solving dependent and inconsistent systems using the elimination method.

**Example 4:** Solve by elimination:  $\{3x-y=76x-2y=14.$ 

**Solution:** To eliminate the variable x, we could multiply the first equation by -2.

$$\begin{cases} 3x - y = 7 & \stackrel{\times (-2)}{\Rightarrow} \\ 6x - 2y = 14 & \begin{cases} -6x + 2y = -14 \\ 6x - 2y = 14 \end{cases} \end{cases}$$

Now adding the equations we have

$$-6x+2y = -14$$

$$+ 6x-2y=14$$

$$0 = 0 True$$

A true statement indicates that this is a dependent system. The lines coincide, and we need y in terms of x to present the solution set in the form (x, mx+b). Choose one of the original equations and solve for y. Since the equations are equivalent, it does not matter which one we choose.

$$3x - y = 7$$

$$3x - y - 3x = 7 - 3x$$

$$-y = -3x + 7$$

$$-1(-y) = -1(-3x + 7)$$

$$y = 3x - 7$$

Answer: (x, 3x-7)

**Example 5:** Solve by elimination:  $\{-x+3y=9\ 2x-6y=12.$ 

**Solution:** We can eliminate x by multiplying the first equation by 2.

$$\begin{cases} -x + 3y = 9 & \stackrel{\times^2}{\Rightarrow} \\ 2x - 6y = 12 & \end{cases} \begin{cases} -2x + 6y = 18 \\ 2x - 6y = 12 \end{cases}$$

Now adding the equations we have

$$-2x+6y=18$$

$$+ 2x-6y=12$$

$$0 = 30$$
 False

A false statement indicates that the system is inconsistent. The lines are parallel and do not intersect.

Answer: No solution, Ø

**Try this!** Solve by elimination:  $\{3x+15y=-152x+10y=30.$ 

Answer: No solution, Ø

### **Clearing Fractions and Decimals**

Given a linear system where the equations have fractional coefficients, it is usually best to clear the fractions before beginning the elimination method.

Example 6: Solve:  $\left\{ \left\{ -\frac{1}{10x+12y=45}, \frac{17x+13y=-221}{17x+13y=-221}, \right\} \right\}$ 

**Solution:** Recall that we can clear fractions by multiplying both sides of an equation by the least common denominator (LCD). Take care to distribute and then simplify.

Equation 1: Equation 2: 
$$10\left(-\frac{1}{10}x + \frac{1}{2}y\right) = 10\left(\frac{4}{5}\right)$$
$$10 \cdot \left(-\frac{1}{10}x\right) + 10 \cdot \frac{1}{2}y = 10 \cdot \frac{4}{5}$$
$$-x + 5y = 8$$
$$21\left(\frac{1}{7}x + \frac{1}{3}y\right) = 21\left(-\frac{2}{21}\right)$$
$$21 \cdot \frac{1}{7}x + 21 \cdot \frac{1}{3}y = 21\left(-\frac{2}{21}\right)$$
$$3x + 7y = -2$$

This results in an equivalent system where the equations have integer coefficients,

$$\begin{cases} -\frac{1}{10}x + \frac{1}{2}y = \frac{4}{5} & \Rightarrow \\ \frac{1}{7}x + \frac{1}{3}y = -\frac{2}{21} & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} -x + 5y = 8 \\ 3x + 7y = -2 \end{cases}$$

Solve using the elimination method.

$$\begin{cases}
-x+5y=8 & \Rightarrow \\
3x+7y=-2
\end{cases} \begin{cases}
-3x+15y=24 \\
3x+7y=-2
\end{cases}$$

$$\frac{-3x+15y=24}{22y=22}$$

$$\frac{22y}{22} = \frac{22}{22}$$

$$y=1$$

Back substitute.

$$3x + 7y = -2$$

$$3x + 7(1) = -2$$

$$3x + 7 - 7 = -2 - 7$$

$$3x = -9$$

$$\frac{3x}{3} = \frac{-9}{3}$$

$$x = -3$$

Answer: (-3, 1)

We can use a similar technique to clear decimals before solving.

**Example 7:** Solve:  $\{3x-0.6y=-0.9-0.5x+0.12y=0.16.$ 

**Solution:** Multiply each equation by the lowest power of 10 necessary to result in integer coefficients. In this case, multiply the first equation by 10 and the second equation by 100.

Equation 1: Equation 2:  

$$10(3x-0.6y) = 10 (-0.9)$$

$$30x-6y = -9$$

$$100 (-0.5x+0.12y) = 100 (0.16)$$

$$-50x+12y = 16$$

This results in an equivalent system where the equations have integer coefficients:

$$\begin{cases} 3x - 0.6y = -0.9 & \Rightarrow \\ -0.5x + 0.12y = 0.16 & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} 30x - 6y = -9 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases}$$

Solve using the elimination method.

$$\begin{cases} 30x - 6y = -9 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 60x - 12y = -18 \\ -50x + 12y = 16 \end{cases}$$

$$60x-12y = -18$$

$$+ -50x+12y = 16$$

$$10x = -2$$

$$\frac{10x}{10} = -\frac{2}{10}$$

$$x = -\frac{1}{5} = -0.2$$

Back substitute.

$$3x - 0.6y = -0.9$$

$$3(-0.2) - 0.6y = -0.9$$

$$-0.6 - 0.6y + 0.6 = -0.9 + 0.6$$

$$\frac{-0.6y}{-0.6} = \frac{-0.3}{-0.6}$$

$$y = 0.5$$

Answer: (-0.2, 0.5)

**Try this!** Solve using elimination:  $\left\{ \begin{cases} 13x-23y=313x-12y=83. \end{cases} \right\}$ 


Answer: (5, -2)

### **Summary of the Methods for Solving Linear Systems**

We have developed three methods for solving linear systems of two equations with two variables. In this section, we summarize the strengths and weaknesses of each method.

The graphing method is useful for understanding what a system of equations is and what the solutions must look like. When the equations of a system are graphed on the same set of axes, we can see that the solution is the point where the graphs intersect. The graphing is made easy when the equations are in slope-intercept form. For example,

$$\begin{cases} y = 5x + 15 \\ y = -5x + 5 \end{cases}$$



The simultaneous solution (-1, 10) corresponds to the point of intersection. One drawback of this method is that it is very inaccurate. When the coordinates of the solution are not integers, the method is practically unusable. If we have a choice, we typically avoid this method in favor of the more accurate algebraic techniques.

The substitution method, on the other hand, is a completely algebraic method. It requires you to solve for one of the variables and substitute the result into the other equation. The resulting equation has one variable for which you can solve. This method is particularly useful when there is a variable within the system with coefficient of 1. For example,

$$\begin{cases} 10x + y = 20 \\ 7x + 5y = 14 \end{cases}$$
 Choose the substitution method.

In this case, it is easy to solve for y in the first equation and then substitute the result into the other equation. One drawback of this method is that it often leads to equivalent equations with fractional coefficients, which are tedious to work with. If there is not a coefficient of 1, then it usually is best to choose the elimination method.

The elimination method is a completely algebraic method that makes use of the addition property of equations. We multiply one or both of the equations to obtain equivalent equations where one of the variables is eliminated if we add them together. For example,

 $\begin{cases} 2x - 3y = 9 \\ 5x - 8y = -16 \end{cases}$  Choose the elimination method.

Here we multiply both sides of the first equation by 5 and both sides of the second equation by -2. This results in an equivalent system where the variable x is eliminated when we add the equations together. Of course, there are other combinations of numbers that achieve the same result. We could even choose to eliminate the variable y. No matter which variable is eliminated first, the solution will be the same. Note that the substitution method, in this case, would require tedious calculations with fractional coefficients. One weakness of the elimination method, as we will see later in our study of algebra, is that it does not always work for nonlinear systems.

### KEY TAKEAWAYS

- The elimination method is a completely algebraic method for solving a system of equations.
- Multiply one or both of the equations in a system by certain numbers to obtain an equivalent system consisting of like terms with

# **4.4** Applications of Linear Systems

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

### **Problems Involving Relationships between Real Numbers**

We now have the techniques needed to solve linear systems. For this reason, we are no longer limited to using one variable when setting up equations that model applications. If we translate an application to a mathematical setup using two variables, then we need to form a linear system with two equations.

**Example 1:** The sum of two numbers is 40 and their difference is 8. Find the numbers.

Solution:

Identify variables.

Let *y* represent one of the unknown numbers. Let *y* represent the other unknown number.

Set up equations: When using two variables, we need to set up two equations. The first key phrase, "the sum of the two numbers is 40," translates as follows:

$$x + y = 40$$

And the second key phrase, "the difference is 8," leads us to the second equation:

$$x - y = 8$$

Therefore, our algebraic setup consists of the following system:

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 40 \\ x - y = 8 \end{cases}$$

*Solve:* We can solve the resulting system using any method of our choosing. Here we choose to solve by elimination. Adding the equations together eliminates the variable y.

$$x + y = 40$$

$$+ x - y = 8$$

$$2x = 48$$

$$x = 24$$

Once we have x, back substitute to find y.

$$x + y = 40$$

$$24 + y = 40$$

$$24 + y - 24 = 40 - 24$$

$$y = 16$$

Check: The sum of the two numbers should be 42 and their difference 8.

$$24 + 16 = 40$$

$$24 - 16 = 8$$

Answer: The two numbers are 24 and 16.

**Example 2:** The sum of 9 times a larger number and twice a smaller is 6. The difference of 3 times the larger and the smaller is 7. Find the numbers.

Solution: Begin by assigning variables to the larger and smaller number.

Let *x* represent the larger number. Let *y* represent the smaller number.

The first sentence describes a sum and the second sentence describes a difference.

9 times a larger twice a smaller
$$9x + 2y = 6$$
3 times the larger the smaller
$$3x - y = 7$$

This leads to the following system:

$$\begin{cases} 9x + 2y = 6\\ 3x - y = 7 \end{cases}$$

Solve using the elimination method. Multiply the second equation by 2 and add.

$$\begin{cases} 9x + 2y = 6 \\ 3x - y = 7 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} 9x + 2y = 6 \\ 6x - 2y = 14 \end{cases}$$

$$9x+2y=6$$

$$+ 6x-2y=14$$

$$15x = 20$$

$$x = \frac{20}{15}$$

$$x = \frac{4}{3}$$

Back substitute to find y.

$$3x - y = 7$$

$$3\left(\frac{4}{3}\right) - y = 7$$

$$4 - y = 7$$

$$-y = 3$$

$$y = -3$$

Answer: The larger number is 4/3 and the smaller number is -3.

Try this! The sum of two numbers is 3. When twice the smaller number is subtracted from 6 times the larger the result is 22. Find the numbers.

Answer: The two numbers are -1/2 and 7/2.

### **Interest and Money Problems**

In this section, the interest and money problems should seem familiar. The difference is that we will be making use of two variables when setting up the algebraic equations.

**Example 3:** A roll of 32 bills contains only \$5 bills and \$10 bills. If the value of the roll is \$220, then how many of each bill are in the roll?

Solution: Begin by identifying the variables.

Let *x* represent the number of \$5 bills. Let *y* represent the number of \$10 bills.

When using two variables, we need to set up two equations. The first equation is created from the fact that there are 32 bills.

$$x + y = 32$$

The second equation sums the value of each bill: the total value is \$220.

$$5 \cdot x + 10 \cdot y = 220$$

Present both equations as a system; this is our algebraic setup.

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 32 \\ 5x + 10y = 220 \end{cases}$$

Here we choose to solve by elimination, although substitution would work just as well. Eliminate x by multiplying the first equation by -5.

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 32 & \stackrel{\times (-5)}{\Rightarrow} \\ 5x + 10y = 220 & \begin{cases} -5x - 5y = -160 \\ 5x + 10y = 220 \end{cases}$$

Now add the equations together:

$$-5x-5y = -160$$

$$+ 5x+10y = 220$$

$$5y = 60$$

$$\frac{5y}{5} = \frac{60}{5}$$

$$y = 12$$

Once we have y, the number of \$10 bills, back substitute to find x.

$$x + y = 32$$

$$x + 12 = 32$$

$$x + 12 - 12 = 32 - 12$$

$$x = 20$$

Answer: There are twenty \$5 bills and twelve \$10 bills. The check is left to the reader.

**Example 4:** A total of \$6,300 was invested in two accounts. Part was invested in a CD at a 412% annual interest rate and part was invested in a money market fund at a 334% annual interest rate. If the total simple interest for one year was \$267.75, then how much was invested in each account?

Solution:

Let x represent the amount invested at  $4\frac{1}{2}\% = 4.5\% = 0.045$ Let y represent the amount invested at  $3\frac{3}{4}\% = 3.75\% = 0.0375$ 

The total amount in both accounts can be expressed as

$$x + y = 6,300$$

To set up a second equation, use the fact that the total interest was \$267.75. Recall that the interest for one year is the interest rate times the principal ( $I=prt=pr\cdot 1=pr$ ). Use this to add the interest in both accounts. Be sure to use the decimal equivalents for the interest rates given as percentages.

interest from the CD + interest from the fund = total interest  

$$0.045x + 0.0375y = 267.75$$

These two equations together form the following linear system:

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 6,300 \\ 0.045x + 0.0375y = 267.75 \end{cases}$$

Eliminate y by multiplying the first equation by -0.0375.

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 6,300 & \Rightarrow \\ 0.045x + 0.0375y = 267.75 & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} -0.0375x - 0.0375y = -236.25 \\ 0.045x + 0.0375y = 267.75 & \end{cases}$$

Next, add the equations together to eliminate the variable y.

$$-0.0375x - 0.0375y = -236.25$$

$$+ 0.045x + 0.0375y = 267.75$$

$$0.0075x = 31.5$$

$$\frac{0.0075x}{0.0075} = \frac{31.5}{0.0075}$$

$$x = 4,200$$

Back substitute.

$$x + y = 6,300$$

$$4,200 + y = 6,300$$

$$4,200 + y - 4,200 = 6,300 - 4,200$$

$$y = 2,100$$

Answer: \$4,200 was invested at 412% and \$2,100 was invested at 334%.

At this point, we should be able to solve these types of problems in two ways: with one variable and now with two variables.

Setting up word problems with two variables often simplifies the entire process, particularly when the relationships between the variables are not so clear.

Try this! On the first day of a two-day meeting, 10 coffees and 10 doughnuts were purchased for a total of \$20.00. Since nobody drank the coffee and all the doughnuts were eaten, the next day only 2 coffees and 14 doughnuts were purchased for a total of \$13.00. How much did each coffee and each doughnut cost?

Answer: Coffee: \$1.25; doughnut: \$0.75

#### **Mixture Problems**

Mixture problems often include a percentage and some total amount. It is important to make a distinction between these two types of quantities. For example, if a problem states that a 20-ounce container is filled with a 2% saline (salt) solution, then this means that the container is filled with a mixture of salt and water as follows:

 Percentage
 Amount

 Salt
 2% = 0.02
 0.02(20 ounces) = 0.4 ounces

 Water
 98% = 0.98
 0.98(20 ounces) = 19.6 ounces

In other words, we multiply the percentage times the total to get the amount of each part of the mixture.

**Example 5:** A 2% saline solution is to be combined and mixed with a 5% saline solution to produce 72 ounces of a 2.5% saline solution. How much of each is needed?

Solution:

Let *x* represent the amount of 2% saline solution needed. Let *y* represent the amount of 5% saline solution needed.

The total amount of saline solution needed is 72 ounces. This leads to one equation,

$$x + y = 72$$

The second equation adds up the amount of salt in the correct percentages. The amount of salt is obtained by multiplying the percentage times the amount, where the variables x and y represent the amounts of the solutions.

salt in 2% solution + salt in 5% solution = salt in the end solution  

$$0.02x + 0.05y = 0.025(72)$$

The algebraic setup consists of both equations presented as a system:

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 72 \\ 0.02x + 0.05y = 0.025(72) \end{cases}$$

Solve.

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 72 \\ 0.02x + 0.05y = 0.025(72) \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} -0.02x - 0.02y = -1.44 \\ 0.02x + 0.05y = 1.8 \end{cases}$$

$$-0.02x - 0.02y = -1.44$$

$$+ 0.02x + 0.05y = 1.8$$

$$0.03y = 0.36$$

$$\frac{0.03y}{0.03} = \frac{0.36}{0.03}$$

$$y = 12$$

Back substitute.



$$x + y = 72$$

$$x + 12 = 72$$

$$x + 12 - 12 = 72 - 12$$

$$x = 60$$

Answer: We need 60 ounces of the 2% saline solution and 12 ounces of the 5% saline solution.

**Example 6:** A 50% alcohol solution is to be mixed with a 10% alcohol solution to create an 8-ounce mixture of a 32% alcohol solution. How much of each is needed?

Solution:

Let *x* represent the amount of 50% alcohol solution needed. Let *y* represent the amount of 10% alcohol solution needed.

The total amount of the mixture must be 8 ounces.

$$x + y = 8$$

The second equation adds up the amount of alcohol from each solution in the correct percentages. The amount of alcohol in the end result is 32% of 8 ounces, or 0.032(8).

alcohol in 50% solution + alcohol in 10% solution = alcohol in the end solution
$$0.50x + 0.10y = 0.32(8)$$

Now we can form a system of two linear equations and two variables as follows:

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 8 \\ 0.50x + 0.10y = 0.32(8) \end{cases}$$

In this example, multiply the second equation by 100 to eliminate the decimals. In addition, multiply the first equation by -10 to line up the variable y to eliminate.

Equation 1: Equation 2: 
$$-10(x+y) = -10(8)$$
$$-10x-10y = -80$$
$$100 \ 0.50x + 0.10y = 100(0.32)(8)$$
$$50x+10y = 256$$

We obtain the following equivalent system:

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 8 & \Rightarrow \\ 0.50x + 0.10y = 0.32(8) & \Rightarrow \\ x + y = 8 & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} -10x - 10y = -80 \\ 50x + 10y = 256 \end{cases}$$

Add the equations and then solve for x:

$$-10x - 10y = -80$$

$$+ 50x + 10y = 256$$

$$40x = 176$$

$$\frac{40x}{40} = \frac{176}{40}$$

$$x = 4.4$$

Back substitute.

$$x + y = 8$$

$$4.4 + y = 8$$

$$4.4 + y - 4.4 = 8 - 4.4$$

$$x = 3.6$$

Answer: To obtain 8 ounces of a 32% alcohol mixture we need to mix 4.4 ounces of the 50% alcohol solution and 3.6 ounces of the 10% solution.

Try this! A 70% antifreeze concentrate is to be mixed with water to produce a 5-gallon mixture containing 28% antifreeze.

How much water and antifreeze concentrate is needed?

Answer: We need to mix 3 gallons of water with 2 gallons of antifreeze concentrate.

### **Uniform Motion Problems (Distance Problems)**

Recall that the distance traveled is equal to the average rate times the time traveled at that rate, D=rt.

These uniform motion problems usually have a lot of data, so it helps to first organize that data in a chart and then set up a linear system. In this section, you are encouraged to use two variables.

**Example 7:** An executive traveled a total of 8 hours and 1,930 miles by car and by plane. Driving to the airport by car, she averaged 60 miles per hour. In the air, the plane averaged 350 miles per hour. How long did it take her to drive to the airport?

Solution: We are asked to find the time it takes her to drive to the airport; this indicates that time is the unknown quantity.

Let *x* represent the time it took to drive to the airport. Let *y* represent the time spent in the air.

	Distance =	= Rate >	Time
Travel by car		60 mph	х
Travel by air		350 mph	у
Total	1,930 mi		8 hours

Use the formula  $D=r \cdot t$  to fill in the unknown distances.

Distance traveled in the car:  $D = r \cdot t = 60 \cdot x$ Distance traveled in the air:  $D = r \cdot t = 350 \cdot y$ 

	Distance =	= Rate >	Time
Travel by car	60x	60 mph	x
Travel by air	350y	350 mph	У
Total	1,930 mi		8 hours

The distance column and the time column of the chart help us to set up the following linear system.

	Distance =	= Rate ×	Time
Travel by car	60x	60 mph	X
Travel by air	350y	350 mph	y
Total	1,930 mi		8 hours

$$60x + 350y = 1,930 x + y = 8$$

$$x + y = 8$$

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 8 & \leftarrow \text{ total time traveled} \\ 60x + 350y = 1,930 & \leftarrow \text{ total distance traveled} \end{cases}$$

Solve.

$$\begin{cases} x + y = 8 & \Rightarrow \\ 60x + 350y = 1,930 & \Rightarrow \end{cases} \begin{cases} -60x - 60y = -480 \\ 60x + 350y = 1,930 \end{cases}$$

$$-60x - 60y = -480$$

$$+ 60x + 350y = 1,930$$

$$290y = 1450$$

$$\frac{290y}{290} = \frac{1450}{290}$$

$$y = 5$$

Now back substitute to find the time it took to drive to the airport x:

$$x + y = 8$$
$$x + 5 = 8$$
$$x = 3$$

Answer: It took her 3 hours to drive to the airport.

It is not always the case that time is the unknown quantity. Read the problem carefully and identify what you are asked to find; this defines your variables.

**Example 8:** Flying with the wind, an airplane traveled 1,365 miles in 3 hours. The plane then turned against the wind and traveled another 870 miles in 2 hours. Find the speed of the airplane and the speed of the wind.

**Solution:** There is no obvious relationship between the speed of the plane and the speed of the wind. For this reason, use two variables as follows:

Let *x* represent the speed of the airplane. Let *w* represent the speed of the wind.

Use the following chart to organize the data:

	Distance =	Rate	×	Time
Flight with wind	1,365 mi			3 hrs
Flight against wind	870 mi			2 hrs
Total				

With the wind, the airplane's total speed is x+w. Flying against the wind, the total speed is x-w.

	Distance =	= Rate	×	Time
Flight with wind	1,365 mi	x + w		3 hrs
Flight against wind	870 mi	x - w		2 hrs
Total	2,235 mi			5 hrs

Use the rows of the chart along with the formula D=rt to construct a linear system that models this problem. Take care to group the quantities that represent the rate in parentheses.

	Distance =	= Rate	×	Time
Flight with wind	1,365 mi	x + w		3 hrs
Flight against wind	870 mi	x - w		2 hrs
Total	2,235 mi			5 hrs

$$\begin{cases} 1,365 = (x+w) \cdot 3 & \leftarrow \text{ distance traveled with the wind} \\ 870 = (x-w) \cdot 2 & \leftarrow \text{ distance traveled against the wind} \end{cases}$$

If we divide both sides of the first equation by 3 and both sides of the second equation by 2, then we obtain the following equivalent system:

$$\begin{cases} 1,365 = (x+w) \cdot 3 & \Rightarrow \\ 870 = (x-w) \cdot 2 & \Rightarrow \\ & & \\ 435 = x-w \end{cases} \begin{cases} 455 = x+w \\ 435 = x-w \end{cases}$$

$$x+w=455$$

$$+ x-w=435$$

$$2x = 890$$

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{890}{2}$$

$$x = 445$$

Back substitute.

$$x + w = 455$$

$$445 + w = 455$$

$$w = 10$$

Answer: The speed of the airplane is 445 miles per hour and the speed of the wind is 10 miles per hour.

**Try this!** A boat traveled 24 miles downstream in 2 hours. The return trip, which was against the current, took twice as long. What are the speeds of the boat and of the current?

Answer: The speed of the boat is 9 miles per hour and the speed of the current is 3 miles per hour.

## 4.5 Solving Systems of Linear Inequalities (Two Variables)



#### **Solutions to Systems of Linear Inequalities**


A system of linear inequalities consists of a set of two or more linear inequalities with the same variables. The inequalities define the conditions that are to be considered simultaneously. For example,

$$\begin{cases} y > x - 2 \\ y \le 2x + 2 \end{cases}$$


We know that each inequality in the set contains infinitely many ordered pair solutions defined by a region in a rectangular coordinate plane. When considering two of these inequalities together, the intersection of these sets defines the set of simultaneous ordered pair solutions. When we graph each of the above inequalities separately, we have



When graphed on the same set of axes, the intersection can be determined.



The intersection is shaded darker and the final graph of the solution set is presented as follows:



The graph suggests that (3, 2) is a solution because it is in the intersection. To verify this, show that it solves both of the original inequalities:

Check: 
$$(3, 2)$$

Inequality 1:  $y > x-2$ 
 $2 > 3-2$ 
 $2 > 1$ 

Inequality 2:  $y \le 2x+2$ 
 $2 \le 2(3)+2$ 
 $2 \le 8$ 

Points on the solid boundary are included in the set of simultaneous solutions and points on the dashed boundary are not.

Consider the point (-1, 0) on the solid boundary defined by y=2x+2 and verify that it solves the original system:

Check: 
$$(-1, 0)$$

Inequality 1:  $y > x - 2$ 
 $0 > -1 - 2$ 
 $0 > -3$ 

Inequality 2:  $y \le 2x + 2$ 
 $0 \le 2(-1) + 2$ 
 $0 \le 0$ 

Notice that this point satisfies both inequalities and thus is included in the solution set. Now consider the point (2, 0) on the dashed boundary defined by y=x-2 and verify that it does not solve the original system:

Check: (2, 0)

Inequality 1: 
$$y > x - 2$$
 $0 > 2 - 2$ 
 $0 > 0$ 

Inequality 2:  $y \le 2x + 2$ 
 $0 \le 2(2) + 2$ 
 $0 \le 6$ 

This point does not satisfy both inequalities and thus is not included in the solution set.

#### **Solving Systems of Linear Inequalities**

Solutions to a system of linear inequalities are the ordered pairs that solve all the inequalities in the system. Therefore, to solve these systems, graph the solution sets of the inequalities on the same set of axes and determine where they intersect.

This intersection, or overlap, defines the region of common ordered pair solutions.


**Example 1:** Graph the solution set:  $\{-2x+y>-43x-6y\ge 6.$ 

**Solution:** To facilitate the graphing process, we first solve for y.

$$\begin{cases} -2x + y > -4 \\ 3x - 6y \ge 6 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y > 2x - 4 \\ y \le \frac{1}{2}x - 1 \end{cases}$$


For the first inequality, we use a dashed boundary defined by y=2x-4 and shade all points above the line. For the second inequality, we use a solid boundary defined by y=12x-1 and shade all points below. The intersection is darkened.





Now we present the solution with only the intersection shaded.

Answer:




**Example 2:** Graph the solution set:  $\{-2x+3y>64x-6y>12$ .

**Solution:** Begin by solving both inequalities for y.

$$\begin{cases} -3x + 2y > 6 \\ 6x - 4y > 8 \end{cases} \Rightarrow \begin{cases} y > \frac{3}{2}x + 3 \\ y < \frac{3}{2}x - 2 \end{cases}$$

Use a dashed line for each boundary. For the first inequality, shade all points above the boundary. For the second inequality, shade all points below the boundary.




As you can see, there is no intersection of these two shaded regions. Therefore, there are no simultaneous solutions.

Answer: No solution, Ø


**Example 3:** Graph the solution set:  $\left\{ \left\{ \begin{array}{l} \\ y \geq -4y < x+3y \leq -3x+3. \end{array} \right. \right\}$ 

Solution: The intersection of all the shaded regions forms the triangular region as pictured darkened below:



After graphing all three inequalities on the same set of axes, we determine that the intersection lies in the triangular region pictured.

# **Chapter 5**

# **Polynomials and Their Operations**

### **5.1** Rules of Exponents

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Simplify expressions using the rules of exponents.
- 2. Simplify expressions involving parentheses and exponents.

#### **Product, Quotient, and Power Rule for Exponents**

If a factor is repeated multiple times, then the product can be written in exponential form  $x_n$ . The positive integer **exponent** n indicates the number of times the **base** x is repeated as a factor.

$$x^n = \underbrace{x \cdot x \cdot \dots \cdot x}_{n \text{ times}}$$

For example,

$$5^4 = 5 \cdot 5 \cdot 5 \cdot 5$$

Next consider the product of 23 and 25,

$$2^{3} \cdot 2^{5} = \underbrace{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2}_{8 \text{ factors of } 2} = 2^{8}$$

Expanding the expression using the definition produces multiple factors of the base, which is quite cumbersome, particularly when n is large. For this reason, we will develop some useful rules to help us simplify expressions with exponents. In this example, notice that we could obtain the same result by adding the exponents.

$$2^3 \cdot 2^5 = 2^{3+5} = 2^8$$

In general, this describes the product rule for exponents. If m and n are positive integers, then



$$x^m \cdot x^n = x^{m+n}$$

In other words, when multiplying two expressions with the same base, add the exponents.

Example 1: Simplify: 105·1018.

Solution:

$$10^5 \cdot 10^{18} = 10^{5+18}$$
$$= 10^{23}$$

Answer: 1023

In the previous example, notice that we did not multiply the base 10 times itself. When applying the product rule, add the exponents and leave the base unchanged.

**Example 2:** Simplify:  $x_6 \cdot x_{12} \cdot x$ .

**Solution:** Recall that the variable x is assumed to have an exponent of 1:  $x=x_1$ .

$$x^{6} \cdot x^{12} \cdot x = x^{6} \cdot x^{12} \cdot x^{1}$$
$$= x^{6+12+1}$$
$$= x^{19}$$

Answer: x19

The base could be any algebraic expression.

**Example 3:** Simplify: (x+y)9(x+y)13.

**Solution:** Treat the expression (x+y) as the base.

$$(x + y)^9 (x + y)^{13} = (x + y)^{9+13}$$
  
=  $(x + y)^{22}$ 

Answer:  $(x+y)_{22}$ 

The commutative property of multiplication allows us to use the product rule for exponents to simplify factors of an algebraic expression.

Example 4: Simplify: 2x8y·3x4y7.

Solution: Multiply the coefficients and add the exponents of variable factors with the same base.

$$2x^{8}y \cdot 3x^{4}y^{7} = 2 \cdot 3 \cdot x^{8} \cdot x^{4} \cdot y^{1} \cdot y^{7}$$
 Commutative property
$$= 6 \cdot x^{8+4} \cdot y^{1+7}$$
 Power rule for exponents
$$= 6x^{12}y^{8}$$

Answer: 6x12y8

Next, we will develop a rule for division by first looking at the quotient of 27 and 23.

$$\frac{2^{7}}{2^{3}} = \frac{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2}{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2} = \frac{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2}{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2} = \frac{2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 2}{1} = 2^{4}$$
3 factors of 2

Here we can cancel factors after applying the definition of exponents. Notice that the same result can be obtained by subtracting the exponents.

$$\frac{2^7}{2^3} = 2^{7-3} = 2^4$$

This describes the quotient rule for exponents. If m and n are positive integers and  $x\neq 0$ , then

$$\frac{x^m}{x^n} = x^{m-n}$$

In other words, when you divide two expressions with the same base, subtract the exponents.

Example 5: Simplify: 12y154y7.

**Solution:** Divide the coefficients and subtract the exponents of the variable y.

$$\frac{12y^{15}}{4y^7} = \frac{12}{4} \cdot y^{15-7}$$
$$= 3y^8$$

Answer: 3y8

**Example 6:** Simplify: 20x10(x+5)610x9(x+5)2.

Solution:

$$\frac{20x^{10}(x+5)^6}{10x^9(x+5)^2} = \frac{20}{10} \cdot x^{10-9} \cdot (x+5)^{6-2}$$
$$= 2x^1(x+5)^4$$

Answer: 2x(x+5)4

Now raise 23 to the fourth power as follows:

After writing the base 23 as a factor four times, expand to obtain 12 factors of 2. We can obtain the same result by multiplying the exponents.

$$(2^3)^4 = 2^{3\cdot 4} = 2^{12}$$

In general, this describes the power rule for exponents. Given positive integers m and n, then

$$\left(x^{m}\right)^{n}=x^{m\cdot n}$$

In other words, when raising a power to a power, multiply the exponents.

Example 7: Simplify: (y6)7.

Solution:

$$(y^6)^7 = y^{6.7}$$
  
=  $y^{42}$ 

Answer: y42

To summarize, we have developed three very useful rules of exponents that are used extensively in algebra. If given positive

integers m and n, then

integers m and n, then	
Product rule:	$\chi_m \cdot \chi_n = \chi_{m+n}$
Quotient rule:	$x_m x_n = x_{m-n}, x \neq 0$
Power rule:	$(x_m)_n=x_{m\cdot n}$

**Try this!** Simplify: y5·(y4)6.

Answer: y29

#### **Power Rules for Products and Quotients**

Now we consider raising grouped products to a power. For example,

$$(xy)^{4} = xy \cdot xy \cdot xy \cdot xy$$

$$= x \cdot x \cdot x \cdot x \cdot y \cdot y \cdot y \cdot y$$

$$= x^{4} \cdot y^{4}$$
Commutative property



After expanding, we have four factors of the product xy. This is equivalent to raising each of the original factors to the fourth power. In general, this describes the power rule for a product. If n is a positive integer, then

$$(xy)^n = x^n y^n$$

Example 8: Simplify: (2ab)7.

**Solution:** We must apply the exponent 7 to all the factors, including the coefficient, 2.

$$(2ab)^{7} = 2^{7}a^{7}b^{7}$$
$$= 128a^{7}b^{7}$$

If a coefficient is raised to a relatively small power, then present the real number equivalent, as we did in this

example: 27=128.

Answer: 128*a*7*b*7

In many cases, the process of simplifying expressions involving exponents requires the use of several rules of exponents.

Example 9: Simplify: (3xy3)4.

Solution:

$$(3xy^{3})^{4} = 3^{4} \cdot x^{4} \cdot (y^{3})^{4}$$

$$= 3^{4} x^{4} y^{3.4}$$

$$= 81x^{4}y^{12}$$
Power rule for exponents

Answer: 81*x*4*y*12

**Example 10:** Simplify: (4*x*2*y*5*z*)3.

Solution:

$$(4x^{2}y^{5}z)^{3} = 4^{3} \cdot (x^{2})^{3} \cdot (y^{5})^{3} \cdot z^{3}$$
$$= 64x^{6}y^{15}z^{3}$$

Answer: 64x6y15z3

**Example 11:** Simplify:  $[5(x+y)^3]^3$ .

Solution:

$$\left[5(x+y)^{3}\right]^{3} = 5^{3} \cdot (x+y)^{9}$$
$$= 125(x+y)^{9}$$

Answer: 125(x+y)9

Next, consider a quotient raised to a power.

$$\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^4 = \frac{x}{y} \cdot \frac{x}{y} \cdot \frac{x}{y} \cdot \frac{x}{y}$$
$$= \frac{x \cdot x \cdot x \cdot x}{y \cdot y \cdot y \cdot y}$$
$$= \frac{x^4}{y^4}$$

Here we obtain four factors of the quotient, which is equivalent to the numerator and the denominator both raised to the fourth power. In general, this describes the power rule for a quotient. If n is a positive integer and  $y\neq 0$ , then

$$\left(\frac{x}{y}\right)^n = \frac{x^n}{y^n}$$

In other words, given a fraction raised to a power, we can apply that exponent to the numerator and the denominator. This rule requires that the denominator is nonzero. We will make this assumption for the remainder of the section.

#### Example 12: Simplify: (3ab)3.

Solution: First, apply the power rule for a quotient and then the power rule for a product.

$$\left(\frac{3a}{b}\right)^3 = \frac{(3a)^3}{b^3}$$
Power rule for a quotient
$$= \frac{3^3 \cdot a^3}{b^3}$$
Power rule for a product
$$= \frac{27a^3}{b^3}$$

Answer: 27a3b3

In practice, we often combine these two steps by applying the exponent to all factors in the numerator and the denominator.

#### Example 13: Simplify: (ab22c3)5.

**Solution:** Apply the exponent 5 to all of the factors in the numerator and the denominator.

$$\left(\frac{ab^2}{2c^3}\right)^5 = \frac{a^5 (b^2)^5}{2^5 (c^3)^5}$$
$$= \frac{a^5 b^{10}}{32c^{15}}$$

Answer: a5b1032c15

**Example 14:** Simplify: (5x5(2x-1)43y7)2.

Solution:

$$\left(\frac{5x^{5}(2x-1)^{4}}{3y^{7}}\right)^{2} = \frac{\left(5x^{5}(2x-1)^{4}\right)^{2}}{(3y^{7})^{2}}$$
Power rule for a quotient
$$= \frac{5^{2} \cdot (x^{5})^{2} \cdot \left[(2x-1)^{4}\right]^{2}}{3^{2} \cdot (y^{7})^{2}}$$
Power rule for products
$$= \frac{25x^{10}(2x-1)^{8}}{9y^{14}}$$
Power rule for exponents

Answer: 25x10(2x-1)89y14

It is a good practice to simplify within parentheses before using the power rules; this is consistent with the order of operations.

**Example 15:** Simplify: (-2*x*3*y*4*zxy*2)4.

Solution:


$$\left(\frac{-2x^3y^4z}{xy^2}\right)^4 = \left(-2 \cdot x^{3-1} \cdot y^{4-2} \cdot z\right)^4$$

$$= \left(-2 \cdot x^2 \cdot y^2 \cdot z\right)^4$$
Simplify within the parentheses first.
$$= \left(-2 \cdot x^2 \cdot y^2 \cdot z\right)^4$$
Apply the power rule for a product.
$$= \left(-2\right)^4 \cdot \left(x^2\right)^4 \cdot \left(y^2\right)^4 \cdot z^4$$
Apply the power rule for exponents.
$$= 16x^8 \ y^8 \ z^4$$

Answer: 16x8y8z4

To summarize, we have developed two new rules that are useful when grouping symbols are used in conjunction with

exponents. If given a positive integer n, where y is a nonzero number, then

**Try this!** Simplify: (4x2(x-y)33yz5)3.

Answer: 64x6(x-y)927y3z15

## Zero as an Exponent

Using the quotient rule for exponents, we can define what it means to have 0 as an exponent. Consider the following calculation:

$$1 = \frac{8}{8} = \frac{2^3}{2^3} = 2^{3-3} = 2^0$$

Eight divided by 8 is clearly equal to 1, and when the quotient rule for exponents is applied, we see that a 0 exponent results.

This leads us to the definition of zero as an exponent, where  $x\neq 0$ :

$$x^{0} = 1$$

It is important to note that 00 is undefined. If the base is negative, then the result is still +1. In other words, any nonzero base raised to the 0 power is defined to be 1. In the following examples, assume all variables are nonzero.

Example 16: Simplify:

a. (-5)0

b. -50

Solution:

a. Any nonzero quantity raised to the 0 power is equal to 1.

$$\left(-5\right)^{0}=1$$

b. In the example -50, the base is 5, not -5.

$$-5^0 = -1 \cdot 5^0$$
$$= -1 \cdot 1$$
$$= -1$$

Answers: a. 1; b. −1

**Example 17:** Simplify: (5*x*3*y*0*z*2)2.

 $\textbf{Solution:} \ It is good \ practice \ to \ simplify \ within \ the \ parentheses \ first.$ 

$$(5x^{3}y^{0}z^{2})^{2} = (5x^{3} \cdot 1 \cdot z^{2})^{2}$$
$$= (5x^{3}z^{2})^{2}$$
$$= 5^{2}x^{3 \cdot 2}z^{2 \cdot 2}$$
$$= 25x^{6}z^{4}$$

Answer: 25x6z4

**Example 18:** Simplify: (-8*a*10*b*55*c*12*d*14)0.

Solution:

$$\left(-\frac{8a^{10}b^5}{5c^{12}d^{14}}\right)^0 = 1$$

Answer: 1

**Try this!** Simplify:  $5x_0$  and  $(5x)_0$ .

Answer:  $5x_0=5$  and  $(5x)_0=1$ 

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

• The rules of exponents allow you to simplify expressions involving exponents.

- When multiplying two quantities with the same base, add exponents:  $x_m \cdot x_n = x_{m+n}$ .
- When dividing two quantities with the same base, subtract exponents:  $x_{mxn}=x_{m-n}$ .
- When raising powers to powers, multiply exponents:  $(xm)n=xm\cdot n$ .

# **5.2** Introduction to Polynomials

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Identify a polynomial and determine its degree.
- 2. Evaluate a polynomial for given values of the variables.
- 3. Evaluate a polynomial using function notation.

## **Definitions**

A polynomial is a special algebraic expression with terms that consist of real number coefficients and variable factors with whole number exponents.

# Examples of polynomials:

$$3x^2$$
  $7xy + 5$   $\frac{3}{2}x^3 + 3x^2 - \frac{1}{2}x + 1$   $6x^2y - 4xy^3 - 4xy^3 + 7$ 

Polynomials do not have variables in the denominator of any term.

# Examples that are not polynomials:

$$\frac{2x^2}{y} \qquad 5\sqrt{x} + 5 \qquad 5x^2 + 3x^{-2} + 7 \qquad \frac{2}{x} - \frac{5}{y} = 3$$

The degree of a term in a polynomial is defined to be the exponent of the variable, or if there is more than one variable in the term, the degree is the sum of their exponents. Recall that  $x_0=1$ ; any constant term can be written as a product of  $x_0$  and itself.

Hence the degree of a constant term is 0.

Term	Degree
3 <i>x</i> 2	2
6 <i>x</i> 2 <i>y</i>	2+1=3
7 <i>a</i> 2 <i>b</i> 3	2+3=5
	0
8	, since 8=8x0
2 <i>x</i>	1, since <i>x</i> = <i>x</i> 1

The degree of a polynomial is the largest degree of all of its terms.

Polynomial	Degree	
4x5-3x3+2x-1	5	
6x2y-5xy3+7		
	4, because 5 <i>xy</i> <sup>3</sup> has degree 4.	

Polynomial	Degree
12x+54	1, because <i>x</i> = <i>x</i> 1

We classify polynomials by the number of terms and the degree as follows:

Expression	Classification	Degree
5 <i>x</i> 7	Monomial (one term)	7
8 <i>x</i> 6-1	Binomial (two terms)	6
-3 <i>x</i> 2+ <i>x</i> -1		
5x3-2x2+3x-6	Trinomial (three terms)	2
	Polynomial (many terms)	3

In this text, we will call polynomials with four or more terms simply polynomials.

**Example 1:** Classify and state the degree:  $7x_2-4x_5-1$ .

Solution: Here there are three terms. The highest variable exponent is 5. Therefore, this is a trinomial of degree 5.

Answer: Trinomial; degree 5

Example 2: Classify and state the degree: 12a5bc3.

**Solution:** Since the expression consists of only multiplication, it is one term, a monomial. The variable part can be written as *asb1c3*; hence its degree is 5+1+3=9.

Answer: Monomial; degree 9

Example 3: Classify and state the degree: 4x2y-6xy4+5x3y3+4.

**Solution:** The term 4x2y has degree 3; -6xy4 has degree 5; 5x3y3 has degree 6; and the constant term 4 has degree 0. Therefore, the polynomial has 4 terms with degree 6.

Answer: Polynomial; degree 6

Of particular interest are polynomials with one variable, where each term is of the form  $a_nx_n$ . Here  $a_n$  is any real number and n is any whole number. Such polynomials have the standard form

$$a_n x^n + a_{n-1} x^{n-1} + \dots + a_1 x + a_0$$

Typically, we arrange terms of polynomials in descending order based on the degree of each term. The leading coefficient is the coefficient of the variable with the highest power, in this case,  $a_n$ .

Example 4: Write in standard form: 3x-4x+5x+7-2x+4.

Solution: Since terms are separated by addition, write the following:

$$3x - 4x^{2} + 5x^{3} + 7 - 2x^{4}$$
$$= 3x + (-4x^{2}) + 5x^{3} + 7 + (-2x^{4})$$

In this form, we can see that the subtraction in the original corresponds to negative coefficients. Because addition is commutative, we can write the terms in descending order based on the degree of each term as follows:

$$= (-2x^4) + 5x^3 + (-4x^2) + 3x + 7$$
$$= -2x^4 + 5x^3 - 4x^2 + 3x + 7$$

Answer:  $-2x_4+5x_3-4x_2+3x+7$ 

We can further classify polynomials with one variable by their degree as follows:

Polynomial	Name	
5	Constant (degree 0)	
2 <i>x</i> +1		
	Linear (degree 1)	
3x2+5x-3		
	Quadratic (degree 2)	
x3+x2+x+1		
	Cubic (degree 3)	
7 <i>x</i> 4+3 <i>x</i> 3-7 <i>x</i> +8		
	Fourth-degree polynomial	

In this text, we call any polynomial of degree  $n \ge 4$  an *n*th-degree polynomial. In other words, if the degree is 4, we call the polynomial a fourth-degree polynomial. If the degree is 5, we call it a fifth-degree polynomial, and so on.

# **Evaluating Polynomials**

Given the values for the variables in a polynomial, we can substitute and simplify using the order of operations.

**Example 5:** Evaluate: 3x-1, where x=-32.

Solution: First, replace the variable with parentheses and then substitute the given value.

$$3x-1=3()-1$$

$$=3(-\frac{3}{2})-1$$

$$=-\frac{9}{2}-1$$

$$=-\frac{9}{2}-\frac{2}{2}$$

$$=-\frac{11}{2}$$

Answer: −11/2

**Example 6:** Evaluate: 3x2+2x-1, where x=-1.

Solution:

$$3x^{2} + 2x - 1 = 3 ()^{2} + 2 () -1$$

$$= 3(-1)^{2} + 2 (-1) - 1$$

$$= 3 \cdot 1 - 2 - 1$$

$$= 3 - 2 - 1$$

$$= 0$$

Answer: 0

**Example 7:** Evaluate: -2a2b+ab2-7, where a=3 and b=-2.

Solution:

$$-2a^{2}b + ab^{2} - 7 = -2 ()^{2} () + () ()^{2} - 7$$

$$= -2 (3)^{2} (-2) + (3) (-2)^{2} - 7$$


$$= -2 \cdot 9 (-2) + 3 \cdot 4 - 7$$

$$= 36 + 12 - 7$$

$$= 41$$

Answer: 41

**Example 8:** The volume of a sphere in cubic units is given by the formula  $V=43\pi r^3$ , where r is the radius. Calculate the volume of a sphere with radius r=32meters.



Solution:

$$V = \frac{4}{3}\pi r^3$$

$$= \frac{4}{3}\pi \left(\frac{3}{2}\right)^3$$

$$= \frac{4}{3}\pi \frac{3^3}{2^3}$$

$$= \frac{\cancel{4}}{\cancel{3}}\pi \frac{\cancel{27}}{\cancel{8}}$$

$$= \frac{9}{2}\pi$$

Answer: 92π cubic meters

**Try this!** Evaluate:  $x_3-x_2+4x-2$ , where x=-3.

Answer: -50

# **Polynomial Functions**

Polynomial functions with one variable are functions that can be written in the form

$$f(x) = a_n x^n + a_{n-1} x^{n-1} + \dots + a_0,$$

where  $a_n$  is any real number and n is any whole number. Some examples of the different classes of polynomial functions are

listed below:

Polynomial function	Name
f(x)=5	Constant function (degree 0)
f(x) = -2x + 1	Linear function (degree 1)
$f(x)=5x_2+4x-3$	Quadratic function (degree 2)
f(x)=x3-1	Cubic function (degree 3)

Polynomial function	Name
f(x)=4x5+3x4-7	Polynomial function

Since there are no restrictions on the values for x, the domain of any polynomial function consists of all real numbers.

**Example 9:** Calculate: f(5), given  $f(x) = -2x^2 + 5x + 10$ .

**Solution:** Recall that the function notation f(5) indicates we should evaluate the function when x=5. Replace every instance of the variable x with the value 5.

$$f(5) = -2(5)^{2} + 5(5) + 10$$
$$= -2 \cdot 25 + 25 + 10$$
$$= -50 + 25 + 10$$
$$= -15$$

Answer: f(5)=-15

**Example 10:** Calculate: f(-1), given  $f(x)=-x_3+2x_2-4x+1$ .

**Solution:** Replace the variable x with -1.

$$f(-1) = -(-1)^{3} + 2(-1)^{2} - 4(-1) + 1$$

$$= -(-1) + 2 \cdot 1 + 4 + 1$$

$$= 1 + 2 + 4 + 1$$

$$= 8$$

Answer: f(-1)=8

**Try this!** Given  $g(x)=x^3-2x^2-x-4$ , calculate g(-1).

Answer: g(-1)=-6

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Polynomials are special algebraic expressions where the terms are the products of real numbers and variables with whole number exponents.
- The degree of a polynomial with one variable is the largest exponent of the variable found in any term.

# **5.3** Adding and Subtracting Polynomials

# LEARNING OBJECTIVES

1. Add polynomials.

- 2. Subtract polynomials.

## **Adding Polynomials**

Recall that we combine like terms, or terms with the same variable part, as a means to simplify expressions. To do this, add the coefficients of the terms to obtain a single term with the same variable part. For example,

$$5x^2 + 8x^2 = 13x^2$$

Notice that the variable part, x2, does not change. This, in addition to the commutative and associative properties of addition, allows us to add polynomials.

**Example 1:** Add: 3x+(4x-5).

**Solution:** The property +(a+b)=a+b, which was derived using the distributive property, allows us to remove the parentheses so that we can add like terms.

$$3x + (4x - 5) = 3x + 4x - 5$$
$$= 7x - 5$$

Answer: 7x-5

**Example 2:** Add: (3x2+3x+5)+(2x2-x-2).

Solution: Remove the parentheses and then combine like terms.

$$(3x^{2} + 3x + 5) + (2x^{2} - x - 2) = 3x^{2} + 3x + 5 + 2x^{2} - x - 2$$

$$= 3x^{2} + 3x + 5 + 2x^{2} - x - 2$$

$$= 3x^{2} + 3x + 5 + 2x^{2} - x - 2$$

$$= 5x^{2} + 2x + 3$$

Answer:  $5x_2+2x+3$ 

**Example 3:** Add: (-5x2y-2xy2+7xy)+(4x2y+7xy2-3xy).

Solution: Remember that the variable parts have to be exactly the same before we can add the coefficients.

$$(-5x^{2}y - 2xy^{2} + 7xy) + (4x^{2}y + 7xy^{2} - 3xy)$$

$$= -5x^{2}y - 2xy^{2} + 7xy + 4x^{2}y + 7xy^{2} - 3xy$$

$$= -x^{2}y + 5xy^{2} + 4xy$$

Answer: -x2y+5xy2+4xy

It is common practice to present the terms of the simplified polynomial expression in descending order based on their degree. In other words, we typically present polynomials in standard form, with terms in order from highest to lowest degree.

**Example 4:** Add: (*a*-4*a*3+*a*5-8)+(-9*a*5+*a*4-7*a*+5+*a*3).

Solution:

$$(a-4a^3+a^5-8)+(-9a^5+a^4-7a+5+a^3)$$

$$=a-4a^3+a^5-8-9a^5+a^4-7a+5+a^3$$

$$=-8a^5+a^4-3a^3-6a-3$$

Answer: -8a5+a4-3a3-6a-3

**Try this!** Add:  $(6-5x_3+x_2-x)+(x_2+x+6x_3-1)$ .

Answer:  $x_3+2x_2+5$ 

### **Subtracting Polynomials**

When subtracting polynomials, we see that the parentheses become very important. Recall that the distributive property allowed us to derive the following:

$$-(a+b) = -a-b$$

In other words, when subtracting an algebraic expression, we remove the parentheses by subtracting each term.

**Example 5:** Subtract: 10x-(3x+5).

Solution: Subtract each term within the parentheses and then combine like terms.

$$10x - (3x + 5) = 10x - 3x - 5$$
$$= 7x - 5$$

Answer: 7x-5

Subtracting a quantity is equivalent to multiplying it by -1.

**Example 6:** Subtract: (3x2+3x+5)-(2x2-x-2).

Solution: Distribute the -1, remove the parentheses, and then combine like terms.

$$(3x^{2} + 3x + 5) - (2x^{2} - x - 2)$$

$$= 3x^{2} + 3x + 5 - 2x^{2} + x + 2$$

$$= x^{2} + 4x + 7$$

Answer:  $x_2+4x+7$ 

Multiplying the terms of a polynomial by -1 changes all the signs.

**Example 7:** Subtract:  $(-5x_3-2x_2+7)-(4x_3+7x_2-3x+2)$ .

Solution: Distribute the −1, remove the parentheses, and then combine like terms.

$$(-5x^3 - 2x^2 + 7) - (4x^3 + 7x^2 - 3x + 2)$$

$$= -5x^3 - 2x^2 + 7 - 4x^3 - 7x^2 + 3x - 2$$

$$= -9x^3 - 9x^2 + 3x + 5$$

Answer:  $-9x_3-9x_2+3x+5$ 

**Example 8:** Subtract 6x2-3x-1 from 2x2+5x-2.

**Solution:** Since subtraction is not commutative, we must take care to set up the difference correctly. First, write the quantity  $(2x^2+5x-2)$ ; from this, subtract the quantity  $(6x^2-3x-1)$ .

$$(2x^{2} + 5x - 2) - (6x^{2} - 3x - 1)$$

$$= 2x^{2} + 5x - 2 - 6x^{2} + 3x + 1$$

$$= -4x^{2} + 8x - 1$$

Answer:  $-4x_2+8x-1$ 

**Example 9:** Simplify: (2x2-3x+5)-(x2-3x+1)+(5x2-4x-8).

Solution: Apply the distributive property, remove the parentheses, and then combine like terms.

$$(2x^{2}-3x+5)-(x^{2}-3x+1)+(5x^{2}-4x-8)$$

$$=2x^{2}-3x+5-x^{2}+3x-1+5x^{2}-4x-8$$

$$=6x^{2}-4x-4$$

Answer:  $6x_2-4x-4$ 

**Try this!** Subtract: (8*x*2*y*-5*xy*2+6)-(*x*2*y*+2*xy*2-1).

Answer: 7x2y-7xy2+7

### **Adding and Subtracting Polynomial Functions**

We use function notation to indicate addition and subtraction of functions as follows:

Addition of functions:	(f+g)(x)=f(x)+g(x)
Subtraction of functions:	(f-g)(x)=f(x)-g(x)

When using function notation, be careful to group the entire function and add or subtract accordingly.

**Example 10:** Calculate: (f+g)(x), given  $f(x)=-x^2-3x+5$  and  $g(x)=3x^2+2x+1$ .

**Solution:** The notation (f+g)(x) indicates that you should add the functions f(x)+g(x) and collect like terms.

$$f(x) + g(x) = (-x^2 - 3x + 5) + (3x^2 + 2x + 1)$$
$$= -x^2 - 3x + 5 + 3x^2 + 2x + 1$$
$$= 2x^2 - x + 6$$

Answer:  $(f+g)(x)=2x_2-x+6$ 

**Example 11:** Calculate: (f-g)(x), given f(x)=2x-3 and g(x)=-2x+2x+5.

**Solution:** The notation (f-g)(x) indicates that you should subtract the functions f(x)-g(x):

$$f(x) - g(x) = (2x-3) - (-2x^2 + 2x + 5)$$
$$= 2x-3+2x^2-2x-5$$
$$= 2x^2-8$$

Answer:  $(f-g)(x)=2x_2-8$ 

We may be asked to evaluate the sum or difference of two functions. We have the option to first find the sum or difference and use the resulting function to evaluate for the given variable, or to first evaluate each function and then find the sum or difference.

**Example 12:** Calculate: (f-g)(5), given  $f(x)=x_2+x_7$  and g(x)=4x+10.

**Solution:** First, find (f-g)(x)=f(x)-g(x).

$$f(x) - g(x) = (x^2 + x - 7) - (4x + 10)$$
$$= x^2 + x - 7 - 4x - 10$$
$$= x^2 - 3x - 17$$

Therefore,

$$(f-g)(x) = x^2 - 3x - 17$$

Next, substitute 5 for the variable x.

$$(f-g)(5) = (5)^2 - 3(5) - 17$$
  
= 25-15-17  
= -7

Answer: (f-g)(5)=-7

**Alternate Solution:** Since (f-g)(5)=f(5)-g(5), we can find f(5) and g(5) and then subtract the results.

$$f(x) = x^{2} + x - 7$$

$$f(5) = (5)^{2} + (5) - 7$$

$$= 25 + 5 - 7$$

$$= 23$$

$$g(x) = 4x + 10$$

$$g(5) = 4(5) + 10$$

$$= 20 + 10$$

$$= 30$$

Therefore, we have

$$(f-g)(5) = f(5) - g(5)$$
  
= 23-30  
= -7

Answer: (f-g)(5)=-7







# **5.4** Multiplying Polynomials

### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Multiply a polynomial by a monomial.
- 2. Multiply a polynomial by a binomial.
- 3. Multiply a polynomial by any size polynomial.
- 4. Recognize and calculate special products.
- 5. Multiply polynomial functions.

### Multiplying by a Monomial

Recall the product rule for exponents: if m and n are positive integers, then

$$x^m \cdot x^n = x^{m+n}$$



In other words, when multiplying two expressions with the same base, add the exponents. This rule applies when multiplying a monomial by a monomial. To find the product of monomials, multiply the coefficients and add the exponents of variable factors with the same base. For example,

$$3x \cdot 5x^2 = 3 \cdot 5 \cdot x^1 \cdot x^2$$
 Commutative property  
=  $15x^{1+2}$  Product rule for exponents  
=  $15x^3$ 

To multiply a polynomial by a monomial, apply the distributive property and then simplify each term.

**Example 1:** Multiply: -5x(4x-2).

**Solution:** In this case, multiply the monomial, -5x, by the binomial, 4x-2. Apply the distributive property and then simplify.

$$-5x(4x-2)$$

$$= (-5x) \cdot 4x + (-5x) \cdot (-2)$$

$$= -20x^2 + 10x$$

Answer:  $-20x_2+10x$ 

**Example 2:** Multiply:  $2x^2(3x^2-5x+1)$ .

Solution: Apply the distributive property and then simplify.

$$2x^{2}(3x^{2} - 5x + 1)$$

$$= 2x^{2} \cdot 3x^{2} - 2x^{2} \cdot 5x + 2x^{2} \cdot 1$$

$$= 6x^{4} - 10x^{3} + 2x^{2}$$

Answer: 6x4-10x3+2x2

**Example 3:** Multiply: -3ab2(a2b3+2a3b-6ab-4).

Solution:

$$-3ab^{2} (a^{2}b^{3} + 2a^{3}b - 6ab - 4)$$

$$= (-3ab^{2}) \cdot a^{2}b^{3} + (-3ab^{2}) \cdot 2a^{3}b - (-3ab^{2}) \cdot 6ab - (-3ab^{2}) \cdot 4$$

$$= -3a^{3}b^{5} - 6a^{4}b^{3} + 18a^{2}b^{3} + 12ab^{2}$$

Answer: -3a3b5-6a4b3+18a2b3+12ab2

To summarize, multiplying a polynomial by a monomial involves the distributive property and the product rule for exponents. Multiply all of the terms of the polynomial by the monomial. For each term, multiply the coefficients and add exponents of variables where the bases are the same.

**Try this!** Multiply: -5x2y(2xy2-3xy+6x2y-1).

Answer:  $-10x_3y_3+15x_3y_2-30x_4y_2+5x_2y$ 

### Multiplying by a Binomial

In the same way that we used the distributive property to find the product of a monomial and a binomial, we will use it to find the product of two binomials.

$$(a+b) (c+d) = (a+b) \cdot c + (a+b) \cdot d$$
$$= ac + bc + ad + bd$$
$$= ac + ad + bc + bd$$

Here we apply the distributive property multiple times to produce the final result. This same result is obtained in one step if we apply the distributive property to a and b separately as follows:

$$(a+b)(c+d) = ac + ad + bc + bd$$

This is often called the FOIL method. We add the products of the first terms of each binomial ac, the outer terms ad, the inner terms bc, and finally the last terms bd. This mnemonic device only works for products of binomials; hence it is best to just remember that the distributive property applies.

**Example 4:** Multiply: (2x+3)(5x-2).

**Solution:** Distribute 2x and then distribute 3.

$$(2x+3)(5x-2) = 2x \cdot 5x - 2x \cdot 2 + 3 \cdot 5x - 3 \cdot 2$$
$$= 10x^2 - 4x + 15x - 6$$

Simplify by combining like terms.

$$=10x^2+11x-6$$

Answer:  $10x_2+11x-6$ 

**Example 5:** Multiply: (12*x*-14)(12*x*+14).

**Solution:** Distribute 12x and then distribute -14.

$$\left(\frac{1}{2}x - \frac{1}{4}\right)\left(\frac{1}{2}x + \frac{1}{4}\right) = \frac{1}{2}x \cdot \frac{1}{2}x + \frac{1}{2}x \cdot \frac{1}{4} + \left(-\frac{1}{4}\right) \cdot \frac{1}{2}x + \left(-\frac{1}{4}\right) \cdot \frac{1}{4}$$

$$= \frac{1}{4}x^2 + \frac{1}{8}x - \frac{1}{8}x - \frac{1}{16}$$

$$= \frac{1}{4}x^2 - \frac{1}{16}$$

Answer: 14x2-116

**Example 6:** Multiply: (3y2-1)(2y+1).

Solution:

$$(3y^{2}-1)(2y+1) = 3y^{2} \cdot 2y + 3y^{2} \cdot 1 + (-1) \cdot 2y + (-1) \cdot 1$$
$$= 6y^{3} + 3y^{2} - 2y - 1$$

Answer: 6y3+3y2-2y-1



After applying the distributive property, combine any like terms.

**Example 7:** Multiply:  $(x_2-5)(3x_2-2x+2)$ .

**Solution:** After multiplying each term of the trinomial by  $x_2$  and -5, simplify.

$$(x^{2} - 5)(3x^{2} - 2x + 2) = x^{2} \cdot 3x^{2} - x^{2} \cdot 2x + x^{2} \cdot 2 + (-5)3x^{2} - (-5)2x + (-5)2$$

$$= 3x^{4} - 2x^{3} + 2x^{2} - 15x^{2} + 10x - 10$$

$$= 3x^{4} - 2x^{3} - 13x^{2} + 10x - 10$$

Answer:  $3x_4-2x_3-13x_2+10x-10$ 

**Example 8:** Multiply: (2x-1)3.

Solution: Perform one product at a time.

$$(2x-1)^{3} = (2x-1)\underbrace{(2x-1)(2x-1)}_{multiply first}$$

$$= (2x-1)\underbrace{(4x^{2}-2x-2x+1)}_{simplify}$$

$$= \underbrace{(2x-1)(4x^{2}-4x+1)}_{multiply second}$$

$$= 8x^{3}-8x^{2}+2x-4x^{2}+4x-1$$

$$= 8x^{3}-12x^{2}+6x-1$$

Answer:  $8x_3-12x_2+6x-1$ 

At this point, it is worth pointing out a common mistake:

$$(2x-1)^3 \neq (2x)^3 - (1)^3$$

The confusion comes from the product to a power rule of exponents, where we apply the power to all factors. Since there are two terms within the parentheses, that rule does not apply. Care should be taken to understand what is different in the following two examples:

$$(xy)^{2} = x^{2}y^{2}$$

$$(x+y)^{2} \neq x^{2} + y^{2}$$

**Try this!** Multiply: (2x-3)(7x2-5x+4).

Answer:  $14x_3-31x_2+23x-12$ 

### **Product of Polynomials**

When multiplying polynomials, we apply the distributive property many times. Multiply all of the terms of each polynomial and then combine like terms.

**Example 9:** Multiply: (2x2+x-3)(x2-2x+5).

Solution: Multiply each term of the first trinomial by each term of the second trinomial and then combine like terms.

$$(2x^{2} + x - 3)(x^{2} - 2x + 5) = 2x^{4} - 4x^{3} + 10x^{2}$$

$$+ x^{3} - 2x^{2} + 5x$$

$$-3x^{2} + 6x - 15$$

$$= 2x^{4} - 3x^{3} + 5x^{2} + 11x - 15$$

Aligning like terms in columns, as we have here, aids in the simplification process.

Answer: 2x4-3x3+5x2+11x-15

Notice that when multiplying a trinomial by a trinomial, we obtain nine terms before simplifying. In fact, when multiplying an n-term polynomial by an m-term polynomial, we will obtain  $n \times m$  terms.

In the previous example, we were asked to multiply and found that

$$(2x^2 + x - 3)(x^2 - 2x + 5) = 2x^4 - 3x^3 + 5x^2 + 11x - 15$$

Because it is easy to make a small calculation error, it is a good practice to trace through the steps mentally to verify that the operations were performed correctly. Alternatively, we can check by evaluating any value for x in both expressions to verify that the results are the same. Here we choose x = 2:

$$(2x^{2} + x - 3)(x^{2} - 2x + 5) = (2(2)^{2} + (2) - 3)((2)^{2} - 2(2) + 5)$$

$$= (8 + 2 - 3)(4 - 4 + 5)$$

$$= (7)(5)$$

$$= 35$$

$$2x^{4} - 3x^{3} + 5x^{2} + 11x - 15 = 2(2)^{4} - 3(2)^{3} + 5(2)^{2} + 11(2) - 15$$

$$= 2 \cdot 16 - 3 \cdot 8 + 5 \cdot 4 + 22 - 15$$

$$= 32 - 24 + 20 + 22 - 15$$

$$= 35$$

Because the results could coincidentally be the same, a check by evaluating does not necessarily prove that we have multiplied correctly. However, after verifying a few values, we can be fairly confident that the product is correct.

**Try this!** Multiply: (x2-2x-3)2.

Answer:  $x_4-4x_3-2x_2+12x+9$ 

#### **Special Products**

In this section, the goal is to recognize certain special products that occur often in our study of algebra. We will develop three formulas that will be very useful as we move along. The three should be memorized. We begin by considering the following two calculations:

$$(a+b)^{2} = (a+b)(a+b)$$

$$= a^{2} + ab + ba + b^{2}$$

$$= a^{2} + ab + ab + b^{2}$$

$$= a^{2} + 2ab + b^{2}$$

$$= a^{2} - 2ab + b^{2}$$

$$= a^{2} - 2ab + b^{2}$$

This leads us to two formulas that describe perfect square trinomials:



$$(a+b)^2 = a^2 + 2ab + b^2$$
  
 $(a-b)^2 = a^2 - 2ab + b^2$ 

We can use these formulas to quickly square a binomial.

**Example 10:** Multiply: (3x+5)2.

**Solution:** Here a=3x and b=5. Apply the formula:

$$(a+b)^{2} = a^{2} + 2ab + b^{2}$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$(3x+5)^{2} = (3x)^{2} + 2 \cdot (3x)(5) + (5)^{2}$$

$$= 9x^{2} + 30x + 25$$

Answer:  $9x_2+30x+25$ 

This process should become routine enough to be performed mentally.

**Example 11:** Multiply: (x-4)2.

**Solution:** Here a=x and b=4. Apply the appropriate formula as follows:

$$(a-b)^{2} = a^{2} - 2 a b + b^{2}$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$(x-4)^{2} = (x)^{2} - 2(x)(4) + (4)^{2}$$

$$= x^{2} - 8x + 16$$

Answer:  $x_2-8x+16$ 

Our third special product follows:

$$(a+b)(a-b) = a2 - ab + ba - b2$$
$$= a2 - ab + ab - b2$$
$$= a2 - b2$$

This product is called difference of squares:

$$(a+b)(a-b) = a^2 - b^2$$

The binomials (a+b) and (a-b) are called conjugate binomials. Therefore, when conjugate binomials are multiplied, the middle term eliminates, and the product is itself a binomial.

**Example 12:** Multiply: (7x+4)(7x-4).

Solution:

$$(7x+4)(7x-4) = (7x)^2 - 28x + 28x - 4^2$$
$$= 49x^2 - 16$$

Answer: 49x2-16

**Try this!** Multiply: (-5x+2)2.

Answer: 25x2-20x+4

### **Multiplying Polynomial Functions**

We use function notation to indicate multiplication as follows:

Multiplication of functions:  $(f \cdot g)(x) = f(x) \cdot g(x)$ 

**Example 13:** Calculate:  $(f \cdot g)(x)$ , given  $f(x)=5x^2$  and  $g(x)=-x^2+2x-3$ .

**Solution:** Multiply all terms of the trinomial by the monomial function f(x).



$$(f \cdot g)(x) = f(x) \cdot g(x)$$
$$= 5x^{2} \cdot (-x^{2} + 2x - 3)$$
$$= -5x^{4} + 10x^{3} - 15x^{2}$$

Answer:  $(f \cdot g)(x) = -5x4 + 10x3 - 15x2$ 

**Example 14:** Calculate:  $(f \cdot g)(-1)$ , given f(x) = -x + 3 and g(x) = 4x - 3x + 6.

**Solution:** First, determine  $(f \cdot g)(x)$ .

$$(f \cdot g)(x) = f(x) \cdot g(x)$$

$$= (-x+3)(4x^2 - 3x + 6)$$

$$= -4x^3 + 3x^2 - 6x + 12x^2 - 9x + 18$$

$$= -4x^3 + 15x^2 - 15x + 18$$

We have

$$(f \cdot g)(x) = -4x^3 + 15x^2 - 15x + 18$$

Next, substitute -1 for the variable x.

$$(f \cdot g) (-1) = -4 (-1)^{3} + 15 (-1)^{2} - 15 (-1) + 18$$
$$= -4 \cdot (-1) + 15 \cdot 1 + 15 + 18$$
$$= 4 + 15 + 15 + 18$$
$$= 52$$

Answer:  $(f \cdot g)(-1) = 52$ 

Because  $(f \cdot g)(-1) = f(-1) \cdot g(-1)$ , we could alternatively calculate f(-1) and g(-1) separately and then multiply the results (try this as an exercise). However, if we were asked to evaluate multiple values for the function  $(f \cdot g)(x)$ , it would be best to first determine the general form, as we have in the previous example.

### KEY TAKEAWAYS

- To multiply a polynomial by a monomial, apply the distributive property and then simplify each of the resulting terms.
- To multiply polynomials, multiply each term in the first polynomial with each term in the second polynomial. Then combine like terms.
- The product of an n-term polynomial and an m-term polynomial results in an  $m \times n$  term polynomial before like terms are combined.
- Check results by evaluating values in the original expression and in your answer to verify that the results are the same.
- Use the formulas for special products to quickly multiply binomials that occur often in algebra.





# **5.5** Dividing Polynomials

### **Dividing by a Monomial**

Recall the quotient rule for exponents: if x is nonzero and m and n are positive integers, then

$$\frac{x^m}{x^n} = x^{m-n}$$

In other words, when dividing two expressions with the same base, subtract the exponents. This rule applies when dividing a monomial by a monomial. In this section, we will assume that all variables in the denominator are nonzero.

Example 1: Divide: 28y37y.

Solution: Divide the coefficients and subtract the exponents of the variable y.

$$\frac{28y^3}{7y} = \frac{28}{7}y^{3-1}$$
$$= 4y^2$$

Answer: 4y2

**Example 2:** Divide: 24x7y58x3y2.

Solution: Divide the coefficients and apply the quotient rule by subtracting the exponents of the like bases.

$$\frac{24x^{7}y^{5}}{8x^{3}y^{2}} = \frac{24}{8}x^{7-3}y^{5-2}$$
$$= 3x^{4}y^{3}$$

Answer: 3x4y3

When dividing a polynomial by a monomial, we may treat the monomial as a common denominator and break up the fraction using the following property:

$$\frac{a+b}{c} = \frac{a}{c} + \frac{b}{c}$$

Applying this property results in terms that can be treated as quotients of monomials.

**Example 3:** Divide: -5x4+25x3-15x25x2.

**Solution:** Break up the fraction by dividing each term in the numerator by the monomial in the denominator and then simplify each term.

$$\frac{-5x^4 + 25x^3 - 15x^2}{5x^2} = -\frac{5x^4}{5x^2} + \frac{25x^3}{5x^2} - \frac{15x^2}{5x^2}$$
$$= -\frac{5}{5}x^{4-2} + \frac{25}{5}x^{3-2} - \frac{15}{5}x^{2-2}$$
$$= -1x^2 + 5x^1 - 3x^0$$
$$= -x^2 + 5x - 3 \cdot 1$$

Answer:  $-x_2+5x-3$ 

Check your division by multiplying the answer, the quotient, by the monomial in the denominator, the divisor, to see if you obtain the original numerator, the dividend.

$$\frac{dividend}{divisor} = quotient$$

$$or$$

$$dividend = divisor \cdot quotient$$

$$5x^{2} \cdot (-x^{2} + 5x - 3) = 5x^{2} \cdot (-x^{2}) + 5x^{2} \cdot 5x - 5x^{2} \cdot 3$$
$$= -5x^{4} + 25x^{3} - 15x^{2} \checkmark$$

**Example 4:** Divide: 9a4b-7a3b2+3a2b-3a2b.

Solution:

$$\frac{9a^4b - 7a^3b^2 + 3a^2b}{-3a^2b} = \frac{9a^4b}{-3a^2b} - \frac{7a^3b^2}{-3a^2b} + \frac{3a^2b}{-3a^2b}$$

$$= -\frac{9}{3}a^{4-2}b^{1-1} + \frac{7}{3}a^{3-2}b^{2-1} - \frac{3}{3}a^{2-2}b^{1-1}$$

$$= -3a^2b^0 + \frac{7}{3}a^1b^1 - 1a^0b^0$$

$$= -3a^2 \cdot 1 + \frac{7}{3}ab - 1 \cdot 1 \cdot 1$$

$$= -3a^2 + \frac{7}{3}ab - 1$$

Answer: -3a2+73ab-1. The check is optional and is left to the reader.

**Try this!** Divide:  $(16x5-8x4+5x3+2x2) \div (2x2)$ .

Answer:  $8x_3-4x_2+52x+1$ 

### **Dividing by a Polynomial**

The same technique outlined for dividing by a monomial *does not* work for polynomials with two or more terms in the denominator. In this section, we will outline a process called polynomial long division, which is based on the division algorithm for real numbers. For the sake of clarity, we will assume that all expressions in the denominator are nonzero.

**Example 5:** Divide: x3+3x2-8x-4x-2.

**Solution:** Here x-2 is the divisor and  $x_3$ +3 $x_2$ -8x-4 is the dividend.

Step 1: To determine the first term of the quotient, divide the leading term of the dividend by the leading term of the divisor.

$$\begin{array}{rcl}
? \\
x-2 \overline{\smash)x^3 + 3x^2 - 8x - 4}
\end{array}$$
Begin by dividing the leading terms.
$$x^3 \div x = x^2$$

Step 2: Multiply the first term of the quotient by the divisor, remembering to distribute, and line up like terms with the dividend.

$$x - 2)x^{3} + 3x^{2} - 8x - 4$$

$$x^{3} - 2x^{2}$$

$$x^{2} \cdot (x - 2) = x^{3} - 2x^{2}$$
Distribute and line up like terms.
$$x^{2} \cdot (x - 2) = x^{3} - 2x^{2}$$

Step 3: Subtract the resulting quantity from the dividend. Take care to subtract both terms.

$$x-2)x^{3}+3x^{2}-8x-4$$

$$-(x^{3}-2x^{2})$$

$$5x^{2}$$
Subtract.
$$-(x^{3}-2x^{2}) = -x^{3}+2x^{2}$$

Step 4: Bring down the remaining terms and repeat the process from step 1.

$$x-2)x^{3}+3x^{2}-8x-4$$

$$x-2)x^{3}+3x^{2}-8x-4$$
Bring down the remaining terms.
$$-(x^{3}-2x^{2})$$

$$5x^{2}-8x-4$$

Notice that the leading term is eliminated and that the result has a degree that is one less than the dividend. The complete process is illustrated below:

$$\begin{array}{r}
9x^2 - 12x + 16 \\
3x + 4 \overline{)27x^3 + 0x^2 + 0x + 64} \\
- (27x^3 + 36x^2) \\
 - 36x^2 + 0x + 64 \\
- (-36x^2 - 48x) \\
 \hline
48x + 64 \\
- (48x + 64) \\
 \hline
0$$

Polynomial long division ends when the degree of the remainder is less than the degree of the divisor. Here the remainder is 0. Therefore, the binomial divides the polynomial evenly and the answer is the quotient shown above the division line.

$$\frac{x^3 + 3x^2 - 8x - 4}{x - 2} = x^2 + 5x + 2$$

To check the answer, multiply the divisor by the quotient to see if you obtain the dividend:

$$x^{3} + 3x^{2} - 8x - 4 = (x - 2)(x^{2} + 5x + 2)$$

Answer:  $x_2+5x+2$ 

Next, we demonstrate the case where there is a nonzero remainder.

Just as with real numbers, the final answer adds the fraction where the remainder is the numerator and the divisor is the denominator to the quotient. In general, when dividing we have

$$\frac{dividend}{divisor} = quotient + \frac{remainder}{divisor}$$

If we multiply both sides by the divisor we obtain

$$dividend = quotient \times divisor + remainder$$

**Example 6:** Divide: 6x2-5x+32x-1.

Solution: Since the denominator is a binomial, begin by setting up polynomial long division.

$$(2x-1) 6x^2 - 5x + 3$$

To start, determine what monomial times 2x-1 results in a leading term 6x2. This is the quotient of the given leading terms:  $(6x2) \div (2x) = 3x$ . Multiply 3x times the divisor 2x-1 and line up the result with like terms of the dividend.

$$\begin{array}{r}
3x \\
2x-1 \overline{\smash{\big)}6x^2 - 5x + 3} \\
6x^2 - 3x
\end{array}$$

Subtract the result from the dividend and bring down the constant term +3.

$$\begin{array}{r}
3x ? \\
2x-1 \overline{\smash{\big)}6x^2 - 5x + 3} \\
\underline{-(6x^2 - 3x)} \\
-2x + 3
\end{array}$$

Subtracting eliminates the leading term and -5x-(-3x)=-5x+3x=-2x. The quotient of -2x and 2x is -1. Multiply 2x-1 by -1 and line up the result.

$$\begin{array}{r}
3x-1 \\
2x-1 \overline{\smash{\big)}6x^2 - 5x + 3} \\
\underline{-(6x^2 - 3x)} \\
-2x+3 \\
-2x+1
\end{array}$$

Subtract again and notice that we are left with a remainder.

$$\begin{array}{r}
3x-1 \\
2x-1 \overline{\smash{\big)}6x^2 - 5x + 3} \\
\underline{-(6x^2 - 3x)} \\
-2x+3 \\
\underline{-(-2x+1)} \\
2
\end{array}$$

The constant term 2 has degree 0, and thus the division ends. We may write

$$\frac{6x^2 - 5x + 3}{2x - 1} = 3x - 1 + \frac{2}{2x - 1}$$

Answer: 3x-1+22x-1. To check that this result is correct, we multiply as follows:

quotient × divisor + remainder = 
$$(3x-1)(2x-1) + 2$$
  
=  $6x^2 - 3x - 2x + 1 + 2$   
=  $6x^2 - 5x + 3$  = dividend

Occasionally, some of the powers of the variables appear to be missing within a polynomial. This can lead to errors when lining up like terms. Therefore, when first learning how to divide polynomials using long division, fill in the missing terms with zero coefficients, called placeholders.

**Example 7:** Divide: 27x3+643x+4.

**Solution:** Notice that the binomial in the numerator does not have terms with degree 2 or 1. The division is simplified if we rewrite the expression with placeholders:

$$27x^3 + 64 = 27x^3 + 0x^2 + 0x + 64$$

Set up polynomial long division:

We begin with  $27x_3 \div 3x = 9x_2$  and work the rest of the division algorithm.

$$\begin{array}{r}
9x^2 - 12x + 16 \\
3x + 4 \overline{)27x^3 + 0x^2 + 0x + 64} \\
-\underline{(27x^3 + 36x^2)} \\
-36x^2 + 0x + 64 \\
-\underline{(-36x^2 - 48x)} \\
48x + 64 \\
-\underline{(48x + 64)} \\
0
\end{array}$$

Answer:  $9x_2-12x+16$ 

**Example 8:** Divide: 3x4-2x3+6x2+23x-7x2-2x+5.

Solution:

$$x^2 - 2x + 5 \overline{\smash{\big)} 3x^4 - 2x^3 + 6x^2 + 23x - 7}$$

Begin the process by dividing the leading terms to determine the leading term of the quotient  $3x4 \div x2 = 3x2$ . Take care to distribute and line up the like terms. Continue the process until the remainder has a degree less than 2.

$$\frac{3x^{2} + 4x - 1}{x^{2} - 2x + 5 \overline{\smash)3x^{4} - 2x^{3} + 6x^{2} + 23x - 7}}$$

$$-(3x^{4} - 6x^{3} + 15x^{2})$$

$$4x^{3} - 9x^{2} + 23x - 7$$

$$-(4x^{3} - 8x^{2} + 20x)$$

$$-x^{2} + 3x - 7$$

$$-(-x^{2} + 2x - 5)$$

$$x - 2$$

The remainder is x-2. Write the answer with the remainder:

$$\frac{3x^4 - 2x^3 + 6x^2 + 23x - 7}{x^2 - 2x + 5} = 3x^2 + 4x - 1 + \frac{x - 2}{x^2 - 2x + 5}$$

Answer:  $3x_2+4x-1+x-2x_2-2x+5$ 

Polynomial long division takes time and practice to master. Work lots of problems and remember that you may check your answers by multiplying the quotient by the divisor (and adding the remainder if present) to obtain the dividend.

**Try this!** Divide: 20x4-32x3+7x2+8x-10 5x-3.

Answer:  $4x_3-4x_2-x+1-75x-3$ 

### **Dividing Polynomial Functions**

We may use function notation to indicate division as follows:

**Division of functions:** (f/g)(x) = f(x)g(x)

The quotient of two polynomial functions does not necessarily have a domain of all real numbers. The values for x that make the function in the denominator 0 are restricted from the domain. This will be discussed in more detail at a later time. For now, assume all functions in the denominator are nonzero.

**Example 9:** Calculate: (f/g)(x) given f(x)=6x5-36x4+12x3-6x2 and g(x)=-6x2.

Solution: The notation indicates that we should divide:

$$(f/g)(x) = \frac{f(x)}{g(x)}$$

$$= \frac{6x^5 - 36x^4 + 12x^3 - 6x^2}{-6x^2}$$

$$= \frac{6x^5}{-6x^2} - \frac{36x^4}{-6x^2} + \frac{12x^3}{-6x^2} - \frac{6x^2}{-6x^2}$$

$$= -1x^{5-2} + 6x^{4-2} - 2x^{3-2} + 1x^{2-2}$$

$$= -x^3 + 6x^2 - 2x + 1$$

Answer:  $(f/g)(x)=-x_3+6x_2-2x+1$ 

**Example 10:** Calculate: (f/g)(-1), given  $f(x)=-3x^3+7x^2-11x-1$  and g(x)=3x-1.

**Solution:** First, determine (f/g)(x).

$$(f/g)(x) = \frac{f(x)}{g(x)} = \frac{-3x^3 + 7x^2 - 11x - 1}{3x - 1}$$

$$\begin{array}{r}
-x^{2} + 2x - 3 \\
3x - 1 \overline{\smash{\big)} - 3x^{3} + 7x^{2} - 11x - 1} \\
-\underline{(-3x^{3} + x^{2})} \\
6x^{2} - 11x - 1 \\
-\underline{(6x^{2} - 2x)} \\
-9x - 1 \\
-\underline{(-9x + 3)}
\end{array}$$

Therefore,

$$(f/g)(x) = -x^2 + 2x - 3 - \frac{4}{3x - 1}$$

Substitute -1 for the variable x.

$$(f/g)(-1) = -(-1)^{2} + 2(-1) - 3 - \frac{4}{3(-1) + 1}$$

$$= -1 - 2 - 3 - \frac{4}{-3 + 1}$$

$$= -6 - \frac{4}{-2}$$

$$= -6 + 2$$

$$= -4$$

Answer: (f/g)(-1)=-4

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- When dividing by a monomial, divide all terms in the numerator by the monomial and then simplify each term. To simplify each term, divide the coefficients and apply the quotient rule for exponents.
- When dividing a polynomial by another polynomial, apply the division algorithm.
- To check the answer after dividing, multiply the divisor by the quotient and add the remainder (if necessary) to obtain the dividend.
- It is a good practice to include placeholders when performing polynomial long division.

# **5.6** Negative Exponents

### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Simplify expressions with negative integer exponents.
- 2. Work with scientific notation.

### **Negative Exponents**

In this section, we define what it means to have negative integer exponents. We begin with the following equivalent

fractions:

$$\frac{1}{8} = \frac{4}{32}$$

Notice that 4, 8, and 32 are all powers of 2. Hence we can write 4=22, 8=23, and 32=25.

$$\frac{1}{2^3} = \frac{1}{8} = \frac{4}{32} = \frac{2^2}{2^5}$$

If the exponent of the term in the denominator is larger than the exponent of the term in the numerator, then the application of the quotient rule for exponents results in a negative exponent. In this case, we have the following:

$$\frac{1}{2^3} = \frac{1}{8} = \frac{4}{32} = \frac{2^2}{2^5} = 2^{2-5} = 2^{-3}$$

We conclude that 2-3=123. This is true in general and leads to the definition of negative exponents. Given any integer n and  $x\neq 0$ , then

$$x^{-n} = \frac{1}{x^n}$$

Here  $x\neq 0$  because 10 is undefined. For clarity, in this section, assume all variables are nonzero.

Simplifying expressions with negative exponents requires that we rewrite the expression with positive exponents.

Example 1: Simplify: 10-2.

Solution:

$$10^{-2} = \frac{1}{10^2}$$
$$= \frac{1}{100}$$

Answer: 1100

Example 2: Simplify: (-3)-1.

Solution:

$$(-3)^{-1} = \frac{1}{(-3)^{1}}$$
$$= -\frac{1}{3}$$

Answer: -13

Example 3: Simplify: 1y-3.

Solution:

$$\frac{1}{y^{-3}} = \frac{1}{\frac{1}{y^3}}$$
$$= 1 \cdot \frac{y^3}{1}$$
$$= y^3$$

Answer: y3

At this point we highlight two very important examples,

Simplify $(2x)^{-1}$	Simplify $2x^{-1}$
$(2x)^{-1} = \frac{1}{(2x)^{1}}$ $= \frac{1}{2x}$	$2x^{-1} = 2 \cdot \frac{1}{x^{1}}$ $= \frac{2}{x}$

If the grouped quantity is raised to a negative exponent, then apply the definition and write the entire grouped quantity in the denominator. If there is no grouping, then apply the definition only to the base preceding the exponent.

**Example 4:** Simplify: (2*ab*)-3.

**Solution:** First, apply the definition of -3 as an exponent and then apply the power of a product rule.

$$(2ab)^{-3} = \frac{1}{(2ab)^{3}}$$
 Apply the negative exponent.
$$= \frac{1}{2^{3}a^{3}b^{3}}$$
 Apply the power rule for a product.
$$= \frac{1}{8a^{3}b^{3}}$$

Answer: 18a3b3

**Example 5:** Simplify:  $(-3xy_3)-2$ .

Solution:

$$(-3xy^{3})^{-2} = \frac{1}{(-3xy^{3})^{2}}$$

$$= \frac{1}{(-3)^{2}x^{2}(y^{3})^{2}}$$

$$= \frac{1}{9x^{2}y^{6}}$$

Answer: 19x2y6

**Example 6:** Simplify: x-3y-4.

Solution:

$$\frac{x^{-3}}{y^{-4}} = \frac{\frac{1}{x^3}}{\frac{1}{y^4}} = \frac{1}{x^3} \cdot \frac{y^4}{1} = \frac{y^4}{x^3}$$

Answer: y4x3

The previous example suggests a property of quotients with negative exponents. If given any integers m and n,

where  $x\neq 0$  and  $y\neq 0$ , then

$$\frac{x^{-n}}{y^{-m}} = \frac{y^m}{x^n}$$

In other words, negative exponents in the numerator can be written as positive exponents in the denominator, and negative exponents in the denominator can be written as positive exponents in the numerator.

**Example 7:** Simplify: -2x-5y3z-2.

Solution: Take care with the coefficient -2; recognize that this is the base and that the exponent is actually +1: -2=(-2)1.

Hence the rules of negative exponents do not apply to this coefficient; leave it in the numerator.

$$\frac{-2x^{-5}y^3}{z^{-2}} = \frac{-2 x^{-5} y^3}{z^{-2}}$$
$$= \frac{-2y^3z^2}{x^5}$$

Answer: -2y3z2x5

**Example 8:** Simplify: (-3x-4)-3y-2.

**Solution:** Apply the power of a product rule before applying negative exponents.

$$\frac{(-3x^{-4})^{-3}}{y^{-2}} = \frac{(-3)^{-3}(x^{-4})^{-3}}{y^{-2}}$$
Apply the product to a power rule.
$$= \frac{(-3)^{-3}x^{12}}{y^{-2}}$$
Power rule
$$= \frac{x^{12}y^{2}}{(-3)^{3}}$$
Negative exponents
$$= \frac{x^{12}y^{2}}{-27}$$

$$= -\frac{x^{12}y^{2}}{27}$$

Answer:  $-x_{12}y_{227}$ 

**Example 9:** Simplify: (3x2)-4(-2y-1z3)-2.

Solution:

$$\frac{(3x^{2})^{-4}}{(-2y^{-1}z^{3})^{-2}} = \frac{3^{-4}(x^{2})^{-4}}{(-2)^{-2}(y^{-1})^{-2}(z^{3})^{-2}} \qquad Product to a power rule$$

$$= \frac{3^{-4}x^{-8}}{(-2)^{-2}y^{2}z^{-6}} \qquad Power rule$$

$$= \frac{(-2)^{2}z^{6}}{3^{4}x^{8}y^{2}} \qquad Negative exponents$$

$$= \frac{4z^{6}}{81x^{8}y^{2}}$$

Answer: 4z681x8y2

**Example 10:** Simplify: (5x2y)3x-5y-3.

**Solution:** First, apply the power of a product rule and then the quotient rule.

$$\frac{(5x^2y)^3}{x^{-5}y^{-3}} = \frac{5^3x^6y^3}{x^{-5}y^{-3}} = 5^3x^{6-(-5)}y^{3-(-3)} = 5^3x^{6+5}y^{3+3} = 125x^{11}y^6$$

Answer: 125x11y6

To summarize, we have the following rules for negative integer exponents with nonzero bases:

Negative exponents:	x-n=1 $x$ $n$
Quotients with negative exponents:	<i>x-ny-m=ymxn</i>

Try this! Simplify: (-5xy-3)-25x4y-4.

Answer: y10125x6

### **Scientific Notation**

Real numbers expressed in scientific notation have the form

$$a \times 10^n$$

where n is an integer and  $1 \le a < 10$ . This form is particularly useful when the numbers are very large or very small. For example,

$$9,460,000,000,000,000 \, \text{m} = 9.46 \times 10^{15} \, \text{m}$$
 One light year   
  $0.000000000005 \, \text{m} = 2.5 \times 10^{-11} \, \text{m}$  Radius of a hydrogen atom

It is cumbersome to write all the zeros in both of these cases. Scientific notation is an alternative, compact representation of these numbers. The factor 10<sub>n</sub> indicates the power of 10 to multiply the coefficient by to convert back to decimal form:

$$9.46 \times 10^{15} = 9.46 \times 1, 000,000,000,000,000 = 9,460,000,000,000,000$$

This is equivalent to moving the decimal in the coefficient fifteen places to the right. A negative exponent indicates that the number is very small:

$$2.5 \times 10^{-11} = 2.5 \times \frac{1}{10^{11}} = \frac{2.5}{100,000,000,000} = 0.0000000000025$$

This is equivalent to moving the decimal in the coefficient eleven places to the left.

Converting a decimal number to scientific notation involves moving the decimal as well. Consider all of the equivalent forms of 0.00563 with factors of 10 that follow:

$$0.00563 = 0.0563 \times 10^{-1}$$

$$= 0.563 \times 10^{-2}$$

$$= 5.63 \times 10^{-3}$$

$$= 56.3 \times 10^{-4}$$

$$= 563 \times 10^{-5}$$

While all of these are equal, 5.63×10-3 is the only form considered to be expressed in scientific notation. This is because the coefficient 5.63 is between 1 and 10 as required by the definition. Notice that we can convert 5.63×10-3 back to decimal form, as a check, by moving the decimal to the left three places.

Example 11: Write 1,075,000,000,000 using scientific notation.

Solution: Here we count twelve decimal places to the left of the decimal point to obtain the number 1.075.

$$1,075,000,000,000 = 1.075 \times 10^{12}$$

Answer: 1.075×10<sub>12</sub>

Example 12: Write 0.000003045 using scientific notation.

**Solution:** Here we count six decimal places to the right to obtain 3.045.

$$0.000003045 = 3.045 \times 10^{-6}$$

Answer: 3.045×10-6

Often we will need to perform operations when using numbers in scientific notation. All the rules of exponents developed so far also apply to numbers in scientific notation.

**Example 13:** Multiply: (4.36×10-5)(5.3×1012).

Solution: Use the fact that multiplication is commutative and apply the product rule for exponents.

$$(4.36 \times 10^{-5})(5.30 \times 10^{12}) = (4.36 \cdot 5.30) \times (10^{-5} \cdot 10^{12})$$

$$= 23.108 \times 10^{-5+12}$$

$$= 2.3108 \times 10^{1} \times 10^{7}$$

$$= 2.3108 \times 10^{1+7}$$

$$= 2.3108 \times 10^{8}$$

Answer: 2.3108×108

**Example 14:** Divide: (3.24×108)÷(9.0×10-3).

Solution:

$$\frac{(3.24 \times 10^{8})}{(9.0 \times 10^{-3})} = \left(\frac{3.24}{9.0}\right) \times \left(\frac{10^{8}}{10^{-3}}\right)$$

$$= 0.36 \times 10^{8 - (-3)}$$

$$= 0.36 \times 10^{8 + 3}$$

$$= 3.6 \times 10^{-1} \times 10^{11}$$

$$= 3.6 \times 10^{-1 + 11}$$

$$= 3.6 \times 10^{10}$$

Answer: 3.6×1010

Example 15: The speed of light is approximately 6.7×10s miles per hour. Express this speed in miles per second.

**Solution:** A unit analysis indicates that we must divide the number by 3,600.

$$6.7 \times 10^{8} \, mph = \frac{6.7 \times 10^{8} \, miles}{1 \, bour} \cdot \left(\frac{1 \, bour}{60 \, minutes}\right) \cdot \left(\frac{1 \, minutes}{60 \, seconds}\right)$$

$$= \frac{6.7 \times 10^{8} \, miles}{3600 \, seconds}$$

$$= \left(\frac{6.7}{3600}\right) \times 10^{8}$$

$$\approx 0.0019 \times 10^{8} \quad Rounded \, to \, two \, significant \, digits$$

$$= 1.9 \times 10^{-3} \times 10^{8}$$

$$= 1.9 \times 10^{-3+8}$$

$$= 1.9 \times 10^{5}$$

Answer: The speed of light is approximately 1.9×105 miles per second.

**Example 16:** By what factor is the radius of the sun larger than the radius of earth?

$$6,300,000 \,\mathrm{m} = 6.3 \times 10^6 \,\mathrm{m}$$
 Radius of Earth  $700,000,000 \,\mathrm{m} = 7.0 \times 10^8 \,\mathrm{m}$  Radius of the Sun

Solution: We want to find the number that when multiplied times the radius of earth equals the radius of the sun.

$$n \cdot radius$$
 of the Earth = radius of the Sun
$$n = \frac{radius \text{ of the Sun}}{radius \text{ of the Earth}}$$

Therefore,

$$n = \frac{7.0 \times 10^8 \text{ m}}{6.3 \times 10^6 \text{ m}}$$
$$= \frac{7.0}{6.3} \times \frac{10^8}{10^6}$$
$$\approx 1.1 \times 10^{8-6}$$
$$= 1.1 \times 10^2$$
$$= 110$$

**Try this!** Divide: (6.75×10-8)÷(9×10-17).

Answer: 7.5×108

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**



# **Chapter 6**

# **Factoring and Solving by Factoring**

# **6.1** Introduction to Factoring

# **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Determine the greatest common factor (GCF) of natural numbers.
- 2. Determine the GCF of monomials.
- 3. Factor out the GCF of a polynomial.
- 4. Factor a four-term polynomial by grouping.

# **GCF of Natural Numbers**

The process of writing a number or expression as a product is called factoring. If we write  $60 = 5 \cdot 12$ , we say that the product  $5 \cdot 12$  is a factorization of 60 and that 5 and 12 are factors. Typically, there are many ways to factor a number. For example,

$$60 = 6 \cdot 10$$

$$60 = 2 \cdot 30$$

$$60 = 4 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$
Factorizations of 60

Recall that a prime number is defined as a natural number with exactly two natural number factors, 1 and itself. The first ten prime numbers follow:

Any natural number greater than 1 can be uniquely written as a product of prime numbers. This product is called the prime factorization. The prime factorization of 60 can be determined by continuing to factor until only a product of prime numbers remains.

$$60 = 2 \cdot 30$$
$$= 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 15$$
$$= 2 \cdot 2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$

Since the prime factorization is unique, it does not matter how we choose to initially factor the number; the end result will be the same. The prime factorization of 60 follows:

$$60 = 2^2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$
 The prime factorization of 60

Recall that the greatest common factor (GCF) of any two natural numbers is the product of all the common prime factors.

**Example 1:** Find the GCF of 60 and 140.

**Solution:** First, determine the prime factorizations of both integers.

$$140 = 10.14$$

$$= 2.5.2.7$$

$$= 2^{2}.5.7$$

$$= 2^{2}.3.5$$

$$= 2^{2}.3.5$$

The product of the common prime factors is 22.5; hence the GCF(60, 140)=22.5=20. To see that it is the greatest common factor, we can write the following:

$$140 = 20 \cdot 7$$
$$60 = 20 \cdot 3$$

Answer: The greatest common factor of 60 and 140 is 20.

Example 2: Find the GCF of 504 and 1,080.

**Solution:** First, determine the prime factorizations of both integers.

$$504 = 9.56$$

$$= 3.3.7.8$$

$$= 3.3.7.2.2.2$$

$$= 2^{3}.3^{2}.7$$

$$= 2^{3}.3^{3}.5$$

$$1080 = 10.108$$

$$= 2.5.9.12$$

$$= 2.5.3.3.2.2.3$$

$$= 2^{3}.3^{3}.5$$

The product of the common prime factors is 23.32.

The GCF(504, 1080)= $23 \cdot 32 = 72$ . Note that we multiplied the common prime factors with the smallest exponent.

$$540 = 72 \cdot 7$$
$$1080 = 72 \cdot 15$$

The numbers 7 and 15 share no common natural number factor other than 1; we say that they are relatively prime.

Answer: The greatest common factor of 504 and 1,080 is 72.

# **GCF of Monomials**

We next consider factorizations of monomials. For example, 6x and  $x_4$  are factors of  $6x_5$  because  $6x_5$ = $6x_5$  $x_4$ . Typically, there are many ways to factor a monomial. Some factorizations of  $6x_5$  follow:

$$6x^{5} = 2x^{3} \cdot 3x^{2}$$

$$6x^{5} = 6x^{4} \cdot x$$

$$6x^{5} = 2x \cdot 3x \cdot x^{3}$$
Factorizations of  $6x^{5}$ 

Given two or more monomials, it will be useful to find the greatest common monomial factor of each. For example, consider 6x5y3z and 8x2y3z2. The variable part of these two monomials look very much like the prime factorization of natural numbers and, in fact, can be treated the same way.

Steps for finding the GCF of monomials are outlined in the following example.

**Example 3:** Find the GCF of 6x5y3z and 8x2y3z2.

Solution:

Step 1: Find the GCF of the coefficients.

$$6x^5y^3z$$
 and  $8x^2y^3z^2$ 

In this case, the GCF(6, 8)=2.

Step 2: Determine the common variable factors with smallest exponents.

$$6x^5y^3z \qquad \text{and} \qquad 8x^2y^3z^2$$

In this case, the common variables with the smallest exponents are  $x_2$ ,  $y_3$ , and  $z_1$ .

**Step 3:** The GCF of the monomials is the product of the common variable factors and the GCF of the coefficients. Therefore,

GCF 
$$(6x^5y^3z, 8x^2y^3z^2) = 2 \cdot x^2 \cdot y^3 \cdot z$$

Answer: 2x2y3z

It is worth pointing out that the GCF in the previous example divides both expressions evenly:

$$\frac{6x^5y^3z}{2x^2y^3z} = 3x^3 \qquad \text{and} \qquad \frac{8x^2y^3z^2}{2x^2y^3z} = 4z$$

Furthermore, we can write the following:

$$6x^5y^3z = 2x^2y^3z \cdot 3x^3$$
 and  $8x^2y^3z^2 = 2x^2y^3z \cdot 4z$ 

The factors 3x3 and 4z share no common monomial factors other than 1; they are relatively prime.

Example 4: Determine the GCF of the following

expressions: 30x6y and 18x4y2z.

**Solution:** The prime factorizations of the coefficients are

$$30 = 2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$

$$18 = 2 \cdot 3 \cdot 3$$

Thus the GCF(30, 18) =  $2 \cdot 3 = 6$ . Next, consider the variable part:

$$30x^{6}y$$

$$30x^6y$$
 and  $18x^4y^2z$ 

The variable factors in common are  $x_4$  and y. The factor z is not in common and we have

$$GCF = 6 \cdot x^4 \cdot y$$

Answer: 6x4y

**Example 5:** Determine the GCF of the following three

expressions: 12a5b2(a+b)5,60a4b3c(a+b)3, and 24a2b7c3(a+b)2.

**Solution:** First, determine the GCF of the coefficients.

$$12 = 2^2 \cdot 3$$

$$60 = 2^2 \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$

$$24 = 2^3 \cdot 3$$

The GCF(12, 60, 24)= $22 \cdot 3$ =12. Next, determine the common factors of the variable part:

$$12a^5b^2(a+b)^5$$
 and  $60a^4b^3c(a+b)^3$  and  $24a^2b^7c^3(a+b)^2$ 

The variable factors in common are a2, b2, and (a+b)2. Therefore,

$$GCF = 12 \cdot a^2 \cdot b^2 \cdot (a+b)^2$$

Answer: 12a2b2(a+b)2. Note that the variable c is not common to all three expressions and thus is not included in the GCF.

**Try this!** Determine the GCF of the following: 60x4y3(x+2y)7, 45x2y5(x+2y)4, and 30x7y7(x+2y)3.

Answer: 15x2y3(x+2y)3

# **Factoring out the GCF**

We have seen that application of the distributive property is the key to multiplying polynomials. The process of factoring a polynomial involves using the distributive property in reverse to write each polynomial as a product of polynomial factors.

$$a(b+c) = ab + ac$$
 Multiplying  
 $ab + ac = a(b+c)$  Factoring

To demonstrate this idea, we multiply and factor side by side. Factoring utilizes the GCF of the terms.

Multiplying	Factoring
$3(5x+1) = 3 \cdot 5x + 3 \cdot 1$ $= 15x + 3$	$15x + 3 = 3 \cdot 5x + 3 \cdot 1$ $= 3(5x + 1)$
$2x^{2} (3x^{3} + 4) = 2x^{2} \cdot 3x^{3} + 2x^{2} \cdot 4$ $= 6x^{5} + 8x^{2}$	$6x^{5} + 8x^{2} = 2x^{2} \cdot 3x^{3} + 2x^{2} \cdot 4$ $= 2x^{2} (3x^{3} + 4)$

In the previous example, we see that the distributive property allows us to write the polynomial 6x5+8x2 as a product of the two factors 2x2 and (3x3+4). Note that in this case, 2x2 is the GCF of the terms of the polynomial:

$$GCF(6x^5, 8x^2) = 2x^2$$

Factoring out the GCF involves rewriting a polynomial as a product where a factor is the GCF of all of its terms:

$$\begin{cases}
 15x + 3 = 3(5x + 1) \\
 6x^5 + 8x^2 = 2x^2(3x^3 + 4)
 \end{cases}$$
Factoring out the GCF

The steps for factoring out the GCF of a polynomial are outlined in the following example.

**Example 6:** Factor out the GCF: 7x4+21x3-14x2.

## Solution:

**Step 1:** Identify the GCF of all the terms. In this case, the GCF(7, 21, 14) = 7, and the common variable factor with the smallest exponent is  $x_2$ . The GCF of the polynomial is  $7x_2$ .

$$7x^4 + 21x^3 - 14x^2 = 7x^2$$



**Step 2:** Determine the terms of the missing factor by dividing each term of the original expression by the GCF. (*This step is usually performed mentally*.)

$$\frac{7x^4}{7x^2} = x^2 \qquad \frac{21x^3}{7x^2} = 3x \qquad \frac{-14x^2}{7x^2} = -2$$

**Step 3:** Apply the distributive property (in reverse) using the terms found in the previous step.

$$7x^4 + 21x^3 - 14x^2 = 7x^2(x^2 + 3x - 2)$$

**Step 4:** As a check, multiply using the distributive property to verify that the product equals the original expression. (*This step is optional and can be performed mentally*.)

$$7x^{2}(x^{2} + 3x - 2) = 7x^{2} \cdot x^{2} + 7x^{2} \cdot 3x - 7x^{2} \cdot 2$$
$$= 7x^{4} + 21x^{3} - 14x^{2}$$

Answer:  $7x_2(x_2+3x-2)$ 

**Example 7:** Factor out the GCF: 48a-16b+4c.

**Solution:** There are no variable factors in common and the GCF(48, 16, 4) = 4.

$$48a - 16b + 4c = 4(?)$$

$$= 4(12a - 4b + c)$$

Answer: 4(12a-4b+c)

**Example 8:** Factor out the GCF:  $25x_3+15x_2+5x$ .

**Solution:** The GCF(25, 15, 5) = 5, and the common variable factor with smallest exponents is  $x_1$ . The GCF of all the terms is 5x.

$$25x^{3} + 15x^{2} + 5x = 5x$$
(?)  
=  $5x(5x^{2} + 3x + 1)$ 

Answer:  $5x(5x_2+3x+1)$ 

If the GCF is the same as one of the terms, then, after the GCF is factored out, a constant term 1 will remain. In the previous example, we can see that 5x5x=1. The importance of remembering the constant term becomes clear when performing the check using the distributive property:

$$5x (5x^2 + 3x + 1) = 5x \cdot 5x^2 + 5x \cdot 3x + 5x \cdot 1$$
$$= 25x^3 + 15x^2 + 5x \quad \checkmark$$

The constant term 1 allows us to obtain the same original expression after we distribute.

**Example 9:** Factor out the GCF: 15*x*6*y*4+10*x*5*y*3*z*2-20*xy*6*z*3.

**Solution:** The GCF(10, 15, 20)=5, and the common variables with smallest exponent are  $x_1$  and  $y_3$ . Therefore, the GCF of the terms is  $5xy_3$ . The first term does not have a variable factor of z and thus cannot be a part of the greatest common factor. If we divide each term by  $5xy_3$ , we obtain

$$\frac{15x^6y^4}{5xy^3} = 3x^5y \qquad \frac{10x^5y^3z^2}{5xy^3} = 2x^4z^2 \qquad \frac{-20xy^6z^3}{5xy^3} = -4y^3z^3$$

and can write

$$15x^{6}y^{4} + 10x^{5}y^{3}z^{2} - 20xy^{6}z^{3} = 5xy^{3}$$

$$= 5xy^{3}(3x^{5}y + 2x^{4}z^{2} - 4y^{3}z^{3})$$

Answer: 5xy3(3x5y+2x4z2-4y3z3)

**Example 10:** Factor out the GCF: 24*a*6*b*2*c*5+8*a*7*b*5*c*.

**Solution:** The GCF(24, 8) = 8, and the variable factors with smallest exponents are  $a_6$ ,  $b_2$ , and c. Therefore, the GCF of all the terms is  $8a_6b_2c$ .

$$24a^{6}b^{2}c^{5} + 8a^{7}b^{5}c = 8a^{6}b^{2}c$$
(?)  
=  $8a^{6}b^{2}c (3c^{4} + ab^{3})$ 

Answer: 8a6b2c(3c4+ab3)

Of course, not all polynomials with integer coefficients can be factored as a product of polynomials with integer coefficients other than 1 and itself. If this is the case, then we say that it is a prime polynomial.

**Example 11:** Factor: 3*x*–5.

Solution: Prime: there are no polynomial factors other than 1 and itself.

Answer: Prime

**Try this!** Factor out the GCF: 16x4y3-8x2y5-4x2y.

Answer: 4x2y(4x2y2-2y4-1)

# **Factor by Grouping**

In this section, we outline a technique for factoring polynomials with four terms. First, review some preliminary examples where the terms have a common binomial factor.

**Example 12:** Factor: 5x(x-3)+2(x-3).

**Solution:** This expression is a binomial with terms 5x(x-3) and 2(x-3). In this case, (x-3) is a common factor. Begin by factoring this common factor out:

$$5x(x-3)+2(x-3)=(x-3)$$
 (?)

To determine the terms of the remaining factor, divide each term by (x-3):

$$\frac{5x(x-3)}{(x-3)} = 5x$$
 
$$\frac{2(x-3)}{(x-3)} = 2$$

This step is typically performed mentally. We have

$$5x (x-3) + 2 (x-3) = (x-3)(?)$$
$$= (x-3)(5x+2)$$

Answer: (x-3)(5x+2)

Recall that 1 is always a common factor. If the GCF is the same as a term, then the factor 1 remains after we factor out that GCF.

**Example 13:** Factor: 3x(4x+1)-(4x+1).

**Solution:** Rewrite the second term -(4x+1) as -1(4x+1) and then factor out the common binomial factor (4x+1).

$$3x (4x+1) - (4x+1) = 3x (4x+1) - 1 (4x+1)$$
$$= (4x+1) ( ? )$$
$$= (4x+1) (3x-1)$$

Answer: (4x+1)(3x-1)

Remember that the goal for this section is to develop a technique that enables us to factor polynomials with four terms into a product of binomials. The intermediate step of this process looks like the previous two examples. For example, we wish to factor

$$5x^2 - 15x + 2x - 6$$

Begin by grouping the first two terms and the last two terms. Then factor out the GCF of each grouping:

$$\underbrace{5x^2 - 15x}_{group} + \underbrace{2x - 6}_{group}$$
$$= 5x(x - 3) + 2(x - 3)$$

In this form, it is a binomial with a common binomial factor, (x-3).

$$=(x-3)(?)$$
  
=  $(x-3)(5x+2)$ 

The steps that follow outline a technique for factoring four-term polynomials called factor by grouping.

**Example 14:** Factor:  $2x_3+4x_2+3x+6$ .

**Solution:** Group terms in such a way as to obtain a binomial with common factors.

**Step 1:** Group the first two and last two terms and then factor out the GCF of each.

$$\underbrace{2x^3 + 4x^2}_{group} + \underbrace{3x + 6}_{group}$$

The GCF of the first two terms is  $2x_2$ , and the GCF of the second two terms is 3.

$$2x^{3} + 4x^{2} + 3x + 6 = \underbrace{2x^{3} + 4x^{2}}_{group} + \underbrace{3x + 6}_{group}$$
$$= 2x^{2} (?) + 3 (?)$$
$$= 2x^{2} (x+2) + 3 (x+2)$$

**Step 2:** At this point, the polynomial is a binomial. Factor out any factors common to both terms. Here (x+2) is a common factor.

$$= 2x^{2} (x+2) + 3 (x+2)$$

$$= (x+2) (?)$$

$$= (x+2)(2x^{2}+3)$$

**Step 3:** Optional check: multiply to verify that we obtain the original expression.

$$(x+2)(2x^2+3) = 2x^3 + 3x + 4x^2 + 6$$
$$= 2x^3 + 4x^2 + 3x + 6$$

Answer: (x+2)(2x+3)

**Example 15:** Factor: 2*a*3–3*a*2+2*a*–3.

**Solution:** The GCF of the first two terms is at and the GCF of the second two terms is 1.

$$2a^{3} - 3a^{2} + 2a - 3 = \underbrace{2a^{3} - 3a^{2}}_{group} + \underbrace{2a - 3}_{group}$$

$$= a^{2} (?) + 1 (?)$$

$$= a^{2} (2a - 3) + 1 (2a - 3)$$

$$= (2a - 3) (?)$$

$$= (2a - 3) (a^{2} + 1)$$

Answer: (2a-3)(a2+1). The check is left to the reader.

**Example 16:** Factor: 6x4-24x3-5x+20.

**Solution:** The GCF for the first group is 6x3. We have to choose 5 or -5 to factor out of the second group.

$$\underbrace{6x^{4} - 24x^{3}}_{group} - \underbrace{5x + 20}_{group}$$

$$= 6x^{3}(x - 4) + 5(-x + 4)$$

$$= 6x^{3}(x - 4) - 5(x - 4)$$

Factoring out a +5 does not result in a common binomial factor. If we choose to factor out -5, then we obtain a common binomial factor and can proceed. Note that when factoring out a negative number, we change the signs of the factored terms.

$$6x^{4} - 24x^{3} - 5x + 20 = \underbrace{6x^{4} - 24x^{3}}_{group} - \underbrace{5x + 20}_{group}$$

$$= 6x^{3} ( ? ) - 5 ( ? )$$

$$= 6x^{3} (x - 4) - 5 (x - 4)$$

$$= (x - 4) ( ? )$$

$$= (x - 4) (6x^{3} - 5)$$

Answer:  $(x-4)(6x^3-5)$ . The check is left to the reader.

## Tip

The sign of the leading coefficient in the second grouping usually indicates whether or not to factor out a negative factor. If that coefficient is positive, factor out a positive factor. If it is negative, factor out a negative factor.

When all the terms of a polynomial have a GCF other than 1, it is a best practice to factor that out before factoring by grouping.

**Example 17:** Factor: 3*y*4+9*y*2-6*y*3-18*y*.

**Solution:** Here we notice that the greatest common factor of all the terms is 3y. Begin by factoring out the GCF and then factor the result by grouping.

$$3y^{4} + 9y^{2} - 6y^{3} - 18y$$

$$= 3y [y^{3} + 3y - 2y^{2} - 6]$$

$$= 3y [y(y^{2} + 3) - 2(y^{2} + 3)]$$
Factor by grouping.
$$= 3y [(y^{2} + 3)(y - 2)]$$

$$= 3y (y^{2} + 3)(y - 2)$$

Answer:  $3y(y_2+3)(y-2)$ 

Sometimes we must first rearrange the terms in order to obtain a common factor.

**Example 18:** Factor: *ab*-2*a*2*b*+*a*3-2*b*3.

**Solution:** Simply factoring the GCF out of the first group and last group does not yield a common binomial factor.

$$\underbrace{ab-2a^2b}_{group} + \underbrace{a^3-2b^3}_{group}$$
$$= ab(1-2a)+1(a^3-2b^3)$$

We must rearrange the terms, searching for a grouping that produces a common factor. In this example, we have a workable grouping if we switch the terms *a*<sub>3</sub>and *ab*.

$$ab - 2a^{2}b + a^{3} - 2b^{3} = \underbrace{a^{3} - 2a^{2}b}_{group} + \underbrace{ab - 2b^{3}}_{group}$$
$$= a^{2}(a - 2b) + b(a - 2b)$$
$$= (a - 2b)(a^{2} + b)$$

Answer: (a-2b)(a2+b)

Not all factorable four-term polynomials can be factored with this technique. For example,

$$3x^3 + 5x^2 - x + 2$$

This four-term polynomial cannot be grouped in any way as to produce a common binomial factor. Despite this, the polynomial is not prime and can be written as a product of polynomials. It can be factored as follows:

$$3x^3 + 5x^2 - x + 2 = (x+2)(3x^2 - x + 1)$$

Factoring such polynomials is something that we will learn to do as we move further along in our study of algebra. For now, we will limit our attempt to factor four-term polynomials to using the factor by grouping technique.

Try this! Factor:  $x_3-x_2y-x_y+y_2$ .

Answer: (x-y)(x2-y)

### KEY TAKEAWAYS

- To find the greatest common factor (GCF) of any collection of natural numbers, first find the prime factorization of each. The GCF is the product of all the common prime factors.
- The GCF of two or more monomials is the product of the GCF of the coefficients and the common variable factors with the smallest power.
- If the terms of a polynomial have a greatest common factor, then factor out that GCF using the distributive property. Divide each term of the polynomial by the GCF to determine the terms of the remaining factor.
- Some four-term polynomials can be factored by grouping the first two terms and the last two terms.
   Factor out the GCF of each group and then factor out the common binomial factor.
- When factoring by grouping, you sometimes have to rearrange the terms to find a common binomial factor. After factoring out the GCF, the remaining binomial factors must be the same for the technique to work.
- Not all polynomials can be factored as the product of polynomials with integer coefficients. In this case,
   we call it a prime polynomial.





# **6.2** Factoring Trinomials of the Form $X^2 + bx + c$

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Factor trinomials of the form  $x_2+bx+c$ .
- 2. Factor trinomials using the AC method.

## Factoring Trinomials of the Form $x^2 + bx + c$

Some trinomials of the form  $x_2+bx+c$  can be factored as a product of binomials. For example,

$$x^{2} + 7x + 10 = (x + 2)(x + 5)$$

We can verify this factorization by multiplying:

$$(x+2)(x+5) = x^2 + 5x + 2x + 10$$
  
=  $x^2 + 7x + 10$ 

Factoring trinomials requires that we work the distributive process in reverse. Notice that the product of the first terms of each binomial is equal to the first term of the trinomial.

$$x \cdot x = x^2$$

The middle term of the trinomial, 7x, is the sum of the products of the outer and inner terms of the binomials:

$$5x + 2x = 7x$$

And the product of the last terms of each binomial is equal to the last term of the trinomial.

$$2.5 = 10$$

This can be visually interpreted as follows:

First term

Middle term
$$(x+2)(x+5)$$

$$(x+2)(x+5)$$

$$+2x$$

$$-7x$$
Last term
$$(x+2)(x+5)$$

$$10$$

If a trinomial of this type factors, then these relationships will be true:

$$x^{2} + bx + c = (x+m)(x+n)$$

$$= x^{2} + nx + mx + mn$$

$$= x^{2} + (n+m)x + mn$$

This gives us

$$b = n + m$$
 and  $c = mn$ 

In short, if the leading coefficient of a factorable trinomial is one, then the factors of the last term must add up to the coefficient of the middle term. This observation is the key to factoring trinomials using the technique known astrial and error (or guess and check). The steps are outlined in the following example.

**Example 1:** Factor: *x*2+7*x*+12.

**Solution:** Note that the polynomial to be factored has three terms; it is a trinomial with a leading coefficient of 1. Use trial and error to factor as follows:

**Step 1:** Write two sets of blank parentheses. If a trinomial of this form factors, then it will factor into two linear binomial factors.

$$x^2 + 7x + 12 = ($$
 )( )

**Step 2:** Write the factors of the first term in the first space of each set of parentheses. In this case, factor  $x_2=x \cdot x$ .

$$x^2 + 7x + 12 = (x)$$
 (x)

**Step 3:** Determine the factors of the last term whose sum equals the coefficient of the middle term. To do this, list all of the factorizations of 12 and search for factors whose sum equals the coefficient of the middle term, 7.

$$12=1 \cdot 12 \longrightarrow 1+12=13$$

$$= 2 \cdot 6 \longrightarrow 2+6=8$$

$$= 3 \cdot 4 \longrightarrow 3+4=7$$

Choose  $12 = 3 \cdot 4$  because 3 + 4 = 7.

**Step 4:** Write in the last term of each binomial using the factors determined in the previous step.

$$x^{2} + 7x + 12 = (x + 3)(x + 4)$$

**Step 5:** Check by multiplying the two binomials.

$$(x+3)(x+4) = x^2 + 4x + 3x + 12$$
$$= x^2 + 7x + 12$$

Answer: (x+3)(x+4)

Since multiplication is commutative, the order of the factors does not matter.

$$x^{2} + 7x + 12 = (x+3)(x+4)$$
$$= (x+4)(x+3)$$

If the last term of the trinomial is positive, then either both of the constant factors must be negative or both must be positive. Therefore, when looking at the list of factorizations of the last term, we are searching for sums that are equal to the coefficient of the middle term.

**Example 2:** Factor: *x*2–9*x*+20.

**Solution:** First, factor  $x_2=x \cdot x$ .

$$x^2 - 9x + 20 = (x ?)(x ?)$$

Next, determine which factors of 20 add up to -9:

$$20 = 1 \cdot 20$$
$$= 2 \cdot 10$$
$$= 4 \cdot 5$$

In this case, choose -4 and -5 because (-4)(-5)=+20 and -4+(-5)=-9.

$$x^{2}-9x+20=(x-4)(x-5)$$

Check.

$$(x-4)(x-5) = x^2 - 5x - 4x + 20$$
$$= x^2 - 9x + 20$$

Answer: (x-4)(x-5)

If the last term of the trinomial is negative, then one of its factors must be negative. In this case, search the list of factorizations of the last term for differences that equal the coefficient of the middle term.

**Example 3:** Factor:  $x_2-4x-12$ .

**Solution:** Begin by factoring the first term  $x_2=x \cdot x$ .

$$x^2 - 4x - 12 = (x ?)(x ?)$$

The factors of 12 are listed below. In this example, we are looking for factors whose difference is -4.

$$12 = 1.12$$
  $\rightarrow 1 + (-12) = -11$   
=  $2.6$   $\rightarrow 2 + (-6) = -4$   
=  $3.4$   $\rightarrow 3 + (-4) = -1$ 

Here choose the factors 2 and -6 because the coefficient of the middle term, -4, is obtained if we add 2+(-6).

$$x^2 - 4x - 12 = (x+2)(x-6)$$

Multiply to check.

$$(x+2)(x-6) = x^2 - 6x + 2x - 12$$
$$= x^2 - 4x - 12$$

Answer: (x+2)(x-6)

Often our first guess will not produce a correct factorization. This process may require repeated trials. For this reason, the check is very important and is not optional.

**Example 4:** Factor:  $x_2+5x-6$ .

**Solution:** The first term of this trinomial  $x_2$  factors as  $x \cdot x$ .

$$x^2 + 5x - 6 = (x ?)(x ?)$$

Consider the factors of 6:

$$6 = 1.6$$
$$= 2.3$$

Suppose we choose the factors 2 and 3 because 2 + 3 = 5, the coefficient of the middle term. Then we have the following incorrect factorization:

$$x^{2} + 5x - 6 = (x+2)(x+3)$$

When we multiply to check, we find the error.



$$(x+2)(x+3) = x^2 + 3x + 2x + 6$$
  
=  $x^2 + 5x + 6$ 

In this case, the middle term is correct but the last term is not. Since the last term in the original expression is negative, we need to choose factors that are opposite in sign. Therefore, we must try again. This time we choose the factors -1 and 6 because -1+6=5.

$$x^{2} + 5x - 6 = (x - 1)(x + 6)$$

Now the check shows that this factorization is correct.

$$(x-1)(x+6) = x^2 + 6x - x - 6$$
$$= x^2 + 5x - 6 \checkmark$$

Answer: (x-1)(x+6)

If we choose the factors wisely, then we can reduce much of the guesswork in this process. However, if a guess is not correct, do not get discouraged; just try a different set of factors.

**Example 5:** Factor:  $x_2+3x+20$ .

Solution:

$$x^{2} + 3x + 20 = (x ?)(x ?)$$

$$20 = 1 \cdot 20$$

$$= 2 \cdot 10$$

$$= 4 \cdot 5$$

Here there are no factors of 20 whose sum is 3. Therefore, the original trinomial cannot be factored as a product of two binomials. This trinomial is prime.

Answer: Prime

**Try this!** Factor: *x*2–13*x*–30.

Answer: (x+2)(x-15)

The techniques described can also be used to factor trinomials with more than one variable.

**Example 6:** Factor: *x*2–14*xy*–72*y*2.

**Solution:** The first term  $x_2$  factors as  $x \cdot x$ .

$$x^{2} + xy - 72y^{2} = (x ?)(x ?)$$

Next, look for factors of the coefficient of the last term, 72, whose sum is -14.

$$72 = 1.72$$
  
= 2.36  
= 3.24  
= 4.18  $\rightarrow$  4+(-18) = -14  
= 6.12  
= 8.9


Therefore, the coefficient of the last term can be factored -72=4(-18), where 4+(-18)=-14. Because the last term has a variable factor of  $y_2$ , factor  $72y_2$  as 4y(-18y) and try the following factorization:

$$x^{2}-14xy-72y^{2}=(x+4y)(x-18y)$$

Multiply to check.

$$(x+4y) (x-18y) = x^2 - 18xy + 4xy - 72y^2$$
$$= x^2 - 14xy - 72y^2 \checkmark$$

Visually, we have the following:



Answer: (x+4y)(x-18y)

**Try this!** Factor: *x*2*y*2+9*xy*-10.

Answer: (xy-1)(xy+10)

### **Factoring Using the AC Method**

An alternate technique for factoring trinomials, called the AC method, makes use of the grouping method for factoring four-term polynomials. If a trinomial in the form  $ax_2+bx+c$  can be factored, then the middle term, bx, can be replaced with two terms with coefficients whose sum is b and product ac. This substitution results in an equivalent expression with four terms that can be factored by grouping. The steps are outlined in the following example.

**Example 7:** Factor using the AC method:  $x_2-x-30$ .

**Solution:** In this example a = 1, b = -1, and c = -30.

**Step 1:** Determine the product *ac*.

$$ac = 1(-30)$$
$$= -30$$

**Step 2**: Find factors of *ac* whose sum equals the coefficient of the middle term, *b*.

$$-30 = 1(-30)$$

$$= 2(-15)$$

$$= 3(-10)$$

$$= 5(-6) \rightarrow 5 + (-6) = -1$$

We can see that the sum of the factors 5 and -6 is equal to the coefficient of the middle term, -1.

**Step 3:** Use the factors as coefficients for the terms that replace the middle term. Here -x=-6x+5x. Write

$$x^2 - x - 30 = x^2 - 6x + 5x - 30$$

**Step 4:** Factor the equivalent expression by grouping.

$$x^{2}-x-30 = \underbrace{x^{2}-6x}_{group} + \underbrace{5x-30}_{group}$$
$$= x(x-6) + 5(x-6)$$
$$= (x-6)(x+5)$$

Answer: (x-6)(x+5)

Notice that the AC method is consistent with the trial and error method. Both methods require that b=m+n, where c=mn. In the example above, -30=(-6)(5) and -1=(-6)+5. The only difference between the methods, when the leading coefficient is 1, is in the process used to obtain the final factorization.

**Example 8:** Factor:  $y_2-14x+48$ .

**Solution:** Here ac = 48 and we search for factors whose sum is -14.

$$48 = 1(48)$$

$$= 2(24)$$

$$= 3(16)$$

$$= 4(12)$$

$$= 6(8) \rightarrow -6 + (-8) = -14$$

Therefore, -14x=-6x-8x. Substitute the new terms and factor by grouping.

$$y^{2}-14x+48 = x^{2}-6x-8x+48$$
$$= x(x-6)-8(x-6)$$
$$= (x-6)(x-8)$$

Answer: (x-6)(x-8). The check is left to the reader.

At this point, it is recommended that the reader stop and factor as many trinomials of the form  $x_2+bx+c$  as time allows before moving on to the next section. Factoring trinomials is one of the more important skills that we learn in this course and should be mastered.

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Factor a trinomial by systematically guessing what factors give two binomials whose product is the original trinomial.
- If a trinomial of the form  $x_2+bx+c$  factors into the product of two binomials, then the coefficient of the middle term is the sum of factors of the last term.
- Not all trinomials can be factored as the product of binomials with integer coefficients. In this case, we call it a prime trinomial.
- Factoring is one of the more important skills required in algebra. For this
  reason, you should practice working as many problems as it takes to
  become proficient.

# **6.3** Factoring Trinomials of the Form $ax^2 + bx + c$

## **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

1. Factor trinomials of the form ax2+bx+c.

#### 2. Factor trinomials with a common factor.

# Factoring Trinomials of the Form $ax^2 + bx + c$

Factoring trinomials of the form  $ax_2+bx+c$  can be challenging because the middle term is affected by the factors of both a and c. To illustrate this, consider the following factored trinomial:

$$10x^2 + 17x + 3 = (2x + 3)(5x + 1)$$

We can multiply to verify that this is the correct factorization.

$$(2x+3)(5x+1) = 10x^2 + 2x + 15x + 3$$
$$= 10x^2 + 17x + 3$$

As we have seen before, the product of the first terms of each binomial is equal to the first term of the trinomial. The middle term of the trinomial is the sum of the products of the outer and inner terms of the binomials. The product of the last terms of each binomial is equal to the last term of the trinomial. Visually, we have the following:

First term

Middle term

$$2x$$

$$(2x+3)(5x+1) \quad (2x+3)(5x+1) \quad (2x+3)(5x+1)$$

$$+ 15x$$

$$17x$$
Last term

In general,

$$ax^{2} + bx + c = (px + m)(qx + n)$$

$$= pqx^{2} + pnx + qmx + mn$$

$$= pqx^{2} + (pn + qm)x + mn$$

This gives us,

$$a = pq$$
 and  $b = pn + qm$ , where  $c = mn$ 

In short, when the leading coefficient of a trinomial is something other than 1, there will be more to consider when determining the factors using the trial and error method. The key lies in the understanding of how the middle term is obtained. Multiply (2x+5)(3x+7) and carefully follow the formation of the middle term.

$$(2x+5)(3x+7) = 2x \cdot 3x + 2x \cdot 7 + 5 \cdot 3x + 5 \cdot 7$$

$$= 6x^{2} + 14x + 15x + 35$$

$$= 6x^{2} + 29x + 35$$

If we think of the FOIL method for multiplying binomials, then the middle term results from the sum of the inner product and the outer product. In this case, 14x+15x=29x, as illustrated below:

Outer product
$$(2x+5)(3x+7) = 6x^{2} + 29x + 35$$
Inner product

For this reason, we need to look for products of the factors of the first and last terms whose sum is equal to the coefficient of the middle term. For example, to factor  $6x^2+29x+35$ , look at the factors of 6 and 35.

$$6 = 1.6$$
  $35 = 1.35$   $= 2.3$   $= 5.7$ 

The combination that produces the coefficient of the middle term is 2.7+3.5=14+15=29. Make sure that the outer terms have coefficients 2 and 7, and that the inner terms have coefficients 5 and 3. Use this information to factor the trinomial:

$$6x^{2} + 29x + 35 = (2x ?)(3x ?)$$
$$= (2x + 5)(3x + 7)$$

**Example 1:** Factor:  $3x_2+7x+2$ .

**Solution:** Since the leading coefficient and the last term are both prime, there is only one way to factor each.

$$3 = 1 \cdot 3$$
 and  $2 = 1 \cdot 2$ 

Begin by writing the factors of the first term, 3x2, as follows:

$$3x^2 + 7x + 2 = (x \quad ?)(3x \quad ?)$$

The middle and last term are both positive; therefore, the factors of 2 are chosen as positive numbers. In this case, the only choice is in which grouping to place these factors.

$$(x+1)(3x+2)$$
 or  $(x+2)(3x+1)$ 

Determine which grouping is correct by multiplying each expression.

$$(x+1) (3x+2) = 3x^{2} + 2x + 3x + 2$$

$$= 3x^{2} + 5x + 2 \qquad \times$$

$$(x+2) (3x+1) = 3x^{2} + x + 6x + 2$$

$$= 3x^{2} + 7x + 2 \qquad \checkmark$$

Notice that these products differ only in their middle terms. Also, notice that the middle term is the sum of the inner and outer product, as illustrated below:

$$(x+1)(3x+2) = 3x^2 + 5x + 2$$

$$(x+2)(3x+1) = 3x^2 + 7x + 2$$

Answer: (x+2)(3x+1)

**Example 2:** Factor: 12*x*2+38*x*+20.

Solution: First, consider the factors of the first and last terms.

$$12 = 1.12$$
  $20 = 1.20$   
=  $2.6$  =  $2.10$   
=  $3.4$  =  $4.5$ 

We search for products of factors whose sum equals the coefficient of the middle term, 38. For brevity, the thought process is illustrated starting with the factors 2 and 6. Factoring begins at this point with the first term.

$$12x^2 + 38x + 20 = (2x ?)(6x ?)$$

We search for factors of 20 that along with the factors of 12 produce a middle term of 38x.

Factors of 20

Possible factorization

$$\begin{cases}
(2x+1) (6x+20) & middle \ term \implies 46x \\
(2x+20) (6x+1) & middle \ term \implies 122x
\end{cases}$$

$$2 \cdot 10$$

$$\begin{cases}
(2x+2) (6x+10) & middle \ term \implies 32x \\
(2x+10) (6x+2) & middle \ term \implies 64x
\end{cases}$$

$$4 \cdot 5$$

$$\begin{cases}
(2x+4) (6x+5) & middle \ term \implies 34x \\
(2x+5) (6x+4) & middle \ term \implies 38x
\end{cases}$$

Here the last combination produces a middle term of 38x.

$$(2x+5)(6x+4) = 12x^2 + 38x + 20$$

Answer: (2x+5)(6x+4)

**Example 3:** Factor:  $10x_2-23x+6$ .

**Solution:** First, consider the factors of the first and last terms.

$$10 = 1.10$$
  $6 = 1.6$   $= 2.3$ 

We are searching for products of factors whose sum equals the coefficient of the middle term, -23. Factoring begins at this point with two sets of blank parentheses:

$$10x^2 - 23x + 6 = ($$
 )( )

Since the last term is positive and the middle term is negative, we know that both factors of the last term must be negative. Here we list all possible combinations with the factors of  $10x_2=2x\cdot 5x$ .

$$10x^{2} - 23x + 6 = (2x \quad ?)(5x \quad ?)$$

$$(2x-1)(5x-6) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -17x$$

$$(2x-6)(5x-1) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -32x$$

$$(2x-2)(5x-3) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -16x$$

$$(2x-3)(5x-2) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -19x$$

There is no combination that produces a middle term of -23x. We then move on to the factors of  $10x2=10x \cdot x$  and list all possible combinations:

?)

$$10x^{2}-23x+6=(10x ?)(x ?)$$

$$(10x-1)(x-6) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -61x$$

$$(10x-6)(x-1) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -16x$$

$$(10x-2)(x-3) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -32x$$

$$(10x-3)(x-2) \quad \text{middle term} \Rightarrow -23x \checkmark$$

And we can write

$$(10x-3)(x-2) = 10x^2 - 23x + 6$$

Answer: (10x-3)(x-2). The complete check is left to the reader.

We can reduce much of the guesswork involved in factoring trinomials if we consider all of the factors of the first and last terms and their products.

**Example 4:** Factor:  $5x_2+38x-16$ .

**Solution:** We begin with the factors of 5 and 16.

$$5 = 1.5$$

$$5 = 2.8$$

$$= 4.4$$

Since the leading coefficient is prime, we can begin with the following:

$$5x^2 + 38x - 16 = (x ?)(5x ?)$$

We look for products of the factors of 5 and 16 that could possibly add to 38.

Factors of 16		Poss	ible produ	icts			
1.16	$\int 1 \cdot 1$	and	5.16	$products \Rightarrow 1$ $products \Rightarrow 16$	and	80

Since the last term is negative, we must look for factors with opposite signs. Here we can see that the products 2 and 40 add up to 38 if they have opposite signs:

$$1 \cdot (-2) + 5 \cdot 8 = -2 + 40 = 38$$

Therefore, use -2 and 8 as the factors of 16, making sure that the inner and outer products are -2x and 40x:

$$(x+8)(5x-2) = 5x^2 + 38x - 16$$

Answer: (x+8)(5x-2). The complete check is left to the reader.

After lots of practice, the process described in the previous example can be performed mentally.

**Try this!** Factor: 12*x*2–31*x*–30.

Answer: (3x-10)(4x+3)

When given trinomials with multiple variables, the process is similar.

**Example 5:** Factor: 9*x*2+30*xy*+25*y*2.

**Solution:** Search for factors of the first and last terms such that the sum of the inner and outer products equals the middle term.

$$9x^{2} = 1x \cdot 9x$$

$$= 3x \cdot 3x$$

$$25y^{2} = 1y \cdot 25y$$

$$= 5y \cdot 5y$$

Add the following products to obtain the middle term:  $3x \cdot 5y + 3x \cdot 5y = 30xy$ .

$$9x^{2} + 30xy + 25y^{2} = (3x) (3x)$$
$$= (3x + 5y)(3x + 5y)$$
$$= (3x + 5y)^{2}$$

In this example, we have a perfect square trinomial. Check.

$$(3x+5y)^{2} = 9x^{2} + 2 \cdot 3x \cdot 5y + 25y^{2}$$
$$= 9x^{2} + 30xy + 25y^{2}$$

Answer:  $(3x+5y)^2$ 

**Try this!** Factor: 16*x*2-24*xy*+9*y*2.

Answer:  $(4x-3y)^2$ 

## **Factoring Trinomials with Common Factors**

It is a good practice to first factor out the GCF, if there is one. Doing this produces a trinomial factor with smaller coefficients. As we have seen, trinomials with smaller coefficients require much less effort to factor. This commonly overlooked step is worth identifying early.

**Example 6:** Factor: 12*x*2-27*x*+6.

**Solution:** Begin by factoring out the GCF.

$$12x^2 - 27x + 6 = 3(4x^2 - 9x + 2)$$

After factoring out 3, the coefficients of the resulting trinomial are smaller and have fewer factors.

$$4 = 1 \cdot 4$$

$$= 2 \cdot 2$$

$$2 = 1 \cdot 2$$

After some thought, we can see that the combination that gives the coefficient of the middle term is 4(-2)+1(-1)=-8-1=-9.

$$3(4x^{2}-9x+2) = 3(4x ?)(x ?)$$
$$= 3(4x-1)(x-2)$$

Check.

$$3 (4x-1)(x-2) = 3 (4x^2 - 8x - x + 2)$$

$$= 3 (4x^2 - 9x + 2)$$

$$= 12x^2 - 27x + 6$$

The factor 3 is part of the factored form of the original expression; be sure to include it in the answer.

Answer: 3(4x-1)(x-2)

It is a good practice to consistently work with trinomials where the leading coefficient is positive.

**Example 7:** Factor:  $-x_2+2x+15$ .

**Solution:** In this example, the leading coefficient is -1. Before beginning the factoring process, factor out the -1:

$$-x^2 + 2x + 15 = -1(x^2 - 2x - 15)$$

At this point, factor the remaining trinomial as usual, remembering to write the -1 as a factor in your final answer. Because 3 + (-5) = -2, use 3 and 5 as the factors of 15.

$$-x^{2} + 2x + 15 = -1(x^{2} - 2x - 15)$$
$$= -1(x)(x)$$
$$= -1(x+3)(x-5)$$

Answer: -1(x+3)(x-5). The check is left to the reader.

**Example 8:** Factor: -60*a*2-5*a*+30.

**Solution:** The GCF of all the terms is 5. However, in this case factor out -5 because this produces a trinomial factor where the leading coefficient is positive.

$$-60a^2 - 5a + 30 = -5(12a^2 + a - 6)$$

Focus on the factors of 12 and 6 that combine to give the middle coefficient, 1.

$$12 = 1.12$$

$$= 2.6$$

$$= 3.4$$

$$6 = 1.6$$

$$= 2.3$$

After much thought, we find that 3.3-4.2=9-8=1. Factor the remaining trinomial.

$$-60a^{2} - 5a + 30 = -5(12a^{2} + a - 6)$$
$$= -5(4a)(3a)$$
$$= -5(4a+3)(3a-2)$$

Answer: -5(4a+3)(3a-2). The check is left to the reader.

**Try this!** Factor:  $24+2x-x^2$ .

Answer: -1(x-6)(x+4)

### **Factoring Using the AC Method**

In this section, we factor trinomials of the form  $ax_2+bx+c$  using the AC method described previously.

**Example 9:** Factor using the AC method: 18x2-21x+5.

**Solution:** Here a = 18, b = -21, and c = 5.

$$ac = 18(5)$$
$$= 90$$

Factor 90 and search for factors whose sum is -21.

$$90 = 1(90)$$
  
= 2(45)  
= 3(30)  
= 5(18)  
= 6(15)  $\checkmark$   
= 9(10)

In this case, the sum of the factors -6 and -15 equals the middle coefficient, -21. Therefore, -21x=-6x-15x, and we can write

$$18x^2 - 21x + 5 = 18x^2 - 6x - 15x + 5$$

Factor the equivalent expression by grouping.

$$18x^{2} - 21x + 5 = 18x^{2} - 6x - 15x + 5$$
$$= 6x (3x - 1) - 5 (3x - 1)$$
$$= (3x - 1) (6x - 5)$$

Answer: (3x-1)(6x-5)

**Example 10:** Factor using the AC method:  $9x_2-61x-14$ .

**Solution:** Here a = 9, b = -61, and c = -14.

$$ac = 9(-14)$$
$$= -126$$

We factor -126 as follows:

$$-126 = 1(-126)$$

$$= 2(-63) \checkmark$$

$$= 3(-42)$$

$$= 6(-21)$$

$$= 7(-18)$$

$$= 9(-14)$$

The sum of factors 2 and -63 equals the middle coefficient, -61. Replace -61xwith 2x-63x:

$$9x^{2}-61x-14 = 9x^{2}+2x-63x-14$$
 Rearrange the terms.  
 $=9x^{2}-63x+2x-14$  Factor by grouping.  
 $=9x(x-7)+2(x-7)$   
 $=(x-7)(9x+2)$ 

Answer: (x-7)(9x+2). The check is left to the reader.

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- If a trinomial of the form  $ax_2+bx+c$  factors into the product of two binomials, then the coefficient of the middle term will be the sum of certain products of factors of the first and last terms.
- If the trinomial has a greatest common factor, then it is a best practice to first factor out the GCF before attempting to factor it into a product of binomials.
- If the leading coefficient of a trinomial is negative, then it is a best practice to factor that negative factor out before attempting to factor the trinomial.
- Factoring trinomials of the form  $ax_2+bx+c$  takes lots of practice and patience. It is extremely important to take the time to become proficient by working lots of exercises.

# **6.4** Factoring Special Binomials

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Factor binomials that are differences of squares.
- 2. Factor binomials that are sums and differences of cubes.

### **Difference of Squares**

A binomial is a polynomial with two terms. We begin with our first special binomial called difference of squares:

$$a^{2} - b^{2} = (a+b)(a-b)$$

To verify the above formula, multiply:

$$(a+b)(a-b) = a2 - ab + ba - b2$$
$$= a2 - ab + ab - b2$$
$$= a2 - b2$$

We use this formula to factor certain special binomials.

**Example 1:** Factor: *x*2–16.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Identify the binomial as difference of squares and determine the square factors of each term.

Difference of Squares
$$x^{2}-16$$

$$x^{2}-16$$

$$x^{2}-16$$

Here we can write

$$x^2 - 16 = (x)^2 - (4)^2$$

The terms are squares of x and 4. Hence a=x and b=4.

Step 2: Substitute into the difference of squares formula.

$$a^{2}-b^{2} = (a+b)(a-b)$$

$$x^{2}-16 = (x+4)(x-4)$$

Step 3: Multiply to check. This step is optional.

$$(x+4)(x-4) = x^2 - 4x + 4x - 16$$
$$= x^2 - 16$$

Answer: (x+4)(x-4)

It is worth taking some extra time at this point to review all of the squares of integers from 1 to 12.

$1^2 = 1$	$7^2 = 49$
$2^2 = 4$	$8^2 = 64$
$3^2 = 9$	$9^2 = 81$
$4^2 = 16$	$10^2 = 100$
$5^2 = 25$	$11^2 = 121$
$6^2 = 36$	$12^2 = 144$

Recognizing these perfect square integers helps speed the factoring process.

**Example 2:** Factor: 9*x*2–121.

**Solution:** The subtraction indicates that this is a difference. Furthermore, we recognize that the terms are squares.

$$9x^2 - 121 = (3x)^2 - (11)^2$$

In this case, a=3x and b=11. Substitute into the formula for difference of squares.

$$a^{2} - b^{2} = (a+b)(a-b)$$
$$9x^{2} - 121 = (3x+11)(3x-11)$$

Answer: (3x+11)(3x-11)

It may be the case that the terms of the binomial have a common factor. If so, it will be difficult to identify the perfect squares until we first factor out the GCF.

**Example 3:** Factor: 12*y*2–75.

**Solution:** The terms are not perfect squares. However, notice that they do have a common factor. First, factor out the GCF, 3.

$$12y^2 - 75 = 3(4y^2 - 25)$$

The resulting binomial factor is a difference of squares with a=2y and b=5.

$$12y^{2} - 75 = 3(4y^{2} - 25)$$
$$= 3(2y + 5)(2y - 5)$$

Answer: 3(2y+5)(2y-5)

**Example 4:** Factor: 49*x*2–100*y*2.

**Solution:** Here we have a binomial with two variables and recognize that it is a difference of squares.

$$49x^2 - 100y^2 = (7x)^2 - (10y)^2$$

Therefore, a=7x and b=10y. Substitute into the formula for difference of squares.

$$a^{2} - b^{2} = (a+b)(a-b)$$

$$49x^{2} - 100y^{2} = (7x+10y)(7x-10y)$$

Answer: (7x+10y)(7x-10y)

**Try this!** Factor: 36*x*2–1.

Answer: (6x+1)(6x-1)

Given any real number b, a polynomial of the form  $x_2+b_2$  is prime. Furthermore, the sum of squares  $a_2+b_2$  does not have a general factored equivalent. Care should be taken not to confuse this with a perfect square trinomial:

$$(a+b)^{2} = (a+b)(a+b)$$

$$= a^{2} + ab + ba + b^{2}$$

$$= a^{2} + 2ab + b^{2}$$

Therefore,

$$(a+b)^2 \neq a^2 + b^2$$

When the degree of the special binomial is greater than two, we may need to apply the difference of squares formula multiple times. A polynomial is completely factored when none of the factors can be factored any further.

**Example 5:** Factor completely: *x*4–16.

**Solution:** First, identify what is being squared:

$$x^4 - 16 = ()^2 - ()^2$$

To do this, recall the power rule for exponents,  $(x_m)_n=x_{mn}$ . When exponents are raised to a power, multiply them. With this in mind, determine that  $(x_2)_2=x_4$  and write

$$x^4 - 16 = (x^2)^2 - (4)^2$$

Therefore,  $a=x_2$  and b=4. Substitute into the formula for difference of squares.

$$x^4 - 16 = (x^2 + 4)(x^2 - 4)$$

At this point, notice that the factor  $(x_2-4)$  is itself a difference of two squares and thus can be further factored using a=x and b=2. The factor  $(x_2+4)$  is a sum of squares, which cannot be factored using real numbers.

$$x^{4} - 16 = (x^{2} + 4) (x^{2} - 4)$$
$$= (x^{2} + 4) (x + 2) (x - 2)$$

Answer:  $(x_2+4)(x+2)(x-2)$ 

**Try this!** Factor completely: 81*x*4–1.

Answer:  $(9x_2+1)(3x+1)(3x-1)$ 

### **Sum and Difference of Cubes**

Two other special binomials of interest are the sum and difference of cubes:

$$a^3 + b^3 = (a+b)(a^2 - ab + b^2)$$

$$a^{3}-b^{3}=(a-b)(a^{2}+ab+b^{2})$$

We can verify these formulas by multiplying:

$$(a+b)(a^2 - ab + b^2) = a^3 - a^2b + ab^2 + a^2b - ab^2 + b^3$$
$$= a^3 + b^3 \quad \checkmark$$

$$(a-b)(a^2+ab+b^2) = a^3 + a^2b + ab^2 - a^2b - ab^2 - b^3$$
$$= a^3 - b^3 \quad \checkmark$$

The process for factoring the sum and difference of cubes is very similar to that for the difference of squares. We first identify a and b and then substitute into the appropriate formula. The separate formulas for sum and difference of cubes allow us to always choose a and b to be positive.

**Example 6:** Factor: *x*3+8.

**Solution:** The plus sign and the fact that the terms are cubes indicate to us that this is a sum of cubes.

Sum of Cubes  

$$\downarrow$$
  $\downarrow$   $\downarrow$   $\downarrow$   
 $x^3 + 8$ 

Next, identify what is being cubed.

$$x^3 + 8 = (x)^3 + (2)^3$$

In this case, a=x and b=2. Substitute into the sum of cubes formula.

The resulting trinomial is prime and the factoring is complete. We can check this factorization by multiplying.

$$(x+2)(x^2-2x+4) = x^3 - 2x^2 + 4x + 2x^2 - 4x + 8$$

$$= x^3 - 2x^2 + 4x + 2x^2 - 4x + 8$$

$$= x^3 + 8$$

Answer:  $(x+2)(x^2-2x+4)$ 

It is helpful to review the perfect cubes of integers from 1 to 12. This will aid you in identifying sums and differences of cubes.

$$1^{3} = 1$$
  $7^{3} = 343$   
 $2^{3} = 8$   $8^{3} = 512$   
 $3^{3} = 27$   $9^{3} = 729$   
 $4^{3} = 64$   $10^{3} = 1000$   
 $5^{3} = 125$   $11^{3} = 1331$   
 $6^{3} = 216$   $12^{3} = 1728$ 

**Example 7:** Factor: *y*3–125.

Solution: In this case, we have a difference of cubes.

Difference of Cubes  

$$y^3 - 125$$
  $y^3 - 125$ 

We can write

$$y^3 - 125 = (y)^3 - (5)^3$$

Substitute a=y and b=5 into the formula for difference of cubes.

$$a^{3}-b^{3} = (a-b)(a^{2}+ab+b^{2})$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$y^{3}-125 = (y-5)(y^{2}+y\cdot 5+5^{2})$$

$$= (y-5)(y^{2}+5y+25)$$

Answer:  $(y-5)(y_2+5y+25)$ 

Always look for common factors when factoring. If the terms of the binomial have a GCF other than 1, then factor that out first.

**Example 8:** Factor: 54*x*4+128*x*.

**Solution:** Begin by factoring out the GCF 2x.

$$54x^4 + 128x = 2x(27x^3 + 64)$$

The resulting binomial factor is a sum of cubes, where a=3x and b=4.

$$54x^{4} + 128x = 2x(27x^{3} + 64)$$

$$= 2x(3x + 4)((3x)^{2} - (3x)(4) + 4^{2})$$

$$= 2x(3x + 4)(9x^{2} - 12x + 16)$$

Answer: 2x(3x+4)(9x-12x+16)

**Example 9:** Factor: *x*3*y*3–1.

**Solution:** This binomial is a difference of cubes with two variables. Identify what is being cubed.

$$x^{3}y^{3}-1=(xy)^{3}-(1)^{3}$$

Here a=xy and b=1. Substitute into the appropriate formula and simplify.

$$a^{3}-b^{3} = (a-b)(a^{2}+ab+b^{2})$$

$$x^{3}y^{3}-1 = (xy-1)((xy)^{2}+xy\cdot 1+1^{2})$$

$$= (xy-1)(x^{2}y^{2}+xy+1)$$

Answer: (xy-1)(x2y2+xy+1)

**Try this!** Factor: 8*x*3+343.

Answer: (2x+7)(4x-14x+49)

When factoring, always look for resulting factors to factor further.

**Example 10:** Factor completely: *x*6–64.

**Solution:** When confronted with a binomial that is both a difference of squares and cubes, as this is, make it a rule to factor using difference of squares first.

$$x^6 - 64 = (x^3)^2 - (8)^2$$

Therefore,  $a=x_3$  and b=8. Substitute into the difference of squares formula.

$$x^6 - 64 = (x^3 + 8)(x^3 - 8)$$

The resulting two binomial factors are a sum and a difference of cubes. Each can be factored further.

$$x^3 + 8 = (x + 2)(x^2 - 2x + 2^2)$$

$$x^3 - 8 = (x - 2)(x^2 + 2x + 2^2)$$

Therefore, we have

$$x^{6} - 64 = (x^{3} + 8) \cdot (x^{3} - 8)$$

$$= (x + 2)(x^{2} - 2x + 4) \cdot (x - 2)(x^{2} + 2x + 4)$$

As an exercise, factor the previous example as a difference of cubes first and then compare the results. Why do you think we make it a rule to factor using difference of squares first?

**Try this!** Factor: *x*6–*y*6.

Answer:  $(x+y)(x^2-xy+y^2)(x-y)(x^2+xy+y^2)$ 

# **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- When factoring special binomials, the first step is to identify it as a sum or difference. Once we identify the binomial, we then determine the values of *a* and *b* and substitute into the appropriate formula.
- The formulas for all of the special binomials should be memorized. In addition, to help facilitate the identification of special binomials, memorize the squares and cubes of integers up to at least 12.
- If a binomial is both a difference of squares and cubes, then first factor it as a difference of squares.

# **6.5** General Guidelines for Factoring Polynomials

### LEARNING OBJECTIVE

1. Develop a general strategy for factoring polynomials.

### **General Factoring Strategy**

We have learned various techniques for factoring polynomials with up to four terms. The challenge is to identify the type of polynomial and then decide which method to apply. The following outlines a **general guideline for factoring**polynomials:

- 1. Check for common factors. If the terms have common factors, then factor out the greatest common factor (GCF) and look at the resulting polynomial factors to factor further.
- 2. Determine the number of terms in the polynomial.
- a. Factor four-term polynomials by grouping.
- b. Factor trinomials (three terms) using "trial and error" or the AC method.
- c. Factor binomials (two terms) using the following special products:

Difference of squares:	a2-b2=(a+b)(a-b)
Sum of squares:	<i>a</i> 2+ <i>b</i> 2 no general formula
Difference of cubes:	$a_3-b_3=(a-b)(a_2+a_b+b_2)$

Sum of cubes:	$a_3+b_3=(a+b)(a_2-a_b+b_2)$

- 3. Look for factors that can be factored further.
- 4. Check by multiplying.

### Note

- If a binomial is both a difference of squares and a difference of cubes, then first factor it as difference of squares and then as a sum and difference of cubes to obtain a more complete factorization.
- Not all polynomials with integer coefficients factor. When this is the case, we say that the polynomial is prime.

If an expression has a GCF, then factor this out first. Doing so is often overlooked and typically results in factors that are easier to work with. Also, look for the resulting factors to factor further; many factoring problems require more than one step. A polynomial is completely factored when none of the factors can be factored further.

**Example 1:** Factor: 6x4-3x3-24x2+12x.

**Solution:** This four-term polynomial has a GCF of 3x. Factor this out first.

$$6x^4 - 3x^3 - 24x^2 + 12x = 3x(2x^3 - x^2 - 8x + 4)$$

Now factor the resulting four-term polynomial by grouping.

$$6x^{4} - 3x^{3} - 24x^{2} + 12x = 3x \left(\underbrace{2x^{3} - x^{2}}_{group} \underbrace{-8x + 4}_{group}\right)$$

$$= 3x \left(x^{2} (2x - 1) - 4 (2x - 1)\right)$$

$$= 3x \left((2x - 1)(x^{2} - 4)\right)$$

$$= 3x (2x - 1)(x^{2} - 4)$$

The factor  $(x^2-4)$  is a difference of squares and can be factored further.

$$= 3x (2x-1) (x^2-4)$$
$$= 3x (2x-1)(x+2)(x-2)$$

Answer: 3x(2x-1)(x+2)(x-2)

**Example 2:** Factor: 18*x*3*y*-60*x*2*y*+50*xy*.

**Solution:** This trinomial has a GCF of 2xy. Factor this out first.

$$18x^{3}y - 60x^{2}y + 50xy = 2xy(9x^{2} - 30x + 25)$$

The trinomial factor can be factored further using the trial and error method. Use the factors 9=3.3 and  $25=(-5)\cdot(-5)$ . These combine to generate the correct coefficient for the middle term: 3(-5)+3(-5)=-15-15=-30.

$$18x^{3}y - 60x^{2}y + 50xy = 2xy(9x^{2} - 30x + 25)$$

$$= 2xy(3x - 7)(3x - 7)$$

$$= 2xy(3x - 5)(3x - 5)$$

$$= 2xy(3x - 5)^{2}$$

Check.

$$2xy (3x-5)^{2} = 2xy (9x^{2} - 2 \cdot 3x \cdot 5 + 5^{2})$$
$$= 2xy (9x^{2} - 30x + 25)$$
$$= 18x^{3}y - 60x^{2}y + 50xy$$

Answer: 2xy(3x-5)2

**Example 3:** Factor: 5*a*3*b*4+10*a*2*b*3-75*ab*2.

**Solution:** This trinomial has a GCF of 5ab2. Factor this out first.

$$5a^3b^4 + 10a^2b^3 - 75ab^2 = 5ab^2(a^2b^2 + 2ab - 15)$$

The resulting trinomial factor can be factored as follows:

$$5a^{3}b^{4} + 10a^{2}b^{3} - 75ab^{2} = 5ab^{2} (a^{2}b^{2} + 2ab - 15)$$
$$= 5ab^{2} (ab ?) (ab ?)$$
$$= 5ab^{2} (ab + 5) (ab - 3)$$

Answer: 5ab2(ab+5)(ab-3)

**Try this!** Factor: 3*x*3*y*-12*x*2*y*2+12*xy*3.

Answer: 3xy(x-2y)2

**Example 4:** Factor: 16y4-1.

**Solution:** This binomial does not have a GCF. Therefore, begin factoring by identifying it as a difference of squares.

$$16y^4 - 1 = (4y^2)^2 - (1)^2$$

Here  $a=4y_2$  and b=1. Substitute into the formula for difference of squares.

$$a^2 - b^2 = (a+b)(a-b)$$

$$16y^4 - 1 = (4y^2 + 1)(4y^2 - 1)$$

The factor (4y2+1) is a sum of squares and is prime. However, (4y2-1) is a difference of squares and can be factored further.

$$16y^{4} - 1 = (4y^{2} + 1)(4y^{2} - 1)$$
$$= (4y^{2} + 1)(2y + 1)(2y - 1)$$

Answer:  $(4y_2+1)(2y+1)(2y-1)$ 

**Example 5:** Factor: *x*6–64*y*6.

**Solution:** This binomial is a difference of squares and a difference of cubes. When this is the case, first factor it as a difference of squares.

$$x^6 - 64y^6 = (x^3)^2 - (8y^3)^2$$

We can write

$$x^6 - 64y^6 = (x^3 + 8y^3)(x^3 - 8y^3)$$

Each factor can be further factored either as a sum or difference of cubes, respectively.

$$x^{3} + 8y^{3} = (x)^{3} + (2y)^{3} = (x + 2y)(x^{2} - 2xy + 4y^{2})$$

$$x^3 - 8y^3 = (x)^3 - (2y)^3 = (x - 2y)(x^2 + 2xy + 4y^2)$$

Therefore,

$$x^{6} - 64y^{6} = (x^{3} + 8y^{3})(x^{3} - 8y^{3})$$
$$= (x + 2y)(x^{2} - 2xy + 4y^{2})(x - 2y)(x^{2} + 2xy + 4y^{2})$$

Answer:  $(x+2y)(x^2-2xy+4y^2)(x-2y)(x^2+2xy+4y^2)$ 

**Example 6:** Factor:  $x_2-(2x-1)_2$ .

**Solution:** First, identify this expression as a difference of squares.

$$x^{2} - (2x-1)^{2} = (x)^{2} - (2x-1)^{2}$$

Here use a=x and b=2x-1 in the formula for a difference of squares.

$$a^{2} - b^{2} = (a+b)(a-b)$$

$$x^{2} - (2x-1)^{2} = [(x+(2x-1))][(x-(2x-1))]$$

$$= (x+2x-1)(x-2x+1)$$

$$= (3x-1)(-x+1)$$

Answer: (3x-1)(-x+1)

**Try this!** Factor: *x*4+2*x*3+27*x*+54.

Answer:  $(x+2)(x+3)(x^2-3x+9)$ 

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Use the polynomial type to determine the method used to factor it.
- It is a best practice to look for and factor out the greatest common factor (GCF) first. This will facilitate further factoring and simplify the process.
   Be sure to include the GCF as a factor in the final answer.

- Look for resulting factors to factor further. It is often the case that factoring requires more than one step.
- If a binomial can be considered as both a difference of squares and a difference of cubes, then first factor it as a difference of squares. This results in a more complete factorization.

# **6.6** Solving Equations by Factoring

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Verify solutions to quadratic equations.
- 2. Solve quadratic equations by factoring.
- 3. Determine a quadratic equation with given solutions.
- 4. Solve polynomial equations by factoring.

## **Solving Quadratic Equations by Factoring**

Learning how to solve equations is one of our main goals in algebra. Up to this point, we have solved linear equations, which are of degree 1. In this section, we will learn a technique that can be used to solve certain equations of degree 2. A quadratic equation is any equation that can be written in the standard form

$$ax^2 + bx + c = 0,$$



where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ . The following are some examples of quadratic equations, all of which will be solved in this section:

$$x^{2} + x - 6 = 0$$
$$4x^{2} - 9 = 0$$
$$2x^{2} + 10x + 20 = -3x + 5$$

A solution of a quadratic equation in standard form is called a root. Quadratic equations can have two real solutions, one real solution, or no real solution. The quadratic equation  $x_2+x-6=0$  has two solutions, namely, x=-3 and x=2.

**Example 1:** Verify that x=-3 and x=2 are solutions to  $x_2+x-6=0$ .

**Solution:** To verify solutions, substitute the values for *x* and then simplify to see if a true statement results.

Check: 
$$x = -3$$
  
 $x^2 + x - 6 = 0$   
 $(-3)^2 + (-3) - 6 = 0$   
 $9 - 3 - 6 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Check:  $x = 2$   
 $x^2 + x - 6 = 0$   
 $(2)^2 + (2) - 6 = 0$   
 $4 + 2 - 6 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Answer: Both values produce true statements. Therefore, they are both solutions to the equation.

Our goal is to develop algebraic techniques for finding solutions to quadratic equations. The first technique requires the zero-product property:

If 
$$a \cdot b = 0$$
, then  $a = 0$  or  $b = 0$ 

In other words, if any product is equal to zero, then one or both of the variable factors must be equal to zero.

**Example 2:** Solve: (x-8)(x+7)=0.

**Solution:** This equation consists of a product of two quantities equal to zero; therefore, the zero-product property applies. One or both of the quantities must be zero.

$$(x-8) = 0$$
 or  $(x+7) = 0$   
 $x-8+8=0+8$   $x+7-7=0-7$   
 $x=8$   $x=-7$ 

To verify that these are solutions, substitute them for the variable x.

Check: 
$$x = 8$$

$$(x-8)(x+7) = 0$$

$$(8-8)(8+7) = 0$$

$$(0)(15) = 0$$

$$0 = 0 \checkmark$$
Check:  $x = -7$ 

$$(x-8)(x+7) = 0$$

$$(-7+8)(-7+7) = 0$$

$$(1)(0) = 0$$

$$0 = 0 \checkmark$$

Notice that each solution produces a factor that is equal to zero. Answer: The solutions are 8 and -7.

The quadratic equation may not be given in its factored form.

**Example 3:** Solve:  $x_2+3x-10=0$ .

**Solution:** The goal is to produce a product that is equal to zero. We can do that by factoring the trinomial on the left side of the equation.

$$x^{2} + 3x - 10 = 0$$
  
 $(x \ ?)(x \ ?) = 0$   $-10 = 5(-2)$   
 $and \ 3 = 5 + (-2)$   
 $(x + 5)(x - 2) = 0$ 

Next, apply the zero-product property and set each factor equal to zero.

$$x + 5 = 0$$
 or  $x - 2 = 0$ 

This leaves us with two linear equations, each of which can be solved for x.

$$x+5-5=0-5$$
  $x-2+2=0+2$   
 $x=-5$   $x=2$ 

Check the solutions by substituting into the original equation to verify that we obtain true statements.

Check: 
$$x = -5$$
  
 $x^2 + 3x - 10 = 0$   
 $(-5)^2 + 3(-5) - 10 = 0$   
 $25 - 15 - 10 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Check:  $x = 2$   
 $x^2 + 3x - 10 = 0$   
 $(2)^2 + 3(2) - 10 = 0$   
 $4 + 6 - 10 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Answer: The solutions are -5 and 2.

Using the zero-product property after factoring a quadratic equation in standard form is the key to this technique. However, the quadratic equation may not be given in standard form, and so there may be some preliminary

steps before factoring. The steps required to solve by factoring are outlined in the following example.

**Example 4:** Solve:  $2x^2+10x+20=-3x+5$ .

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Express the quadratic equation in standard form. For the zero-product property to apply, the quadratic expression must be equal to zero. Use the addition and subtraction properties of equality to combine opposite-side like terms and obtain zero on one side of the equation. In this example, add 3x to and subtract 5 from both sides.

$$2x^{2} + 10x + 20 + 3x = -3x + 5 + 3x$$
$$2x^{2} + 13x + 20 = 5$$
$$2x^{2} + 13x + 20 - 5 = 5 - 5$$
$$2x^{2} + 13x + 15 = 0$$

**Step 2:** Factor the quadratic expression.

$$(2x+3)(x+5)=0$$

**Step 3:** Apply the zero-product property and set each variable factor equal to zero.

$$2x + 3 = 0$$
 or  $x + 5 = 0$ 

**Step 4:** Solve the resulting linear equations.

$$2x+3=0 or x+5=0$$

$$2x=-3 x=-5$$

$$\frac{2x}{2} = \frac{-3}{2}$$

$$x = -\frac{3}{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are -5 and -3/2. The check is optional.

**Example 5:** Solve:  $9x_2+1=6x$ .

**Solution:** Write this in standard form by subtracting 6x from both sides.

$$9x^2 + 1 - 6x = 6x - 6x$$

$$9x^2 - 6x + 1 = 0$$

Once the equation is in standard form, equal to zero, factor.

$$(3x-1)(3x-1) = 0$$

This is a perfect square trinomial. Hence setting each factor equal to zero results in a repeated solution.

$$3x-1=0$$
 or  $3x-1=0$   
 $3x=1$   $3x=1$   
 $x=\frac{1}{3}$   $x=\frac{1}{3}$ 

A repeated solution is called a double root and does not have to be written twice.

Answer: The solution is 1/3.

**Try this!** Solve:  $x_2-3x=28$ .

Answer: x=-4 or x=7

Not all quadratic equations in standard form are trinomials. We often encounter binomials.

**Example 6:** Solve: *x*2–9=0.

**Solution:** This quadratic equation is given in standard form, where the binomial on the left side is a difference of squares. Factor as follows:

$$x^{2} - 9 = 0$$
$$(x+3)(x-3) = 0$$

Next, set each factor equal to zero and solve.

$$x + 3 = 0$$
 or  $x - 3 = 0$   
 $x = -3$   $x = 3$ 

Answer: The solutions are 3 and -3, which can also be written as  $\pm 3$ .

**Example 7:** Solve: 5x2=15x.

**Solution:** By inspection, we see that x=0 is a solution to this quadratic equation. Since dividing by zero is undefined, we want to avoid dividing both sides of this equation by x. In general, we wish to avoid dividing both sides of any equation by a variable or an expression containing a variable. We will discuss this in more detail later. The first step is to rewrite this equation in standard form with zero on one side.

$$5x^{2} = 15x$$

$$5x^{2} - 15x = 15x - 15x$$
Subtract 15x from both sides.
$$5x^{2} - 15x = 0$$

Next, factor the expression. Notice that the binomial on the left has a GCF of 5x.

$$5x^2 - 15x = 0$$

$$5x(x-3) = 0$$

Set each factor to equal to zero.

$$5x = 0 or x - 3 = 0$$

$$\frac{5x}{5} = \frac{0}{5}$$

$$x = 3$$

$$x = 0$$

Answer: The solutions are 0 and 3.

**Example 8:** Solve: (2x+1)(x+5)=11.

**Solution:** This quadratic equation appears to be factored; hence it might be tempting to set each factor equal to 11. However, this would lead to incorrect results. We must rewrite the equation in standard form, equal to zero, so that we can apply the zero-product property.

$$(2x+1)(x+5)=11$$

$$2x^{2}+10x+x+5=11$$

$$2x^{2}+11x+5-11=11-11$$

$$2x^{2}+11x-6=0$$

Once it is in standard form, we can factor and then set each factor equal to zero.

$$(2x-1)(x+6) = 0$$
  
 $2x-1=0$  or  $x+6=0$   
 $2x=1$   $x=-6$   
 $x=\frac{1}{2}$ 

Answer: The solutions are 1/2 and -6.

**Example 9:** Solve:  $15x_2-25x+10=0$ .

**Solution:** We begin by factoring out the GCF of 5. Then factor the resulting trinomial.

$$15x^2 - 25x + 10 = 0$$

$$5(3x^2-5x+2)=0$$

$$5(3x-2)(x-1)=0$$

Next, we set each  $variable\ factor$  equal to zero and solve for x.

$$3x-2=0 \quad \text{or} \quad x-1=0$$
$$3x=2 \qquad x=1$$
$$x=\frac{2}{3}$$

Notice that the factor 5 is not a variable factor and thus did not contribute to the solution set.

Answer: The solutions are 2/3 and 1.

**Example 10:** Factor: 52x2+76x-13=0.

**Solution:** Clear the fractions by multiplying both sides of the equation by the LCD, which is equal to 6.

$$\frac{5}{2}x^{2} + \frac{7}{6}x - \frac{1}{3} = 0$$

$$6 \cdot \left(\frac{5}{2}x^{2} + \frac{7}{6}x - \frac{1}{3}\right) = 6 \cdot (0)$$

$$15x^{2} + 7x - 2 = 0$$

At this point, we have an equivalent equation with integer coefficients and can factor as usual. Begin with the factors of 15 and 2.

$$15 = 1.15$$
  $2 = 1.2$   $= 3.5$ 

The coefficient of the middle term is 7=3(-1)+5(2). Factor as follows:

$$15x^{2} + 7x - 2 = 0$$
$$(3x + 2)(5x - 1) = 0$$

Set each factor equal to zero and solve.

$$3x+2=0$$
 or  $5x-1=0$   
 $3x=-2$   $5x=1$   
 $x=-\frac{2}{3}$   $x=\frac{1}{5}$ 

Answer: The solutions are -2/3 and 1/5.

**Try this!** Solve: 4*x*2–9=0. Answer: -3/2 and 3/2

# **Finding Equations with Given Solutions**

The zero-product property states,

If 
$$a \cdot b = 0$$
, then  $a = 0$  or  $b = 0$ 

And, in fact, the converse is true as well:

If 
$$a = 0$$
 or  $b = 0$ , then  $ab = 0$ 

When this is the case, we can write the following:

$$a \cdot b = 0$$
, if and only if  $a = 0$  or  $b = 0$ 

We use this property to find equations, given the solutions. To do this, the steps for solving by factoring are performed in reverse.

**Example 11:** Find a quadratic equation with solutions -7 and 2.

Solution: Given the solutions, we can determine two linear factors.

$$x = -7$$
 or  $x = 2$   
 $x + 7 = 0$   $x - 2 = 0$ 

The product of these linear factors is equal to zero when x=-7 or x=2:

$$(x+7)(x-2) = 0$$

Multiply the binomials and present the equation in standard form.

$$x^{2} - 2x + 7x - 14 = 0$$
$$x^{2} + 5x - 14 = 0$$

Answer:  $x_2+5x-14=0$ . We may check our equation by substituting the given answers to see if we obtain a true statement. Also, the equation found above

is not unique and so the check becomes essential when our equation looks different from someone else's. This is left as an exercise.

**Example 12:** Find a quadratic equation with integer coefficients, given solutions 1/2 and -3/4.

**Solution:** To avoid fractional coefficients, we first clear the fractions by multiplying both sides by the denominator.

$$x = \frac{1}{2}$$
 or 
$$x = -\frac{3}{4}$$
$$2 \cdot x = 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2}$$
 
$$4 \cdot x = -\frac{3}{4} \cdot 4$$
$$2x = 1$$
 
$$4x = -3$$
$$2x - 1 = 0$$
 
$$4x + 3 = 0$$

Apply the zero-product property and multiply.

$$(2x-1) (4x+3) = 0$$
$$8x^{2} + 6x - 4x - 3 = 0$$
$$8x^{2} + 2x - 3 = 0$$

Answer:  $8x_2+2x-3=0$ 

Try this! Find a quadratic equation with integer coefficients, given solutions -1 and 2/3.

Answer:  $3x_2+x-2=0$ 

# **Solving Polynomial Equations by Factoring**

The zero-product property is true for any number of factors that make up an equation. If an expression is equal to zero and can be factored into linear factors, then we will be able to set each factor equal to zero and solve for each equation.

**Example 13:** Solve: 3x(x-5)(3x-2)=0.

**Solution:** Set each variable factor equal to zero and solve.

$$3x = 0$$
 or  $x - 5 = 0$  or  $3x - 2 = 0$   
 $\frac{3x}{3} = \frac{0}{3}$   $x = 5$   $\frac{3x}{3} = \frac{2}{3}$   
 $x = 0$   $x = \frac{2}{3}$ 

Answer: The solutions are 0, 5, and 2/3.

Of course, we cannot expect the equation to be given in factored form.

**Example 14:** Solve:  $x_3+2x_2-9x-18=0$ .

Solution: Begin by factoring the left side completely.

$$x^{3} + 2x^{2} - 9x - 18 = 0$$
 Factor by grouping.  

$$x^{2}(x+2) - 9(x+2) = 0$$
 
$$(x+2)(x^{2}-9) = 0$$
 Factor as a difference of squares.  

$$(x+2)(x+3)(x-3) = 0$$

Set each factor equal to zero and solve.

$$x + 2 = 0$$
 or  $x + 3 = 0$  or  $x - 3 = 0$   
 $x = -2$   $x = -3$   $x = 3$ 

Answer: The solutions are -2, -3, and 3.

Notice that the degree of the polynomial is 3 and we obtained three solutions. In general, for any polynomial equation with one variable of degree n, the fundamental theorem of algebra guarantees n real solutions or fewer. We have seen that many polynomials do not factor. This does not imply that equations involving these unfactorable polynomials do not have real solutions. In fact, many polynomial equations that do not factor do have real solutions. We will learn how to solve these types of equations as we continue in our study of algebra.

**Try this!** Solve:  $-10x_3-18x_2+4x=0$ .

Answer: -2, 0, 1/5

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- A polynomial can have at most a number of solutions equal to its degree.
   Therefore, quadratic equations can have up to two real solutions.
- To solve a quadratic equation, first write it in standard form. Once the
  quadratic expression is equal to zero, factor it and then set each variable
  factor equal to zero. The solutions to the resulting linear equations are
  the solutions to the quadratic equation.
- Not all quadratic equations can be solved by factoring. We will learn how
  to solve quadratic equations that do not factor later in the course.

# **6.7** Applications Involving Quadratic Equations

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Set up and solve applications involving relationships between real numbers.
- 2. Set up and solve applications involving geometric relationships involving area and the Pythagorean theorem.
- 3. Set up and solve applications involving the height of projectiles.

### **Number Problems**

The algebraic setups of the word problems that we have previously encountered led to linear equations. When we translate the applications to algebraic setups in this section, the setups lead to quadratic equations. Just as before, we want to avoid relying on the "guess and check" method for solving applications. Using algebra to solve problems simplifies the process and is more reliable.

**Example 1:** One integer is 4 less than twice another integer, and their product is 96. Set up an algebraic equation and solve it to find the two integers.

**Solution:** First, identify the variables. Avoid two variables by using the relationship between the two unknowns.

Let *n* represent one of the integers.

twice 
$$4$$
 less than  $-4$ 

Let 2n-4 represent the other integer.

The key phrase, "their product is 96," indicates that we should multiply and set the product equal to 96.

$$n \cdot (2n - 4) = 96$$

Once we have the problem translated to a mathematical equation, we then solve. In this case, we can solve by factoring. The first step is to write the equation in standard form:

$$n \cdot (2n-4) = 96$$
 Distribute n.  
 $2n^2 - 4n = 96$  Subtract 96 from both sides.  
 $2n^2 - 4n - 96 = 0$ 

Next, factor completely and set each variable factor equal to zero.

$$2n^2 - 4n - 96 = 0$$
 Factor out the GCF, 2.  
 $2(n^2 - 2n - 48) = 0$  Factor the resulting trinomial.  
 $2(n+6)(n-8) = 0$  Set each variable factor equal to zero.

$$n+6=0 \quad or \quad n-8=0$$
$$n=-6 \qquad n=8$$

The problem calls for two integers whose product is +96. The product of two positive numbers is positive and the product of two negative numbers


is positive. Hence we can have two sets of solutions. Use 2n-4 to determine the other integers.

$$n = -6$$
  $n = 8$   
 $2n-4 = 2(-6)-4$   $2n-4 = 2(8)-4$   
 $= -12-4$   $= 16-4$   
 $= -16$   $= 12$ 

Answer: Two sets of integers solve this problem:  $\{8, 12\}$  and  $\{-6, -16\}$ . Notice that (8)(12) = 96 and (-6)(-16) = 96; our solutions check out.

With quadratic equations, we often obtain two solutions for the identified unknown. Although it may be the case that both are solutions to the equation, they may not be solutions to the problem. If a solution does not solve the original application, then we disregard it.

Recall that consecutive odd and even integers both are separated by two units.



**Example 2:** The product of two consecutive positive odd integers is 99. Find the integers.

#### Solution:

Let n represent the first positive odd integer. Let n + 2 represent the next positive odd integer The key phase, "product.. is 99," indicates that we should multiply and set the product equal to 99.

$$n \cdot (n+2) = 99$$

Rewrite the quadratic equation in standard form and solve by factoring.

$$n^{2} + 2n = 99$$
$$n^{2} + 2n - 99 = 0$$
$$(n-9)(n+11) = 0$$

$$n-9=0$$
 or  $n+11=0$   
 $n=9$   $n=-11$ 

Because the problem asks for positive integers, *n*=9 is the only solution. Back substitute to determine the next odd integer.

$$n + 2 = 9 + 2$$
$$= 11$$

Answer: The consecutive positive odd integers are 9 and 11.

**Example 3:** Given two consecutive positive odd integers, the product of the larger and twice the smaller is equal to 70. Find the integers.

#### Solution:

Let *n* represent the smaller positive odd integer.

Let n + 2 represent the next positive odd integer.

The key phrase "twice the smaller" can be translated to 2n. The phrase "product... is 70" indicates that we should multiply this by the larger odd integer and set the product equal to 70.

$$(n+2)\cdot 2n = 70$$

Solve by factoring.

$$(n+2) \cdot 2n = 70$$
 Distribute.  
 $2n^2 + 4n = 70$  Subtract 70 from both sides.  
 $2n^2 + 4n - 70 = 0$  Factor out the GCF, 2.  
 $2(n^2 + 2n - 35) = 0$  Factor the resulting trinomial.  
 $2(n-5)(n+7) = 0$  Set each variable factor equal to zero.

$$n-5=0$$
 or  $n+7=0$   
 $n=5$   $n=-7$ 

Because the problem asks for positive integers, n=5 is the only solution. Back substitute into n+2 to determine the next odd integer.

$$n+2=5+2$$
$$=7$$

Answer: The positive odd integers are 5 and 7.

**Try this!** The product of two consecutive positive even integers is 168. Find the integers.

Answer: The positive even integers are 12 and 14.


## **Geometry Problems**

When working with geometry problems, it is helpful to draw a picture. Below are some area formulas that you are expected to know. (*Recall that*  $\pi \approx 3.14$ .)

Area of a rectangle:	$A=l\cdot w$
Area of a square:	$A=s_2$
Area of a triangle:	A=12bh
Area of a circle:	$A=\pi r_2$

**Example 4:** The floor of a rectangular room has a length that is 4 feet more than twice its width. If the total area of the floor is 240 square feet, then find the dimensions of the floor.

### Solution:



twice its width 
$$4 \text{ feet more} \\ 2w + 4$$

Use the formula  $A=l\cdot w$  and the fact that the area is 240 square feet to set up an algebraic equation.

$$A = l \cdot w$$
$$240 = (2w + 4) \cdot w$$

Solve by factoring.

$$240 = (2w+4) \cdot w$$

$$240 = 2w^{2} + 4w$$

$$0 = 2w^{2} + 4w - 240$$

$$0 = 2(w^{2} + 2w - 120)$$

$$0 = 2(w-10)(w+12)$$

$$w-10 = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad w+12 = 0$$

$$w = 10 \quad w = -12$$

At this point we have two possibilities for the width of the rectangle. However, since a negative width is not defined, choose the positive solution, w=10. Back substitute to find the length.


$$2w+4=2(10)+4$$
  
= 20+4  
= 24

Answer: The width is 10 feet and the length is 24 feet.

It is important to include the correct units in the final presentation of the answer. In the previous example, it would not make much sense to say the width is 10. Make sure to indicate that the width is 10 *feet*.

**Example 5:** The height of a triangle is 3 inches less than twice the length of its base. If the total area of the triangle is 7 square inches, then find the lengths of the base and height.

#### Solution:



Let *b* represent the length of the base of the triangle.

twice the base 
$$3$$
 inches less than  $-3$ 

Let 2b-3 represent the height of the triangle.

Use the formula A=12bh and the fact that the area is 7 square inches to set up an algebraic equation.

$$A = \frac{1}{2}b \cdot h$$
$$7 = \frac{1}{2}b(2b-3)$$

To avoid fractional coefficients, multiply both sides by 2 and then rewrite the quadratic equation in standard form.

$$2 \cdot 7 = 2 \cdot \frac{1}{2}b(2b-3)$$

$$14 = b(2b-3)$$

$$14 = 2b^2 - 3b$$

$$0 = 2b^2 - 3b - 14$$

Factor and then set each factor equal to zero.

$$0 = 2b^{2} - 3b - 14$$

$$0 = (2b - 7)(b + 2)$$

$$2b - 7 = 0 or b + 2 = 0$$

$$2b = 7 b = -2$$

$$b = \frac{7}{2}$$

In this case, disregard the negative answer; the length of the base is 7/2 inches long. Use 2b-3 to determine the height of the triangle.

$$2b-3=2\left(\frac{7}{2}\right)-3$$
$$=7-3$$
$$=4$$

Answer: The base measures  $7/2 = 3\frac{1}{2}$  inches and the height is 4 inches.

**Try this!** The base of a triangle is 5 units less than twice the height. If the area is 75 square units, then what is the length of the base and height? Answer: The height is 10 units and the base is 15 units.


Recall that a right triangle is a triangle where one of the angles measures  $90^{\circ}$ . The side opposite of the right angle is the longest side of the triangle and is called the hypotenuse. The Pythagorean theorem gives us a relationship between the legs and hypotenuse of any right triangle, where a and b are the lengths of the legs and c is the length of the hypotenuse:



Given certain relationships, we use this theorem when determining the lengths of sides of right triangles.

**Example 6:** The hypotenuse of a right triangle is 10 inches. If the short leg is 2 inches less than the long leg, then find the lengths of the legs.

### Solution:



Let *x* represent the length of the long leg.

Let x - 2 represent the length of the short leg.

Given that the hypotenuse measures 10 inches, substitute its value into the Pythagorean theorem and obtain a quadratic equation in terms of x.

$$a^{2} + b^{2} = c^{2}$$
 $(x-2)^{2} + x^{2} = 10^{2}$ 

Multiply and rewrite the equation in standard form.

$$(x-2)^{2} + x^{2} = 10^{2}$$
$$x^{2} - 4x + 4 + x^{2} = 100$$
$$2x^{2} - 4x - 96 = 0$$

Once it is in standard form, factor and set each variable factor equal to zero.

$$2x^{2}-4x-96=0$$
$$2(x^{2}-2x-48)=0$$
$$2(x+6)(x-8)=0$$


$$x+6=0$$
 or  $x-8=0$   
 $x=-6$   $x=8$ 

Because lengths cannot be negative, disregard the negative answer. In this case, the long leg measures 8 inches. Use x-2 to determine the length of the short leg.

$$x - 2 = 8 - 2$$
$$= 6$$

Answer: The short leg measures 6 inches and the long leg measures 8 inches.

**Example 7:** One leg of a right triangle measures 3 centimeters. The hypotenuse of the right triangle measures 3 centimeters less than twice the length of the unknown leg. Find the measure of all the sides of the triangle. Solution:



Let *x* represent the length of the unknown leg.

Let 2x - 3 represent the length of the unknown leg.

To set up an algebraic equation, we use the Pythagorean theorem.

$$a^{2} + b^{2} = c^{2}$$
  
 $3^{2} + x^{2} = (2x-3)^{2}$ 

Solve by factoring.

$$3^{2} + x^{2} = (2x-3)^{2}$$

$$9 + x^{2} = 4x^{2} - 12x + 9$$

$$0 = 3x^{2} - 12x$$

$$0 = 3x(x-4)$$

$$3x = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad x - 4 = 0$$
$$x = 0 \quad x = 4$$

Disregard 0. The length of the unknown leg is 4 centimeters. Use 2x-3 to determine the length of the hypotenuse.

$$2x-3=2(4)-3$$
$$=8-3$$
$$=5$$

Answer: The sides of the triangle measure 3 centimeters, 4 centimeters, and 5 centimeters.

**Try this!** The hypotenuse of a right triangle measures 13 units. If one leg is 2 units more than twice that of the other, then find the length of each leg. Answer: The two legs measure 5 units and 12 units.

## **Projectile Problems**

The height of an object launched upward, ignoring the effects of air resistance, can be modeled with the following formula:

height = 
$$-\frac{1}{2}gt^2 + v_0t + s_0$$

Using function notation, which is more appropriate, we have

$$h(t) = -\frac{1}{2}gt^2 + v_0t + s_0$$

With this formula, the height can be calculated at any given time t after the object is launched. The coefficients represent the following:


-12 <i>g</i>	The letter $g$ represents the acceleration due to gravity.
v0	"v-naught" represents the initial velocity of the object.
S0	"s-naught" represents the initial height from which the object is launched.

We consider only problems where the acceleration due to gravity can be expressed as g=32 ft/sec2. Therefore, in this section time will be measured in seconds and the height in feet. Certainly though, the formula is valid using units other than these.

**Example 8:** The height of a projectile launched upward at a speed of 32 feet/second from a height of 128 feet is given by the function  $h(t)=-16t^2+32t+128$ . How long does it take to hit the ground? Solution: An inefficient method for finding the time to hit the ground is to simply start guessing at times and evaluating. To do this, construct a chart.

t	h		Points
0	128	$h(0) = -16(0)^2 + 32(0) + 128 = 128$	(0, 128)
1	144	$h(1) = -16(1)^2 + 32(1) + 128 = 144$	(1, 144)
2	128	$h(2) = -16(2)^2 + 32(2) + 128 = 128$	(2, 128)
3	80	$h(3) = -16(3)^2 + 32(3) + 128 = 80$	(3, 80)
4	0	$h(4) = -16(4)^{2} + 32(4) + 128 = 0$	(4, 0)

Use the table to sketch the height of the projectile over time.



We see that at 4 seconds, the projectile hits the ground. Note that when this occurs, the height is equal to 0. Now we need to solve this problem algebraically. To find the solution algebraically, use the fact that the height is 0 when the object hits the ground. We need to find the time, t, when h(t)=0.

$$h(t) = -16t^2 + 32t + 128$$

$$\downarrow 0 = -16t^2 + 32t + 128$$

Solve the equation by factoring.

$$0 = -16t^{2} + 32t + 128$$
$$0 = -16(t^{2} - 2t - 8)$$
$$0 = -16(t - 4)(t + 2)$$

Now set each variable factor to zero.

$$t-4=0$$
 or  $t+2=0$   
 $t=4$   $t=-2$ 

As expected, the projectile hits the ground at t=4 seconds. Disregard -2 as a solution because negative time is not defined.

Answer: The projectile hits the ground 4 seconds after it is launched.

Example 9: The height of a certain book dropped from the top of a 144foot building is given by  $h(t)=-16t^2+144$ . How long does it take to hit the ground?

**Solution:** Find the time t when the height h(t)=0.

$$0 = -16t^{2} + 144$$
$$0 = -16(t^{2} - 9)$$
$$0 = -16(t + 3)(t - 3)$$

$$t+3=0$$
 or  $t-3=0$   
 $t=-3$   $t=3$ 

Answer: The book takes 3 seconds to hit the ground when dropped from the top of a 144-foot building.

**Try this!** The height of a projectile, shot straight up into the air from the ground, is given by  $h(t)=-16t^2+80t$ . How long does it take to come back down to the ground?

Answer: It will take 5 seconds to come back down to the ground.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- It is best to translate a word problem to a mathematical setup and then solve using algebra. Avoid using the "guess and check" method of solving applications in this section.
- When solving applications, check that your solutions make sense in the context of the question. For example, if you wish to find the length of the base of a triangle, then you would disregard any negative solutions.
- It is important to identify each variable and state in a sentence what each variable represents. It is often helpful to draw a picture.







# 7.1 Simplifying Rational Expressions

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

## Rational Expressions, Evaluating, and Restrictions

A rational number, or fraction ab, is a real number defined as a quotient of two integers a and b, where  $b\neq 0$ . Similarly, we define a rational expression, or algebraic fraction PQ, as the quotient of two polynomials P and Q, where  $Q\neq 0$ . Some examples of rational expressions follow:

$$\frac{x+3}{x-5} \qquad \frac{x+7}{2x^2+x-6} \qquad \frac{x^4+x^3-2x^2-x}{x^2-1}$$

The example x+3x-5 consists of linear expressions in both the numerator and denominator. Because the denominator contains a variable, this expression is not defined for all values of x.

**Example 1:** Evaluate x+3x-5 for the set of x-values  $\{-3, 4, 5\}$ .

**Solution:** Substitute the values in for x.

x = -3	x = 4	<i>x</i> = 5
$\frac{x+3}{x-5} = \frac{(-3)+3}{(-3)-5}$	$\frac{x+3}{x-5} = \frac{(4)+3}{(4)-5}$	$\frac{x+3}{x-5} = \frac{(5)+3}{(5)-5}$ $= \frac{8}{0} $ Undefined
$={-8}$	= -1	$=\frac{1}{0}$ Undefined
= 0	= -7	

Answer: When x=-3, the value of the rational expression is 0; when x=4, the value of the rational expression is -7; and when x=5, the value of the rational expression is undefined.

This example illustrates that variables are restricted to values that do not make the denominator equal to 0. The domain of a rational expression is the set of real numbers for which it is defined, and restrictions are the real numbers for which the expression is not defined. We often express the domain of a rational expression in terms of its restrictions.

**Example 2:** Find the domain of the following: x+72x2+x-6.

**Solution:** In this example, the numerator x+7 is a linear expression and the denominator  $2x_2+x-6$  is a quadratic expression. If we factor the denominator, then we will obtain an equivalent expression.

$$\frac{x+7}{2x^2+x-6} = \frac{x+7}{(2x-3)(x+2)}$$

Because rational expressions are undefined when the denominator is 0, we wish to find the values for x that make it 0. To do this, apply the zero-product property. Set each factor in the denominator equal to 0 and solve.

$$(2x-3)(x+2) = 0$$
  
 $2x-3=0$  or  $x+2=0$   
 $2x=3$   $x=-2$   
 $x=\frac{3}{2}$ 

We conclude that the original expression is defined for any real number except 3/2 and -2. These two values are the restrictions to the domain. It is important to note that -7 is *not* a restriction to the domain because the expression is defined as 0 when the numerator is 0.

$$\frac{x+7}{2x^2+x-6} = \frac{(-7)+7}{2(-7)^2+(-7)-6}$$
$$= \frac{0}{98-7-6}$$
$$= \frac{0}{85}$$
$$= 0$$

Answer: The domain consists of any real number x, where  $x\neq 32$  and  $x\neq -2$ .

We can express the domain of the previous example using notation as follows:

Set-builder notation Interval notation 
$$\{x \mid x \neq -2, \frac{3}{2}\} \qquad (-\infty, -2) \cup (-2, \frac{3}{2}) \cup (\frac{3}{2}, \infty)$$

The restrictions to the domain of a rational expression are determined by the denominator. Ignore the numerator when finding those restrictions. **Example 3:** Determine the domain: x4+x3-2x2-xx2-1.

**Solution:** To find the restrictions to the domain, set the denominator equal to 0 and solve:

$$x^{2}-1=0$$
 $(x+1)(x-1)=0$ 
 $x+1=0$  or  $x-1=0$ 
 $x=-1$   $x=1$ 

These two values cause the denominator to be 0. Hence they are restricted from the domain.

Answer: The domain consists of any real number x, where  $x\neq\pm1$ .

**Example 4:** Determine the domain: x2-254.

**Solution:** There is no variable in the denominator and thus no restriction to the domain.

Answer: The domain consists of all real numbers, R.

## **Simplifying Rational Expressions**

When simplifying fractions, look for common factors that cancel. For example,

$$\frac{12}{60} = \frac{1 \cdot \cancel{12}}{5 \cdot \cancel{12}} = \frac{1}{5}$$

We say that the fraction 12/60 is equivalent to 1/5. Fractions are in simplest form if the numerator and denominator share no common factor other than 1. Similarly, when working with rational expressions, look for factors to cancel. For example,

$$\frac{x+4}{(x-3)(x+4)} = \frac{1 \cdot (x+4)}{(x-3)(x+4)} = \frac{1}{x-3}$$

The resulting rational expression is equivalent if it shares the same domain. Therefore, we must make note of the restrictions and write

$$\frac{x+4}{(x-3)(x+4)} = \frac{1}{x-3}$$
, where  $x \ne 3$  and  $x \ne -4$ 

In words, x+4(x-3)(x+4) is equivalent to 1x-3, if  $x\neq 3$  and  $x\neq -4$ . We can verify this by choosing a few values with which to evaluate both expressions to see if the results are the same. Here we choose x=7 and evaluate as follows:

$$\frac{x+4}{(x-3)(x+4)} = \frac{1}{x-3}$$

$$\frac{(7)+4}{(7-3)(7+4)} = \frac{1}{(7)-3}$$

$$\frac{11}{(4)(11)} = \frac{1}{4}$$

$$\frac{1}{4} = \frac{1}{4} \quad \checkmark$$

It is important to state the restrictions before simplifying rational expressions because the simplified expression may be defined for restrictions of the original. In this case, the expressions are not equivalent. Here -4 is defined for the simplified equivalent but not for the original, as illustrated below:

$$\frac{x+4}{(x-3)(x+4)} = \frac{1}{x-3}$$

$$\frac{(-4)+4}{(-4-3)(-4+4)} = \frac{1}{(-4)-3}$$

$$\frac{0}{(-7)(0)} = \frac{1}{-7}$$

$$\frac{0}{0} = -\frac{1}{7}$$

**Example 5:** Simplify and state the restriction: 25x215x3.

**Solution:** In this example, the expression is undefined when x is 0.

$$\frac{25x^2}{15x^3} = \frac{25(0)^2}{15(0)^3} = \frac{0}{0}$$
 Undefined

Therefore, the domain consists of all real numbers x, where  $x\neq 0$ . With this understanding, we can cancel common factors.

$$\frac{25x^2}{15x^3} = \frac{5 \cdot 5x^2}{3x \cdot 5x^2}$$
$$= \frac{5}{3x}$$

Answer: 53x, where  $x\neq 0$ 

**Example 6:** State the restrictions and simplify: 3x(x-5)(2x+1)(x-5).

**Solution:** To determine the restrictions, set the denominator equal to 0 and solve.

$$(2x+1)(x-5) = 0$$
  
 $2x+1=0$  or  $x-5=0$   
 $2x = -1$   $x = 5$   
 $x = -\frac{1}{2}$ 

The domain consists of all real numbers except for -1/2 and 5. Next, we find an equivalent expression by canceling common factors.

$$\frac{3x(x-5)}{(2x+1)(x-5)} = \frac{3x(x-5)}{(2x+1)(x-5)}$$
$$= \frac{3x}{2x+1}$$

Answer: 3x2x+1, where  $x\neq -12$  and  $x\neq 5$ 

Typically, rational expressions are not given in factored form. If this is the case, factor first and then cancel. The steps are outlined in the following example.

**Example 7:** State the restrictions and simplify: 3x+6x+x-2.

Solution:

Step 1: Completely factor the numerator and denominator.

$$\frac{3x+6}{x^2+x-2} = \frac{3(x+2)}{(x-1)(x+2)}$$

**Step 2:** Determine the restrictions to the domain. To do this, set the denominator equal to 0 and solve.

$$(x-1)(x+2) = 0$$
  
 $x-1=0$  or  $x+2=0$ 

The domain consists of all real numbers except -2 and 1.

Step 3: Cancel common factors, if any.

$$\frac{3x+6}{x^2+x-2} = \frac{3(x+2)}{(x-1)(x+2)}$$
$$= \frac{3}{x-1}$$

Answer: 3x-1, where  $x\neq 1$  and  $x\neq -2$ 

**Example 8:** State the restrictions and simplify:  $x^{2+7}x^{-3}0x^{2-7}x^{+1}2$ .

Solution: First, factor the numerator and denominator.

$$\frac{x^2 + 7x - 30}{x^2 - 7x + 12} = \frac{(x - 3)(x + 10)}{(x - 4)(x - 3)}$$

Any value of x that results in a value of 0 in the denominator is a restriction. By inspection, we determine that the domain consists of all real numbers except 4 and 3. Next, cancel common factors.

$$= \frac{(x-3)(x+10)}{(x-4)(x-3)}$$
$$= \frac{x+10}{x-4}$$

Answer: x+10x-4, where  $x\neq 3$  and  $x\neq 4$ 

It is important to remember that we can only cancel factors of a product. A common mistake is to cancel terms. For example,

$$\frac{\cancel{x^2} + 7x - 30}{\cancel{x^2} - 7x + 12} \qquad \frac{\cancel{x} + 10}{\cancel{x} - 4} \qquad \frac{2\cancel{x} - 1}{\cancel{x} - 1}$$
incorrect! incorrect! incorrect!

**Try this!** State the restrictions and simplify: x2-165x2-20x.

Answer: x+45x, where  $x\neq 0$  and  $x\neq 4$ 

In some examples, we will make a broad assumption that the denominator is nonzero. When we make that assumption, we do not need to determine the restrictions.

**Example 9:** Simplify: xy+y2-3x-3yx2-y2. (Assume all denominators are nonzero.)

**Solution:** Factor the numerator by grouping. Factor the denominator using the formula for a difference of squares.

$$\frac{xy + y^2 - 3x - 3y}{x^2 - y^2} = \frac{y(x+y) - 3(x+y)}{(x+y)(x-y)}$$
$$= \frac{(x+y)(y-3)}{(x+y)(x-y)}$$

Next, cancel common factors.

$$= \frac{(x+y)(y-3)}{(x+y)(x-y)}$$
$$= \frac{y-3}{x-y}$$

Answer: y-3x-y

## **Opposite Binomial Factors**

Recall that the opposite of the real number a is -a. Similarly, we can define the opposite of a polynomial P to be -P. We first consider the opposite of the binomial a-b:

$$-(a-b) = -a + b = b - a$$

This leads us to the opposite binomial property:

$$-(a-b) = (b-a)$$

This is equivalent to factoring out a - 1.

$$(b-a) = -1(a-b)$$

If  $a\neq b$ , then we can divide both sides by (a-b) and obtain the following:

$$\frac{b-a}{a-b} = -1$$

**Example 10:** State the restrictions and simplify: 3-xx-3.

**Solution:** By inspection, we can see that the denominator is 0 if x=3.

Therefore, 3 is the restriction to the domain. Apply the opposite binomial property to the numerator and then cancel.

$$\frac{3-x}{x-3} = \frac{-(x-3)}{(x-3)}$$
Opposite binomial property
$$= \frac{-1 \cdot (x-3)}{(x-3)}$$
Cancel.
$$= -1$$

Answer: 3-xx-3=-1, where  $x\neq 3$ 

Since addition is commutative, we have

$$(a+b) = (b+a)$$

or

$$\frac{b+a}{a+b} = 1$$

Take care not to confuse this with the opposite binomial property. Also, it is important to recall that

$$\frac{-a}{b} = -\frac{a}{b} = \frac{a}{-b}$$

In other words, show a negative fraction by placing the negative sign in the numerator, in front of the fraction bar, or in the denominator. Generally, negative denominators are avoided.

**Example 11:** Simplify and state the restrictions: 4-x2x2+3x-10.

**Solution:** Begin by factoring the numerator and denominator.

$$\frac{4-x^2}{x^2+3x-10} = \frac{(2+x)(2-x)}{(x-2)(x+5)}$$
The restrictions are  $x \neq 2$  and  $x \neq -5$ .
$$= \frac{(2+x)\cdot(-1)(x-2)}{(x-2)(x+5)}$$
Apply the opposite binomial property, then cancel.
$$= \frac{(2+x)\cdot(-1)}{(x+5)}$$

$$= -\frac{2+x}{x+5} \quad \text{or} \quad = -\frac{x+2}{x+5}$$

The restrictions are  $x \neq 2$  and  $x \neq -5$ .

Answer: -x+2x+5, where  $x\neq 2$  and  $x\neq -5$ 

**Try this!** Simplify and state the restrictions: 2x2-7x-1525-x2.

Answer: -2x+3x+5, where  $x\neq\pm5$ 

## **Rational Functions**

Rational functions have the form

$$r\left(x\right) = \frac{p\left(x\right)}{q\left(x\right)},$$

where p(x) and q(x) are polynomials and  $q(x)\neq 0$ . The domain of a rational function consists of all real numbers x such that the denominator  $q(x)\neq 0$ .

### Example 12:

- a. Simplify:  $r(x)=2x^2+5x-36x^2+18x$ .
- b. State the domain.
- c. Calculate r(-2).

#### Solution:

a. To simplify the rational function, first factor and then cancel.

$$r(x) = \frac{2x^2 + 5x - 3}{6x^2 + 18x}$$
$$= \frac{(2x - 1)(x + 3)}{6x(x + 3)}$$
$$= \frac{2x - 1}{6x}$$

b. To determine the restrictions, set the denominator of the original function equal to 0 and solve.

$$6x^2 + 18x = 0$$
$$6x(x+3) = 0$$

$$6x = 0 or x + 3 = 0$$
$$x = 0 x = -3$$

The domain consists of all real numbers x, where  $x\neq 0$  and  $x\neq -3$ . c. Since -2 is not a restriction, substitute it for the variable x using the simplified form.

$$r(x) = \frac{2x-1}{6x}$$

$$r(-2) = \frac{2(-2) - 1}{6(-2)}$$

$$= \frac{-4 - 1}{-12}$$

$$= \frac{-5}{-12}$$

$$= \frac{5}{12}$$

Answers:

a. r(x)=2x-16x

b. The domain is all real numbers except o and -3.

c. r(-2)=512

If a cost function C(x) represents the cost of producing x units, then the average cost c(x) is the cost divided by the number of units produced.

Average cost: 
$$c(x) = \frac{C(x)}{x}$$

**Example 13:** The cost in dollars of producing t-shirts with a company logo is given by C(x)=7x+200, where x represents the number of shirts produced. Determine the average cost of producing

a. 40 t-shirts

b. 250 t-shirts

c. 1,000 t-shirts

Solution: Set up a function representing the average cost.

$$c(x) = \frac{C(x)}{x} = \frac{7x + 200}{x}$$

Next, calculate c(40), c(250), and c(1000).

$$c(40) = \frac{7(40) + 200}{40} = \frac{280 + 200}{40} = \frac{480}{40} = 12.00$$

$$c(250) = \frac{7(250) + 200}{250} = \frac{1750 + 200}{250} = \frac{1950}{250} = 7.80$$

$$c(1000) = \frac{7(1000) + 200}{1000} = \frac{7000 + 200}{1000} = \frac{7200}{1000} = 7.20$$

#### Answers:

- a. If 40 t-shirts are produced, then the average cost per t-shirt is \$12.00.
- b. If 250 t-shirts are produced, then the average cost per t-shirt is \$7.80.
- c. If 1,000 t-shirts are produced, then the average cost per t-shirt is \$7.20.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Rational expressions usually are not defined for all real numbers. The real numbers that give a value of 0 in the denominator are not part of the domain. These values are called restrictions.
- Simplifying rational expressions is similar to simplifying fractions. First, factor the numerator and denominator and then cancel the common factors. Rational expressions are simplified if there are no common factors other than 1 in the numerator and the denominator.
- Simplified rational expressions are equivalent for values in the domain of the original expression. Be sure to state the restrictions if the denominators are not assumed to be nonzero.

Use the opposite binomial property to cancel binomial factors that involve subtraction. Use -(a-b)=b-a to replace factors that will then cancel.
 Do not confuse this with factors that involve addition, such as (a+b)=(b+a).

# 7.2 Multiplying and Dividing Rational Expressions

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Multiply rational expressions.
- 2. Divide rational expressions.

## **Multiplying Rational Expressions**

When multiplying fractions, we can multiply the numerators and denominators together and then reduce, as illustrated:

$$\frac{3}{5} \cdot \frac{5}{9} = \frac{3 \cdot 5}{5 \cdot 9} = \frac{\cancel{\cancel{3}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{5}}}{\cancel{\cancel{5}} \cdot \cancel{\cancel{9}}} = \frac{1}{3}$$

Multiplying rational expressions is performed in a similar manner. For example,

$$\frac{y}{x} \cdot \frac{x}{y^2} = \frac{y \cdot x}{x \cdot y^2} = \frac{\cancel{y} \cdot \cancel{x}}{\cancel{x} \cdot \cancel{y^2}} = \frac{1}{y}$$

In general, given polynomials P, Q, R, and S, where  $Q\neq 0$  and  $S\neq 0$ , we have

$$\frac{P}{Q} \cdot \frac{R}{S} = \frac{PR}{QS}$$

In this section, assume that all variable expressions in the denominator are nonzero unless otherwise stated.

**Example 1:** Multiply: 12x25y3·20y46x3.

**Solution:** Multiply numerators and denominators and then cancel common factors.

$$\frac{12x^{2}}{5y^{3}} \cdot \frac{20y^{4}}{6x^{3}} = \frac{240x^{2}y^{4}}{30x^{3}y^{3}} \qquad Multiply.$$

$$= \frac{240 x^{2}y^{4}}{30 x^{2}y^{4}} \qquad Cancel.$$

$$= \frac{8y}{x}$$

Answer: 8yx

**Example 2:** Multiply:  $x-3x+5\cdot x+5x+7$ .

**Solution:** Leave the product in factored form and cancel the common factors.

$$\frac{x-3}{x+5} \cdot \frac{x+5}{x+7} = \frac{(x-3) \cdot (x+5)}{(x+5) \cdot (x+7)}$$
$$= \frac{x-3}{x+7}$$

Answer: x-3x+7

**Example 3:** Multiply: 15x2y3(2x-1)·x(2x-1)3x2y(x+3).

**Solution:** Leave the polynomials in the numerator and denominator factored so that we can cancel the factors. In other words, do not apply the distributive property.

$$\frac{15x^{2}y^{3}}{(2x-1)} \cdot \frac{x(2x-1)}{3x^{2}y(x+3)} = \frac{15x^{3}y^{3}(2x-1)}{3x^{2}y(2x-1)(x+3)} \qquad Multiply.$$

$$= \frac{15x^{2}y^{3}}{3x^{2}y(2x-1)(x+3)} \qquad Cancel.$$

$$= \frac{5xy^{2}}{x+3}$$

Answer: 5xy2x+3

Typically, rational expressions will not be given in factored form. In this case, first factor all numerators and denominators completely. Next, multiply and cancel any common factors, if there are any.

**Example 4:** Multiply:  $x+5x-5 \cdot x-5x2-25$ .

**Solution:** Factor the denominator *x*2–25 as a difference of squares. Then multiply and cancel.

$$\frac{x+5}{x-5} \cdot \frac{x-5}{x^2 - 25} = \frac{x+5}{x-5} \cdot \frac{x-5}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{(x+5)(x-5)}{(x-5)(x+5)(x-5)}$$
Cancel.
$$= \frac{1}{x-5}$$

Keep in mind that 1 is always a factor; so when the entire numerator cancels out, make sure to write the factor 1.

Answer: 1x-5

**Example 5:** Multiply:  $x2+3x+2x2-5x+6\cdot x2-7x+12x2+8x+7$ .

Solution:

$$\frac{x^2 + 3x + 2}{x^2 - 5x + 6} \cdot \frac{x^2 - 7x + 12}{x^2 + 8x + 7} = \frac{(x+1)(x+2)}{(x-2)(x-3)} \cdot \frac{(x-3)(x-4)}{(x+1)(x+7)}$$

$$= \frac{(x+1)(x+2)(x-3)(x-4)}{(x-2)(x-3)(x+1)(x+7)}$$

$$= \frac{(x+2)(x-4)}{(x-2)(x+7)}$$
Cancel.

It is a best practice to leave the final answer in factored form.

Answer: (x+2)(x-4)(x-2)(x+7)

**Example 6:** Multiply:  $-2x2+x+3x2+2x-8\cdot 3x-6x2+x$ .

**Solution:** The trinomial  $-2x_2+x+3$  in the numerator has a negative leading coefficient. Recall that it is a best practice to first factor out a -1 and then factor the resulting trinomial.

$$\frac{-2x^{2} + x + 3}{x^{2} + 2x - 8} \cdot \frac{3x - 6}{x^{2} + x} = \frac{-1(2x^{2} - x - 3)}{x^{2} + 2x - 8} \cdot \frac{3(x - 2)}{x(x + 1)}$$

$$= \frac{-1(2x - 3)(x + 1)}{(x - 2)(x + 4)} \cdot \frac{3(x - 2)}{x(x + 1)}$$

$$= \frac{-1(2x - 3)(x + 1) \cdot 3(x - 2)}{(x - 2)(x + 4) \cdot x(x + 1)}$$

$$= \frac{-1(2x - 3) \cdot 3}{(x + 4) \cdot x}$$

$$= \frac{-3(2x - 3)}{x(x + 4)} \quad \text{or} \quad = -\frac{3(2x - 3)}{x(x + 4)}$$

Answer: -3(2x-3)x(x+4)

**Example 7:** Multiply: 7-xx2+3x•x2+10x+21x2-49.

**Solution:** We replace 7-x with -1(x-7) so that we can cancel this factor.

$$\frac{7-x}{x^2+3x} \cdot \frac{x^2+10x+21}{x^2-49} = \frac{-1(x-7)}{x(x+3)} \cdot \frac{(x+3)(x+7)}{(x+7)(x-7)}$$

$$= \frac{-1(x-7)(x+3)(x+7)}{x(x+3)(x+7)(x-7)}$$

$$= \frac{-1}{x}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{x}$$

Answer: -1x

**Try this!** Multiply: *x*2-648-*x*·*x*+*x*2*x*2+9*x*+8.

Answer: -x

## **Dividing Rational Expressions**

To divide two fractions, we multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor, as illustrated:

$$\frac{5}{8} \div \frac{1}{2} = \frac{5}{8} \cdot \frac{2}{1} = \frac{5 \cdot \cancel{2}}{\cancel{8} \cdot 1} = \frac{5}{4}$$

Dividing rational expressions is performed in a similar manner. For example,

$$\frac{x}{y^2} \div \frac{1}{y} = \frac{x}{y^2} \cdot \frac{y}{1} = \frac{x \cdot \cancel{y}}{\cancel{y}^2 \cdot 1} = \frac{x}{y}$$

In general, given polynomials P, Q, R, and S, where  $Q \neq 0$ ,  $R \neq 0$ , and  $S \neq 0$ , we have

$$\frac{P}{Q} \div \frac{R}{S} = \frac{P}{Q} \cdot \frac{S}{R} = \frac{PS}{QR}$$

**Example 8:** Divide: 8x5y25z6÷20xy415z3.

**Solution:** First, multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor and then cancel.

$$\frac{8x^{5}y}{25z^{6}} \div \frac{20xy^{4}}{15z^{3}} = \frac{8x^{5}y}{25z^{6}} \cdot \frac{15z^{3}}{20xy^{4}} \qquad Multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor.$$

$$= \frac{120x^{5}yz^{3}}{500xy^{4}z^{6}}$$

$$= \frac{120x^{5}yz^{3}}{500x^{4}y^{4}z^{6}}$$

$$= \frac{120x^{5}yz^{3}}{500x^{4}y^{4}z^{6}}$$
Cancel.
$$= \frac{6x^{4}}{25y^{3}z^{3}}$$

Answer: 6x425y3z3

**Example 9:** Divide:  $x+2x^2-4+x+3x-2$ .

**Solution:** After multiplying by the reciprocal of the divisor, factor and cancel.

$$\frac{x+2}{x^2-4} \div \frac{x+3}{x-2} = \frac{x+2}{x^2-4} \cdot \frac{x-2}{x+3}$$

$$= \frac{(x+2)}{(x+2)(x-2)} \cdot \frac{(x-2)}{(x+3)}$$

$$= \frac{(x+2)(x-2)}{(x+2)(x-2)(x+3)}$$

$$= \frac{1}{x+3}$$
Multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor.

Factor.

Cancel.

Answer: 1x+3

**Example 10:** Divide:  $x2-6x-16x2+4x-21 \div x2+9x+14x2-8x+15$ .

**Solution:** Begin by multiplying by the reciprocal of the divisor. After doing so, factor and cancel.

$$\frac{x^2 - 6x - 16}{x^2 + 4x - 21} \div \frac{x^2 + 9x + 14}{x^2 - 8x + 15} = \frac{x^2 - 6x - 16}{x^2 + 4x - 21} \cdot \frac{x^2 - 8x + 15}{x^2 + 9x + 14}$$

$$= \frac{(x + 2)(x - 8)}{(x - 3)(x + 7)} \cdot \frac{(x - 3)(x - 5)}{(x + 2)(x + 7)}$$

$$= \frac{(x + 2)(x - 8)(x - 3)(x - 5)}{(x - 3)(x + 7)(x + 2)(x + 7)}$$

$$= \frac{(x - 8)(x - 5)}{(x + 7)^2}$$

Answer: (x-8)(x-5)(x+7)2

**Example 11:** Divide:  $9-4x2x+2 \div (2x-3)$ .

**Solution:** Just as we do with fractions, think of the divisor (2x-3) as an algebraic fraction over 1.

$$\frac{9-4x^{2}}{x+2} \div (2x-3) = \frac{9-4x^{2}}{x+2} \div \frac{2x-3}{1}$$

$$= \frac{(3+2x)(3-2x)}{x+2} \cdot \frac{1}{2x-3} \qquad Replace: (3-2x) = (-1)\cdot(2x-3)$$

$$= \frac{(3+2x)\cdot(-1)(2x-3)}{(x+2)(2x-3)} \qquad Cancel.$$

$$= -\frac{3+2x}{x+2} \quad or = -\frac{2x+3}{x+2}$$

Answer: -2x+3x+2

**Try this!** Divide:  $4x2+7x-225x2 \div 1-4x100x4$ .

Answer:  $-4x_2(x+2)$ 

### **Multiplying and Dividing Rational Functions**

The product and quotient of two rational functions can be simplified using the techniques described in this section. The restrictions to the domain of a product consist of the restrictions of each function.

**Example 12:** Calculate  $(f \cdot g)(x)$  and determine the restrictions to the domain.

$$f(x) = \frac{16x^2 - 1}{5x}$$
,  $g(x) = \frac{1}{1 - 4x}$ 

**Solution:** In this case, the domain of f(x) consists of all real numbers except 0, and the domain of g(x) consists of all real numbers except 1/4.

Therefore, the domain of the product consists of all real numbers except 0 and 1/4. Multiply the functions and then simplify the result.

$$(f \cdot g)(x) = f(x) \cdot g(x)$$

$$= \frac{16x^2 - 1}{5x} \cdot \frac{1}{1 - 4x}$$

$$= \frac{(4x+1)(4x-1)}{5x} \cdot \frac{1}{1 - 4x}$$

$$= \frac{(4x+1)(4x-1)}{5x \cdot (-1)(4x-1)}$$

$$= \frac{4x+1}{-5x}$$

$$= -\frac{4x+1}{5x}$$

Answer:  $(f \cdot g)(x) = -4x + 15x$ , where  $x \neq 0$ , 14

The restrictions to the domain of a quotient will consist of the restrictions of each function as well as the restrictions on the reciprocal of the divisor.

**Example 13:** Calculate (f/g)(x) and determine the restrictions.

$$f(x) = \frac{x^2 - 64}{x^2 - 11x + 24}, g(x) = \frac{x + 8}{x - 3}$$

Solution:

$$(f/g)(x) = f(x) \div g(x)$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 64}{x^2 - 11x + 24} \div \frac{x + 8}{x - 3}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 64}{x^2 - 11x + 24} \cdot \frac{x - 3}{x + 8} \qquad \text{Multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor.}$$

$$= \frac{(x + 8)(x - 8)(x - 3)}{(x - 3)(x - 8)(x + 8)} \qquad Factor.$$

$$= \frac{(x + 8)(x - 8)(x - 3)}{(x - 3)(x - 8)(x + 8)} \qquad Cancel.$$

$$= \frac{1}{1}$$

$$= 1$$

In this case, the domain of f(x) consists of all real numbers except 3 and 8, and the domain of g(x) consists all real numbers except 3. In addition, the reciprocal of g(x) has a restriction of -8. Therefore, the domain of this quotient consists of all real numbers except 3, 8, and -8.

Answer: (f/g)(x)=1, where  $x\neq 3, 8, -8$ 

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- After multiplying rational expressions, factor both the numerator and denominator and then cancel common factors. Make note of the restrictions to the domain. The values that give a value of 0 in the denominator are the restrictions.
- To divide rational expressions, multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor.

- The restrictions to the domain of a product consist of the restrictions to the domain of each factor.
- The restrictions to the domain of a quotient consist of the restrictions to the domain of each rational expression as well as the restrictions on the reciprocal of the divisor.

# 7.3 Adding and Subtracting Rational Expressions

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Add and subtract rational expressions with common denominators.
- 2. Add and subtract rational expressions with unlike denominators.
- 3. Add and subtract rational functions.

# **Adding and Subtracting with Common Denominators**

Adding and subtracting rational expressions is similar to adding and subtracting fractions. Recall that if the denominators are the same, we can add or subtract the numerators and write the result over the common denominator.

$$\frac{3}{13} + \frac{7}{13} = \frac{3+7}{13}$$
$$= \frac{10}{13}$$

When working with rational expressions, the common denominator will be a polynomial. In general, given polynomials P, Q, and R, where  $Q\neq 0$ , we have the following:

$$\frac{P}{Q} \pm \frac{R}{Q} = \frac{P \pm R}{Q}$$

In this section, assume that all variable factors in the denominator are nonzero.

**Example 1:** Add: 3*y*+7*y*.

**Solution:** Add the numerators 3 and 7, and write the result over the common denominator, y.

$$\frac{3}{y} + \frac{7}{y} = \frac{3+7}{y}$$
$$= \frac{10}{y}$$

Answer: 10y

**Example 2:** Subtract: *x*-52*x*-1-12*x*-1.

**Solution:** Subtract the numerators x-5 and 1, and write the result over the common denominator, 2x-1.

$$\frac{x-5}{2x-1} - \frac{1}{2x-1} = \frac{x-5-1}{2x-1}$$
 Simplify the numerator.
$$= \frac{x-6}{2x-1}$$

Answer: x-62x-1

**Example 3:** Subtract: 2x+7(x+5)(x-3)-x+10(x+5)(x-3).

**Solution:** We use parentheses to remind us to subtract the entire numerator of the second rational expression.

$$\frac{2x+7}{(x+5)(x-3)} - \frac{x+10}{(x+5)(x-3)} = \frac{(2x+7) - (x+10)}{(x+5)(x-3)}$$
 Simplify the numerator.
$$= \frac{2x+7 - x - 10}{(x+5)(x-3)}$$
 Leave the denominator factored.
$$= \frac{x+3}{(x+5)(x-3)}$$
 Cancel common factors.
$$= \frac{1}{x+5}$$

Answer: 1x+5

**Example 4:** Simplify: 2x2+10x+3x2-36-x2+6x+5x2-36+x-4x2-36.

**Solution:** Subtract and add the numerators. Make use of parentheses and write the result over the common denominator, *x*2–36.

$$\frac{2x^{2} + 10x + 3}{x^{2} - 36} - \frac{x^{2} + 6x + 5}{x^{2} - 36} + \frac{x - 4}{x^{2} - 36}$$

$$= \frac{(2x^{2} + 10x + 3) - (x^{2} + 6x + 5) + (x - 4)}{x^{2} - 36}$$

$$= \frac{2x^{2} + 10x + 3 - x^{2} - 6x - 5 + x - 4}{x^{2} - 36}$$

$$= \frac{x^{2} + 5x - 6}{x^{2} - 36}$$

$$= \frac{(x - 1)(x + 6)}{(x + 6)(x - 6)}$$

$$= \frac{x - 1}{x - 6}$$
Cancel.

Answer: x-1x-6

**Try this!** Subtract: *x*2+12*x*2-7*x*-4-*x*2-2*x*2*x*2-7*x*-4.

Answer: 1*x*-4

### **Adding and Subtracting with Unlike Denominators**

To add rational expressions with unlike denominators, first find equivalent expressions with common denominators. Do this just as you have with fractions. If the denominators of fractions are relatively prime, then the least common denominator (LCD) is their product. For example,

$$\frac{1}{3} + \frac{1}{5} \implies LCD = 3.5 = 15$$

Multiply each fraction by the appropriate form of 1 to obtain equivalent fractions with a common denominator.

$$\frac{1}{3} + \frac{1}{5} = \frac{1 \cdot 5}{3 \cdot 5} + \frac{1 \cdot 3}{5 \cdot 3}$$

$$= \frac{5}{15} + \frac{3}{15}$$
Equivalent fractions with a common denominator
$$= \frac{5+3}{15}$$

$$= \frac{8}{15}$$

The process of adding and subtracting rational expressions is similar. In general, given polynomials P, Q, R, and S, where  $Q\neq 0$  and  $S\neq 0$ , we have the following:

$$\frac{P}{Q} \pm \frac{R}{S} = \frac{PS \pm QR}{QS}$$

In this section, assume that all variable factors in the denominator are nonzero.

**Example 5:** Add: 1*x*+1*y*.

**Solution:** In this example, the LCD=xy. To obtain equivalent terms with this common denominator, multiply the first term by yy and the second term by xx.

$$\frac{1}{x} + \frac{1}{y} = \frac{1}{x} \cdot \frac{y}{y} + \frac{1}{y} \cdot \frac{x}{x}$$

$$= \frac{y}{xy} + \frac{x}{xy}$$
Equivalent terms with a common denominator
$$= \frac{y+x}{xy}$$
Add the numerators and place the result over the common denominator, xy.

Answer: y+xxy

**Example 6:** Subtract: 1y-1y-3.

**Solution:** Since the LCD=y(y-3), multiply the first term by 1 in the form of (y-3)(y-3) and the second term by yy.

$$\frac{1}{y} - \frac{1}{y-3} = \frac{1}{y} \cdot \frac{(y-3)}{(y-3)} - \frac{1}{y-3} \cdot \frac{y}{y}$$

$$= \frac{(y-3)}{y(y-3)} - \frac{y}{y(y-3)}$$

$$= \frac{y-3-y}{y(y-3)}$$

$$= \frac{-3}{y(y-3)} \quad \text{or} \quad = -\frac{3}{y(y-3)}$$

Answer: -3y(y-3)

It is not always the case that the LCD is the product of the given denominators. Typically, the denominators are not relatively prime; thus determining the LCD requires some thought. Begin by factoring all denominators. The LCD is the product of all factors with the highest power. For example, given

$$\frac{1}{x^3(x+2)(x-3)} \qquad \text{and} \qquad \frac{1}{x(x+2)^2}$$

there are three base factors in the denominator: x, (x+2), and (x-3). The highest powers of these factors are  $x_3$ ,  $(x+2)_2$ , and  $(x-3)_1$ . Therefore,

$$LCD = x^3 (x+2)^2 (x-3)$$

The general steps for adding or subtracting rational expressions are illustrated in the following example.

**Example 7:** Subtract: xx2+4x+3-3x2-4x-5.

Solution:

**Step 1:** Factor all denominators to determine the LCD.

$$=\frac{x}{x^2+4x+3} - \frac{3}{x^2-4x-5}$$
$$=\frac{x}{(x+1)(x+3)} - \frac{3}{(x+1)(x-5)}$$

The LCD is (x+1)(x+3)(x-5).

**Step 2:** Multiply by the appropriate factors to obtain equivalent terms with a common denominator. To do this, multiply the first term by (x-5)(x-5) and the second term by (x+3)(x+3).

$$= \frac{x}{(x+1)(x+3)} \cdot \frac{(x-5)}{(x-5)} - \frac{3}{(x+1)(x-5)} \cdot \frac{(x+3)}{(x+3)}$$
$$= \frac{x(x-5)}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)} - \frac{3(x+3)}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$

**Step 3:** Add or subtract the numerators and place the result over the common denominator.

$$= \frac{x(x-5) - 3(x+3)}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$

Step 4: Simplify the resulting algebraic fraction.

$$= \frac{x(x-5)-3(x+3)}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$
Simplify the numerator.
$$= \frac{x^2-5x-3x-9}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2-8x-9}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$
Factor.
$$= \frac{(x+1)(x-9)}{(x+1)(x+3)(x-5)}$$
Cancel.
$$= \frac{(x-9)}{(x+3)(x-5)}$$

Answer: (x-9)(x+3)(x-5)

**Example 8:** Subtract: *x*2-9*x*+18*x*2-13*x*+36-*xx*-4.

**Solution:** It is best not to factor the numerator,  $x_2-9x+18$ , because we will most likely need to simplify after we subtract.

$$\frac{x^2 - 9x + 18}{x^2 - 13x + 36} - \frac{x}{x - 4}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 9x + 18}{(x - 4)(x - 9)} - \frac{x}{x - 4}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 9x + 18}{(x - 4)(x - 9)} - \frac{x}{(x - 4)} \cdot \frac{(x - 9)}{(x - 9)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 9x + 18}{(x - 4)(x - 9)} - \frac{x(x - 9)}{(x - 4)(x - 9)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 9x + 18 - x(x - 9)}{(x - 4)(x - 9)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 9x + 18 - x(x - 9)}{(x - 4)(x - 9)}$$

Factor the denominator.

The LCD is (x-4)(x-9).

Multiply the second term by 1 in the form of  $\frac{(x-9)}{(x-9)}$ .

Equivalent terms with a common denominator

Subtract the numerators and place the result over the common denominator.

Simplify.

Answer: 18(x-4)(x-9)

 $=\frac{18}{(x-4)(x-9)}$ 

**Example 9:** Subtract: 1*x*2-4-12-*x*.

**Solution:** First, factor the denominators and determine the LCD. Notice how the opposite binomial property is applied to obtain a more workable denominator.

$$\frac{1}{x^2 - 4} - \frac{1}{2 - x} = \frac{1}{(x + 2)(x - 2)} - \frac{1}{-1(x - 2)}$$
$$= \frac{1}{(x + 2)(x - 2)} + \frac{1}{(x - 2)}$$

The LCD is (x+2)(x-2). Multiply the second term by 1 in the form of (x+2)(x+2).

$$= \frac{1}{(x+2)(x-2)} + \frac{1}{(x-2)} \cdot \frac{(x+2)}{(x+2)}$$
$$= \frac{1}{(x+2)(x-2)} + \frac{x+2}{(x-2)(x+2)}$$

Now that we have equivalent terms with a common denominator, add the numerators and write the result over the common denominator.

$$= \frac{1}{(x+2)(x-2)} + \frac{x+2}{(x-2)(x+2)}$$

$$= \frac{1+x+2}{(x+2)(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{x+3}{(x+2)(x-2)}$$

Answer: x+3(x+2)(x-2)

**Example 10:** Simplify: y-1y+1-y+1y-1+y-5y-1.

**Solution:** Begin by factoring the denominator.

$$\frac{y-1}{y+1} - \frac{y+1}{y-1} + \frac{y^2 - 5}{y^2 - 1}$$

$$= \frac{y-1}{y+1} - \frac{y+1}{y-1} + \frac{y^2 - 5}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$

We can see that the LCD is (y+1)(y-1). Find equivalent fractions with this denominator.

$$= \frac{(y-1)}{(y+1)} \cdot \frac{(y-1)}{(y-1)} - \frac{(y+1)}{(y-1)} \cdot \frac{(y+1)}{(y+1)} + \frac{y^2 - 5}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$

$$= \frac{y^2 - 2y + 1}{(y+1)(y-1)} - \frac{y^2 + 2y + 1}{(y+1)(y-1)} + \frac{y^2 - 5}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$

Next, subtract and add the numerators and place the result over the common denominator.

$$=\frac{(y^2-2y+1)-(y^2+2y+1)+(y^2-5)}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$

Finish by simplifying the resulting rational expression.

$$= \frac{y^2 - 2y + 1 - y^2 - 2y - 1 + y^2 - 5}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$

$$= \frac{y^2 - 4y - 5}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$
Factor.
$$= \frac{(y+1)(y-5)}{(y+1)(y-1)}$$
Cancel.
$$= \frac{(y-5)}{(y-1)}$$

Answer: y-5y-1

**Try this!** Simplify: -2x2-1+x1+x-51-x.

Answer: x+3x-1

Rational expressions are sometimes expressed using negative exponents. In this case, apply the rules for negative exponents before simplifying the expression.

**Example 11:** Simplify: y-2+(y-1)-1.

**Solution:** Recall that  $x_{-n=1x_n}$ . We begin by rewriting the negative exponents as rational expressions.

$$y^{-2} + (y-1)^{-1}$$

$$= \frac{1}{y^2} + \frac{1}{(y-1)^1}$$
Replace negative exponents.
$$= \frac{1}{y^2} \cdot \frac{(y-1)}{(y-1)} + \frac{1}{(y-1)} \cdot \frac{y^2}{y^2}$$
Multiply by factors to obtain equivalent expressions with a common denominator.
$$= \frac{(y-1)}{y^2(y-1)} + \frac{y^2}{y^2(y-1)}$$

$$= \frac{(y-1)+y^2}{y^2(y-1)}$$
Add and simplify.
$$= \frac{y^2+y-1}{y^2(y-1)}$$
The trinomial does not factor.

Answer:  $y_2+y-1y_2(y-1)$ 

## **Adding and Subtracting Rational Functions**

We can simplify sums or differences of rational functions using the techniques learned in this section. The restrictions of the result consist of the restrictions to the domains of each function.

**Example 12:** Calculate (f+g)(x), given f(x)=1x+3 and g(x)=1x-2, and state the restrictions.

Solution:

$$(f+g)(x) = f(x) + g(x)$$

$$= \frac{1}{x+3} + \frac{1}{x-2}$$

$$= \frac{1}{x+3} \cdot \frac{(x-2)}{(x-2)} + \frac{1}{x-2} \cdot \frac{(x+3)}{(x+3)}$$

$$= \frac{x-2}{(x+3)(x-2)} + \frac{x+3}{(x-2)(x+3)}$$

$$= \frac{x-2+x+3}{(x+3)(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{2x+1}{(x+3)(x-2)}$$

Here the domain of f consists of all real numbers except -3, and the domain of g consists of all real numbers except 2. Therefore, the domain of f + g consists of all real numbers except -3 and 2.

Answer: 2x+1(x+3)(x-2), where  $x\neq -3$ , 2

**Example 13:** Calculate (f-g)(x), given  $f(x)=x(x-1)x^2-25$  and g(x)=x-3x-5, and state the restrictions to the domain.

Solution:

$$(f-g)(x) = f(x) - g(x)$$

$$= \frac{x(x-1)}{x^2 - 25} - \frac{x-3}{x-5}$$

$$= \frac{x(x-1)}{(x+5)(x-5)} - \frac{(x-3)}{(x-5)} \cdot \frac{(x+5)}{(x+5)}$$

$$= \frac{x(x-1) - (x-3)(x+5)}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - x - (x^2 + 5x - 3x - 15)}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - x - (x^2 + 2x - 15)}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - x - x^2 - 2x + 15}{x+5}$$

$$= \frac{-3x + 15}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{-3(x-5)}{(x+5)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{-3}{(x+5)}$$

The domain of f consists of all real numbers except 5 and -5, and the domain of g consists of all real numbers except 5. Therefore, the domain of f - g consists of all real numbers except -5 and 5.

Answer: -3x+5, where  $x\neq\pm5$

# **7.4** Complex Rational Expressions

## **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

1. Simplify complex rational expressions by multiplying the numerator by the reciprocal of the divisor.

2. Simplify complex rational expressions by multiplying numerator and denominator by the least common denominator (LCD).

### **Definitions**

A complex fraction is a fraction where the numerator or denominator consists of one or more fractions. For example,

$$\frac{\frac{3}{4}}{\frac{1}{2}}$$

Simplifying such a fraction requires us to find an equivalent fraction with integer numerator and denominator. One way to do this is to divide. Recall that dividing fractions involves multiplying by the reciprocal of the divisor.

$$\frac{\frac{3}{4}}{\frac{1}{2}} = \frac{3}{\cancel{2}} \cdot \frac{\cancel{2}}{1} = \frac{3}{2}$$
 Method 1: using division

An alternative method for simplifying this complex fraction involves multiplying both the numerator and denominator by the LCD of all the given fractions. In this case, the LCD = 4.

$$\frac{\frac{3}{4} \cdot 4}{\frac{1}{2} \cdot 4} = \frac{3}{2}$$
 Method 2: using the LCD

A complex rational expression is defined as a rational expression that contains one or more rational expressions in the numerator or denominator or both. For example,

$$\frac{\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{x}}{\frac{1}{4} - \frac{1}{x^2}}$$

We simplify a complex rational expression by finding an equivalent fraction where the numerator and denominator are polynomials. As illustrated above, there are two methods for simplifying complex rational expressions, and we will outline the steps for both methods. For the sake of clarity, assume that variable expressions used as denominators are nonzero.

# **Method 1: Simplify Using Division**

We begin our discussion on simplifying complex rational expressions using division. Before we can multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor, we must simplify the numerator and denominator separately. The goal is to first obtain single algebraic fractions in the numerator and the denominator. The steps for simplifying a complex algebraic fraction are illustrated in the following example.

**Example 1:** Simplify: 12+1x14-1x2.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Simplify the numerator and denominator. The goal is to obtain a single algebraic fraction divided by another single algebraic fraction. In this example, find equivalent terms with a common denominator in both the numerator and denominator before adding and subtracting.

$$\frac{\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{x}}{\frac{1}{4} - \frac{1}{x^2}} = \frac{\frac{1}{2} \cdot \frac{x}{x} + \frac{1}{x} \cdot \frac{2}{2}}{\frac{1}{4} \cdot \frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{1}{x^2} \cdot \frac{4}{4}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x}{2x} + \frac{2}{2x}}{\frac{x^2}{4x^2} - \frac{4}{4x^2}}$$
Equivalent fractions with common denominators
$$= \frac{\frac{x+2}{2x}}{\frac{x^2-4}{4x^2}}$$
Add the fractions in the numerator and denominator.

At this point we have a single algebraic fraction divided by a single algebraic fraction.

Step 2: Multiply the numerator by the reciprocal of the divisor.

$$\frac{\frac{x+2}{2x}}{\frac{x^2-4}{4x^2}} = \frac{x+2}{2x} \cdot \frac{4x^2}{x^2-4}$$

Step 3: Factor all numerators and denominators completely.

$$=\frac{x+2}{2x}\cdot\frac{4x^2}{(x+2)(x-2)}$$

Step 4: Cancel all common factors.

$$= \frac{4x^{2} \cdot (x+2)}{2x(x+2)(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{4x^{2} \cdot (x+2)}{2x(x+2)(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{2x}{(x-2)}$$

Answer: 2xx-2

**Example 2:** Simplify: 1*x*-1*x*-24*x*2-2*x*.

Solution:

$$\frac{1}{x} - \frac{1}{x-2} = \frac{1}{x} \cdot \frac{(x-2)}{(x-2)} - \frac{1}{x-2} \cdot \frac{x}{x}$$

$$\frac{4}{x^2 - 2x}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x-2}{x(x-2)} - \frac{x}{x(x-2)}}{\frac{4}{x^2 - 2x}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x-2-x}{x(x-2)}}{\frac{4}{x^2 - 2x}}$$
Subtract.
$$= \frac{\frac{x-2-x}{x(x-2)}}{\frac{4}{x^2 - 2x}}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{x(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{x}{x(x-2)}$$

$$= \frac{-2}{x(x-2)} \cdot \frac{x^2 - 2x}{4}$$
Multiply by the reciprocal of the divisor.
$$= \frac{-2}{x(x-2)} \cdot \frac{x^2 - 2x}{4}$$
Factor.
$$= \frac{-1}{x} \cdot \frac{x}{x} \cdot \frac{x$$

Answer: -12

**Example 3:** Simplify 1-4*x*-21*x*2 1-2*x*-15*x*2.

**Solution:** The LCD of the rational expressions in both the numerator and denominator is x2. Multiply by the appropriate factors to obtain equivalent terms with this as the denominator and then subtract.

$$\frac{1 - \frac{4}{x} - \frac{21}{x^2}}{1 - \frac{2}{x} - \frac{15}{x^2}} = \frac{\frac{1}{1} \cdot \frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{4}{x} \cdot \frac{x}{x} - \frac{21}{x^2}}{\frac{1}{1} \cdot \frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{2}{x} \cdot \frac{x}{x} - \frac{15}{x^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{4x}{x^2} - \frac{21}{x^2}}{\frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{2x}{x^2} - \frac{15}{x^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x^2 - 4x - 21}{x^2}}{\frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{2x - 15}{x^2}}$$

We now have a single rational expression divided by another single rational expression. Next, multiply the numerator by the reciprocal of the divisor and then factor and cancel.

$$\frac{\frac{x^2 - 4x - 21}{x^2}}{\frac{x^2 - 2x - 15}{x^2}} = \frac{x^2 - 4x - 21}{x^2} \cdot \frac{x^2}{x^2 - 2x - 15}$$

$$= \frac{(x + 3)(x - 7)}{x^2} \cdot \frac{x^2}{(x + 3)(x - 5)}$$

$$= \frac{x - 7}{x - 5}$$

Answer: x-7x-5

**Example 4:** Simplify: 1-1x2 1x-1.

Solution:

$$\frac{1 - \frac{1}{x^2}}{\frac{1}{x} - 1} = \frac{\frac{1}{1} \cdot \frac{x^2}{x^2} - \frac{1}{x^2}}{\frac{1}{x} - \frac{1}{1} \cdot \frac{x}{x}}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{x^2 - 1}{x^2}}{\frac{1 - x}{x}}$$

$$= \frac{(x + 1)(x - 1)}{x^2} \cdot \frac{x}{-1 \cdot (x - 1)}$$

$$= \frac{x + 1}{-1 \cdot x}$$

$$= -\frac{x + 1}{x}$$

Answer: -x+1x

**Try this!** Simplify: 181–1*x*2 19+1*x*.

Answer: x–99x

# **Method 2: Simplify Using the LCD**

An alternative method for simplifying complex rational expressions involves clearing the fractions by multiplying the expression by a special

form of 1. In this method, multiply the numerator and denominator by the least common denominator (LCD) of all given fractions.

**Example 5:** Simplify: 12+1x14-1x2.

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Determine the LCD of all the fractions in the numerator and denominator. In this case, the denominators of the given fractions are 2, x, 4, and  $x_2$ . Therefore, the LCD is  $4x_2$ .

**Step 2:** Multiply the numerator and denominator by the LCD. This step should clear the fractions in both the numerator and denominator.

$$\frac{\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{x}}{\frac{1}{4} - \frac{1}{x^2}} = \frac{\left(\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{x}\right) \cdot 4x^2}{\left(\frac{1}{4} - \frac{1}{x^2}\right) \cdot 4x^2}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{1}{2} \cdot 4x^2 + \frac{1}{x} \cdot 4x^2}{\frac{1}{4} \cdot 4x^2 - \frac{1}{x^2} \cdot 4x^2}$$

$$= \frac{2x^2 + 4x}{x^2 - 4}$$
Cancel.

This leaves us with a single algebraic fraction with a polynomial in the numerator and in the denominator.

Step 3: Factor the numerator and denominator completely.

$$= \frac{2x^2 + 4x}{x^2 - 4}$$
$$= \frac{2x(x+2)}{(x+2)(x-2)}$$

Step 4: Cancel all common factors.

$$= \frac{2x(x+2)}{(x+2)(x-2)}$$
$$= \frac{2x}{x-2}$$

Answer: 2xx-2

## **Note**

This was the same problem that we began this section with, and the results here are the same. It is worth taking the time to compare the steps involved using both methods on the same problem.

**Example 6:** Simplify: 1-2*x*-15*x*2 3-14*x*-5*x*2.

**Solution:** Considering all of the denominators, we find that the LCD is  $x_2$ . Therefore, multiply the numerator and denominator by  $x_2$ :

$$\frac{1 - \frac{2}{x} - \frac{15}{x^2}}{3 - \frac{14}{x} - \frac{5}{x^2}} = \frac{\left(1 - \frac{2}{x} - \frac{15}{x^2}\right) \cdot x^2}{\left(3 - \frac{14}{x} - \frac{5}{x^2}\right) \cdot x^2} \qquad Multiply numerator and denominator by the LCD.$$

$$= \frac{1 \cdot x^2 - \frac{2}{x} \cdot x^2 - \frac{15}{x^2} \cdot x^2}{3 \cdot x^2 - \frac{14}{x} \cdot x^2 - \frac{5}{x^2} \cdot x^2} \qquad Distribute.$$

$$= \frac{x^2 - 2x - 15}{3x^2 - 14x - 5}$$

At this point, we have a rational expression that can be simplified by factoring and then canceling the common factors.

$$= \frac{(x+3)(x-5)}{(3x+1)(x-5)}$$

$$= \frac{x+3}{3x+1}$$
Cancel.

Answer: x+33x+1

It is important to point out that multiplying the numerator and denominator by the same nonzero factor is equivalent to multiplying by 1 and does not change the problem. Because  $x_2x_2=1$ , we can multiply the numerator and denominator by  $x_2$  in the previous example and obtain an equivalent expression.

**Example 7:** Simplify: 1x+1+3x-3 2x-3-1x+1.

**Solution:** The LCM of all the denominators is (x+1)(x-3). Begin by multiplying the numerator and denominator by these factors.

$$\frac{\frac{1}{x+1} + \frac{3}{x-3}}{\frac{2}{x-3} - \frac{1}{x+1}} = \frac{\left(\frac{1}{x+1} + \frac{3}{x-3}\right) \cdot (x+1)(x-3)}{\left(\frac{2}{x-3} - \frac{1}{x+1}\right) \cdot (x+1)(x-3)}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{1(x+1)(x-3)}{x+1} + \frac{3(x+1)(x-3)}{x-3}}{\frac{2(x+1)(x-3)}{x-3} - \frac{1(x+1)(x-3)}{x+1}}$$

$$= \frac{(x-3) + 3(x+1)}{2(x+1) - 1(x-3)}$$

$$= \frac{x-3 + 3x + 3}{2x + 2 - x + 3}$$

$$= \frac{4x}{x+5}$$

$$= \frac{4x}{x+5}$$

Answer: 4xx+5

**Try this!** Simplify: 1*y*-14116-1*y*2.

Answer: -4yy+4

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Complex rational expressions can be simplified into equivalent expressions with a polynomial numerator and polynomial denominator.
- One method of simplifying a complex rational expression requires us to first write the numerator and denominator as a single algebraic fraction.

Then multiply the numerator by the reciprocal of the divisor and simplify the result.

- Another method for simplifying a complex rational expression requires
  that we multiply it by a special form of 1. Multiply the numerator and
  denominator by the LCM of all the denominators as a means to clear the
  fractions. After doing this, simplify the remaining rational expression.
- An algebraic fraction is reduced to lowest terms if the numerator and denominator are polynomials that share no common factors other than
   1.

# **7.5** Solving Rational Equations

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Solve rational equations.
- 2. Solve literal equations, or formulas, involving rational expressions.

## **Solving Rational Equations**

A rational equation is an equation containing at least one rational expression. Rational expressions typically contain a variable in the denominator. For this reason, we will take care to ensure that the denominator is not 0 by making note of restrictions and checking our solutions.

Solve rational equations by clearing the fractions by multiplying both sides of the equation by the least common denominator (LCD).

**Example 1:** Solve: 5x-13=1x.

**Solution:** We first make a note that  $x\neq 0$  and then multiply both sides by the LCD, 3x:

$$3x \cdot \left(\frac{5}{x} - \frac{1}{3}\right) = 3x \cdot \left(\frac{1}{x}\right)$$
 Multiply both sides by the LCD.  

$$3x \cdot \frac{5}{x} - 3x \cdot \frac{1}{3} = 3x \cdot \frac{1}{x}$$
 Distribute.  

$$15 - x = 3$$
 Simplify, and then solve.  

$$-x = -12$$
  

$$x = 12$$

Check your answer by substituting 12 for x to see if you obtain a true statement.

$$\frac{5}{x} - \frac{1}{3} = \frac{1}{x}$$

$$\frac{5}{12} - \frac{1}{3} = \frac{1}{12}$$

$$\frac{5}{12} - \frac{4}{12} = \frac{1}{12}$$

$$\frac{1}{12} = \frac{1}{12}$$

Answer: The solution is 12.

After multiplying both sides of the previous example by the LCD, we were left with a linear equation to solve. This is not always the case; sometimes we will be left with a quadratic equation.

**Example 2:** Solve: 2-1x(x+1)=3x+1.

**Solution:** In this example, there are two restrictions,  $x\neq 0$  and  $x\neq -1$ . Begin by multiplying both sides by the LCD, x(x+1).

$$x(x+1) \cdot \left(2 - \frac{1}{x(x+1)}\right) = x(x+1) \cdot \frac{3}{x+1}$$

$$x(x+1) \cdot 2 - \frac{x(x+1) \cdot 1}{x(x+1)} = \frac{x(x+1) \cdot 3}{x+1}$$

$$2x(x+1) - 1 = 3x$$

$$2x^2 + 2x - 1 = 3x$$

After distributing and dividing out the common factors, a quadratic equation remains. To solve it, rewrite it in standard form, factor, and then set each factor equal to 0.

$$2x^{2} + 2x - 1 - 3x = 3x - 3x$$
$$2x^{2} - x - 1 = 0$$
$$(2x+1)(x-1) = 0$$

$$2x+1=0 \quad \text{or} \quad x-1=0$$
$$2x=-1 \qquad x=1$$
$$x=-\frac{1}{2}$$

Check to see if these values solve the original equation.

$$2 - \frac{1}{x(x+1)} = \frac{3}{x+1}$$

$$Check \ x = -\frac{1}{2}$$

$$2 - \frac{1}{\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)\left(\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) + 1\right)} = \frac{3}{\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right) + 1}$$

$$2 - \frac{1}{1(1+1)} = \frac{3}{1+1}$$

$$1 \quad 3$$

$$\frac{1}{2}\left(\left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)+1\right) \quad \left(-\frac{1}{2}\right)+1$$

$$2-\frac{1}{2}=\frac{3}{2}$$

$$2-\frac{1}{2}=\frac{3}{2}$$

$$2+1\cdot\frac{4}{1}=3\cdot\frac{2}{1}$$

$$2+4=6$$

$$6=6$$

Answer: The solutions are -1/2 and 1.

Up to this point, all of the possible solutions have solved the original equation. However, this may not always be the case. Multiplying both sides of an equation by variable factors may lead to extraneous solutions, which are solutions that do not solve the original equation. A complete list of steps for solving a rational equation is outlined in the following example.

**Example 3:** Solve: xx+2+2x2+5x+6=5x+3.

Solution:

**Step 1:** Factor all denominators and determine the LCD.

$$\frac{x}{x+2} + \frac{2}{x^2 + 5x + 6} = \frac{5}{x+3}$$
$$\frac{x}{(x+2)} + \frac{2}{(x+2)(x+3)} = \frac{5}{(x+3)}$$

The LCD is (x+2)(x+3).

**Step 2:** Identify the restrictions. In this case, they are  $x\neq -2$  and  $x\neq -3$ .

**Step 3:** Multiply both sides of the equation by the LCD. Distribute carefully and then simplify.

$$(x+2)(x+3) \cdot \left(\frac{x}{(x+2)} + \frac{2}{(x+2)(x+3)}\right) = \cdot (x+2)(x+3) \cdot \frac{5}{(x+3)}$$

$$\frac{x \cdot (x+2)(x+3)}{(x+2)} + \frac{2 \cdot (x+2)(x+3)}{(x+2)(x+3)} = \frac{5 \cdot (x+2)(x+3)}{(x+3)}$$

$$x(x+3) + 2 = 5(x+2)$$

$$x^2 + 3x + 2 = 5x + 10$$

**Step 4:** Solve the resulting equation. Here the result is a quadratic equation. Rewrite it in standard form, factor, and then set each factor equal to 0.

$$x^{2} + 3x + 2 - 5x - 10 = 5x + 10 - 5x - 10$$

$$x^{2} - 2x - 8 = 0$$

$$(x+2)(x-4) = 0$$

$$x+2 = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad x-4 = 0$$

$$x = -2 \quad x = 4$$

**Step 5:** Check for extraneous solutions. Always substitute into the original equation, or the factored equivalent. In this case, choose the factored equivalent to check:

$$\frac{x}{(x+2)} + \frac{2}{(x+2)(x+3)} = \frac{5}{(x+3)}$$

Check 
$$x = -2$$

$$\frac{-2}{(-2+2)} + \frac{2}{(-2+2)(-2+3)} = \frac{5}{(-2+3)}$$

$$\frac{4}{(4+2)} + \frac{2}{(4+2)(4+3)} = \frac{5}{(4+3)}$$

$$\frac{2}{6} + \frac{2}{6} = \frac{5}{7}$$
Undefined terms!
$$\frac{2}{3} + \frac{1}{21} = \frac{5}{7}$$

$$\frac{14}{21} + \frac{1}{21} = \frac{5}{7}$$

$$\frac{15}{21} = \frac{5}{7}$$

$$\frac{5}{7} = \frac{5}{7}$$

Here -2 is an extraneous solution and is not included in the solution set. It is important to note that -2 is a restriction.

Answer: The solution is 4.

If this process produces a solution that happens to be a restriction, then disregard it as an extraneous solution.

**Try this!** Solve: xx-5+3x+2=7xx2-3x-10.

Answer: -3

Sometimes all potential solutions are extraneous, in which case we say that there is no solution to the original equation. In the next two examples, we demonstrate two ways in which a rational equation can have no solutions.

**Example 4:** Solve: 3xx2-4-2x+2=1x+2.

**Solution:** To identify the LCD, first factor the denominators.

$$\frac{3x}{x^2 - 4} - \frac{2}{x + 2} = \frac{1}{x + 2}$$
$$\frac{3x}{(x + 2)(x - 2)} - \frac{2}{(x + 2)} = \frac{1}{(x + 2)}$$

Multiply both sides by the least common denonominator (LCD), (x+2)(x-2), distributing carefully.

$$\frac{3x \cdot (x+2)(x-2)}{(x+2)(x-2)} - \frac{2 \cdot (x+2)(x-2)}{(x+2)} = \frac{1 \cdot (x+2)(x-2)}{(x+2)}$$

$$3x - 2(x-2) = 1(x-2)$$

$$3x - 2x + 4 = x - 2$$

$$x + 4 = x - 2$$

$$4 = -2$$
False

The equation is a contradiction and thus has no solution.

Answer: No solution, Ø

**Example 5:** Solve: xx-4-4x+5=36x2+x-20.

**Solution:** First, factor the denominators.

$$\frac{x}{(x-4)} - \frac{4}{(x+5)} = \frac{36}{(x-4)(x+5)}$$

Take note that the restrictions are  $x\neq 4$  and  $x\neq -5$ . To clear the fractions, multiply by the LCD, (x-4)(x+5).

$$\frac{x \cdot (x-4)(x+5)}{(x-4)} - \frac{4 \cdot (x-4)(x+5)}{(x+5)} = \frac{36 \cdot (x-4)(x+5)}{(x-4)(x+5)}$$

$$x(x+5) - 4(x-4) = 36$$

$$x^2 + 5x - 4x + 16 = 36$$

$$x^2 + x - 20 = 0$$

$$(x-4)(x+5) = 0$$

$$x - 4 = 0 \text{ or } x+5 = 0$$

$$x = 4 \qquad x = -5$$

Both of these values are restrictions of the original equation; hence both are extraneous.

Answer: No solution, Ø

**Try this!** Solve: 1x+1+xx-3=4xx2-2x-3.

Answer: Ø

It is important to point out that this technique for clearing algebraic fractions only works for equations. Do not try to clear algebraic fractions when simplifying expressions. As a reminder, we have

Expression

Equation

$$\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}$$

$$\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1} = 0$$

Expressions are to be simplified and equations are to be solved. If we multiply the expression by the LCD, x(2x+1), we obtain another expression that is not equivalent.

$$\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}$$

$$\neq x (2x+1) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}\right)$$

$$= 2x + 1 + x^2$$

$$\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}$$

$$\neq x (2x+1) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}\right)$$

$$= 2x+1+x^{2}$$

$$x (2x+1) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{x} + \frac{x}{2x+1}\right) = x(2x+1) \cdot 0$$

$$2x+1+x^{2} = 0$$

$$x^{2}+2x+1=0$$

# **Literal Equations**

Literal equations, or formulas, are often rational equations. Hence the techniques described in this section can be used to solve for particular variables. Assume that all variable expressions in the denominator are nonzero.

**Example 6:** Solve for x: z=x-5y.

**Solution:** The goal is to isolate x. Assuming that y is nonzero, multiply both sides by y and then add 5 to both sides.

$$y \cdot z = y \cdot \frac{x - 5}{y}$$
$$yz = x - 5$$
$$yz + 5 = x - 5 + 5$$
$$yz + 5 = x$$

Answer: x=yz+5

**Example 7:** Solve for c: 1c=1a+1b.

**Solution:** In this example, the goal is to isolate c. We begin by multiplying both sides by the LCD,  $a \cdot b \cdot c$ , distributing carefully.

$$\frac{1}{c} = \frac{1}{a} + \frac{1}{b}$$

$$abc \cdot \frac{1}{c} = abc \cdot \frac{1}{a} + abc \cdot \frac{1}{b}$$

$$ab = bc + ac$$

On the right side of the equation, factor out c.

$$ab = c(b+a)$$



Next, divide both sides of the equation by the quantity (b+a).

$$\frac{ab}{(b+a)} = \frac{c(b+a)}{(b+a)}$$
$$\frac{ab}{b+a} = c$$

Answer: c=abb+a

**Try this!** Solve for y: x=y+1y-1.

Answer: y=x+1x-1

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Begin solving rational equations by multiplying both sides by the LCD. The
  resulting equivalent equation can be solved using the techniques learned
  up to this point.
- Multiplying both sides of a rational equation by a variable expression introduces the possibility of extraneous solutions. Therefore, we must check the solutions against the set of restrictions. If a solution is a restriction, then it is not part of the domain and is extraneous.
- When multiplying both sides of an equation by an expression, distribute carefully and multiply each term by that expression.
- If all of the resulting solutions are extraneous, then the original equation has no solutions.

# **7.6** Applications of Rational Equations

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Solve applications involving relationships between real numbers.
- 2. Solve applications involving uniform motion (distance problems).
- 3. Solve work-rate applications.

### **Number Problems**

Recall that the reciprocal of a nonzero number n is 1/n. For example, the reciprocal of 5 is 1/5 and  $5 \cdot 1/5 = 1$ . In this section, the applications will often involve the key word "reciprocal." When this is the case, we will see that the algebraic setup results in a rational equation.

**Example 1:** A positive integer is 4 less than another. The sum of the reciprocals of the two positive integers is 10/21. Find the two integers. **Solution:** Begin by assigning variables to the unknowns.

Let n represent the larger positive integer. Let n-4 represent the smaller positive integer.

Next, use the reciprocals 1n and 1n-4 to translate the sentences into an algebraic equation.

the sum of the reciprocals
$$\frac{1}{n} + \frac{1}{n-4} = \frac{10}{21}$$

We can solve this rational expression by multiplying both sides of the equation by the least common denominator (LCD). In this case, the LCD is 21n(n-4).

$$\frac{1}{n} + \frac{1}{n-4} = \frac{10}{21}$$

$$21n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{n} + \frac{1}{n-4}\right) = 21n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{10}{21}\right) \quad \text{Multiply both sides}$$

$$by \text{ the LCD.}$$

$$21n(n-4) \cdot \frac{1}{n} + 21n(n-4) \cdot \frac{1}{n-4} = 21n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{10}{21}\right) \quad \text{Distribute and}$$

$$then cancel.$$

$$21(n-4) + 21n = 10n(n-4)$$

Solve the resulting quadratic equation.

$$21(n-4)+21n = 10n(n-4)$$

$$21n-84+21n = 10n^{2}-40n$$

$$42n-84 = 10n^{2}-40n$$

$$0 = 10n^{2}-82n+84$$

$$0 = 2(5n^{2}-41n+42)$$

$$0 = 2(5n-6)(n-7)$$

$$5n-6 = 0 \text{ or } n-7 = 0$$

$$5n = 6 \qquad n = 7$$

$$n = \frac{6}{5}$$

The question calls for integers and the only integer solution is n=7. Hence disregard 6/5. Use the expression n=4 to find the smaller integer.

$$n-4=7-4=3$$

Answer: The two positive integers are 3 and 7. The check is left to the reader.


**Example 2:** A positive integer is 4 less than another. If the reciprocal of the smaller integer is subtracted from twice the reciprocal of the larger, then the result is 1/30. Find the two integers.

#### Solution:

Let *n* represent the larger positive integer.

Let n-4 represent the smaller positive integer.

Set up an algebraic equation.



Solve this rational expression by multiplying both sides by the LCD. The LCD is 30n(n-4).

$$\frac{2}{n} - \frac{1}{n-4} = \frac{1}{30}$$

$$30n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{2}{n} - \frac{1}{n-4}\right) = 30n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{30}\right)$$

$$30n(n-4) \cdot \frac{2}{n} - 30n(n-4) \cdot \frac{1}{n-4} = 30n(n-4) \cdot \left(\frac{1}{30}\right)$$

$$60(n-4) - 30n = n(n-4)$$

$$60n - 240 - 30n = n^2 - 4n$$

$$30n - 240 = n^2 - 4n$$

$$0 = n^2 - 34n + 240$$

$$0 = (n-10)(n-24)$$

$$n-10 = 0 \text{ or } n-24 = 0$$

Here we have two viable possibilities for the larger integer. For this reason, we will we have two solutions to this problem.

n = 10 n = 24

If 
$$n = 10$$
, then  $n - 4 = 10 - 4 = 6$ .  
If  $n = 24$ , then  $n - 4 = 24 - 4 = 20$ .

As a check, perform the operations indicated in the problem.

Check 6 and 10.  

$$2\left(\frac{1}{10}\right) - \frac{1}{6} = \frac{1}{5} - \frac{1}{6}$$

$$= \frac{6}{30} - \frac{5}{30}$$

$$= \frac{1}{30} \checkmark$$
Check 20 and 24.  

$$2\left(\frac{1}{24}\right) - \frac{1}{20} = \frac{1}{12} - \frac{1}{20}$$

$$= \frac{5}{60} - \frac{3}{60}$$

$$= \frac{2}{60}$$

$$= \frac{1}{30} \checkmark$$

Answer: Two sets of positive integers solve this problem: {6, 10} and {20, 24}.

**Try this!** The difference between the reciprocals of two consecutive positive odd integers is 2/15. Find the integers.

Answer: The integers are 3 and 5.

# **Uniform Motion Problems**

Uniform motion problems, also referred to as distance problems, involve the formula

$$D = rt$$

where the distance, D, is given as the product of the average rate, r, and the time, t, traveled at that rate. If we divide both sides by the average rate, r, then we obtain the formula

$$t = \frac{D}{r}$$

For this reason, when the unknown quantity is time, the algebraic setup for distance problems often results in a rational equation. Similarly, when the unknown quantity is the rate, the setup also may result in a rational equation.

We begin any uniform motion problem by first organizing our data with a chart. Use this information to set up an algebraic equation that models the application.

**Example 5:** Mary spent the first 120 miles of her road trip in traffic. When the traffic cleared, she was able to drive twice as fast for the remaining 300 miles. If the total trip took 9 hours, then how fast was she moving in traffic? **Solution:** First, identify the unknown quantity and organize the data.

Let *x* represent Mary's average speed (miles per hour) in traffic. Let 2*x* represent her average speed after the traffic cleared.

	Distance =	Rate	×	Time
In traffic	120 mi	х		
Clear traffic	300 mi	2x		
Total				9 hours

To avoid introducing two more variables for the time column, use the formula t=Dr. Here the time for each leg of the trip is calculated as follows:

Time spent in traffic: 
$$t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{120}{x}$$
  
Time clear of traffic:  $t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{300}{2x}$ 

Use these expressions to complete the chart.

	Distance =	= Rate	×	Time	3

The algebraic setup is defined by the time column. Add the times for each leg of the trip to obtain a total of 9 hours:

time spent in traffic time clear of traffic total time of trip
$$\frac{120}{x} + \frac{300}{2x} = 9$$

We begin solving this equation by first multiplying both sides by the LCD, 2x.

$$\frac{120}{x} + \frac{300}{2x} = 9$$

$$2x \cdot \left(\frac{120}{x} + \frac{300}{2x}\right) = 2x \cdot 9$$

$$2x \cdot \frac{120}{x} + 2x \cdot \frac{300}{2x} = 2x \cdot 9$$

$$240 + 300 = 18x$$

$$540 = 18x$$

$$30 = x$$

Answer: Mary averaged 30 miles per hour in traffic.

**Example 6:** A passenger train can travel, on average, 20 miles per hour faster than a freight train. If the passenger train covers 390 miles in the same time it takes the freight train to cover 270 miles, then how fast is each train?

Solution: First, identify the unknown quantities and organize the data.

Let *x* represent the average speed of the freight train.

Let x + 20 represent the speed of the passenger train.

Next, organize the given data in a chart.

	Distance =	= Rate	×	Time
Passenger Train	390 mi	x + 20		
Freight Train	270 mi	x		
Total				

Use the formula t=Dr to fill in the time column for each train.

Passenger train: 
$$t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{390}{x + 20}$$
Freight train: 
$$t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{270}{x}$$

	Distance =	= Rate	× Time
Passenger Train	390 mi	x + 20	$\frac{390}{x+20}$
Freight Train	270 mi	x	$\frac{270}{x}$
Total			

Because the trains travel the same amount of time, finish the algebraic setup by equating the expressions that represent the times:

$$\frac{390}{x+20} = \frac{270}{x}$$

Solve this equation by first multiplying both sides by the LCD, x(x+20).

$$x(x+20) \cdot \left(\frac{390}{x+20}\right) = x(x+20) \cdot \left(\frac{270}{x}\right)$$

$$390x = 270 (x+20)$$

$$390x = 270x + 5400$$

$$120x = 5400$$

$$x = 45$$

Use x + 20 to find the speed of the passenger train.

$$x + 20 = 45 + 20 = 65$$

Answer: The speed of the passenger train is 65 miles per hour and the speed of the freight train is 45 miles per hour.

**Example 7:** Brett lives on the river 8 miles upstream from town. When the current is 2 miles per hour, he can row his boat downstream to town for supplies and back in 3 hours. What is his average rowing speed in still water?

#### Solution:

Let x represent Brett's average rowing speed in still water.

Rowing downstream, the current increases his speed, and his rate is x + 2 miles per hour. Rowing upstream, the current decreases his speed, and his rate is x - 2 miles per hour. Begin by organizing the data in the following chart:

	Distance =	Rate	× Time
Trip downstream	8 mi	x + 2	
Trip upstream	8 mi	x-2	
Total			3 hours

Use the formula t=Dr to fill in the time column for each leg of the trip.

Trip downstream: 
$$t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{8}{x+2}$$
Trip upstream: 
$$t = \frac{D}{r} = \frac{8}{x-2}$$

	Distance =	Rate	× Time
Trip downstream	8 mi	x + 2	$\frac{8}{x+2}$
Trip upstream	8 mi	x-2	$\frac{8}{x-2}$
Total			3 hours

The algebraic setup is defined by the time column. Add the times for each leg of the trip to obtain a total of 3 hours:

time rowing downstream time rowing upstream total time of trip
$$\frac{8}{x+2} + \frac{8}{x-2} = 3$$

Solve this equation by first multiplying both sides by the LCD, (x+2)(x-2).

$$(x-2)(x+2) \cdot \left(\frac{8}{x+2} + \frac{8}{x-2}\right) = 3(x-2)(x+2)$$

$$(x-2)(x+2) \cdot \frac{8}{x+2} + (x-2)(x+2) \cdot \frac{8}{x-2} = 3(x-2)(x+2)$$

$$8(x-2) + 8(x+2) = 3(x^2 - 4)$$

$$8x - 16 + 8x + 16 = 3x^2 - 12$$

$$16x = 3x^2 - 12$$

$$0 = 3x^2 - 16x - 12$$

Next, solve the resulting quadratic equation.

$$0 = 3x^{2} - 16x - 12$$

$$0 = (3x + 2)(x - 6)$$

$$3x + 2 = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad x - 6 = 0$$

$$3x = -2 \quad x = 6$$

$$x = \frac{-2}{3}$$

Use only the positive solution, *x*=6 miles per hour.

Answer: His rowing speed is 6 miles per hour.

**Try this!** Dwayne drove 18 miles to the airport to pick up his father and then returned home. On the return trip he was able to drive an average of 15 miles per hour faster than he did on the trip there. If the total driving time was 1 hour, then what was his average speed driving to the airport? Answer: His average speed driving to the airport was 30 miles per hour.

# **Work-Rate Problems**

The rate at which a task can be performed is called a work rate. For example, if a painter can paint a room in 8 hours, then the task is to paint the room, and we can write

In other words, the painter can complete 18 of the task per hour. If he works for less than 8 hours, then he will perform a fraction of the task. For example,

work rate 
$$\times$$
 time = work completed

 $\frac{1}{8} \times 2 \text{ hrs} = \frac{1}{4}$  One-quarter of the room painted

 $\frac{1}{8} \times 4 \text{ hrs} = \frac{1}{2}$  One-half of the room painted

 $\frac{1}{8} \times 8 \text{ hrs} = 1$  One whole room painted


Obtain the amount of the task completed by multiplying the work rate by the amount of time the painter works. Typically, work-rate problems involve people working together to complete tasks. When this is the case, we can organize the data in a chart, just as we have done with distance problems.

Suppose an apprentice painter can paint the same room by himself in 10 hours. Then we say that he can complete 110 of the task per hour.

Let t represent the time it takes both of the painters, working together, to paint the room.

Amou	nt of Task Completed =		Time
Painter		$\frac{1}{8}$	t
Apprentice		$\frac{1}{10}$	t
Total	1		

To complete the chart, multiply the work rate by the time for each person. The portion of the room each can paint adds to a total of 1 task completed. This is represented by the equation obtained from the first column of the chart:



This setup results in a rational equation that can be solved for t by multiplying both sides by the LCD, 40.

$$\frac{1}{8}t + \frac{1}{10}t = 1$$

$$40 \cdot \left(\frac{1}{8}t + \frac{1}{10}t\right) = 40 \cdot 1$$

$$40 \cdot \frac{t}{8} + 40 \cdot \frac{t}{10} = 40 \cdot 1$$

$$5t + 4t = 40$$

$$9t = 40$$

$$t = \frac{40}{9}$$

$$t = 4\frac{4}{9}$$

Therefore, the two painters, working together, complete the task in 449 hours.

In general, we have the following work-rate formula:

$$\frac{1}{t_1}t + \frac{1}{t_2}t = 1$$

Here  $_{1t1}$  and  $_{1t2}$  are the individual work rates and t is the time it takes to complete one task working together. If we factor out the time, t, and then divide both sides by t, we obtain an equivalent work-rate formula:

$$\frac{1}{t_1}t + \frac{1}{t_2}t = 1$$

$$t\left(\frac{1}{t_1} + \frac{1}{t_2}\right) = 1$$

$$\frac{1}{t_1} + \frac{1}{t_2} = \frac{1}{t}$$

In summary, we have the following equivalent work-rate formulas:

Work rate formulas:

$$\frac{1}{t_1}t + \frac{1}{t_2}t = 1$$
 or  $\frac{t}{t_1} + \frac{t}{t_2} = 1$  or  $\frac{1}{t_1} + \frac{1}{t_2} = \frac{1}{t}$ 

**Example 3:** Working alone, Billy's dad can complete the yard work in 3 hours. If Billy helps his dad, then the yard work takes 2 hours. How long would it take Billy working alone to complete the yard work?

**Solution:** The given information tells us that Billy's dad has an individual work rate of  $_{13}$  task per hour. If we let x represent the time it takes Billy working alone to complete the yard work, then Billy's individual work rate is  $_{1x}$ , and we can write

Amou	nt of Task Completed =		< Time
Billy's Dad		$\frac{1}{3}$	2
Billy		$\frac{1}{x}$	2
Total	1		

Working together, they can complete the task in 2 hours. Multiply the individual work rates by 2 hours to fill in the chart.

	nt of Task Completed :		× Time
Billy's Dad	$\frac{1}{3}\cdot 2$	$\frac{1}{3}$	2
Billy	$\frac{1}{x} \cdot 2$	$\frac{1}{x}$	2
Total	1		
	$\frac{1}{3} \cdot 2 + \frac{1}{x}$	2 = 1	

The amount of the task each completes will total 1 completed task. To solve for x, we first multiply both sides by the LCD, 3x.

$$\frac{1}{3} \cdot 2 + \frac{1}{x} \cdot 2 = 1$$

$$3x \cdot \left(\frac{2}{3} + \frac{2}{x}\right) = 3x \cdot 1$$

$$3x \cdot \frac{2}{3} + 3x \cdot \frac{2}{x} = 3x \cdot 1$$

$$2x + 6 = 3x$$

$$6 = x$$

Answer: It takes Billy 6 hours to complete the yard work alone.

Of course, the unit of time for the work rate need not always be in hours.

**Example 4:** Working together, two construction crews can build a shed in 5 days. Working separately, the less experienced crew takes twice as long to build a shed than the more experienced crew. Working separately, how long does it take each crew to build a shed?

#### Solution:

Let x represent the time it takes the more experienced crew to build a shed. Let 2x represent the time it takes the less experienced crew to build a shed.

Working together, the job is completed in 5 days. This gives the following setup:

	nt of Task Completed :	Work - = Rate >	< Time
Experienced Crew	$\frac{1}{x}$ .5	$\frac{1}{x}$	5 days
Inexperienced Crew	$\frac{1}{2x} \cdot 5$	$\frac{1}{2x}$	5 days
Total	1		

The first column in the chart gives us an algebraic equation that models the problem:

$$\frac{1}{x} \cdot 5 + \frac{1}{2x} \cdot 5 = 1$$

$$\frac{5}{x} + \frac{5}{2x} = 1$$

Solve the equation by multiplying both sides by 2x.

$$2x \cdot \left(\frac{5}{x} + \frac{5}{2x}\right) = 2x \cdot 1$$

$$2x \cdot \frac{5}{x} + 2x \cdot \frac{5}{2x} = 2x \cdot 1$$

$$10 + 5 = 2x$$

$$15 = 2x$$

$$\frac{15}{2} = x \quad \text{or} \quad x = 7\frac{1}{2} \text{ days}$$

To determine the time it takes the less experienced crew, we use 2x:

$$2x = 2\left(\frac{15}{2}\right)$$
$$= 15 \text{ days}$$

Answer: Working separately, the experienced crew takes 7½ days to build a shed, and the less experienced crew takes 15 days to build a shed.

**Try this!** Joe's garden hose fills the pool in 12 hours. His neighbor has a thinner hose that fills the pool in 15 hours. How long will it take to fill the pool using both hoses?

Answer: It will take both hoses 623 hours to fill the pool.

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- In this section, all of the steps outlined for solving general word problems apply. Look for the new key word "reciprocal," which indicates that you should write the quantity in the denominator of a fraction with numerator 1.

# 7.7 Variation


# **Direct Variation**

Consider a freight train moving at a constant speed of 30 miles per hour. The equation that expresses the distance traveled at that speed in terms of time is given by

D = 30t

After 1 hour the train has traveled 30 miles, after 2 hours the train has traveled 60 miles, and so on. We can construct a chart and graph this relation.

Time, t, in hours	Distance $D = 30t$
0	0
1	30
2	60
3	90
4	120



In this example, we can see that the distance varies over time as the product of the constant rate, 30 miles per hour, and the variable, t. This relationship is described as direct variation and 30 is called the **variation constant**. In addition, if we divide both sides of D=30t by t we have

$$\frac{D}{t} = 30$$

In this form, it is reasonable to say that D is proportional to t, where 30 is the constant of proportionality. In general, we have

Key words	Translation
"y varies directly as x"	
"y is directly proportional to $x$ "	
"y is <b>proportional</b> to x"	y=kx

Here k is nonzero and is called the constant of variation or the constant of proportionality.

**Example 1:** The circumference of a circle is directly proportional to its diameter, and the constant of proportionality is  $\pi$ . If the circumference is measured to be 20 inches, then what is the radius of the circle?

#### Solution:

Let *C* represent the circumference of the circle.

Let *d* represent the diameter of a circle.

Use the fact that "the circumference is directly proportional to the diameter" to write an equation that relates the two variables.

$$C = kd$$

We are given that "the constant of proportionality is  $\pi$ ," or  $k=\pi$ . Therefore, we write

$$C = \pi d$$

Now use this formula to find d when the circumference is 20 inches.

$$20 = \pi d$$

$$\frac{20}{\pi} = \frac{\pi d}{\pi}$$

$$\frac{20}{\pi} = d$$

The radius of the circle, r, is one-half of its diameter.

$$r = \frac{d}{2}$$

$$= \frac{\frac{20}{\pi}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{20}{\pi} \cdot \frac{1}{2}$$

$$= \frac{10}{\pi}$$

Answer: The radius is  $10\pi$  inches, or approximately 3.18 inches.

Typically, we will not be given the constant of variation. Instead, we will be given information from which it can be determined.

**Example 2:** An object's weight on earth varies directly to its weight on the moon. If a man weighs 180 pounds on earth, then he will weigh 30 pounds on the moon. Set up an algebraic equation that expresses the weight on earth in terms of the weight on the moon and use it to determine the weight of a woman on the moon if she weighs 120 pounds on earth.

#### Solution:

Let *y* represent the weight on Earth.

Let *x* represent the weight on the Moon.

We are given that the "weight on earth varies directly to the weight on the moon."

$$y = kx$$

To find the constant of variation k, use the given information. A 180-pound man on earth weighs 30 pounds on the moon, or y=180 when x=30.

$$180 = k \cdot 30$$

Solve for k.

$$\frac{180}{30} = k$$
$$6 = k$$

Next, set up a formula that models the given information.

$$y = 6x$$

This implies that a person's weight on earth is 6 times her weight on the moon. To answer the question, use the woman's weight on earth, y=120 pounds, and solve for x.

$$120 = 6x$$

$$\frac{120}{6} = x$$

$$20 = x$$

Answer: The woman weighs 20 pounds on the moon.

### **Inverse Variation**

Next, consider the relationship between time and rate,

$$r = \frac{D}{t}$$

If we wish to travel a fixed distance, then we can determine the average speed required to travel that distance in a given amount of time. For example, if we wish to drive 240 miles in 4 hours, we can determine the required average speed as follows:


$$r = \frac{240}{4} = 60$$

The average speed required to drive 240 miles in 4 hours is 60 miles per hour. If we wish to drive the 240 miles in 5 hours, then determine the required speed using a similar equation:

$$r = \frac{240}{5} = 48$$

In this case, we would only have to average 48 miles per hour. We can make a chart and view this relationship on a graph.

Time t in hours	$Speed$ $r = \frac{240}{t}$
2	120
3	80
4	60
5	48



This is an example of an inverse relationship. We say that r is inversely proportional to the time t, where 240 is the constant of proportionality. In general, we have

Key words	Translation
"y varies inversely as x"	
"y is inversely proportional to x"	y=kx

Again, k is nonzero and is called the **constant of variation** or the **constant of proportionality**.

**Example 3:** If y varies inversely as x and y=5 when x=2, then find the constant of proportionality and an equation that relates the two variables. **Solution:** If we let k represent the constant of proportionality, then the statement "y varies inversely as x" can be written as follows:

$$y = \frac{k}{x}$$

Use the given information, y=5 when x=2, to find k.

$$5 = \frac{k}{2}$$

Solve for k.

$$2 \cdot 5 = 2 \cdot \frac{k}{2}$$
$$10 = k$$

Therefore, the formula that models the problem is

$$y = \frac{10}{x}$$

Answer: The constant of proportionality is 10, and the equation is y=10x.

**Example 4:** The weight of an object varies inversely as the square of its distance from the center of earth. If an object weighs 100 pounds on the surface of earth (approximately 4,000 miles from the center), then how much will it weigh at 1,000 miles above earth's surface?

#### Solution:

Let w represent weight of the object.

Let *d* represent the object's distance from the center of Earth.

Since "w varies inversely as the square of d," we can write

$$w = \frac{k}{d^2}$$

Use the given information to find k. An object weighs 100 pounds on the surface of earth, approximately 4,000 miles from the center. In other words, w = 100 when d = 4,000:

$$100 = \frac{k}{(4,000)^2}$$

Solve for k.

$$(4,000)^{2} \cdot 100 = (4,000)^{2} \cdot \frac{k}{(4,000)^{2}}$$
  
 $1,600,000,000 = k$   
 $1.6 \times 10^{9} = k$ 

Therefore, we can model the problem with the following formula:

$$w = \frac{1.6 \times 10^9}{d^2}$$

To use the formula to find the weight, we need the distance from the center of earth. Since the object is 1,000 miles above the surface, find the distance from the center of earth by adding 4,000 miles:

$$d = 4,000 + 1,000 = 5,000$$
 miles

To answer the question, use the formula with d = 5,000.

$$y = \frac{1.6 \times 10^9}{(5,000)^2}$$
$$= \frac{1.6 \times 10^9}{25,000,000}$$
$$= \frac{1.6 \times 10^9}{2.5 \times 10^7}$$
$$= 0.64 \times 10^2$$
$$= 64$$

Answer: The object will weigh 64 pounds at a distance 1,000 miles above the surface of earth.


## **Joint Variation**

Lastly, we define relationships between multiple variables. In general, we have

Vocabulary	Translation
"y varies jointly as x and z"	
"y is jointly proportional to $x$ and $z$ "	y=kxz

Here k is nonzero and is called the **constant of variation** or the **constant of proportionality**.

**Example 5:** The area of an ellipse varies jointly as a, half of the ellipse's major axis, and b, half of the ellipse's minor axis. If the area of an ellipse is  $300\pi$  cm<sub>2</sub>, where a=10 cm and b=30 cm, then what is the constant of proportionality? Give a formula for the area of an ellipse.



**Solution:** If we let A represent the area of an ellipse, then we can use the statement "area varies jointly as a and b" to write

$$A = kab$$

To find the constant of variation, k, use the fact that the area is  $300\pi$  when a=10 and b=30.

$$300\pi = k (10) (30)$$
$$300\pi = 300k$$
$$\pi = k$$

Therefore, the formula for the area of an ellipse is

$$A = \pi ab$$

Answer: The constant of proportionality is  $\pi$ , and the formula for the area is  $A=ab\pi$ .

**Try this!** Given that y varies directly as the square of x and inversely to z, where y = 2 when x = 3 and z = 27, find y when x = 2 and z = 16.

Answer: 3/2

# **KEY TAKEAWAY**

• The setup of variation problems usually requires multiple steps. First, identify the key words to set up an equation and then use the given information to find the constant of variation *k*. After determining the constant of variation, write a formula that models the problem. Once a formula is found, use it to answer the question.

# **Chapter 8**

# **Radical Expressions and Equations**

## 8.1 Radicals

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Find square roots.
- 2. Find cube roots.
- 3. Find *n*th roots.
- 4. Simplify expressions using the product and quotient rules for radicals.

## **Square Roots**

The square root of a number is that number that when multiplied by itself yields the original number. For example, 4 is a square root of 16, because 42=16. Since (-4)2=16, we can say that -4 is a square root of 16 as well. Every positive real number has two square roots, one positive and one negative. For this reason, we use the **radical sign**  $\sqrt{}$  to denote the principal (nonnegative) square root and a negative sign in front of the radical  $-\sqrt{}$  to denote the negative square root.

$$\sqrt{16} = 4$$
 Positive square root of 16  
 $-\sqrt{16} = -4$  Negative square root of 16

Zero is the only real number with one square root.

$$\sqrt{0} = 0$$
 because  $0^2 = 0$ 

If the radicand, the number inside the radical sign, is nonnegative and can be factored as the square of another nonnegative number, then the square root of the number is apparent. In this case, we have the following property:

$$\sqrt{a^2} = a$$
, if  $a \ge 0$ 

Example 1: Find the square root.

- a. 36---√
- b. 144----√
- c. 0.04---√
- d. 19−−√

Solution:

- a.  $36 \sqrt{62} \sqrt{66}$
- b.  $144 - \sqrt{122} - \sqrt{122}$
- c.  $0.04 --\sqrt{=(0.2)_2} ---\sqrt{=0.2}$
- d. 19— $\sqrt{=(13)2}$ —— $\sqrt{=13}$

Example 2: Find the negative square root.

- a.  $-4\sqrt{}$
- b. −1√

Solution:

- a.  $-4\sqrt{=-2}$
- $b. -1 \sqrt{=-1} -1$

The radicand may not always be a perfect square. If a positive integer is not a perfect square, then its square root will be irrational. For example,  $2\sqrt{i}$  is an irrational number and can be approximated on most calculators using the square root button.

$$\sqrt{2} \approx 1.414$$
 because  $1.414^2 \approx 2$ 

Next, consider the square root of a negative number. To determine the square root of -9, you must find a number that when squared results in -9:

$$\sqrt{-9} = ?$$
 or  $(?)^2 = -9$ 

However, any real number squared always results in a positive number:

$$(3)^2 = 9$$
 and  $(-3)^2 = 9$ 

The square root of a negative number is currently left undefined. For now, we will state that  $-9---\sqrt{100}$  is not a real a number.

#### **Cube Roots**

The cube root of a number is that number that when multiplied by itself three times yields the original number. Furthermore, we denote a cube root using the symbol  $\sqrt{3}$ , where 3 is called the index. For example,

$$\sqrt[3]{125} = 5$$
, because  $5^3 = 125$ 

The product of three equal factors will be positive if the factor is positive and negative if the factor is negative. For this reason, any real number will have only one real cube root. Hence the technicalities associated with the principal root do not apply. For example,

$$\sqrt[3]{-125} = -5$$
, because  $(-5)^3 = -125$ 

In general, given any real number a, we have the following property:

$$\sqrt[3]{a^3} = a$$

When simplifying cube roots, look for factors that are perfect cubes.

Example 3: Find the cube root.

a. 
$$27 - -\sqrt{3}$$

b. 
$$64 - -\sqrt{3}$$

c. 
$$0\sqrt{3}$$

d. 
$$18 - -\sqrt{3}$$

#### Solution:

a. 
$$27 - \sqrt{3} = 33 - \sqrt{3} = 3$$

b. 
$$64 - -\sqrt{3} = 43 - -\sqrt{3} = 4$$

c. 
$$0\sqrt{3}=03--\sqrt{3}=0$$

d. 
$$18 - \sqrt{3} = (12)3 - \sqrt{3} = 12$$

Example 4: Find the cube root.

a. 
$$-8 - - - \sqrt{3}$$

b. 
$$-1 - - \sqrt{3}$$

c. 
$$-127 - - - \sqrt{3}$$

#### Solution:

a. 
$$-8 - - - \sqrt{3} = (-2)3 - - - - \sqrt{3} = -2$$

b. 
$$-1 - - \sqrt{3} = (-1)3 - - - \sqrt{3} = -1$$

c. 
$$-127 - - - \sqrt{3} = (-13)3 - - - - \sqrt{3} = -13$$

It may be the case that the radicand is not a perfect cube. If an integer is not a perfect cube, then its cube root will be irrational. For example,  $2\sqrt{3}$  is an irrational number which can be approximated on most calculators using the root button. Depending on the calculator, we typically type in the index prior to pushing the button and then the radicand as follows:

$$3 \left[ \sqrt[x]{y} \right] 2 =$$

Therefore, we have

$$\sqrt[3]{2} \approx 1.260$$
, because  $1.260 \land 3 \approx 2$ 

#### nth Roots

For any integer  $n \ge 2$ , we define the nth root of a positive real number as that number that when raised to the nth power yields the original number. Given any nonnegative real number a, we have the following property:

$$\sqrt[n]{a^n} = a$$
, if  $a \ge 0$ 

Here n is called the **index** and  $a_n$  is called the **radicand**. Furthermore, we can refer to the entire expression  $a\sqrt{n}$  as a radical. When the index is an integer greater than 3, we say "fourth root", "fifth root", and so on. The nth root of any number is apparent if we can write the radicand with an exponent equal to the index.

**Example 5:** Find the *n*th root.

a. 
$$81 - -\sqrt{4}$$

b. 
$$32 - -\sqrt{5}$$

d. 116——
$$\sqrt{4}$$

#### Solution:

a. 
$$81 - -\sqrt{4} = 34 - -\sqrt{4} = 3$$

b. 
$$32 - \sqrt{5} = 25 - \sqrt{5} = 2$$

c. 
$$1\sqrt{7}=17--\sqrt{7}=1$$

d. 
$$116 - - \sqrt{4} = (12)4 - - - \sqrt{4} = 12$$

If the index is n=2, then the radical indicates a square root and it is customary to write the radical without the index, as illustrated below:

$$\sqrt[2]{a} = \sqrt{a}$$

We have already taken care to define the principal square root of a number. At this point, we extend this idea to nth roots when n is even. For example,

3 is a fourth root of 81, because 34=81. And since (-3)4=81, we can say that -3 is a fourth root of 81 as well. Hence we use the radical sign  $\sqrt{n}$  to denote the principal (nonnegative) nth root when n is even. In this case, for any real number a, we use the following property:

$$\sqrt[n]{a^n} = |a|$$
 When n is even

For example,

$$\sqrt[4]{81} = \sqrt[4]{3^4} = |3| = 3$$

$$\sqrt[4]{81} = \sqrt[4]{(-3)^4} = |-3| = 3$$

The negative *n*th root, when *n* is even, will be denoted using a negative sign in front of the radical  $-\sqrt{n}$ .

$$-\sqrt[4]{81} = -\sqrt[4]{3^4} = -3$$

We have seen that the square root of a negative number is not real because any real number, when squared, will result in a positive number. In fact, a similar problem arises for any even index:

$$\sqrt[4]{-81} = ?$$
 or  $(?)^4 = -81$ 

Here the fourth root of -81 is not a real number because the fourth power of any real number is always positive.

$$\left\{\begin{array}{c} \sqrt{-4} \\ \sqrt[4]{-81} \end{array}\right\}$$
 These radicals are not real numbers.

Example 6: Simplify.

a. 
$$-16 - - \sqrt{4}$$

b. 
$$-16 - -\sqrt{4}$$

#### Solution:

a. The radicand is negative and the index is even. Therefore, there is no real number that when raised to the fourth power is -16.

$$\sqrt[4]{-16}$$
 Not a real number

b. Here the radicand is positive. Furthermore, 16=24, and we can simplify as follows:

$$-\sqrt[4]{16} = -\sqrt[4]{2^4} = -2$$

When n is odd, the same problems do not occur. The product of an odd number of positive factors is positive and the product of an odd number of negative factors is negative. Hence when the index n is odd, there is only one real nth root for any real number a. And we have the following property:

$$\sqrt[n]{a^n} = a$$
 When n is odd

**Example 7:** Find the *n*th root.

a. 
$$-32 - - \sqrt{5}$$

b. 
$$-1$$
— $-\sqrt{7}$ 

#### Solution:

a. 
$$-32 - - \sqrt{5} = (-2)5 - - - \sqrt{5} = -2$$

b. 
$$-1 - - \sqrt{7} = (-1)7 - - - \sqrt{7} = -1$$

**Try this!** Find the fourth root: 625— $-\sqrt{4}$ .

Answer: 5

Summary: When n is odd, the nth root is positive or negative depending on the sign of the radicand.

$$\sqrt[3]{27} = \sqrt[3]{3^3} = 3$$
$$\sqrt[3]{-27} = \sqrt[3]{(-3)^3} = -3$$

When *n* is even, the *n*th root is **positive or not real** depending on the sign of the radicand.

$$\sqrt[4]{16} = \sqrt[4]{(-2)^4} = |-2| = 2$$
 $\sqrt[4]{-16}$  The radical is not a real number.

# Simplifying Using the Product and Quotient Rule for Radicals

It will not always be the case that the radicand is a perfect power of the given index. If not, we use the following two properties to simplify them.

If a and b represent positive real <u>numbers</u>, then we have

Product rule for radicals:	$a \cdot b \sqrt{n} = a \sqrt{n} \cdot b \sqrt{n}$
Quotient rule for radicals:	$ab - \sqrt{n} = a\sqrt{n}b\sqrt{n}$

A radical is simplified if it does not contain any factor that can be written as a perfect power of the index.

**Example 8:** Simplify:  $12--\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Here 12 can be written as  $4 \cdot 3$ , where 4 is a perfect square.

$$\sqrt{12} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 3}$$
 Apply the product rule for radicals.  
 $= \sqrt{4} \cdot \sqrt{3}$  Simplify.  
 $= 2 \cdot \sqrt{3}$ 

We can verify our answer on a calculator:

$$\sqrt{12} \approx 3.46$$
 and  $2 \cdot \sqrt{3} \approx 3.46$ 

Also, it is worth noting that

$$3.46^{2} \approx 12$$

Answer: 23√

**Example 9:** Simplify:  $135 - - \sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Begin by finding the largest perfect square factor of 135.

$$135 = 3^{3} \cdot 5$$
$$= 3^{2} \cdot 3 \cdot 5$$
$$= 9 \cdot 15$$

Therefore,

$$\sqrt{135} = \sqrt{9 \cdot 15}$$
 Apply the product rule for radicals.  

$$= \sqrt{9} \cdot \sqrt{15}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= 3 \cdot \sqrt{15}$$

Answer:  $315--\sqrt{\phantom{0}}$ 

**Example 10:** Simplify: 50121—— $\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Begin by finding the prime factorizations of both 50 and 121. This will enable us to easily determine the largest perfect square factors.

$$50 = 5^2 \cdot 2$$
$$121 = 11^2$$

Therefore,

$$\sqrt{\frac{50}{121}} = \sqrt{\frac{5^2 \cdot 2}{11^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{5^2 \cdot \sqrt{2}}}{\sqrt{11^2}}$$

$$= \frac{5 \cdot \sqrt{2}}{11}$$
Simplify.
$$= \frac{5 \cdot \sqrt{2}}{11}$$

Answer: 52√11

**Example 11:** Simplify:  $162 - -\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** Use the prime factorization of 162 to find the largest perfect cube factor:

$$162 = 3^4 \cdot 2$$
$$= 3^3 \cdot 3 \cdot 2$$

Replace the radicand with this factorization and then apply the product rule for radicals.

$$\sqrt[3]{162} = \sqrt[3]{3^3 \cdot 3 \cdot 2}$$
 Apply the product rule for radicals.  

$$= \sqrt[3]{3^3} \cdot \sqrt[3]{3 \cdot 2}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= 3 \cdot \sqrt[3]{6}$$

We can verify our answer on a calculator.

$$\sqrt[3]{162} \approx 5.451$$
 and  $3 \cdot \sqrt[3]{6} \approx 5.451$ 

Answer:  $36\sqrt{3}$ 

**Try this!** Simplify:  $296--\sqrt{3}$ .

Answer:  $4 \cdot 12 - \sqrt{3}$ 

**Example 12:** Simplify: -96— $-\sqrt{5}$ .

**Solution:** Here we note that the index is odd and the radicand is negative; hence the result will be negative. We can factor the radicand as follows:

$$-96 = -32 \cdot 3 = (-2)^5 \cdot 3$$

Then simplify:

$$\sqrt[5]{-24} = \sqrt[5]{(-2)^5 \cdot 3}$$
 Apply the product rule for radicals.  

$$= \sqrt[5]{(-2)^5} \cdot \sqrt[5]{3}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= -2 \cdot \sqrt[5]{3}$$

Answer:  $-23\sqrt{5}$ 

**Example 13:** Simplify: -864——— $\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** In this case, consider the equivalent fraction with -8=(-2)3 in the numerator and then simplify.

$$\sqrt[3]{-\frac{8}{64}} = \sqrt[3]{\frac{-8}{64}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{(-2)^3}}{\sqrt[3]{4^3}}$$
Simplify.
$$= \frac{-2}{4}$$

$$= -\frac{1}{2}$$

Answer: −1/2

**Try this!** Simplify -108—— $-\sqrt{3}$ .

Answer:  $-3.4\sqrt{3}$ 

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- The square root of a number is that number that when multiplied by itself yields the original number. When the radicand a is positive,  $a2-\sqrt{a}$ . When the radicand is negative, the result is not a real number.
- The cube root of a number is that number that when used as a factor with itself three times yields the original number. The cube root may be positive or negative depending on the sign of the radicand. Therefore, for any real number a, we have the property  $a_3--\sqrt{3}=a$ .
- When working with nth roots, n determines the definition that applies. We use  $a_n - \sqrt{n} = a$  when n is odd and  $a_n - \sqrt{n} = |a|$  when n is even. When n is even, the negative nth root is denoted with a negative sign in front of the radical sign.

- To simplify square roots, look for the largest perfect square factor of the radicand and then apply the product or quotient rule for radicals.
- To simplify cube roots, look for the largest perfect cube factor of the radicand and then apply the product or quotient rule for radicals.
- To simplify nth roots, look for the factors that have a power that is equal
  to the index n and then apply the product or quotient rule for radicals.
   Typically, the process is streamlined if you work with the prime
  factorization of the radicand.

# **8.2** Simplifying Radical Expressions

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Simplify radical expressions using the product and quotient rule for radicals.
- 2. Use formulas involving radicals.
- 3. Evaluate given square root and cube root functions.

## **Simplifying Radical Expressions**

An algebraic expression that contains radicals is called a radical expression. We use the product and quotient rules to simplify them.

**Example 1:** Simplify:  $8y_3 - - \sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** Use the fact that  $a_n - \sqrt{n} = a$  when n is odd.

$$\sqrt[3]{8y^3} = \sqrt[3]{2^3 \cdot y^3}$$
 Apply the product rule for radicals.  

$$= \sqrt[3]{2^3} \cdot \sqrt[3]{y^3}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= 2y$$

Answer: 2y

**Example 2:** Simplify:  $9x_2 - - \sqrt{.}$ 

Solution: The square root has index 2; use the fact

that  $a_n - \sqrt{n} = |a|$  when n is even.

$$\sqrt{9x^2} = \sqrt{3^2 x^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{3^2} \cdot \sqrt{x^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{3^2} \cdot \sqrt{x^2}$$

$$= 3|x|$$
Apply the product rule for radicals.

Simplify.

Since x is a variable, it may represent a negative number. Thus we need to ensure that the result is positive by including the absolute value operator.

# **Important Note**

Answer: 3|x|

Typically, at this point beginning algebra texts note that all variables are assumed to be positive. If this is the case, then *x* in the previous example is positive and the absolute value operator is not needed. The example can be simplified as follows:

$$9x_2 - - \sqrt{32}x_2 - - \sqrt{32}x_2 - - \sqrt{32}x_3 - \sqrt{32}x_4 - \sqrt{32}x_$$

In this section, we will assume that all variables are positive. This allows us to focus on calculating *n*th roots without the technicalities associated with the principal *n*th root problem. For this reason, we will use the following property for the rest of the section:

$$a_n - \sqrt{n} = a$$
, if  $a \ge 0$  *n*th root

When simplifying radical expressions, look for factors with powers that match the index.

**Example 3:** Simplify: 18x3y4——— $\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Begin by determining the square factors of 18, x3, and y4.

$$\begin{vmatrix}
18 = 2 \cdot 3^{2} \\
x^{3} = x^{2} \cdot x
\end{vmatrix}$$

$$y^{4} = (y^{2})^{2}$$
Square factors

Make these substitutions and then apply the product rule for radicals and simplify.

$$\sqrt{18x^3y^4} = \sqrt{2 \cdot 3^2 \cdot x^2 \cdot x \cdot (y^2)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{3^2} \cdot \sqrt{x^2} \cdot \sqrt{(y^2)^2} \cdot \sqrt{2x}$$

$$= 3 \cdot x \cdot y^2 \cdot \sqrt{2x}$$

$$= 3xy^2\sqrt{2x}$$
Apply the product rule for radicals.

Simplify.

Answer:  $3xy_22x - -\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 4:** Simplify: 4a5b6—— $\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Begin by determining the square factors of 4, as, and b6.

$$4 = 2^{2}$$

$$a^{5} = a^{2} \cdot a^{2} \cdot a = (a^{2})^{2} \cdot a$$

$$b^{6} = b^{3} \cdot b^{3} = (b^{3})^{2}$$
Square factors

Make these substitutions and then apply the product rule for radicals and simplify.

$$\sqrt{\frac{4a^5}{b^6}} = \sqrt{\frac{2^2 (a^2)^2 \cdot a}{(b^3)^2}}$$

$$= \sqrt{\frac{2^2 \cdot \sqrt{(a^2)^2} \cdot \sqrt{a}}{(b^3)^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{2^2} \cdot \sqrt{(a^2)^2} \cdot \sqrt{a}}{\sqrt{(b^3)^2}}$$

$$= \frac{2a^2 \sqrt{a}}{b^3}$$
Apply the product and quotient rule for radicals.

Simplify.

Answer: 2a2a\b3

**Example 5:** Simplify: 80x5y7——— $\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** Begin by determining the cubic factors of 80, x5, and y7.

$$80 = 2^{4} \cdot 5 = 2^{3} \cdot 2 \cdot 5$$

$$x^{5} = x^{3} \cdot x^{2}$$

$$y^{7} = y^{6} \cdot y = (y^{2})^{3} \cdot y$$
Cubic factors

Make these substitutions and then apply the product rule for radicals and simplify.

$$\sqrt[3]{80x^5y^7} = \sqrt[3]{2^3 \cdot 2 \cdot 5 \cdot x^3 \cdot x^2 \cdot (y^2)^3 \cdot y}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{2^3 \cdot \sqrt[3]{x^3} \cdot \sqrt[3]{(y^2)^3} \cdot \sqrt[3]{2 \cdot 5 \cdot x^2 \cdot y}}$$

$$= 2 \cdot x \cdot y^2 \cdot \sqrt[3]{10x^2y}$$

$$= 2xy^2 \sqrt[3]{10x^2y}$$
Apply the product rule for radicals.

Simplify.

Answer:  $2xy2 \cdot 10x2y - - \sqrt{3}$ 

**Example 6:** Simplify 9x6y3z9—— $\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** The coefficient 9=32 and thus does not have any perfect cube factors. It will be left as the only remaining radicand because all of the other factors are cubes, as illustrated below:

$$x^{6} = (x^{2})^{3}$$

$$y^{3} = (y^{3})^{3}$$

$$z^{9} = (z^{3})^{3}$$
Cubic factors

Replace the variables with these equivalents, apply the product and quotient rule for radicals, and then simplify.

$$\sqrt[3]{\frac{9x^6}{y^3z^9}} = \sqrt[3]{\frac{3^2 \cdot (x^2)^3}{y^3 \cdot (z^3)^3}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{3^2} \cdot \sqrt[3]{(x^2)^3}}{\sqrt[3]{y^3} \cdot \sqrt[3]{(z^3)^3}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{3^2} \cdot x^2}{y \cdot z^3}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{9} \cdot x^2}{y \cdot z^3}$$

Answer:  $x2.9\sqrt{3}yz3$ 

**Example 7:** Simplify: 81a4b5——— $\sqrt{4}$ .

**Solution:** Determine all factors that can be written as perfect powers of 4. Here it is important to see that  $b5=b4\cdot b$ . Hence the factor b will be left inside the radical.

$$\sqrt[4]{81}a^4b^5 = \sqrt[4]{3^4 \cdot a^4 \cdot b^4 \cdot b}$$
$$= \sqrt[4]{3^4 \cdot \sqrt[4]{a^4 \cdot \sqrt[4]{b^4} \cdot \sqrt[4]{b}}}$$
$$= 3 \cdot a \cdot b \cdot \sqrt[4]{b}$$

Answer:  $3ab \cdot b\sqrt{4}$ 

**Example 8:** Simplify: -32x3y6z5----- $\sqrt{5}$ .

**Solution:** Notice that the variable factor x cannot be written as a power of 5 and thus will be left inside the radical. In addition, for  $y_6=y_5\cdot y$ ; the factor y will be left inside the radical as well.

$$\sqrt[5]{-32x^3y^6z^5} = \sqrt[5]{(-2)^5 \cdot x^3 \cdot y^5 \cdot y \cdot z^5} 
= \sqrt[5]{(-2)^5} \cdot \sqrt[5]{y^5} \cdot \sqrt[5]{z^5} \cdot \sqrt[5]{x^3 \cdot y} 
= -2 \cdot y \cdot z \cdot \sqrt[5]{x^3 \cdot y}$$

Answer:  $-2yz \cdot x3y - - - \sqrt{5}$ 

Answer:  $8x3y3z63y--\sqrt{}$ 

# Tip

To easily simplify an *n*th root, we can divide the powers by the index.  $a6--\sqrt{=}a3$ , which is  $a6\div 2=a3b6--\sqrt{3}=b2$ , which is  $b6\div 3=b2c6--\sqrt{6}=c$ , which is  $c6\div 6=c1$ 


If the index does not divide into the power evenly, then we can use the quotient and remainder to simplify. For example,  $a5--\sqrt{=a2\cdot a}\sqrt{}$ , which is  $a5\div 2=a2 \ r1b5--\sqrt{3}=b\cdot b2--\sqrt{3}$ , which is  $b5\div 3=b1 \ r2c14--\sqrt{5}=c2\cdot c4--\sqrt{5}$ , which is  $c14\div 5=c2 \ r4$ 

The quotient is the exponent of the factor outside of the radical, and the remainder is the exponent of the factor left inside the radical.

## **Formulas Involving Radicals**

We next review the distance formula. Given two points  $(x_1, y_1)$  and  $(x_2, y_2)$ ,





The distance, d, between them is given by the following formula:

Distance formula:	$d=(x_2-x_1)_2+(y_2-y_1)_2$

Recall that this formula was derived from the Pythagorean theorem.

**Example 9:** Calculate the distance between (-4, 7) and (2, 1).

Solution: Use the distance formula with the following points.

$$(x_1, y_1)$$
  $(x_2, y_2)$   
(-4,7)  $(2, 1)$ 

It is a good practice to include the formula in its general form before substituting values for the variables; this improves readability and reduces the probability of making errors.

$$d = \sqrt{(x_2 - x_1)^2 + (y_2 - y_1)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(2 - (-4))^2 + (1 - 7)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(2 + 4)^2 + (1 - 7)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{(6)^2 + (-6)^2}$$

$$= \sqrt{36 + 36}$$

$$= \sqrt{72}$$

$$= \sqrt{36 \cdot 2}$$


$$= 6\sqrt{2}$$

Answer: 62√ units

**Example 10:** The period, T, of a pendulum in seconds is given by the formula

$$T = 2\pi \sqrt{\frac{L}{32}}$$

where L represents the length of the pendulum in feet. If the length of a pendulum measures 6 feet, then calculate the period rounded off to the nearest tenth of a second.



**Solution:** Substitute 6 for L and then simplify.

$$T = 2\pi \sqrt{\frac{L}{32}}$$

$$= 2\pi \sqrt{\frac{6}{32}}$$

$$= 2\pi \sqrt{\frac{3}{16}}$$

$$= 2\pi \sqrt{\frac{3}{16}}$$

$$= 2\pi \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{16}}$$

$$= 2\pi \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{16}}$$

$$= \frac{2\pi \sqrt{3}}{4}$$
Use a calculator.
$$\approx 2.7$$

Answer: The period is approximately 2.7 seconds.

## **Square Root and Cube Root Functions**

We begin with the square root function:


$$f(x) = \sqrt{x}$$

We know that the square root is not a real number when the radicand x is negative. Therefore, we conclude that the domain consists of all real numbers greater than or equal to 0. Here we choose 0 and some positive values for x, calculate the corresponding y-values, and plot the resulting ordered pairs.

X	y = f(x)		Ordered pairs
0	0	$f(0) = \sqrt{0} = 0$	(0, 0)
1	1	$f(1) = \sqrt{1} = 1$	(1, 1)
4	2	$f(4) = \sqrt{4} = 2$	(4, 2)
9	3	$f(9) = \sqrt{9} = 3$	(9, 3)
16	4	$f(16) = \sqrt{16} = 4$	(16, 4)

After plotting the points, we can then sketch the graph of the square root function.

**Example 11:** Given the function  $f(x)=x+2-\cdots \sqrt{1}$ , find f(-2), f(2), and f(6). **Solution:** Replace x with each of the given values.

$$f(x) = \sqrt{x+2}$$

$$f(-2) = \sqrt{-2 + 2} = \sqrt{0} = 0$$

$$f(2) = \sqrt{2 + 2} = \sqrt{4} = 2$$

$$f(6) = \sqrt{6 + 2} = \sqrt{8} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 2} = 2\sqrt{2}$$

Answer: f(-2)=0, f(2)=2, and  $f(6)=22\sqrt{}$ 


Next, consider the cube root function:

$$f(x) = \sqrt[3]{x}$$

Since the cube root could be either negative or positive, we conclude that the domain consists of all real numbers. For completeness, choose some positive and negative values for x, as well as 0, and then calculate the corresponding y-values.

X	y = f(x)		Ordered pairs
-8	-2	$f(-8) = \sqrt[3]{-8} = -2$	(-8, -2)
-1	-1	$f(-1) = \sqrt[3]{-1} = -1$	(-1, -1)
0	0	$f(0) = \sqrt[3]{0} = 0$	(0, 0)
1	1	$f(1) = \sqrt[3]{1} = 1$	(1, 1)
8	2	$f(8) = \sqrt[3]{8} = 2$	(8, 2)

Plot the points and sketch the graph of the cube root function.



**Example 12:** Given the function  $g(x)=x-1-\cdots-\sqrt{3}$ , find g(-7), g(0), and g(55). **Solution:** Replace x with each of the given values.

$$g(x) = \sqrt[3]{x-1}$$

$$g(-7) = \sqrt[3]{-7 - 1} = \sqrt[3]{-8} = \sqrt[3]{(-2)^3} = -2$$

$$g(0) = \sqrt[3]{0 - 1} = \sqrt[3]{-1} = \sqrt[3]{(-1)^3} = -1$$

$$g(55) = \sqrt[3]{55 - 1} = \sqrt[3]{54} = \sqrt[3]{27 \cdot 2} = \sqrt[3]{3^3 \cdot 2} = 3\sqrt[3]{2}$$

Answer: g(-7)=-2, g(0)=-1, and  $g(55)=32\sqrt{3}$ 

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- In beginning algebra, we typically assume that all variable expressions
  within the radical are positive. This allows us to focus on simplifying
  radicals without the technical issues associated with the principal nth
  root.

## **8.3** Adding and Subtracting Radical Expressions

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Add and subtract like radicals.
- 2. Simplify radical expressions involving like radicals.

## **Adding and Subtracting Radical Expressions**

Adding and subtracting radical expressions is similar to adding and subtracting like terms. Radicals are considered to be like radicals, or similar radicals, when they share the same index and radicand. For example, the terms  $35\sqrt{}$  and  $45\sqrt{}$  contain like radicals and can be added using the distributive property as follows:

$$3\sqrt{5} + 4\sqrt{5} = (3+4)\sqrt{5}$$
$$= 7\sqrt{5}$$

Typically, we do not show the step involving the distributive property and simply write

$$3\sqrt{5} + 4\sqrt{5} = 7\sqrt{5}$$

When adding terms with like radicals, add only the coefficients; the radical part remains the same.

**Example 1:** Add:  $32\sqrt{+22}\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution: The terms contain like radicals; therefore, add the coefficients.

$$3\sqrt{2} + 2\sqrt{2} = 5\sqrt{2}$$

Answer: 52√

Subtraction is performed in a similar manner.

**Example 2:** Subtract:  $27\sqrt{-37}\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$2\sqrt{7} - 3\sqrt{7} = (2-3)\sqrt{7}$$
$$= -1\sqrt{7}$$
$$= -\sqrt{7}$$

Answer:  $-7\sqrt{}$ 

If the radicand and the index are not exactly the same, then the radicals are not similar and we cannot combine them.

**Example 3:** Simplify:  $105\sqrt{+62}\sqrt{-95}\sqrt{-72}\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$10\sqrt{5} + 6\sqrt{2} - 9\sqrt{5} - 7\sqrt{2} = 10\sqrt{5} - 9\sqrt{5} + 6\sqrt{2} - 7\sqrt{2}$$
$$= \sqrt{5} - \sqrt{2}$$

We cannot simplify any further because  $5\sqrt{}$  and  $2\sqrt{}$  are not like radicals; the radicands are not the same.

Answer:  $5\sqrt{-2}$ 

#### **Caution**

It is important to point out that  $5\sqrt{-2}\sqrt{\pm}5-2----\sqrt{.}$  We can verify this by calculating the value of each side with a calculator.

$$\sqrt{5} - \sqrt{2} \approx 0.82$$

$$\sqrt{5 - 2} = \sqrt{3} \approx 1.73$$

In general, note that  $a\sqrt{n}\pm b\sqrt{n}\neq a\pm b----\sqrt{n}$ .

**Example 4:** Simplify:  $36\sqrt{3}+26\sqrt{-6}\sqrt{3}-36\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$3\sqrt[3]{6} + 2\sqrt{6} - \sqrt[3]{6} - 3\sqrt{6} = 2\sqrt[3]{6} - \sqrt[3]{6} + 2\sqrt{6} - 3\sqrt{6}$$
$$= 2\sqrt[3]{6} - \sqrt{6}$$

We cannot simplify any further because  $6\sqrt{3}$  and  $6\sqrt{3}$  are not like radicals; the indices are not the same.

Answer:  $26\sqrt{3}-6\sqrt{3}$ 

Often we will have to simplify before we can identify the like radicals within the terms.

**Example 5:** Subtract:  $12-\sqrt{-48}-\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution: At first glance, the radicals do not appear to be similar.

However, after simplifying completely, we will see that we can combine them.

$$\sqrt{12} - \sqrt{48} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 3} - \sqrt{16 \cdot 3}$$
$$= 2\sqrt{3} - 4\sqrt{3}$$
$$= -2\sqrt{3}$$

Answer:  $-23\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 6:** Simplify:  $20 - \sqrt{+27} - \sqrt{-35}\sqrt{-212} - \sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$\sqrt{20} + \sqrt{27} - 3\sqrt{5} - 2\sqrt{12} = \sqrt{4 \cdot 5} + \sqrt{9 \cdot 3} - 3\sqrt{5} - 2\sqrt{4 \cdot 3}$$
 Simplify.
$$= 2\sqrt{5} + 3\sqrt{3} - 3\sqrt{5} - 2 \cdot 2\sqrt{3}$$

$$= 2\sqrt{5} - 3\sqrt{5} + 3\sqrt{3} - 4\sqrt{3}$$
 Combine like terms.
$$= -\sqrt{5} - \sqrt{3}$$

Answer:  $-5\sqrt{-3}$ 

**Try this!** Subtract:  $250-\sqrt{-68}\sqrt{.}$ 

Answer:  $-22\sqrt{}$ 

Next, we work with radical expressions involving variables. In this section, assume all radicands containing variable expressions are not negative.

**Example 7:** Simplify:  $-62x - \sqrt{3} - 3x - \sqrt{3} + 72x - \sqrt{3}$ .

Solution:

$$-6\sqrt[3]{2x} - \sqrt[3]{3x} + 7\sqrt[3]{2x} = -6\sqrt[3]{2x} + 7\sqrt[3]{2x} - \sqrt[3]{3x}$$
$$= \sqrt[3]{2x} - \sqrt[3]{3x}$$

We cannot combine any further because the remaining radical expressions do not share the same radicand; they are not like radicals. Note that  $2x-\sqrt{3}-3x-\sqrt{3}\neq 2x-3x-\cdots-\sqrt{3}$ .

Answer:  $2x - \sqrt{3} - 3x - \sqrt{3}$ 

We will often find the need to subtract a radical expression with multiple terms. If this is the case, remember to apply the distributive property before combining like terms.

**Example 8:** Simplify:  $(9x\sqrt{-2y})$ – $(10x\sqrt{+7y})$ .

Solution:

$$(9\sqrt{x} - 2\sqrt{y}) - (10\sqrt{x} + 7\sqrt{y}) = 9\sqrt{x} - 2\sqrt{y} - 10\sqrt{x} - 7\sqrt{y}$$

$$= 9\sqrt{x} - 10\sqrt{x} - 2\sqrt{y} - 7\sqrt{y}$$

$$= -\sqrt{x} - 9\sqrt{y}$$
Combine like terms.

Answer:  $-x\sqrt{-9}y\sqrt{-9}y$ 

Until we simplify, it is often unclear which terms involving radicals are similar.

**Example 9:** Simplify:  $52y - \sqrt{3} - (54y - - \sqrt{3} - 16 - - \sqrt{3})$ . **Solution:** 

$$5\sqrt[3]{2y} - (\sqrt[3]{54y} - \sqrt[3]{16}) = 5\sqrt[3]{2y} - \sqrt[3]{54y} + \sqrt[3]{16}$$

$$= 5\sqrt[3]{2y} - \sqrt[3]{3^3 \cdot 2y} + \sqrt[3]{2^3 \cdot 2}$$

$$= 5\sqrt[3]{2y} - 3\sqrt[3]{2y} + 2\sqrt[3]{2}$$
Combine like terms.
$$= 2\sqrt[3]{2y} + 2\sqrt[3]{2}$$

Answer:  $22y - \sqrt{3} + 22\sqrt{3}$ 

**Example 10 :** Simplify: 2a125a2b——— $\sqrt{-a280b}$ —— $\sqrt{+420a4b}$ ——— $\sqrt{.}$  **Solution :** 

$$2a\sqrt{125a^{2}b} - a^{2}\sqrt{80b} + 4\sqrt{20a^{4}b}$$

$$= 2a\sqrt{25 \cdot 5 \cdot a^{2} \cdot b} - a^{2}\sqrt{16 \cdot 5 \cdot b} + 4\sqrt{4 \cdot 5 \cdot (a^{2})^{2}b} \qquad Factor.$$

$$= 2a \cdot 5 \cdot a\sqrt{5b} - a^{2} \cdot 4\sqrt{5b} + 4 \cdot 2 \cdot a^{2}\sqrt{5b} \qquad Simplify.$$

$$= 10a^{2}\sqrt{5b} - 4a^{2}\sqrt{5b} + 8a^{2}\sqrt{5b} \qquad Combine like terms.$$

$$= 14a^{2}\sqrt{5b}$$

Answer:  $14a25b - -\sqrt{}$ 

**Try this!** Simplify:  $45x_3 - - - \sqrt{-(20x_3 - - - \sqrt{-80x - - - \sqrt{-}})}$ .

Answer:  $x5x - \sqrt{+45x} - \sqrt{-1}$ 

## Tip

Take careful note of the differences between products and sums within a radical.

Products	Sums
$x_2y_2 - \cdots \sqrt{=} xyx_3y_3 - \cdots \sqrt{3} = xy$	$x_2+y_2-\cdots-\sqrt{\neq}x+y_3+y_3-\cdots-\sqrt{3}\neq x+y$

The property  $a \cdot b - - \sqrt{n} = a \sqrt{n} \cdot b \sqrt{n}$  says that we can simplify radicals when the operation in the radicand is multiplication. There is no corresponding property for addition.

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Add and subtract terms that contain like radicals just as you do like terms. If the index and radicand are exactly the same, then the radicals are similar and can be combined. This involves adding or subtracting only the coefficients; the radical part remains the same.
- Simplify each radical completely before combining like terms.

# **8.4** Multiplying and Dividing Radical Expressions

## **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Multiply radical expressions.

# **Multiplying Radical Expressions**

When multiplying radical expressions with the same index, we use the product rule for radicals. If a and b represent positive real numbers,

$$\sqrt[n]{a} \cdot \sqrt[n]{b} = \sqrt[n]{a \cdot b}$$

**Example 1:** Multiply:  $2\sqrt{.6}\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** This problem is a product of two square roots. Apply the product rule for radicals and then simplify.

$$\sqrt{2} \cdot \sqrt{6} = \sqrt{2 \cdot 6}$$
 Multiply the radicands.  

$$= \sqrt{12}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= \sqrt{2^2 \cdot 3}$$
  

$$= 2\sqrt{3}$$

Answer: 23√

**Example 2:** Multiply:  $9\sqrt{3.6}\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** This problem is a product of cube roots. Apply the product rule for radicals and then simplify.

$$\sqrt[3]{9} \cdot \sqrt[3]{6} = \sqrt[3]{9 \cdot 6}$$
 Multiply the radicands.  

$$= \sqrt[3]{54}$$
 Simplify.  

$$= \sqrt[3]{3^3 \cdot 2}$$
  

$$= 3\sqrt[3]{2}$$

Answer:  $32\sqrt{3}$ 

Often there will be coefficients in front of the radicals.

**Example 3:** Multiply:  $23\sqrt{.52}\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Using the product rule for radicals and the fact that multiplication is commutative, we can multiply the coefficients and the radicands as follows.

$$2\sqrt{3} \cdot 5\sqrt{2} = 2 \cdot 5 \cdot \sqrt{3} \cdot \sqrt{2}$$
 Multiplication is commutative.  

$$= 10 \cdot \sqrt{6}$$
 Multiply the coefficients and the radicands.  

$$= 10\sqrt{6}$$

Typically, the first step involving the application of the commutative property is not shown.

Answer: 106√

**Example 4:** Multiply:  $-2.5x - -\sqrt{3} \cdot 3.25x_2 - ---\sqrt{3}$ .

Solution:

$$-2\sqrt[3]{5x} \cdot 3\sqrt[3]{25x^2} = -6\sqrt[3]{125x^3}$$
Multiply the coefficients and then multiply the radicands.
$$= -6\sqrt[3]{5^3x^3}$$
Simplify.
$$= -6 \cdot 5x$$

$$= -30x$$

Answer: -30x

Use the distributive property when multiplying rational expressions with more than one term.

**Example 5:** Multiply:  $43\sqrt{23\sqrt{-36}}$ .

**Solution:** Apply the distributive property and multiply each term by  $43\sqrt{.}$ 

$$4\sqrt{3} (2\sqrt{3} - 3\sqrt{6}) = 4\sqrt{3} \cdot 2\sqrt{3} - 4\sqrt{3} \cdot 3\sqrt{6}$$

$$= 8\sqrt{9} - 12\sqrt{18}$$

$$= 8\sqrt{9} - 12\sqrt{9 \cdot 2}$$

$$= 8 \cdot 3 - 12 \cdot 3\sqrt{2}$$

$$= 24 - 36\sqrt{2}$$
Distribute.

Simplify.

Answer:  $24-362\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 6:** Multiply:  $4x_2 - -\sqrt{3}(2x - \sqrt{3} - 5 4x_2 - -\sqrt{3})$ .

**Solution:** Apply the distributive property and then simplify the result.

$$\sqrt[3]{4x^2} \left(\sqrt[3]{2x} - 5\sqrt[3]{4x^2}\right) = \sqrt[3]{4x^2} \cdot \sqrt[3]{2x} - \left(\sqrt[3]{4x^2}\right) \cdot 5\sqrt[3]{4x^2}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{8x^3} - 5\sqrt[3]{16x^4}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{2^3 x^3} - 5\sqrt[3]{2^4 x^4}$$

$$= 2x - 5 \cdot 2x\sqrt[3]{2x}$$

$$= 2x - 10x\sqrt[3]{2x}$$

Answer:  $2x-10x\cdot 2x-\sqrt{3}$ 

The process for multiplying radical expressions with multiple terms is the same process used when multiplying polynomials. Apply the distributive property, simplify each radical, and then combine like terms.

**Example 7:** Multiply:  $(5\sqrt{+2})(5\sqrt{-4})$ .

Solution: Begin by applying the distributive property.

$$(\sqrt{5}+2)(\sqrt{5}-4)$$

$$(\sqrt{5}+2)(\sqrt{5}-4) = \sqrt{5} \cdot \sqrt{5} - \sqrt{5} \cdot 4 + 2 \cdot \sqrt{5} - 2 \cdot 4 \qquad Distribute.$$

$$= \sqrt{25} - 4\sqrt{5} + 2\sqrt{5} - 8 \qquad Simplify.$$

$$= 5 - 4\sqrt{5} + 2\sqrt{5} - 8$$

$$= 5 - 8 - 4\sqrt{5} + 2\sqrt{5} \qquad Combine like terms.$$

$$= -3 - 2\sqrt{5}$$

Answer:  $-3-25\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 8:** Multiply:  $(3x\sqrt{-y}\sqrt{)}2$ .

Solution:

$$(3\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})^{2} = (3\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})(3\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})$$

$$= 3\sqrt{x} \cdot 3\sqrt{x} - 3\sqrt{x} \cdot \sqrt{y} - \sqrt{y} \cdot 3\sqrt{x} + \sqrt{y} \cdot \sqrt{y}$$

$$= 9\sqrt{x^{2}} - 3\sqrt{xy} - 3\sqrt{xy} + \sqrt{y^{2}}$$

$$= 9x - 6\sqrt{xy} + y$$
Simplify.

Answer:  $9x-6xy--\sqrt{+y}$ 

**Try this!** Multiply:  $(23\sqrt{+52}\sqrt{)}(3\sqrt{-26}\sqrt{)}$ .

Answer:  $6-122\sqrt{+56}\sqrt{-203}\sqrt{}$ 

The expressions (a+b) and (a-b) are called conjugates. When multiplying conjugates, the sum of the products of the inner and outer terms results in 0.

**Example 9:** Multiply:  $(2\sqrt{+5}\sqrt{)}(2\sqrt{-5}\sqrt{)}$ .

**Solution:** Apply the distributive property and then combine like terms.

$$(\sqrt{2} + \sqrt{5})(\sqrt{2} - \sqrt{5}) = \sqrt{2} \cdot \sqrt{2} - \sqrt{2} \cdot \sqrt{5} + \sqrt{5} \cdot \sqrt{2} - \sqrt{5} \cdot \sqrt{5}$$

$$= \sqrt{4} - \sqrt{10} + \sqrt{10} - \sqrt{25}$$

$$= 2 - \sqrt{10} + \sqrt{10} - 5$$

$$opposites \ add \ to \ 0$$

$$= 2 - 5$$

$$= -3$$
Distribute.

Answer: -3

It is important to note that when multiplying conjugate radical expressions, we obtain a rational expression. This is true in general and is often used in our study of algebra.

$$(\sqrt{a} + \sqrt{b})(\sqrt{a} - \sqrt{b}) = \sqrt{a^2} - \sqrt{ab} + \sqrt{ab} - \sqrt{b^2}$$
$$= a - b$$

Therefore, for nonnegative real numbers a and b, we have the following property:

$$(\sqrt{a} + \sqrt{b})(\sqrt{a} - \sqrt{b}) = a - b$$



# Dividing Radical Expressions (Rationalizing the Denominator)

To divide radical expressions with the same index, we use the quotient rule for radicals. If a and b represent nonnegative numbers, where  $b\neq 0$ , then we have

$$\frac{\sqrt[n]{a}}{\sqrt[n]{b}} = \sqrt[n]{\frac{a}{b}}$$

**Example 10:** Divide: 80√10√.

**Solution:** In this case, we can see that 10 and 80 have common factors. If we apply the quotient rule for radicals and write it as a single square root, we will be able to reduce the fractional radicand.

$$\frac{\sqrt{80}}{\sqrt{10}} = \sqrt{\frac{80}{10}}$$

$$= \sqrt{8}$$

$$= \sqrt{8}$$

$$= \sqrt{8}$$

$$= \sqrt{4 \cdot 2}$$

$$= 2\sqrt{2}$$
Apply the quotient rule for radicals and reduce the radicand.

Simplify.

Answer: 22√

**Example 11:** Divide:  $16x5y4\sqrt{2}xy\sqrt{.}$ 

Solution:

$$\frac{\sqrt{16x^5y^4}}{\sqrt{2xy}} = \sqrt{\frac{16x^5y^4}{2xy}}$$

$$= \sqrt{8x^4y^3}$$

$$= \sqrt{4 \cdot 2 \cdot (x^2)^2 \cdot y^2 \cdot y}$$

$$= 2x^2y\sqrt{2y}$$

Apply the quotient rule for radicals and cancel.

Simplify.

Answer:  $2x2y2y--\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 12:** Divide:  $54a3b5\sqrt{3}16a2b2\sqrt{3}$ .

Solution:

$$\frac{\sqrt[3]{54a^3b^5}}{\sqrt[3]{16a^2b^2}} = \sqrt[3]{\frac{54 \cdot a^3b^5}{16a^2b^2}}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{\frac{27ab^3}{8}}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{\frac{27ab^3}{8}}$$
Replace 27 and 8 with their prime factorizations.
$$= \sqrt[3]{\frac{3^3ab^3}{2^3}}$$
Simplify.
$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{3^3ab^3}}{\sqrt[3]{2^3}}$$

$$= \frac{3b\sqrt[3]{a}}{2}$$

Answer:  $3b \cdot a\sqrt{32}$ 

When the divisor of a radical expression contains a radical, it is a common practice to find an equivalent expression where the denominator is a rational number. Finding such an equivalent expression is called rationalizing the denominator.

## Radical expression Rational denominator

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} \qquad = \qquad \frac{\sqrt{3}}{3}$$

To do this, multiply the fraction by a special form of 1 so that the radicand in the denominator can be written with a power that matches the index. After doing this, simplify and eliminate the radical in the denominator. For example,

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt{3}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{3}} = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{3^2}} = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{3}$$

Remember, to obtain an equivalent expression, you must multiply the numerator and denominator by the exact same nonzero factor.

**Example 13:** Rationalize the denominator:  $3\sqrt{2}\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** The goal is to find an equivalent expression without a radical in the denominator. In this example, multiply by 1 in the form  $2\sqrt{2}$ .

$$\frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{2}} = \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{2}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{2}}{\sqrt{2}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{6}}{\sqrt{2^2}}$$
Simplify.
$$= \frac{\sqrt{6}}{2}$$
Rational denominator

Answer: 6√2

**Example 14:** Rationalize the denominator:  $123x\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** The radicand in the denominator determines the factors that you need to use to rationalize it. In this example, multiply by 1 in the form  $3x\sqrt{3}x\sqrt{.}$ 

$$\frac{1}{2\sqrt{3x}} = \frac{1}{2\sqrt{3x}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{3x}}{\sqrt{3x}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3x}}{2\sqrt{3^2 x^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3x}}{2\sqrt{3^2 x^2}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3x}}{2 \cdot 3x}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3x}}{6x}$$

Answer:  $3x\sqrt{6}x$ 

Typically, we will find the need to reduce, or cancel, after rationalizing the denominator.

**Example 15:** Rationalize the denominator:  $52\sqrt{5}ab\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** In this example, we will multiply by 1 in the form 5ab√5ab√.

$$\frac{5\sqrt{2}}{\sqrt{5ab}} = \frac{5\sqrt{2}}{\sqrt{5ab}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{5ab}}{\sqrt{5ab}}$$

$$= \frac{5\sqrt{10ab}}{\sqrt{25a^2b^2}} \qquad Simplify.$$

$$= \frac{5\sqrt{10ab}}{5ab} \qquad Cancel.$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{10ab}}{ab}$$

Notice that a and b do not cancel in this example. Do not cancel factors inside a radical with those that are outside.

Answer: 10ab√ab

**Try this!** Rationalize the denominator: 4a3b—— $\sqrt{.}$ 

Answer:  $23ab\sqrt{3}b$ 

Up to this point, we have seen that multiplying a numerator and a denominator by a square root with the exact same radicand results in a rational denominator. In general, this is true only when the denominator contains a square root. However, this is not the case for a cube root. For example,

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt[3]{x}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt[3]{x}}{\sqrt[3]{x}} = \frac{\sqrt[3]{x}}{\sqrt[3]{x^2}}$$

Note that multiplying by the same factor in the denominator does not rationalize it. In this case, if we multiply by 1 in the form of  $x_2\sqrt{3}x_2\sqrt{3}$ , then we can write the radicand in the denominator as a power of 3. Simplifying the result then yields a rationalized denominator. For example,

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt[3]{x}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt[3]{x}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt[3]{x^2}}{\sqrt[3]{x^2}} = \frac{\sqrt[3]{x^2}}{\sqrt[3]{x^3}} = \frac{\sqrt[3]{x^2}}{x}$$

Therefore, to rationalize the denominator of radical expressions with one radical term in the denominator, begin by factoring the radicand of the denominator. The factors of this radicand and the index determine what we should multiply by. Multiply numerator and denominator by the *n*th root of

factors that produce nth powers of all the factors in the radicand of the denominator.

**Example 16:** Rationalize the denominator: 125√3.

**Solution:** The radical in the denominator is equivalent to  $52-\sqrt{3}$ . To rationalize the denominator, it should be  $53-\sqrt{3}$ . To obtain this, we need one more factor of 5. Therefore, multiply by 1 in the form of  $5\sqrt{3}5\sqrt{3}$ .

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt[3]{25}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt[3]{5^2}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt[3]{5}}{\sqrt[3]{5}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{5}}{\sqrt[3]{5^3}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{5}}{\sqrt[3]{5^3}}$$
Simplify.
$$= \frac{\sqrt[3]{5}}{5}$$

Answer: 5√35

**Example 17:** Rationalize the denominator:  $27a2b2 - - \sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** In this example, we will multiply by 1 in the form 22b√322b√3.

$$\sqrt[3]{\frac{27a}{2b^2}} = \frac{\sqrt[3]{3^3a}}{\sqrt[3]{2b^2}}$$

$$= \frac{3\sqrt[3]{a}}{\sqrt[3]{2b^2}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt[3]{2^2b}}{\sqrt[3]{2^2b}}$$

$$= \frac{3\sqrt[3]{2^2ab}}{\sqrt[3]{2^3b^3}}$$

$$= \frac{3\sqrt[3]{2^3ab}}{\sqrt[3]{2^3b^3}}$$

$$= \frac{3\sqrt[3]{4ab}}{2b}$$
Simplify.

Answer:  $34ab\sqrt{32}b$ 

**Example 18:** Rationalize the denominator:  $14x3\sqrt{5}$ .

**Solution:** In this example, we will multiply by 1 in the form 23x2√523x2√5.

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt[5]{4x^3}} = \frac{1}{\sqrt[5]{2^2x^3}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt[5]{2^3x^2}}{\sqrt[5]{2^3x^2}} \qquad \text{Multiply by the fifth root of factors that result in powers of 5.}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[5]{2^3x^2}}{\sqrt[5]{2^5x^5}} \qquad \text{Simplify.}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt[5]{8x^2}}{2x}$$

Answer:  $8x2\sqrt{52}x$ 

When two terms involving square roots appear in the denominator, we can rationalize it using a very special technique. This technique involves multiplying the numerator and the denominator of the fraction by the conjugate of the denominator. Recall that multiplying a radical expression by its conjugate produces a rational number.

**Example 19:** Rationalize the denominator:  $13\sqrt{-2}$ .

**Solution:** In this example, the conjugate of the denominator is  $3\sqrt{+2}$ .

Therefore, multiply by 1 in the form  $(3\sqrt{+2}\sqrt{)}(3\sqrt{+2}\sqrt{)}$ .

$$\frac{1}{\sqrt{3} - \sqrt{2}} = \frac{1}{(\sqrt{3} - \sqrt{2})} \frac{(\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2})}{(\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2})}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2}}{\sqrt{9} + \sqrt{6} - \sqrt{6} - \sqrt{4}}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2}}{3 - 2}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2}}{1}$$

$$= \sqrt{3} + \sqrt{2}$$

Multiply numerator and denominator by the conjugate of the denominator.

Simplify.

Answer:  $3\sqrt{+2}$ 

Notice that the terms involving the square root in the denominator are eliminated by multiplying by the conjugate. We can use the property  $(a\sqrt{+}b\sqrt{})(a\sqrt{-}b\sqrt{})=a-b$  to expedite the process of multiplying the expressions in the denominator.

**Example 20:** Rationalize the denominator:  $2\sqrt{-6}\sqrt{2}\sqrt{+6}\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Multiply by 1 in the form  $2\sqrt{-6}\sqrt{2}\sqrt{-6}\sqrt{2}$ .

$$\frac{\sqrt{2} - \sqrt{6}}{\sqrt{2} + \sqrt{6}} = \frac{(\sqrt{2} - \sqrt{6})}{(\sqrt{2} + \sqrt{6})} \frac{(\sqrt{2} - \sqrt{6})}{(\sqrt{2} - \sqrt{6})}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{4} - \sqrt{12} - \sqrt{12} + \sqrt{36}}{2 - 6}$$

$$= \frac{2 - 2\sqrt{12} + 6}{-4}$$

$$= \frac{8 - 2\sqrt{4 \cdot 3}}{-4}$$

$$= \frac{8 - 4\sqrt{3}}{-4}$$

$$= \frac{8 - 4\sqrt{3}}{-4}$$

$$= -2 + \sqrt{3}$$
Multiply by the conjugate of the denominator.

Simplify.

Answer:  $-2+3\sqrt{}$ 

**Example 21:** Rationalize the denominator: x\/+y\/x\/-y\/.

**Solution:** In this example, we will multiply by 1 in the form x - y / x / - y / x.

$$\frac{\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y}}{\sqrt{x} + \sqrt{y}} = \frac{(\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})}{(\sqrt{x} + \sqrt{y})} \frac{(\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})}{(\sqrt{x} - \sqrt{y})}$$

$$= \frac{\sqrt{x^2} - \sqrt{xy} - \sqrt{xy} + \sqrt{y^2}}{x - y}$$

$$= \frac{x - 2\sqrt{xy} + y}{x - y}$$
Simplify.

Answer:  $x-2xy\sqrt{+yx-y}$ 

**Try this!** Rationalize the denominator:  $35\sqrt{+525}\sqrt{-3}$ .

Answer: 195√+4511

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- To multiply two single-term radical expressions, multiply the coefficients and multiply the radicands. If possible, simplify the result.
- Apply the distributive property when multiplying radical expressions with multiple terms. Then simplify and combine all like radicals.
- Multiplying a two-term radical expression involving square roots by its conjugate results in a rational expression.
- It is common practice to write radical expressions without radicals in the denominator. The process of finding such an equivalent expression is called rationalizing the denominator.

# **8.5** Rational Exponents

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Write expressions with rational exponents in radical form.
- 2. Write radical expressions with rational exponents.

# **Definition of Rational Exponents**

So far, exponents have been limited to integers. In this section, we will define what rational (or fractional) exponents mean and how to work with them. All of the rules for exponents developed up to this point apply. In particular, recall the product rule for exponents. Given any rational numbers m and n, then

$$x^m \cdot x^n = x^{m+n}$$

For example, if we have an exponent of 12, then the product rule for exponents implies the following:

$$5^{\frac{1}{2}} \cdot 5^{\frac{1}{2}} = 5^{\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{2}} = 5^{1} = 5$$

Here 51/2 is one of two equal factors of 5; hence it is a square root of 5, and we can write

$$5^{1/2} = \sqrt{5}$$

Furthermore, we can see that 21/3 is one of three equal factors of 2.

$$2^{\frac{1}{3}} \cdot 2^{\frac{1}{3}} \cdot 2^{\frac{1}{3}} = 2^{\frac{1}{3} + \frac{1}{3} + \frac{1}{3}} = 2^{\frac{3}{3}} = 2^{1} = 2$$

Therefore, 21/3 is the cube root of 2, and we can write

$$2^{1/3} = \sqrt[3]{2}$$

This is true in general, given any nonzero real number a,

$$a^{1/n} = \sqrt[n]{a}$$

In other words, the denominator of a fractional exponent determines the index of an nth root.

Example 1: Rewrite as a radical.

- a. 71/2
- b. 71/3

Solution:

- a.  $71/2 = 7\sqrt{ }$
- b.  $71/3 = 7\sqrt{3}$

Example 2: Rewrite as a radical and then simplify.

- a. 811/2
- b. 81<sub>1/4</sub>

Solution:

- a.  $811/2 = 81 \sqrt{-9}$
- b.  $81_{1/4} = 81 \sqrt{4} = 34 \sqrt{4} = 3$

Example 3: Rewrite as a radical and then simplify.

- a. (125x3)1/3
- b. (-32y10)1/5

Solution:

a.

$$(125x^{3})^{1/3} = \sqrt[3]{125x^{3}}$$
$$= \sqrt[3]{5^{3}x^{3}}$$
$$= 5x$$

b.

$$(-32y^{10})^{1/5} = \sqrt[5]{-32y^{10}}$$
$$= \sqrt[5]{(-2)^5 (y^2)^5}$$
$$= -2y^2$$

Next, consider fractional exponents where the numerator is an integer other than 1. For example, consider the following:

$$5^{\frac{2}{3}} \cdot 5^{\frac{2}{3}} \cdot 5^{\frac{2}{3}} = 5^{\frac{2}{3} + \frac{2}{3} + \frac{2}{3}} = 5^{\frac{6}{3}} = 5^{2}$$

This shows that 52/3 is one of three equal factors of 52. In other words, 52/3 is the cube root of 52 and we can write:

$$5^{2/3} = \sqrt[3]{5^2}$$

In general, given any real number a,

$$a^{m/n} = \sqrt[n]{a^m}$$

An expression with a rational exponent is equivalent to a radical where the denominator is the index and the numerator is the exponent. Any radical expression can be written with a rational exponent, which we call exponential form.

Radical form Exponential form
$$\sqrt[5]{x^2} = x^{2/5}$$

Example 4: Rewrite as a radical.

- a. 72/5
- b. 23/4

#### Solution:

- a.  $72/5 = 72 -\sqrt{5} = 49 -\sqrt{5}$
- b.  $23/4=23--\sqrt{4}=8\sqrt{4}$

Example 5: Rewrite as a radical and then simplify.

- a. 82/3
- b. (32)3/5

## Solution:

a.

$$8^{2/3} = \sqrt[3]{8^2}$$
$$= \sqrt[3]{64}$$
$$= \sqrt[3]{4^3}$$
$$= 4$$

b. We can often avoid very large integers by working with their prime factorization.

$$(32)^{3/5} = \sqrt[5]{(32)^3}$$
 Replace 32 with 2<sup>5</sup>.
$$= \sqrt[5]{(2^5)^3}$$
 Apply the power rule for exponents.
$$= \sqrt[5]{2^{15}}$$
  $15 \div 5 = 3$ , so  $2^{15} = (2^3)^5$ .
$$= \sqrt[5]{(2^3)^5}$$
 Simplify.
$$= 2^3$$

$$= 8$$

Given a radical expression, we will be asked to find the equivalent in exponential form. Assume all variables are positive.

**Example 6:** Rewrite using rational exponents:  $x_2 - \sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** Here the index is 3 and the power is 2. We can write

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2} = x^{2/3}$$

Answer:  $x_2/3$ 

**Example 7:** Rewrite using rational exponents:  $y_3 - -\sqrt{6}$ .

Solution: Here the index is 6 and the power is 3. We can write

$$\sqrt[6]{y^3} = y^{3/6} = y^{1/2}$$

Answer: y1/2

It is important to note that the following are equivalent.

$$\sqrt[n]{a^m} = (\sqrt[n]{a})^m$$

In other words, it does not matter if we apply the power first or the root first. For example, we can apply the power before the root:

$$27^{2/3} = \sqrt[3]{27^2} = \sqrt[3]{(3^3)^2} = \sqrt[3]{3^6} = 3^2 = 9$$

Or we can apply the *n*th root before the power:

$$27^{2/3} = (\sqrt[3]{27})^2 = (\sqrt[3]{3^3})^2 = 3^2 = 9$$

The results are the same.

**Example 8:** Rewrite as a radical and then simplify: (-8)2/3.

**Solution:** Here the index is 3 and the power is 2. We can write

$$(-8)^{2/3} = (\sqrt[3]{-8})^2 = (-2)^2 = 4$$

Answer: 4

**Try this!** Rewrite as a radical and then simplify: 253/2.

Answer: 125

Some calculators have a caret button  $\hat{}$ . If so, we can calculate approximations for radicals using it and rational exponents. For example, to calculate  $2\sqrt{-21/2}=2^{(1/2)}\approx 1.414$ , we would type

To calculate  $22--\sqrt{3}=22/3=2^{(2/3)}\approx 1.587$ , we would type

# **Operations Using the Rules of Exponents**

In this section, we review all of the rules of exponents, which extend to include rational exponents. If given any rational numbers m and n, then we have

Product rule:	$x_m \cdot x_n = x_{m+n}$
Quotient rule:	$x_m x_n = x_{m-n}, x \neq 0$
Power rule:	$(x_m)_n=x_{m\cdot n}$
Power rule for a product:	$(xy)_n=x_ny_n$
Power rule for a quotient:	$(xy)_n=x_ny_n, y\neq 0$
Negative exponents:	x-n=1xn
Zero exponent:	<i>x</i> 0=1, <i>x</i> ≠0

These rules allow us to perform operations with rational exponents.

**Example 9:** Simplify: 22/3·21/6.

Solution:

$$2^{\frac{2}{3}} \cdot 2^{\frac{1}{6}} = 2^{\frac{2}{3} + \frac{1}{6}}$$
 Apply the product rule  $x^m \cdot x^n = x^{m+n}$ .

 $= 2^{\frac{4}{6} + \frac{1}{6}}$  Find equivalent fractions with a common denominator and then add.

 $= 2^{\frac{5}{6}}$ 

Answer: 25/6

**Example 10:** Simplify:  $x_1/2x_1/3$ .

#### Solution:

$$\frac{x^{1/2}}{x^{1/3}} = x^{\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{3}}$$

$$= x^{\frac{3}{6} - \frac{2}{6}}$$

$$= x^{\frac{3}{6} - \frac{2}{6}}$$
Find equivalent fractions with a common denominator and then subtract.
$$= x^{\frac{1}{6}}$$

Answer:  $x_{1/6}$ 

**Example 11:** Simplify: (*y*3/4)2/3.

#### Solution:

$$(y^{3/4})^{2/3} = y^{\frac{3}{4} \cdot \frac{2}{3}}$$
 Apply the power rule  $(x^m)^n = x^{m \cdot n}$ .  
 $= y^{\frac{6}{12}}$  Multiply the exponents and reduce.  
 $= y^{\frac{1}{2}}$ 

Answer: y1/2

**Example 12:** Simplify: (16*a*4*b*8)3/4.

#### Solution:

$$(16a^4b^8)^{3/4} = (2^4a^4b^8)^{3/4}$$
 Rewrite 16 as  $2^4$ .  
 $= (2^4)^{3/4} (a^4)^{3/4} (b^8)^{3/4}$  Apply the power rule for a product  $(xy)^n = x^n y^n$ .  
 $= 2^{4 \cdot \frac{3}{4}} a^{4 \cdot \frac{3}{4}} b^{8 \cdot \frac{3}{4}}$  Apply the power rule to each factor.  
 $= 2^3 a^3 b^6$  Simplify.  
 $= 8a^3 b^6$ 

Answer: 8a3b6

**Example 13:** Simplify: 25–3/2.

Solution:

$$25^{-3/2} = \frac{1}{25^{3/2}}$$
Definition of negative exponents  $x^{-n} = \frac{1}{x^n}$ .
$$= \frac{1}{(5^2)^{3/2}}$$
Write 25 as  $5^2$  and apply the power rule.
$$= \frac{1}{5^{2 \cdot \frac{3}{2}}}$$

$$= \frac{1}{5^3}$$

$$= \frac{1}{125}$$

Answer: 1/125

**Try this!** Simplify: (8*a*3/4*b*3)2/3*a*1/3.

Answer:  $4a_{1/6}b_2$ 

# **Radical Expressions with Different Indices**

To apply the product or quotient rule for radicals, the indices of the radicals involved must be the same. If the indices are different, then first rewrite the radicals in exponential form and then apply the rules for exponents.

**Example 14:** Multiply:  $2\sqrt{.2}\sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:** In this example, the index of each radical factor is different. Hence the product rule for radicals does not apply. Begin by converting the radicals into an equivalent form using rational exponents. Then apply the product rule for exponents.

$$\sqrt{2} \cdot \sqrt[3]{2} = 2^{\frac{1}{2}} \cdot 2^{\frac{1}{3}}$$
 Equivalents using rational exponents
$$= 2^{\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{3}}$$
 Apply the product rule for exponents.
$$= 2^{\frac{3+2}{6}}$$

$$= 2^{\frac{5}{6}}$$

$$= \sqrt[6]{2^{5}}$$

Answer:  $25 - \sqrt{6}$ 

**Example 15:** Divide: 4√32√5.

**Solution:** In this example, the index of the radical in the numerator is different from the index of the radical in the denominator. Hence the quotient rule for radicals does not apply. Begin by converting the radicals into an equivalent form using rational exponents and then apply the quotient rule for exponents.

$$\frac{\sqrt[3]{4}}{\sqrt[5]{2}} = \frac{\sqrt[3]{2^2}}{\sqrt[5]{2}}$$

$$= \frac{2^{\frac{2}{3}}}{2^{\frac{1}{5}}}$$
Equivalents using rational exponents
$$= 2^{\frac{2}{3} - \frac{1}{5}}$$
Apply the quotient rule for exponents.
$$= 2^{\frac{10-3}{15}}$$

$$= 2^{\frac{7}{15}}$$

$$= 2^{\frac{7}{15}}$$

$$= 1\sqrt[5]{2^7}$$

Answer:  $27 - \sqrt{15}$ 

**Example 16:** Simplify:  $4\sqrt{3}$  —— $\sqrt{.}$ 

**Solution:** Here the radicand of the square root is a cube root. After rewriting this expression using rational exponents, we will see that the power rule for exponents applies.

$$\sqrt[3]{4} = \sqrt[3]{2^2}$$

$$= (2^{2/3})^{1/2}$$
Equivalents using rational exponents
$$= 2^{\frac{2}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{2}}$$
Apply the power rule for exponents.
$$= 2^{\frac{1}{3}}$$

$$= \sqrt[3]{2}$$

Answer:  $2\sqrt{3}$ 

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- When converting fractional exponents to radicals, use the numerator as the power and the denominator as the index of the radical.

The square root of a negative number is not real. In the second expression, because of the order of operations, the negative sign is applied to the answer after 4 is raised to the (3/2) power.

### **8.6** Solving Radical Equations

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Solve equations involving square roots.
- 2. Solve equations involving cube roots.

#### **Radical Equations**

A radical equation is any equation that contains one or more radicals with a variable in the radicand.

Following are some examples of radical equations, all of which will be solved in this section:

$$\sqrt{x-1} = 5$$

$$\sqrt{2x-5} + 4 = x$$

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

We begin with the squaring property of equality; given real numbers a and b, we have the following:

If 
$$a = b$$
, then  $a^2 = b^2$ 

In other words, equality is retained if we square both sides of an equation.

$$-3 = -3 \qquad \Rightarrow \qquad (-3)^2 = (-3)^2$$
$$9 = 9 \qquad \checkmark$$

The converse, on the other hand, is not necessarily true:

$$9 = 9$$

$$(-3)^2 = (3)^2 \implies -3 \neq 3 \quad \times$$

This is important because we will use this property to solve radical equations. Consider a very simple radical equation that can be solved by inspection:

$$\sqrt{x} = 3$$

Here we can see that x=9 is a solution. To solve this equation algebraically, make use of the squaring property of equality and the fact that  $(a\sqrt{})2=a2-\sqrt{}=a$  when a is positive. Eliminate the square root by squaring both sides of the equation as follows:

$$\left(\sqrt{x}\right)^2 = \left(3\right)^2$$
$$x = 9$$

As a check, we can see that  $9\sqrt{=3}$  as expected. Because the converse of the squaring property of equality is not necessarily true, solutions to the squared equation may not be solutions to the original. Hence squaring both sides of an equation introduces the possibility of extraneous solutions, or solutions that do not solve the original equation. For this reason, we must check the answers that result from squaring both sides of an equation.

**Example 1:** Solve:  $x-1----\sqrt{-5}$ .

Solution: We can eliminate the square root by applying the squaring property of equality.

$$\sqrt{x-1} = 5$$

$$(\sqrt{x-1})^2 = (5)^2$$
Square both sides.
$$x-1 = 25$$
Solve.
$$x = 26$$

Next, we must check.

$$\sqrt{26-1} = 5$$

$$\sqrt{25} = 5$$

$$5 = 5 \quad \checkmark$$

Answer: The solution is 26.

**Example 2:** Solve:  $5-4x----\sqrt{=x}$ .

Solution: Begin by squaring both sides of the equation.

$$\sqrt{5-4x} = x$$

$$(\sqrt{5-4x})^2 = (x)^2$$
Square both sides.
$$5-4x = x^2$$

You are left with a quadratic equation that can be solved by factoring.

$$5-4x = x^{2}$$

$$0 = x^{2} + 4x - 5$$

$$0 = (x+5)(x-1)$$

$$x + 5 = 0$$
 or  $x - 1 = 0$   
 $x = -5$   $x = 1$ 

Since you squared both sides, you must check your solutions.

After checking, you can see that x=-5 was extraneous; it did not solve the original radical equation.

Disregard that answer. This leaves x=1 as the only solution.

Answer: The solution is x=1.

In the previous two examples, notice that the radical is isolated on one side of the equation. Typically, this is not the case. The steps for solving radical equations involving square roots are outlined in the following example.

**Example 3:** Solve:  $2x-5----\sqrt{+4}=x$ .

Solution:

Step 1: Isolate the square root. Begin by subtracting 4 from both sides of the equation.

$$\sqrt{2x-5} + 4 - 4 = x - 4$$

$$\sqrt{2x-5} = x - 4$$

Step 2: Square both sides. Squaring both sides eliminates the square root.

$$(\sqrt{2x-5})^2 = (x-4)^2$$
$$2x-5 = x^2 - 8x + 16$$

**Step 3:** Solve the resulting equation. Here you are left with a quadratic equation that can be solved by factoring.

$$2x-5 = x^{2} - 8x + 16$$
$$0 = x^{2} - 10x + 21$$
$$0 = (x-3)(x-7)$$

$$x-3=0$$
 or  $x-7=0$   
 $x=3$   $x=7$ 

**Step 4:** Check the solutions in the original equation. Squaring both sides introduces the possibility of extraneous solutions; hence the check is required.

Check 
$$x = 3$$

$$\sqrt{2x-5} + 4 = x$$

$$\sqrt{2(3)-5} + 4 = 3$$

$$\sqrt{6-5} + 4 = 3$$

$$\sqrt{1+4} = 3$$

$$1+4=3$$

$$5 = 3$$
Check  $x = 7$ 

$$\sqrt{2x-5} + 4 = x$$

$$\sqrt{2(7)-5} + 4 = 7$$

$$\sqrt{14-5} + 4 = 7$$

$$\sqrt{9} + 4 = 7$$

$$3+4=7$$

$$7 = 7$$

After checking, we can see that x=3 is an extraneous root; it does not solve the original radical equation.

This leaves x=7 as the only solution.

Answer: The solution is x=7.

**Example 4:** Solve:  $3x+1----\sqrt{-2}x=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by isolating the term with the radical.

$$3\sqrt{x+1} - 2x = 0$$
$$3\sqrt{x+1} = 2x$$

Despite the fact that the term on the left side has a coefficient, it is still considered isolated. Recall that terms are separated by addition or subtraction operators.

$$3\sqrt{x+1} = 2x$$

$$(3\sqrt{x+1})^2 = (2x)^2$$

$$9(x+1) = 4x^2$$
Square both sides.

Solve the resulting quadratic equation.

$$9x + 9 = 4x^{2}$$

$$0 = 4x^{2} - 9x - 9$$

$$0 = (4x + 3)(x - 3)$$

$$4x + 3 = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad x - 3 = 0$$

$$4x = -3 \quad x = 3$$

$$x = -\frac{3}{4}$$

Since we squared both sides, we must check our solutions.

Check 
$$x = -\frac{3}{4}$$

$$3\sqrt{x+1} - 2x = 0$$

$$3\sqrt{(-\frac{3}{4})+1} - 2(-\frac{3}{4}) = 0$$

$$3\sqrt{\frac{1}{4}} + \frac{3}{2} = 0$$

$$3 \cdot \frac{1}{2} + \frac{3}{2} = 0$$

$$\frac{3}{2} + \frac{3}{2} = 0$$

$$3 = 0$$

$$3 \cdot \frac{1}{2} = 0$$

$$0 = 0$$

$$0 = 0$$

$$0 = 0$$

After checking, we can see that x=-34 was extraneous.

Answer: The solution is 3.

Sometimes both of the possible solutions are extraneous.

**Example 5:** Solve:  $4-11x-----\sqrt{-x}+2=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by isolating the radical.

$$\sqrt{4-11x} - x + 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4-11x} = x - 2$$

$$(\sqrt{4-11x})^2 = (x-2)^2$$

$$4-11x = x^2 - 4x + 4$$

$$0 = x^2 + 7x$$

$$0 = x(x+7)$$
Isolate the radical.

Square both sides.

Since we squared both sides, we must check our solutions.

Check 
$$x = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4-11x} - x + 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4-11(0)} - 0 + 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4} + 2 = 0$$

$$2 + 2 = 0$$

$$4 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{81} + 9 = 0$$

$$18 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{24-11x} - x + 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4-11(-7)} - (-7) + 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt{4+77} + 7 + 2 = 0$$

$$9 + 9 = 0$$

$$18 = 0$$

Since both possible solutions are extraneous, the equation has no solution.

Answer: No solution, Ø

The squaring property of equality extends to any positive integer power n. Given real numbers a and b, we have the following:

If 
$$a = b$$
, then  $a^n = b^n$ 

This is often referred to as the power property of equality. Use this property, along with the fact that  $(a\sqrt{n})n=an-\sqrt{n}=a$ , when a is positive, to solve radical equations with indices greater than 2.

**Example 6:** Solve:  $x_2+4----\sqrt{3}-2=0$ .

**Solution:** Isolate the radical and then cube both sides of the equation.

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4} = 2$$

$$(\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4})^3 = (2)^3$$
Cube both sides.
$$x^2 + 4 = 8$$
Solve.
$$x^2 - 4 = 0$$

$$(x + 2)(x - 2) = 0$$

$$x + 2 = 0 \text{ or } x - 2 = 0$$

$$x = -2$$

$$x = 2$$

Check.

Check 
$$x = -2$$

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{(-2)^2 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{4 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{8} - 2 = 0$$

$$2 - 2 = 0$$

$$0 = 0$$
Check  $x = 2$ 

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{4 + 4} - 2 = 0$$

$$\sqrt[3]{8} - 2 = 0$$

$$2 - 2 = 0$$

$$0 = 0$$

Answer: The solutions are −2 and 2.

**Try this!** Solve:  $2x-1----\sqrt{+2}=x$ .

Answer: x=5 (x=1 is extraneous)

It may be the case that the equation has two radical expressions.

**Example 7:** Solve: 
$$3x-4----\sqrt{2}x+9----\sqrt{2}$$
.

**Solution:** Both radicals are considered isolated on separate sides of the equation.

$$\sqrt{3x-4} = \sqrt{2x+9}$$

$$(\sqrt{3x-4})^2 = (\sqrt{2x+9})^2$$
Square both sides.
$$3x-4 = 2x+9$$
Solve.
$$x = 13$$

Check x=13.

$$\sqrt{3x-4} = \sqrt{2x+9}$$

$$\sqrt{3(13)-4} = \sqrt{2(13)+9}$$

$$\sqrt{39-4} = \sqrt{26+9}$$

$$\sqrt{35} = \sqrt{35}$$

Answer: The solution is 13.

**Solution:** Eliminate the radicals by cubing both sides.

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + x - 14} = \sqrt[3]{x + 50}$$

$$(\sqrt[3]{x^2 + x - 14})^3 = (\sqrt[3]{x + 50})^3$$
Cube both sides.
$$x^2 + x - 14 = x + 50$$
Solve.
$$x^2 - 64 = 0$$

$$(x + 8)(x - 8) = 0$$

$$x + 8 = 0$$
 or  $x - 8 = 0$   
 $x = -8$   $x = 8$ 

Check.

Check 
$$x = -8$$

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + x - 14} = \sqrt[3]{x + 50}$$

$$\sqrt[3]{(-8)^2 + (-8) - 14} = \sqrt[3]{(-8) + 50}$$

$$\sqrt[3]{64 - 8 - 14} = \sqrt[3]{42}$$

$$\sqrt[3]{42} = \sqrt[3]{42}$$

Check 
$$x = 8$$

$$\sqrt[3]{x^2 + x - 14} = \sqrt[3]{x + 50}$$

$$\sqrt[3]{(8)^2 + (8) - 14} = \sqrt[3]{(8) + 50}$$
$$\sqrt[3]{64 + 8 - 14} = \sqrt[3]{58}$$
$$\sqrt[3]{58} = \sqrt[3]{58} \checkmark$$

Answer: The solutions are -8 and 8.

We will learn how to solve some of the more advanced radical equations in the next course, Intermediate Algebra.

**Try this!** Solve:  $3x+1----\sqrt{2}=2x-3----\sqrt{2}$ .

Answer: 13

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Solve equations involving square roots by first isolating the radical and then squaring both sides. Squaring a square root eliminates the radical, leaving us with an equation that can be solved using the techniques learned earlier in our study of algebra. However, squaring both sides of an equation introduces the possibility of extraneous solutions, so check your answers in the original equation.
- Solve equations involving cube roots by first isolating the radical and then cubing both sides. This
  eliminates the radical and results in an equation that may be solved with techniques you have already
  mastered.

# **Chapter 9**

## **Solving Quadratic Equations and Graphing Parabolas**

## **9.1** Extracting Square Roots

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVE

1. Solve quadratic equations by extracting square roots.

## **Extracting Square Roots**

Recall that a quadratic equation is in standard form if it is equal to 0:

$$ax^2 + bx + c = 0$$

where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ . A solution to such an equation is called a root. Quadratic equations can have two real solutions, one real solution, or no real solution. If the quadratic expression on the left factors, then we can solve it by factoring. A review of the steps used to solve by factoring follow:

**Step 1:** Express the quadratic equation in standard form.

**Step 2:** Factor the quadratic expression.

**Step 3:** Apply the zero-product property and set each variable factor equal to 0.

**Step 4:** Solve the resulting linear equations.

For example, we can solve  $x_2$ –4=0 by factoring as follows:

$$x^{2}-4=0$$
 $(x+2)(x-2)=0$ 
 $x+2=0 \text{ or } x-2=0$ 
 $x=-2 \qquad x=2$ 

The two solutions are -2 and 2. The goal in this section is to develop an alternative method that can be used to easily solve equations where b = 0, giving the form

$$ax^2 + c = 0$$

The equation  $x_2$ –4=0 is in this form and can be solved by first isolating  $x_2$ .

$$x^2 - 4 = 0$$

$$x^2 = 4$$

If we take the square root of both sides of this equation, we obtain the following:

$$\sqrt{x^2} = \sqrt{4}$$
$$|x| = 2$$

$$|x| = 2$$

Here we see that x=-2 and x=2 are solutions to the resulting equation. In general, this describes the square root property; for any real number k,

If 
$$x^2 = k$$
, then  $x = \pm \sqrt{k}$ 

The notation "±" is read "plus or minus" and is used as compact notation that indicates two solutions. Hence the statement  $x=\pm k\sqrt{\text{indicates}}$ that  $x=-k\sqrt{}$  or  $x=k\sqrt{}$ . Applying the square root property as a means of solving a quadratic equation is called extracting the roots.

**Example 1:** Solve:  $x_2-25=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by isolating the square.

$$x^2 - 25 = 0$$
$$x^2 = 25$$

Next, apply the square root property.

$$x^2 = 25$$
$$x = \pm \sqrt{25}$$
$$x = \pm 5$$

Answer: The solutions are -5 and 5. The check is left to the reader.

Certainly, the previous example could have been solved just as easily by factoring. However, it demonstrates a technique that can be used to solve equations in this form that do not factor.

**Example 2:** Solve: *x*2–5=0.

**Solution:** Notice that the quadratic expression on the left does not factor. We can extract the roots if we first isolate the leading term,  $x_2$ .

$$x^2 - 5 = 0$$
$$x^2 = 5$$

Apply the square root property.

$$x = \pm \sqrt{5}$$

For completeness, check that these two real solutions solve the original quadratic equation. Generally, the check is optional.

Check 
$$x = -\sqrt{5}$$
  
 $x^2 - 5 = 0$   
 $(-\sqrt{5})^2 - 5 = 0$   
 $5 - 5 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Check  $x = \sqrt{5}$   
 $x^2 - 5 = 0$   
 $(\sqrt{5})^2 - 5 = 0$   
 $5 - 5 = 0$   
 $0 = 0$ 

Check  $x = \sqrt{5}$ 

Answer: The solutions are  $-5\sqrt{}$  and  $5\sqrt{}$ .

**Example 3:** Solve: 4*x*2–45=0.

**Solution:** Begin by isolating *x*2.

$$4x^{2} - 45 = 0$$

$$4x^{2} = 45$$

$$\frac{4x^{2}}{4} = \frac{45}{4}$$

$$x^{2} = \frac{45}{4}$$

Apply the square root property and then simplify.

$$x = \pm \sqrt{\frac{45}{4}}$$
$$x = \pm \frac{\sqrt{9 \cdot 5}}{\sqrt{4}}$$
$$x = \pm \frac{3\sqrt{5}}{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-35\sqrt{2}$  and  $35\sqrt{2}$ .

Sometimes quadratic equations have no real solution.

**Example 4:** Solve: *x*2+9=0.

**Solution:** Begin by isolating  $x_2$ .

$$x^{2} + 9 = 0$$
$$x^{2} = -9$$
$$x = \pm \sqrt{-9}$$

After applying the square root property, we are left with the square root of a negative number. Therefore, there is no real solution to this equation.

Answer: No real solution

Reverse this process to find equations with given solutions of the form  $\pm k$ .

**Example 5:** Find an equation with solutions  $-23\sqrt{}$  and  $23\sqrt{}$ .

**Solution:** Begin by squaring both sides of the following equation:

$$x = \pm 2\sqrt{3}$$

$$x^{2} = (\pm 2\sqrt{3})^{2}$$

$$x^{2} = 4 \cdot 3$$

$$x^{2} = 12$$

Lastly, subtract 12 from both sides and present the equation in standard form.

Answer:  $x_2-12=0$ 

**Try this!** Solve: 9*x*2–8=0.

Answer:  $x=-22\sqrt{3}$  or  $x=22\sqrt{3}$ 

Consider solving the following equation:

$$\left(x+2\right)^2 = 25$$

To solve this equation by factoring, first square *x*+2 and then put it in standard form, equal to zero, by subtracting 25 from both sides.

$$(x+2)^{2} = 25$$

$$x^{2} + 4x + 4 = 25$$

$$x^{2} + 4x + 4 - 25 = 25 - 25$$

$$x^{2} + 4x - 21 = 0$$

Factor and then apply the zero-product property.

$$x^{2} + 4x - 21 = 0$$
$$(x+7)(x-3) = 0$$

$$x + 7 = 0$$
 or  $x - 3 = 0$   
 $x = -7$   $x = 3$ 

The two solutions are -7 and 3.

When an equation is in this form, we can obtain the solutions in fewer steps by extracting the roots.

**Example 6:** Solve: (x+2)2=25.

**Solution:** Solve by extracting the roots.

$$(x+2)^2 = 25$$
 Apply the square root property.  
 $x+2=\pm\sqrt{25}$  Simplify.  
 $x+2=\pm5$   
 $x=-2\pm5$ 

At this point, separate the "plus or minus" into two equations and simplify each individually.

$$x = -2 - 5$$
 or  $x = -2 + 5$   
 $x = -7$   $x = 3$ 

Answer: The solutions are −7 and 3.

In addition to fewer steps, this method allows us to solve equations that do not factor.

**Example 7:** Solve: (3x+3)2-27=0.

**Solution:** Begin by isolating the square.

$$(3x+3)^2 - 27 = 0$$
$$(3x+3)^2 = 27$$

Next, extract the roots and simplify.

$$(3x+3)^{2} = 27$$

$$3x+3 = \pm\sqrt{27}$$

$$3x+3 = \pm\sqrt{9\cdot 3}$$

$$3x+3 = \pm 3\sqrt{3}$$

Solve for x.

$$3x + 3 = \pm 3\sqrt{3}$$

$$3x = -3 \pm 3\sqrt{3}$$

$$\frac{3x}{3} = \frac{-3 \pm 3\sqrt{3}}{3}$$

$$x = \frac{3(-1 \pm \sqrt{3})}{3}$$

$$x = -1 \pm \sqrt{3}$$
Subtract 3 on both sides.

Divide both sides by 3.

Factor out a 3.

Answer: The solutions are  $-1-3\sqrt{}$  and  $-1+3\sqrt{}$ .

**Example 8:** Solve: 9(2x-1)2-8=0.

**Solution:** Begin by isolating the square factor.

$$9(2x-1)^{2}-8=0$$

$$9(2x-1)^{2}=8$$

$$(2x-1)^{2}=\frac{8}{9}$$

Apply the square root property and solve.

$$(2x-1)^2 = \frac{8}{9}$$

$$2x-1 = \pm \sqrt{\frac{8}{9}}$$

$$2x-1 = \pm \frac{\sqrt{4 \cdot 2}}{\sqrt{9}}$$

$$2x = 1 \pm \frac{2\sqrt{2}}{3}$$

$$2x = \frac{3}{3} \pm \frac{2\sqrt{2}}{3}$$

$$2x = \frac{3 \pm 2\sqrt{2}}{3}$$

$$\frac{1}{2} \cdot 2x = \frac{1}{2} \cdot \frac{3 \pm 2\sqrt{2}}{3}$$


$$x = \frac{3 \pm 2\sqrt{2}}{6}$$

Answer: The solutions are 3-22 $\sqrt{6}$  and 3+22 $\sqrt{6}$ .

**Try this!** Solve:  $3(x-5)^2-2=0$ .

Answer: 15±6√3

**Example 9:** The length of a rectangle is twice its width. If the diagonal measures 2 feet, then find the dimensions of the rectangle.



#### Solution:

Let w represent the width.

Let 2w represent the length.

The diagonal of any rectangle forms two right triangles. Thus the Pythagorean theorem applies. The sum of the squares of the legs of a right triangle is equal to the square of the hypotenuse:

$$(\log)^2 + (\log)^2 = \text{hypotenuse}^2$$
  
 $(2w)^2 + (w)^2 = (2)^2$ 

Solve.

$$(2w)^{2} + (w)^{2} = (2)^{2}$$

$$4w^{2} + w^{2} = 4$$

$$5w^{2} = 4$$

$$\frac{5w^{2}}{5} = \frac{4}{5}$$

$$w^{2} = \frac{4}{5}$$

$$Extract the roots.$$

$$w = \pm \sqrt{\frac{4}{5}}$$

$$w = \pm \frac{2}{\sqrt{5}}$$

Here we obtain two solutions,  $w=-25\sqrt{}$  and  $w=25\sqrt{}$ . Since the problem asked for a length of a rectangle, we disregard the negative answer. Furthermore, we will rationalize the denominator and present our solutions without any radicals in the denominator.

$$w = \frac{2}{\sqrt{5}}$$
Rationalize the denominator.
$$= \frac{2}{\sqrt{5}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{5}}{\sqrt{5}}$$

$$= \frac{2\sqrt{5}}{\sqrt{25}}$$

$$= \frac{2\sqrt{5}}{5}$$

Back substitute to find the length.

$$l = 2w$$

$$= 2\left(\frac{2\sqrt{5}}{5}\right)$$

$$= \frac{4\sqrt{5}}{5}$$

Answer: The length of the rectangle is 45√5 feet and the width is 25√5 feet.

### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Solve equations of the form ax2+c=0 by extracting the roots.
- Extracting roots involves isolating the square and then applying the square root property. After applying the square root property, you have two linear equations that each can be solved. Be sure to simplify all radical expressions and rationalize the denominator if necessary.

# **9.2** Completing the Square

#### LEARNING OBJECTIVE

1. Solve quadratic equations by completing the square.

## **Completing the Square**

In this section, we will devise a method for rewriting any quadratic equation of the form

$$ax^2 + bx + c = 0$$

in the form

$$(x-p)^2 = q$$

This process is called completing the square. As we have seen, quadratic equations in this form can easily be solved by extracting roots. We begin by examining perfect square trinomials:

$$(x+3)^2 = x^2 + 6x + 9$$
  
 $\downarrow \qquad \uparrow$   
 $\left(\frac{6}{2}\right)^2 = (3)^2 = 9$ 

The last term, 9, is the square of one-half of the coefficient of x. In general, this is true for any perfect square trinomial of the form  $x_2+bx+c$ .

$$\left(x + \frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = x^2 + 2 \cdot \frac{b}{2}x + \left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2$$
$$= x^2 + bx + \left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2$$

In other words, any trinomial of the form  $x_2+bx+c$  will be a perfect square trinomial if

$$c = \left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2$$

## **Note**

It is important to point out that the leading coefficient must be equal to 1 for this to be true.

**Example 1:** Complete the square:  $x_2+8x+?=(x+?)_2$ .

**Solution:** In this example, the coefficient of the middle term b = 8, so find the value that completes the square as follows:

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{8}{2}\right)^2 = (4)^2 = 16$$

The value that completes the square is 16.

$$x^{2} + 8x + 16 = (x + 4)(x + 4)$$
$$= (x + 4)^{2}$$

Answer:  $x_2+8x+16=(x+4)_2$ 

**Example 2:** Complete the square:  $x_2+3x+?=(x+?)_2$ .

**Solution:** Here b = 3, so find the value that will complete the square as follows:

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{3}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{9}{4}$$

The value 9/4 completes the square:

$$x^{2} + 3x + \frac{9}{4} = \left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)\left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)$$
$$= \left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)^{2}$$

Answer:  $x_2+3x+94=(x+32)2$ 

We can use this technique to solve quadratic equations. The idea is to take any quadratic equation in standard form and complete the square so that we can solve it by extracting roots. The following are general steps for solving a quadratic equation with a leading coefficient of 1 in standard form by completing the square.

**Example 3:** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2+14x+46=0$ .

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Add or subtract the constant term to obtain the equation in the form  $x_2+bx = c$ . In this example, subtract 46 to move it to the right side of the equation.

$$x^2 + 14x + 46 = 0$$
$$x^2 + 14x = -46$$

**Step 2:** Use (b2)2 to determine the value that completes the square. Here b = 14:

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{14}{2}\right)^2 = (7)^2 = 49$$

Step 3: Add (b2)2 to both sides of the equation and complete the square.

$$x^{2} + 14x = -46$$

$$x^{2} + 14x + 49 = -46 + 49$$

$$(x+7)(x+7) = 3$$

$$(x+7)^{2} = 3$$

**Step 4:** Solve by extracting roots.

$$(x+7)^{2} = 3$$
$$x+7 = \pm\sqrt{3}$$
$$x = -7 \pm \sqrt{3}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-7-3\sqrt{\text{ or }-7+3\sqrt{\text{.}}}$ . The check is optional.

**Example 4:** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2-18x+72=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by subtracting 72 from both sides.

$$x^2 - 18x + 72 = 0$$
$$x^2 - 18x = -72$$

Next, find the value that completes the square using b = -18.

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{-18}{2}\right)^2 = (-9)^2 = 81$$

To complete the square, add 81 to both sides, complete the square, and then solve by extracting the roots.

$$x^{2}-18x = -72$$

$$x^{2}-18x+81=-72+81$$

$$(x-9)(x-9)=9$$

$$(x-9)^{2}=9$$

$$x-9=\pm\sqrt{9}$$

$$x-9=\pm3$$

$$x=9\pm3$$
Complete the square.

Extract the roots.

At this point, separate the "plus or minus" into two equations and solve each.

$$x = 9 - 3$$
 or  $x = 9 + 3$   
 $x = 6$   $x = 12$ 

Answer: The solutions are 6 and 12.

Note that in the previous example the solutions are integers. If this is the case, then the original equation will factor.

$$x^{2} - 18x + 72 = 0$$
$$(x - 6)(x - 12) = 0$$

If it factors, we can solve it by factoring. However, not all quadratic equations will factor.

**Example 5:** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2+10x+1=0$ .

Solution: Begin by subtracting 1 from both sides of the equation.

$$x^2 + 10x + 1 = 0$$
$$x^2 + 10x = -1$$

Here b = 10, and we determine the value that completes the square as follows:

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{10}{2}\right)^2 = (5)^2 = 25$$

To complete the square, add 25 to both sides of the equation.

$$x^{2} + 10x = -1$$

$$x^{2} + 10x + 25 = -1 + 25$$

$$x^{2} + 10x + 25 = 24$$

Factor and then solve by extracting roots.

$$x^{2}+10x+25=24$$

$$(x+5)(x+5)=24$$

$$(x+5)^{2}=24$$

$$x+5=\pm\sqrt{24}$$

$$x+5=\pm2\sqrt{6}$$

$$x=-5\pm2\sqrt{6}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-5-26\sqrt{}$  and  $-5+26\sqrt{}$ .

Sometimes quadratic equations do not have real solutions.

**Example 6:** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2-2x+3=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by subtracting 3 from both sides of the equation.

$$x^2 - 2x + 3 = 0$$
$$x^2 - 2x = -3$$



Here b = -2, and we have

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{-2}{2}\right)^2 = (-1)^2 = 1$$

Therefore,

$$x^{2}-2x = -3$$

$$x^{2}-2x+1=-3+1$$

$$(x-1)^{2}=-2$$

At this point we see that extracting the root leads to the square root of a negative number.

$$(x-1)^{2} = -2$$

$$x-1 = \pm \sqrt{-2}$$

$$x = 1 \pm \sqrt{-2}$$

Answer: No real solution

**Try this!** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2-2x-27=0$ .

Answer:  $x=1\pm27\sqrt{}$ 

The coefficient of x is not always divisible by 2.

**Example 7:** Solve by completing the square:  $x_2+3x-2=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by adding 2 to both sides.

$$x^2 + 3x - 2 = 0$$
$$x^2 + 3x = 2$$

Use b = 3 to find the value that completes the square:

$$\left(\frac{3}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{9}{4}$$

To complete the square, add 9/4 to both sides of the equation.

$$x^{2} + 3x = 2$$

$$x^{2} + 3x + \frac{9}{4} = 2 + \frac{9}{4}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)\left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right) = \frac{8}{4} + \frac{9}{4}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)^{2} = \frac{17}{4}$$

Solve by extracting roots.

$$\left(x + \frac{3}{2}\right)^2 = \frac{17}{4}$$

$$x + \frac{3}{2} = \pm \sqrt{\frac{17}{4}}$$

$$x + \frac{3}{2} = \pm \frac{\sqrt{17}}{2}$$

$$x = -\frac{3}{2} \pm \frac{\sqrt{17}}{2}$$

$$x = \frac{-3 \pm \sqrt{17}}{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-3\pm17\sqrt{2}$ .

So far, all of the examples have had a leading coefficient of 1. The formula (b2)2determines the value that completes the square only if the leading coefficient is 1. If this is not the case, then simply divide both sides by the leading coefficient.

**Example 8:** Solve by completing the square:  $2x^2+5x-1=0$ .

**Solution:** Notice that the leading coefficient is 2. Therefore, divide both sides by 2 before beginning the steps required to solve by completing the square.

$$\frac{2x^2 + 5x - 1}{2} = \frac{0}{2}$$
$$\frac{2x^2}{2} + \frac{5x}{2} - \frac{1}{2} = 0$$
$$x^2 + \frac{5}{2}x - \frac{1}{2} = 0$$

Begin by adding 1/2 to both sides of the equation.

$$x^{2} + \frac{5}{2}x - \frac{1}{2} = 0$$
$$x^{2} + \frac{5}{2}x = \frac{1}{2}$$

Here b = 5/2, and we can find the value that completes the square as follows:

$$\left(\frac{b}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{5}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{5}{2} \cdot \frac{1}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{5}{4}\right)^2 = \frac{25}{16}$$

To complete the square, add 25/16 to both sides of the equation.

$$x^{2} + \frac{5}{2}x = \frac{1}{2}$$

$$x^{2} + \frac{5}{2}x + \frac{25}{16} = \frac{1}{2} + \frac{25}{16}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{5}{4}\right)\left(x + \frac{5}{4}\right) = \frac{8}{16} + \frac{25}{16}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{5}{4}\right)^{2} = \frac{33}{16}$$

Next, solve by extracting roots.

$$\left(x + \frac{5}{4}\right)^2 = \frac{33}{16}$$

$$x + \frac{5}{4} = \pm \sqrt{\frac{33}{16}}$$

$$x + \frac{5}{4} = \pm \frac{\sqrt{33}}{4}$$

$$x = -\frac{5}{4} \pm \frac{\sqrt{33}}{4}$$

$$x = \frac{-5 \pm \sqrt{33}}{4}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-5\pm33\sqrt{4}$ .

**Try this!** Solve:  $2x^2-2x-3=0$ .

Answer:  $x=1\pm7\sqrt{2}$ 

## **KEY TAKEAWAYS**

- Solve any quadratic equation by completing the square.
- You can apply the square root property to solve an equation if you can first convert the equation to the form (x-p)2=q.
- To complete the square, first make sure the equation is in the form  $x_2+bx=c$ . Then add the value  $(b_2)_2$  to both sides and factor.
- The process for completing the square always works, but it may lead to some tedious calculations with fractions. This is the case when the middle term, *b*, is not divisible by 2.

# The Quadratic Formula

In this section, we will develop a formula that gives the solutions to any quadratic equation in standard form. To do this, we begin with a general quadratic equation in standard form and solve for x by completing the square. Here a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ :

$$ax^2 + bx + c = 0$$

$$\frac{ax^{2} + bx + c}{a} = \frac{0}{a}$$
 Divide both sides by a.  

$$x^{2} + \frac{b}{a}x + \frac{c}{a} = 0$$
 Subtract  $\frac{c}{a}$  from both sides.  

$$x^{2} + \frac{b}{a}x = -\frac{c}{a}$$

Determine the constant that completes the square: take the coefficient of x, divide it by 2, and then square it.

$$\left(\frac{b/a}{2}\right)^2 = \left(\frac{b}{2a}\right)^2 = \frac{b^2}{4a^2}$$

Add this to both sides of the equation and factor.

$$x^{2} + \frac{b}{a}x + \frac{b^{2}}{4a^{2}} = -\frac{c}{a} + \frac{b^{2}}{4a^{2}}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{b}{2a}\right)\left(x + \frac{b}{2a}\right) = -\frac{c}{a} + \frac{b^{2}}{4a^{2}}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{b}{2a}\right)^{2} = -\frac{4ac}{4a^{2}} + \frac{b^{2}}{4a^{2}}$$

$$\left(x + \frac{b}{2a}\right)^{2} = \frac{b^{2} - 4ac}{4a^{2}}$$

Solve by extracting roots.

$$\left(x + \frac{b}{2a}\right)^2 = \frac{b^2 - 4ac}{4a^2}$$

$$x + \frac{b}{2a} = \pm \sqrt{\frac{b^2 - 4ac}{4a^2}}$$

$$x + \frac{b}{2a} = \pm \frac{\sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$x = -\frac{b}{2a} \pm \frac{\sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

This derivation gives us a formula that solves any quadratic equation in standard form. Given  $ax_2+bx+c=0$ , where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ , then the solutions can be calculated using the quadratic formula:

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

Consider the quadratic equation  $2x_2-7x+3=0$ . It can be solved by factoring as follows:

$$2x^{2} - 7x + 3 = 0$$

$$(2x - 1)(x - 3) = 0$$

$$2x - 1 = 0 \quad \text{or} \quad x - 3 = 0$$

$$2x-1=0 \quad \text{or} \quad x-3=0$$

$$2x=1 \qquad x=3$$

$$x=\frac{1}{2}$$

The solutions are 1/2 and 3. The following example shows that we can obtain the same results using the quadratic formula.

**Example 1:** Solve using the quadratic formula: 2x2-7x+3=0.

**Solution:** Begin by identifying a, b, and c as the coefficients of each term.

$$a = 2$$
  $b = -7$   $c = 3$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-7) \pm \sqrt{(-7)^2 - 4(2)(3)}}{2(2)}$$

$$= \frac{7 \pm \sqrt{49 - 24}}{4}$$

$$= \frac{7 \pm \sqrt{25}}{4}$$

$$= \frac{7 \pm 5}{4}$$

Separate the "plus or minus" into two equations and simplify each individually.

$$x = \frac{7-5}{4} \quad \text{or} \quad x = \frac{7+5}{4}$$

$$x = \frac{2}{4} \qquad x = \frac{12}{4}$$

$$x = \frac{1}{2} \qquad x = 3$$

Answer: The solutions are 1/2 and 3.

Of course, if the quadratic factors, then it is a best practice to solve it by factoring. However, not all quadratic polynomials factor; nevertheless, the quadratic formula provides us with a means to solve such equations.

**Example 2:** Solve using the quadratic formula:  $5x_2+2x-1=0$ .

**Solution:** Begin by identifying a, b, and c.

$$a = 5$$
  $b = 2$   $c = -1$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(2) \pm \sqrt{(2)^2 - 4(5)(-1)}}{2(5)}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{4 + 20}}{10}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{24}}{10}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{4 \cdot 6}}{10}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm 2\sqrt{6}}{10}$$

$$= \frac{2(-1 \pm \sqrt{6})}{10}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{6}}{5}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-1\pm6\sqrt{5}$ .

Often terms are missing. When this is the case, use 0 as the coefficient.

**Example 3:** Solve using the quadratic formula: *x*2–18=0.

**Solution:** Think of this equation with the following coefficients:

$$1x^2 + 0x - 18 = 0$$

Here

$$a = 1$$
  $b = 0$   $c = -18$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(0) \pm \sqrt{(0)^2 - 4(1)(-18)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{0 \pm \sqrt{0 + 72}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{\pm \sqrt{72}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{\pm \sqrt{36 \cdot 2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{\pm 6\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

$$= \pm 3\sqrt{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $\pm 32\sqrt{.}$ 

Since the coefficient of x was 0, we could have solved the equation by extracting the roots. As an exercise, solve the previous example using this method and verify that the results are the same.

**Example 4:** Solve using the quadratic formula: 9x2-12x+4=0.

Solution: In this case,

$$a = 9$$
  $b = -12$   $c = 4$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-12) \pm \sqrt{(-12)^2 - 4(9)(4)}}{2(9)}$$

$$= \frac{12 \pm \sqrt{144 - 144}}{18}$$

$$= \frac{12 \pm \sqrt{0}}{18}$$

$$= \frac{12}{18}$$

$$= \frac{2}{3}$$

In this example, notice that the radicand of the square root is 0. This results in only one solution to this quadratic equation. Normally, we expect two solutions. When we find only one solution, the solution is called a double root. If we solve this equation by factoring, then the solution appears twice.

$$9x^{2} - 12x + 4 = 0$$
$$(3x - 2)(3x - 2) = 0$$

$$3x-2=0$$
 or  $3x-2=0$   
 $3x=2$   $3x=2$   
 $x=\frac{2}{3}$   $x=\frac{2}{3}$ 

Answer: 2/3, double root

**Example 5:** Solve using the quadratic formula:  $x_2+x+1=0$ .

Solution: In this case,

$$a = 1$$
  $b = 1$   $c = 1$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(1) \pm \sqrt{(1)^2 - 4(1)(1)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{1 - 4}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{-3}}{2}$$

The solution involves the square root of a negative number; hence the solutions are not real. This quadratic equation has two non real solutions and will be discussed in further detail as we continue in our study of algebra. For now, simply state that the equation does not have real solutions.

Answer: No real solutions

**Try this!** Solve:  $x_2-2x-2=0$ .

Answer:  $1\pm3\sqrt{}$ 

It is important to place the quadratic equation in standard form before using the quadratic formula.

**Example 6:** Solve using the quadratic formula: (2x+1)(2x-1)=24x+8.

**Solution:** Begin by using the distributive property to expand the left side and combining like terms to obtain an equation in standard form, equal to 0.

$$(2x+1)(2x-1) = 24x+8$$

$$4x^{2}-2x+2x-1 = 24x+8$$

$$4x^{2}-1 = 24x+8$$

$$4x^{2}-24x-9 = 0$$

Once the equation is in standard form, identify a, b, and c. Here

$$a = 4$$
  $b = -24$   $c = -9$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-24) \pm \sqrt{(-24)^2 - 4(4)(-9)}}{2(4)}$$

$$= \frac{24 \pm \sqrt{576 + 144}}{8}$$

$$= \frac{24 \pm \sqrt{720}}{8}$$

$$= \frac{24 \pm \sqrt{144 \cdot 5}}{8}$$

$$= \frac{24 \pm 12\sqrt{5}}{8}$$

$$= \frac{12(2 \pm \sqrt{5})}{8}$$

$$= \frac{3(2 \pm \sqrt{5})}{2} \quad \text{or} \quad = \frac{6 \pm 3\sqrt{5}}{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $6\pm35\sqrt{2}$ .

**Try this!** Solve: 3x(x-2)=1.

Answer:  $3\pm23\sqrt{3}$

# **9.4** Guidelines for Solving Quadratic Equations and Applications

#### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Use the discriminant to determine the number and type of solutions to any quadratic equation.
- 2. Develop a general strategy for solving quadratic equations.
- 3. Solve applications involving quadratic equations.

#### **Discriminant**

If given a quadratic equation in standard form, ax2+bx+c=0, where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ , then the solutions can be calculated using the quadratic formula:

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

The solutions are rational, irrational, or not real. We can determine the type and number of solutions by studying the discriminant, the expression inside the radical,  $b_2$ –4ac. If the value of this expression is negative, then the equation has no real solutions. If the discriminant is positive, then we have two real solutions. And if the discriminant is 0, then we have one real solution.

**Example 1:** Determine the type and number of solutions:  $x_2-10x+30=0$ .

**Solution:** We begin by identifying a, b, and c. Here

$$a = 1$$
  $b = -10$   $c = 30$ 

Substitute these values into the discriminant and simplify.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-10)^{2} - 4(1)(30)$$
$$= 100 - 120$$
$$= -20$$

Since the discriminant is negative, we conclude that there are no real solutions.

Answer: No real solution

If we use the quadratic formula in the previous example, we find that a negative radicand stops the process of simplification and shows that there is no real solution.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-10) \pm \sqrt{-20}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{10 \pm \sqrt{-20}}{2}$$
No real solution

### Note

We will study quadratic equations with no real solutions as we progress in our study of algebra.

**Example 2:** Determine the type and number of solutions:  $7x_2-10x+1=0$ .

Solution: Here

$$a = 7$$
  $b = -10$   $c = 1$ 

Substitute these values into the discriminant:

$$b^{2}-4ac = (-10)^{2}-4(7)(1)$$
$$=100-28$$
$$=72$$

Since the discriminant is positive, we can conclude that there are two real solutions.

Answer: Two real solutions

If we use the quadratic formula in the previous example, we find that a positive radicand in the quadratic formula leads to two real solutions.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-10) \pm \sqrt{72}}{2(7)}$$
Positive discriminant
$$= \frac{10 \pm \sqrt{36 \cdot 2}}{14}$$

$$= \frac{10 \pm 6\sqrt{2}}{14}$$

$$= \frac{\cancel{2}(5 \pm 3\sqrt{2})}{\cancel{14}}$$

$$= \frac{5 \pm 3\sqrt{2}}{7}$$
Two real solutions

The two real solutions are  $5-32\sqrt{7}$  and  $5+32\sqrt{7}$ . Note that these solutions are irrational; we can approximate the values on a calculator.

$$\frac{5-3\sqrt{2}}{7} \approx 0.11$$
 and  $\frac{5+3\sqrt{2}}{7} \approx 1.32$ 

**Example 3:** Determine the type and number of solutions: 2x2-7x-4=0. **Solution:** In this example,

$$a = 2$$
  $b = -7$   $c = -4$ 

Substitute these values into the discriminant and simplify.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-7)^{2} - 4(2)(-4)$$
$$= 49 + 32$$
$$= 81$$

Since the discriminant is positive, we conclude that there are two real solutions. Furthermore, since the discriminant is a perfect square, we obtain two rational solutions.

Answer: Two real solutions

We could solve the previous quadratic equation using the quadratic formula as follows:

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$
$$= \frac{-(-7) \pm \sqrt{81}}{2(2)}$$
$$= \frac{7 \pm 9}{4}$$

$$x = \frac{7-9}{4} \quad \text{or} \quad x = \frac{7+9}{4}$$

$$x = \frac{-2}{4} \qquad x = \frac{16}{4}$$

$$x = -\frac{1}{2} \qquad x = 4$$

Note that if the discriminant is a perfect square, then we could have factored the original equation.

$$2x^{2} - 7x - 4 = 0$$
$$(2x+1)(x-4) = 0$$

$$2x + 1 = 0 or x - 4 = 0$$
$$2x = -1 x = 4$$
$$x = -\frac{1}{2}$$

Given the special condition where the discriminant is 0, we obtain only one solution, a double root.

**Example 4:** Determine the type and number of solutions:  $9x_2-6x+1=0$ .

**Solution:** Here a=9, b=-6, and c=1, and we have

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-6)^{2} - 4(9)(1)$$
$$= 36 - 36$$
$$= 0$$

Since the discriminant is 0, we conclude that there is only one real solution, a double root.

Answer: One real solution

Since 0 is a perfect square, we can solve the equation above by factoring.

$$9x^{2} - 6x + 1 = 0$$
$$(3x - 1)(3x - 1) = 0$$

$$3x-1=0$$
 or  $3x-1=0$   
 $3x = 1$   $3x = 1$   
 $x = \frac{1}{3}$   $x = \frac{1}{3}$ 

Here 1/3 is a solution that occurs twice; it is a double root.

In summary, if given any quadratic equation in standard form,  $ax_2+bx+c=0$ , where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ , then we have the following:

Positive discriminant:	b2-4ac>0	Two real solutions
Zero discriminant:	<i>b</i> 2-4 <i>ac</i> =0	One real solution
Negative discriminant:	b2-4ac<0	No real solution

As we will see, knowing the number and type of solutions ahead of time helps us determine which method is best for solving a quadratic equation.

**Try this!** Determine the number and type of solutions: 3x2-5x+4=0.

Answer: No real solution

## **General Guidelines for Solving Quadratic Equations**

Use the coefficients of a quadratic equation to help decide which method is most appropriate for solving it. While the quadratic formula always works, it is sometimes not the most efficient method. Given any quadratic equation in standard form, ax2+bx+c=0, general guidelines for determining the method for solving it follow:

- 1. If c = 0, then factor out the GCF and solve by factoring.
- 2. If b = 0, then solve by extracting the roots.
- 3. If *a*, *b*, and *c* are all nonzero, then determine the value for the discriminant, *b*2–4*ac*:
- a. If the discriminant is a perfect square, then solve by factoring.
- b. If the discriminant is not a perfect square, then solve using the quadratic formula.
- 5 If the discriminant is positive, we obtain two real solutions.
- 2 If the discriminant is negative, then there is no real solution.

**Example 5:** Solve:  $15x_2 - 5x = 0$ .

**Solution:** In this case, c = 0 and we can solve by factoring out the GCF.

$$15x^{2} - 5x = 0$$

$$5x(3x - 1) = 0$$

$$5x = 0 or 3x - 1 = 0$$

$$x = 0 3x = 1$$

 $x=\frac{1}{3}$ 

Answer: The solutions are 0 and 1/3.

**Example 6:** Solve:  $3x_2-5=0$ .

**Solution:** In this case, b = 0 and we can solve by extracting the roots.

$$3x^{2} - 5 = 0$$

$$3x^{2} = 5$$

$$x^{2} = \frac{5}{3}$$
Apply the square root property.
$$x = \pm \sqrt{\frac{5}{3}}$$
Rationalize the denominator.
$$x = \pm \frac{\sqrt{5}}{\sqrt{3}} \cdot \frac{\sqrt{3}}{\sqrt{3}}$$

$$x = \pm \frac{\sqrt{15}}{3}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $\pm_{15}\sqrt{3}$ .

**Example 7:** Solve: 9*x*2-6*x*-7=0.

**Solution:** Begin by identifying a, b, and c as the coefficients of each term.

Here

$$a = 9 \qquad b = -6 \qquad c = -7$$

Substitute these values into the discriminant and then simplify.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-6)^{2} - 4(9)(-7)$$
$$= 36 + 252$$
$$= 288$$

Since the discriminant is positive and not a perfect square, use the quadratic formula and expect two real solutions.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-6) \pm \sqrt{288}}{2(9)}$$

$$= \frac{6 \pm \sqrt{144 \cdot 2}}{18}$$

$$= \frac{6 \pm 12\sqrt{2}}{18}$$

$$= \frac{6(1 \pm 2\sqrt{2})}{18}$$

$$= \frac{1 \pm 2\sqrt{2}}{3}$$

Answer: The solutions are 1±22√3.

**Example 8:** Solve: 4x(x-2)=-7.

Solution: Begin by rewriting the quadratic equation in standard form.

$$4x(x-2) = -7$$
$$4x^{2} - 8x = -7$$
$$4x^{2} - 8x + 7 = 0$$

Here

$$a = 4$$
  $b = -8$   $c = 7$ 

Substitute these values into the discriminant and then simplify.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-8)^{2} - 4(4)(7)$$
$$= 64 - 112$$
$$= -48$$

Since the discriminant is negative, the solutions are not real numbers.

Answer: No real solution

**Example 9:** Solve: (3x+5)(3x+7)=6x+10.

Solution: Begin by rewriting the quadratic equation in standard form.

$$(3x+5)(3x+7) = 6x+10$$
$$9x^2 + 21x+15x+35 = 6x+10$$
$$9x^2 + 36x+35 = 6x+10$$
$$9x^2 + 30x+25 = 0$$

Substitute a = 9, b = 30, and c = 25 into the discriminant.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (30)^{2} - 4(9) (25)$$
$$= 900 - 900$$
$$= 0$$

Since the discriminant is 0, solve by factoring and expect one real solution, a double root.

$$9x^{2} + 30x + 25 = 0$$
$$(3x + 5)(3x + 5) = 0$$

$$3x + 5 = 0$$
 or  $3x + 5 = 0$   
 $3x = -5$   $3x = -5$   
 $x = -\frac{5}{3}$   $x = -\frac{5}{3}$ 

Answer: The solution is -5/3.

**Try this!** Solve:  $5x_2+2x-7=2x-3$ .


Answer:  $\pm 25\sqrt{5}$ 

# **Applications Involving Quadratic Equations**

In this section, the algebraic setups usually consist of a quadratic equation where the solutions may not be integers.

**Example 10:** The height of a triangle is 2 inches less than twice the length of its base. If the total area of the triangle is 11 square inches, then find the lengths of the base and height. Round answers to the nearest hundredth.

#### Solution:



Let *x* represent the length of the base of the triangle.

twice the base 
$$2$$
 inches less than  $-2$ 

Let 2x-2 represent the height of the triangle.

Use the formula A=12bh and the fact that the area is 11 square inches to set up an algebraic equation.

$$A = \frac{1}{2}b \cdot h$$

$$11 = \frac{1}{2}x(2x-2)$$

To rewrite this quadratic equation in standard form, first distribute 12x.

$$11 = \frac{1}{2}x(2x-2)$$

$$11 = x^{2} - x$$

$$0 = x^{2} - x - 11$$

Use the coefficients, a = 1, b = -1, and c = -11, to determine the type of solutions.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (-1)^{2} - 4(1)(-11)$$
$$= 1 + 44$$
$$= 45$$

Since the discriminant is positive, expect two real solutions.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-1) \pm \sqrt{45}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{1 \pm \sqrt{9.5}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{1 \pm 3\sqrt{5}}{2}$$

In this problem, disregard the negative solution and consider only the positive solution.

$$x = \frac{1 + 3\sqrt{5}}{2}$$

Back substitute to find the height.

height = 
$$2x - 2$$
  
=  $2\left(\frac{1+3\sqrt{5}}{2}\right) - 2$   
=  $1+3\sqrt{5}-2$   
=  $-1+3\sqrt{5}$ 

Answer: The base measures  $1+35\sqrt{2}\approx3.85$  inches and the height is  $-1+35\sqrt{\approx}5.71$  inches.

**Example 11:** The sum of the squares of two consecutive positive integers is 481. Find the integers.

Solution:

Let *n* represent the first positive integer.

Let n+1 represent the next positive integer.

The algebraic setup follows:

The sum of the squares of... 
$$(n+1)^2$$
 = 481

Rewrite the quadratic equation in standard form.

$$n^{2} + n^{2} + 2n + 1 = 481$$

$$2n^{2} + 2n - 480 = 0$$

$$2(n^{2} + n - 240) = 0$$

$$\frac{2(n^{2} + n - 240)}{2} = \frac{0}{2}$$

$$n^{2} + n - 240 = 0$$
Factor out the GCF.

Divide both sides by 2.

When the coefficients are large, sometimes it is less work to use the quadratic formula instead of trying to factor it. In this case, a=1, b=1, and c=-240. Substitute into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$n = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(1) \pm \sqrt{(1)^2 - 4(1)(-240)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{1 + 960}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm \sqrt{961}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm 31}{2}$$

$$n = \frac{-1 - 31}{2} \quad \text{or} \quad n = \frac{-1 + 31}{2}$$

$$n = \frac{-32}{2} \qquad n = \frac{30}{2}$$

Since the problem calls for positive integers, disregard the negative solution and choose n = 15.

$$n+1=15+1$$
$$=16$$

Answer: The positive integers are 15 and 16.

n = -16

#### **KEY TAKEAWAYS**



# The Graph of a Quadratic Equation

We know that any linear equation with two variables can be written in the form y=mx+b and that its graph is a line. In this section, we will see that any quadratic equation of the form y=ax2+bx+c has a curved graph called a parabola.



Two points determine any line. However, since a parabola is curved, we should find more than two points. In this text, we will determine at least five points as a means to produce an acceptable sketch. To begin, we graph our first parabola by plotting points. Given a quadratic equation of the form y=ax2+bx+c, x is the independent variable and y is the dependent variable. Choose some values for x and then determine the corresponding y-values. Then plot the points and sketch the graph.


**Example 1:** Graph by plotting points:  $y=x^2-2x-3$ .

**Solution:** In this example, choose the *x*-values  $\{-2, -1, 0, 1, 2, 3, 4\}$  and calculate the corresponding *y*-values.


X	y		Points
-2	5	$y = (-2)^2 - 2(-2) - 3 = 4 + 4 - 3 = 5$	(-2, 5)
-1	0	$y = (-1)^2 - 2(-1) - 3 = 1 + 2 - 3 = 0$	(-1, 0)
0	-3	$y = (0)^{2} - 2(0) - 3 = 0 - 0 - 3 = -3$	(0, -3)
1	-4	$y = (1)^2 - 2(1) - 3 = 1 - 2 - 3 = -4$	(1, -4)
2	-3	$y = (2)^{2} - 2(2) - 3 = 4 - 4 - 3 = -3$	(2, -3)
3	0	$y = (3)^2 - 2(3) - 3 = 9 - 6 - 3 = 0$	(3, 0)
4	5	$y = (4)^{2} - 2(4) - 3 = 16 - 8 - 3 = 5$	(4, 5)

Plot these points and determine the shape of the graph.

Answer:



When graphing, we want to include certain special points in the graph. The y-intercept is the point where the graph intersects the y-axis. The x-intercepts are the points where the graph intersects the x-axis. The vertex is the point that defines the minimum or maximum of the graph. Lastly, the line of symmetry(also called the axis of symmetry) is the vertical line through the vertex, about which the parabola is symmetric.



For any parabola, we will find the vertex and y-intercept. In addition, if the x-intercepts exist, then we will want to determine those as well. Guessing at the x-values of these special points is not practical; therefore, we will develop techniques that will facilitate finding them. Many of these techniques will be used extensively as we progress in our study of algebra. Given a quadratic equation of the form y=ax2+bx+c, find the y-intercept by setting x=0 and solving. In general, y=a(0)2+b(0)+c=c, and we have

*y-intercept* (0,c)

Next, recall that the *x*-intercepts, if they exist, can be found by setting *y*=0. Doing this, we have 0=a2+bx+c, which has general solutions given by the quadratic formula,  $x=-b\pm b2-4ac\sqrt{2}a$ . Therefore, the *x*-intercepts have this general form:

$$\left(\frac{-b-\sqrt{b^2-4ac}}{2a},0\right)$$
 and  $\left(\frac{-b+\sqrt{b^2-4ac}}{2a},0\right)$ 

Using the fact that a parabola is symmetric, we can determine the vertical line of symmetry using the *x*-intercepts. To do this, we find the *x*-value midway between the *x*-intercepts by taking an average as follows:

$$x = \left(\frac{-b - \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a} + \frac{-b + \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}\right) \div 2$$

$$= \left(\frac{-b - \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac} - b + \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}\right) \div \left(\frac{2}{1}\right)$$

$$= \frac{-2b}{2a} \cdot \frac{1}{2}$$

$$= -\frac{b}{2a}$$

Therefore, the line of symmetry is the vertical line:

#### Line of symmetry

$$x = -\frac{b}{2a}$$

We can use the line of symmetry to find the *x*-value of the vertex. The steps for graphing a parabola are outlined in the following example.

**Example 2:** Graph:  $y=-x_2-2x+3$ .

#### Solution:

**Step 1:** Determine the y-intercept. To do this, set x = 0 and solve for y.

$$y = -x^{2} - 2x + 3$$
$$= -(0)^{2} - 2(0) + 3$$
$$= 3$$

The y-intercept is (0, 3).

**Step 2:** Determine the x-intercepts. To do this, set y = 0 and solve for x.

$$y = -x^2 - 2x + 3$$
 Set  $y = 0$ .  
 $0 = -x^2 - 2x + 3$  Multiply both sides by -1.  
 $0 = x^2 + 2x - 3$  Factor.  
 $0 = (x+3)(x-1)$  Set each factor equal to zero.

$$x+3=0$$
 or  $x-1=0$   
 $x=-3$   $x=1$ 

Here when y = 0, we obtain two solutions. There are two x-intercepts, (-3, 0) and (1, 0).

**Step 3:** Determine the vertex. One way to do this is to use the equation for the line of symmetry, x=-b2a, to find the x-value of the vertex. In this example, a = -1 and b = -2:

$$x = \frac{-b}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-2)}{2(-1)}$$

$$= \frac{2}{-2}$$

$$= -1$$

Substitute -1 into the original equation to find the corresponding y-value.

$$y = -x^{2} - 2x + 3$$

$$= -(-1)^{2} - 2(-1) + 3$$

$$= -1 + 2 + 3$$

$$= 4$$

The vertex is (-1, 4).

**Step 4:** Determine extra points so that we have at least five points to plot. In this example, one other point will suffice. Choose x = -2 and find the corresponding y-value.

$$x$$
  $y$  Point   
 $-2$   $3$   $y = -(-2)^2 - 2(-2) + 3 = -4 + 4 + 3 = 3$  (-2, 3)


Our fifth point is (-2, 3).

**Step 5:** Plot the points and sketch the graph. To recap, the points that we have found are

y-intercept:	(0, 3)
x-intercept:	(-3, 0) and (1, 0)


Vertex:	(-1, 4)
Extra point:	(-2, 3)

Answer:



The parabola opens downward. In general, use the leading coefficient to determine whether the parabola opens upward or downward. If the leading coefficient is negative, as in the previous example, then the parabola opens

downward. If the leading coefficient is positive, then the parabola opens upward.



All quadratic equations of the form  $y=ax^2+bx+c$  have parabolic graphs with y-intercept (0, c). However, not all parabolas have x intercepts.

**Example 3:** Graph:  $y=2x_2+4x+5$ .

**Solution:** Because the leading coefficient 2 is positive, note that the parabola opens upward. Here c = 5 and the y-intercept is (0, 5). To find the x-intercepts, set y = 0.

$$y = 2x^2 + 4x + 5$$
$$0 = 2x^2 + 4x + 5$$

In this case, a = 2, b = 4, and c = 5. Use the discriminant to determine the number and type of solutions.

$$b^{2} - 4ac = (4)^{2} - 4(2)(5)$$
$$= 16 - 40$$
$$= -24$$

Since the discriminant is negative, we conclude that there are no real solutions. Because there are no real solutions, there are no *x*-intercepts. Next, we determine the *x*-value of the vertex.

$$x = \frac{-b}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(4)}{2(2)}$$

$$= \frac{-4}{4}$$

$$= -1$$

Given that the x-value of the vertex is -1, substitute into the original equation to find the corresponding y-value.

$$y = 2x^{2} + 4x + 5$$

$$= 2(-1)^{2} + 4(-1) + 5$$

$$= 2 - 4 + 5$$

$$= 3$$

The vertex is (-1, 3). So far, we have only two points. To determine three more, choose some x-values on either side of the line of symmetry, x = -1. Here we choose x-values -3, -2, and 1.

X	y		Points
-3	11	$y = 2(-3)^2 + 4(-3) + 5 = 18 - 12 + 5 = 11$	(-3, 11)
-2	5	$y = 2(-2)^{2} + 4(-2) + 5 = 8 - 8 + 5 = 5$	(-2, 5)
1	11	$y = 2(1)^2 + 4(1) + 5 = 2 + 4 + 5 = 11$	(1, 11)


To summarize, we have

y-intercept:	(0, 5)
--------------	--------

x-intercepts:	None
Vertex:	(-1, 3)
Extra points:	(-3, 11), (-2, 5), (1, 11)

Plot the points and sketch the graph.

Answer:



**Example 4:** Graph:  $y=-2x_2+12x-18$ .

**Solution:** Note that a = -2: the parabola opens downward. Since c = -18, the *y*-intercept is (0, -18). To find the *x*-intercepts, set y = 0.

$$y = -2x^2 + 12x - 18$$
$$0 = -2x^2 + 12x - 18$$



Solve by factoring.

$$0 = -2x^2 + 12x - 18$$
 Factor out  $-2$ .  
 $0 = -2(x^2 - 6x + 9)$  Factor the resulting trinomial.  
 $0 = -2(x - 3)(x - 3)$  Set each variable factor to 0.

$$x-3=0$$
 or  $x-3=0$   
 $x=3$   $x=3$ 

Here x = 3 is a double root, so there is only one x-intercept, (3, 0). From the original equation, a = -2, b = 12, and c = -18. The x-value of the vertex can be calculated as follows:

$$x = \frac{-b}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(12)}{2(-2)}$$

$$= \frac{-12}{-4}$$

$$= 3$$

Given that the *x*-value of the vertex is 3, substitute into the original equation to find the corresponding *y*-value.

$$y = -2x^{2} + 12x - 18$$

$$= -2(3)^{2} + 12(3) - 18$$

$$= -18 + 36 - 18$$

$$= 0$$

Therefore, the vertex is (3, 0), which happens to be the same point as the x-intercept. So far, we have only two points. To determine three more, choose


some x-values on either side of the line of symmetry, x = 3 in this case. Choose x-values 1, 5, and 6.

To summarize, we have

y-intercept:	(0, -18)
x-intercept:	(3, 0)
Vertex:	(3, 0)
Extra points:	(1, -8), (5, -8), (6, -18)

Plot the points and sketch the graph.

Answer:



**Example 5:** Graph:  $y=x_2-2x-1$ .

**Solution:** Since a = 1, the parabola opens upward. Furthermore, c = -1, so they-intercept is (0, -1). To find the x-intercepts, set y = 0.

$$y = x^2 - 2x - 1$$

$$0 = x^2 - 2x - 1$$

In this case, solve using the quadratic formula with a = 1, b = -2, and c = -1.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-2) \pm \sqrt{(-2)^2 - 4(1)(-1)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm \sqrt{4 + 4}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm \sqrt{8}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm \sqrt{4 \cdot 2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm 2\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{2(1 \pm \sqrt{2})}{2}$$

$$= 1 \pm \sqrt{2}$$

Here we obtain two real solutions for x, and thus there are two x-intercepts:

$$(1-\sqrt{2},0)$$
 and  $(1+\sqrt{2},0)$ 

Approximate values using a calculator:

$$(-0.41, 0)$$
 and  $(2.41, 0)$ 

Use the approximate answers to place the ordered pair on the graph. However, we will present the exact *x*-intercepts on the graph. Next, find the vertex.

$$x = \frac{-b}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-2)}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{2}{2}$$

$$= 1$$

Given that the *x*-value of the vertex is 1, substitute into the original equation to find the corresponding *y*-value.

$$y = x^{2} - 2x - 1$$

$$= (1)^{2} - 2(1) - 1$$

$$= 1 - 2 - 1$$

$$= -2$$

The vertex is (1, -2). We need one more point.


$$x$$
  $y$  Point   
  $2$   $-1$   $y = (2)^2 - 2(2) - 1 = 4 - 4 - 1 = -1$   $(2, -1)$ 

To summarize, we have



# Finding the Maximum and Minimum

It is often useful to find the maximum and/or minimum values of functions that model real-life applications. To find these important values given a quadratic function, we use the vertex. If the leading coefficient a is positive, then the parabola opens upward and there will be a minimum y-value. If the leading coefficient a is negative, then the parabola opens downward and there will be a maximum y-value.

**Example 6:** Determine the maximum or minimum:  $y=-4x^2+24x-35$ . **Solution:** Since a=-4, we know that the parabola opens downward and there will be a maximum y-value. To find it, we first find the x-value of the vertex.

$$x = -\frac{b}{2a}$$


$$= -\frac{24}{2(-4)}$$

$$= -\frac{24}{-8}$$
Substitute  $a = -4$  and  $b = 24$ .
$$= -\frac{24}{-8}$$
Simplify.
$$= 3$$

The *x*-value of the vertex is 3. Substitute this value into the original equation to find the corresponding *y*-value.

$$y = -4x^{2} + 24x - 35$$
 Substitute  $x = 3$ .  
 $= -4(3)^{2} + 24(3) - 35$  Simplify.  
 $= -36 + 72 - 35$   
 $= 1$ 

The vertex is (3, 1). Therefore, the maximum y-value is 1, which occurs when x = 3, as illustrated below:



## Note

The graph is not required to answer this question.

Answer: The maximum is 1.

**Example 7:** Determine the maximum or minimum: y=4x2-32x+62. **Solution:** Since a=+4, the parabola opens upward and there is a minimum y-value. Begin by finding the x-value of the vertex.


$$x = -\frac{b}{2a}$$

$$= -\frac{-32}{2(4)}$$
Substitute  $a = 4$  and  $b = -32$ .
$$= -\frac{-32}{8}$$
Simplify.
$$= 4$$

Substitute x = 4 into the original equation to find the corresponding y-value.

$$y = 4x^{2} - 32x + 62$$
$$= 4(4)^{2} - 32(4) + 62$$
$$= 64 - 128 + 62$$
$$= -2$$

The vertex is (4, -2). Therefore, the minimum y-value of -2 occurs when x = 4, as illustrated below:



Answer: The minimum is -2.

**Try this!** Determine the maximum or minimum: y=(x-3)2-9. Answer: The minimum is -9.

A parabola, opening upward or downward (as opposed to sideways), defines a function and extends indefinitely to the right and left as indicated by the arrows. Therefore, the domain (the set of x-values) consists of all real numbers. However, the range (the set of y-values) is bounded by the y-value of the vertex.

**Example 8:** Determine the domain and range:  $y=x^2-4x+3$ .

**Solution:** First, note that since a=1 is positive, the parabola opens upward. Hence there will be a minimum y-value. To find that value, find the x-value of the vertex:

$$x = -\frac{b}{2a} = -\frac{-4}{2(1)} = 2$$

Then substitute into the equation to find the corresponding y-value.


$$y = x^{2} - 4x + 3$$

$$= (2)^{2} - 4(2) + 3$$

$$= 4 - 8 + 3$$

$$= -1$$

The vertex is (2, -1). The range consists of the set of y-values greater than or equal to the minimum y-value -1.



Answer: Domain:  $\mathbf{R} = (-\infty, \infty)$ ; range:  $[-1, \infty)$ 

**Example 9:** The height in feet of a projectile is given by the function h(t)=-16t2+72t, where t represents the time in seconds after launch. What is the maximum height reached by the projectile?

**Solution:** Here *a*=–16, and the parabola opens downward. Therefore, the *y*-value of the vertex determines the maximum height. Begin by finding the *x*-value of the vertex:

$$x = -\frac{b}{2a} = -\frac{72}{2(-16)} = \frac{72}{32} = \frac{9}{4}$$

The maximum height will occur in  $9/4 = 2\frac{1}{4}$  seconds. Substitute this time into the function to determine the height attained.

$$h\left(\frac{9}{4}\right) = -16\left(\frac{9}{4}\right)^2 + 72\left(\frac{9}{4}\right)$$
$$= -16\left(\frac{81}{16}\right) + 72\left(\frac{9}{4}\right)$$
$$= -81 + 162$$
$$= 81$$

Answer: The maximum height of the projectile is 81 feet.

# Finding the Vertex by Completing the Square

In this section, we demonstrate an alternate approach for finding the vertex. Any quadratic equation y=ax2+bx+c can be rewritten in the form

$$y = a (x - h)^2 + k$$

In this form, the vertex is (h, k).

**Example 10:** Determine the vertex:  $y=-4(x-3)^2+1$ .

**Solution:** When the equation is in this form, we can read the vertex directly from the equation.

$$y = a(x-h)^{2} + k$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$y = -4(x-3)^{2} + 1$$

Here h = 3 and k = 1.

Answer: The vertex is (3, 1).

**Example 11:** Determine the vertex: y=2(x+3)2-2.

**Solution:** Rewrite the equation as follows before determining h and k.

$$y = a(x - h)^{2} + k$$
 $\downarrow$ 
 $\downarrow$ 
 $y = 2(x - (-3))^{2} + (-2)$ 

Here h = -3 and k = -2.

Answer: The vertex is (-3, -2).

Often the equation is not given in this form. To obtain this form, complete the square.

**Example 12:** Rewrite in  $y=a(x-h)^2+k$  form and determine the vertex:  $y=x^2+4x+9$ .

**Solution:** Begin by making room for the constant term that completes the square.

$$y = x^{2} + 4x + 9$$
$$= x^{2} + 4x + \underline{\hspace{1cm}} + 9 - \underline{\hspace{1cm}}$$

The idea is to add and subtract the value that completes the square, (b2)2, and then factor. In this case, add and subtract (42)2=(2)2=4.

$$y = x^{2} + 4x + 9$$
 Add and subtract 4.  
 $= \underbrace{x^{2} + 4x + 4}_{factor} + 9 - 4$  Factor.  
 $= (x + 2)(x + 2) + 5$   
 $= (x + 2)^{2} + 5$ 

Adding and subtracting the same value within an expression does not change it. Doing so is equivalent to adding 0. Once the equation is in this form, we can easily determine the vertex.

$$y = a(x - h)^{2} + k$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$y = (x - (-2))^{2} + 5$$

Here h = -2 and k = 5.

Answer: The vertex is (-2, 5).

If there is a leading coefficient other than 1, then we must first factor out the leading coefficient from the first two terms of the trinomial.

**Example 13:** Rewrite in y=a(x-h)2+k form and determine the vertex: y=2x2-4x+8.

**Solution:** Since a = 2, factor this out of the first two terms in order to complete the square. Leave room inside the parentheses to add a constant term.

$$y = 2x^{2} - 4x + 8$$
$$= 2(x^{2} - 2x) + 8$$

Now use -2 to determine the value that completes the square. In this case, (-22)2=(-1)2=1. Add and subtract 1 and factor as follows:

$$y = 2x^{2} - 4x + 8$$

$$= 2(x^{2} - 2x + __ - __ ) + 8 Add and subtract 1.$$

$$= 2\left(\underbrace{x^{2} - 2x + 1 - 1}_{factor}\right) + 8 Factor.$$

$$= 2((x - 1)(x - 1) - 1) + 8$$

$$= 2((x - 1)^{2} - 1) + 8 Distribute the 2.$$

$$= 2(x - 1)^{2} - 2 + 8$$

$$= 2(x - 1)^{2} + 6$$

In this form, we can easily determine the vertex.

$$y = a(x-h)^{2} + k$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \downarrow$$

$$y = 2(x-1)^{2} + 6$$

Here h = 1 and k = 6.

Answer: The vertex is (1, 6).

**Try this!** Rewrite in  $y=a(x-h)^2+k$  form and determine the

vertex:  $y = -2x_2 - 12x + 3$ .

Answer:  $y=-2(x+3)^2+21$ ; vertex: (-3, 21)

## KEY TAKEAWAYS

• The graph of any quadratic equation  $y=ax^2+bx+c$ , where a, b, and c are real numbers and  $a\neq 0$ , is called a parabola.

- When graphing parabolas, find the vertex and y-intercept. If the x-intercepts exist, find those as well. Also, be sure to find ordered pair solutions on either side of the line of symmetry, x=-b2a.
- Use the leading coefficient, a, to determine if a parabola opens upward or downward. If a is positive, then it opens upward. If a is negative, then it opens downward.
- The vertex of any parabola has an x-value equal to -b2a. After finding the x-value of the vertex, substitute it into the original equation to find the corresponding y-value. This y-value is a maximum if the parabola opens downward, and it is a minimum if the parabola opens upward.
- The domain of a parabola opening upward or downward consists of all real numbers. The range is bounded by the *y*-value of the vertex.
- An alternate approach to finding the vertex is to rewrite the quadratic equation in the form y=a(x-h)2+k. When in this form, the vertex is (h, k) and can be read directly from the equation. To obtain this form, take y=ax2+bx+c and complete the square.

# **9.6** Introduction to Complex Numbers and Complex Solutions

### **LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Perform operations with complex numbers.

## **Introduction to Complex Numbers**

Up to this point, the square root of a negative number has been left undefined. For example, we know that  $-9---\sqrt{100}$  is not a real a number.

$$\sqrt{-9} = ?$$
 or  $(?)^2 = -9$ 

There is no real number that when squared results in a negative number. We begin the resolution of this issue by defining the imaginary unit, i, as the square root of -1.

$$i = \sqrt{-1}$$
 and  $i^2 = -1$ 

To express a square root of a negative number in terms of the imaginary unit i, we use the following property, where a represents any nonnegative real number:

$$\sqrt{-a} = \sqrt{-1 \cdot a} = \sqrt{-1} \cdot \sqrt{a} = i\sqrt{a}$$

With this we can write

$$\sqrt{-9} = \sqrt{-1 \cdot 9} = \sqrt{-1} \cdot \sqrt{9} = i \cdot 3 = 3i$$

If  $-9---\sqrt{3}i$ , then we would expect that 3i squared equals -9:

$$(3i)^2 = 9i^2 = 9(-1) = -9$$

Therefore, the square root of any negative real number can be written in terms of the imaginary unit. Such numbers are often called imaginary numbers.

**Example 1:** Rewrite in terms of the imaginary unit i.

### Solution:

a. 
$$-4---\sqrt{-1\cdot 4}----\sqrt{-1---\sqrt{4}}=2i$$

b. 
$$-5---\sqrt{-1.5}----\sqrt{-1.5}\sqrt{-1.5}$$



c. 
$$-8 - - \sqrt{-1 \cdot 4 \cdot 2} - - \sqrt{-1} - \sqrt{-4} \sqrt{-2} \sqrt{-2} i \cdot 2 \cdot 2 \sqrt{-2} i \cdot 2$$

### **Notation Note**

When an imaginary number involves a radical, place i in front of the radical. Consider the following:

$$2i2\sqrt{=22}\sqrt{i}$$

Since multiplication is commutative, these numbers are equivalent. However, in the form  $22\sqrt{i}$ , the imaginary unit i is often misinterpreted to be part of the radicand. To avoid this confusion, it is a best practice to place the i in front of the radical and use  $2i2\sqrt{.}$ 

A complex number is any number of the form

$$a + bi$$

where a and b are real numbers. Here a is called the real part and b is called the imaginary part. For example, 3-4i is a complex number with a real part, 3, and an imaginary part, -4. It is important to note that any real number is also a complex number. For example, the real number 5 is also a complex number because it can be written as 5+0i with a real part of 5 and an imaginary part of 0. Hence the set of real numbers, denoted  $\mathbf{R}$ , is a subset of the set of complex numbers, denoted  $\mathbf{C}$ .

Adding and subtracting complex numbers is similar to adding and subtracting like terms. Add or subtract the real parts and then the imaginary parts.

**Example 2:** Add: (3-4i)+(2+5i).

**Solution:** Add the real parts and then add the imaginary parts.



$$(3-4i) + (2+5i) = 3-4i+2+5i$$
$$= 5+i$$

Answer: 5+i

To subtract complex numbers, subtract the real parts and subtract the imaginary parts. This is consistent with the use of the distributive property.

**Example 3:** Subtract: (3-4i)-(2+5i).

Solution: Distribute the negative one and then combine like terms.

$$(3-4i)-(2+5i) = 3-4i-2-5i$$
  
= 1-9i

Answer: 1–9i

The distributive property also applies when multiplying complex numbers. Make use of the fact that i2=-1 to resolve the result into standard form: a+bi.

**Example 4:** Multiply: 5i(3-4i).

**Solution:** Begin by applying the distributive property.

$$5i(3-4i) = 5i \cdot 3 - 5i \cdot 4i$$
 Distribute.  
 $= 15i - 20i^2$  Substitute  $i^2 = -1$ .  
 $= 15i - 20 (-1)$  Simplify.  
 $= 15i + 20$   
 $= 20 + 15i$ 

Answer: 20+15i

**Example 5:** Multiply: (3-4i)(4+5i).

Solution:

$$(3-4i)(4+5i) = 3 \cdot 4 + 3 \cdot 5i - 4i \cdot 4 - 4i \cdot 5i$$

$$= 12+15i-16i-20i^{2}$$

$$= 12+15i-16i-20(-1)$$

$$= 12-i+20$$

$$= 32-i$$
Distribute.

Substitute  $i^{2} = -1$ .

Answer: 32-i

Given a complex number a+bi, its complex conjugate is a-bi. We next explore the product of complex conjugates.

**Example 6:** Multiply: (3-4i)(3+4i).

Solution:

$$(3-4i)(3+4i) = 3 \cdot 3 + 3 \cdot 4i - 4i \cdot 3 - 4i \cdot 4i$$

$$= 9+12i-12i-16i^{2}$$

$$= 9-16 (-1)$$

$$= 9+16$$

$$= 25$$

Answer: 25

In general, the product of complex conjugates follows:

$$(a+bi)(a-bi) = a^{2} - a \cdot bi + bi \cdot a - b^{2}i^{2}$$
$$= a^{2} - abi + abi - b^{2} (-1)$$
$$= a^{2} + b^{2}$$

Note that the result does not involve the imaginary unit; hence the result is real. This leads us to the very useful property:

$$(a+bi)(a-bi) = a^2 + b^2$$

To divide complex numbers, we apply the technique used to rationalize the denominator. Multiply the numerator and denominator (dividend and divisor) by the conjugate of the denominator. The result can then be resolved into standard form, a+bi.

**Example 7:** Divide: 11-2*i*.

**Solution:** In this example, the conjugate of the denominator is 1+2i. Multiply by 1 in the form (1+2i)(1+2i).

$$\frac{1}{1-2i} = \frac{1}{(1-2i)} \cdot \frac{(1+2i)}{(1+2i)}$$

$$= \frac{(1+2i)}{1^2+2^2}$$

$$= \frac{1+2i}{1+4}$$

$$= \frac{1+2i}{5}$$

To express this complex number in standard form, write each term over the common denominator 5.

$$\frac{1+2i}{5} = \frac{1}{5} + \frac{2i}{5}$$
$$= \frac{1}{5} + \frac{2}{5}i$$

Answer: 15+25*i* 

**Example 8:** Divide: 3-4*i*3+2*i*.

Solution:

$$\frac{3-4i}{3+2i} = \frac{(3-4i)}{(3+2i)} \cdot \frac{(3-2i)}{(3-2i)}$$

$$= \frac{9-6i-12i+8i^2}{3^2+2^2}$$

$$= \frac{9-18i+8(-1)}{9+4}$$

$$= \frac{9-18i-8}{13}$$

$$= \frac{1-18i}{13}$$

$$= \frac{1}{13} - \frac{18}{13}i$$

Answer: 113–1813*i* 

**Try this!** Divide: 5+5*i*1-3*i*.

Answer: -1+2i

## **Quadratic Equations with Complex Solutions**

Now that complex numbers are defined, we can complete our study of solutions to quadratic equations. Often solutions to quadratic equations are not real.

**Example 9:** Solve using the quadratic formula:  $x_2-2x+5=0$ 

**Solution:** Begin by identifying a, b, and c. Here

$$a = 1$$
  $b = -2$   $c = 5$ 

Substitute these values into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-2) \pm \sqrt{(-2)^2 - 4(1)(5)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm \sqrt{4 - 20}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{2 \pm \sqrt{-16}}{2}$$
Negative radicand
$$= \frac{2 \pm 4i}{2}$$
Two complex solutions
$$= \frac{2}{2} \pm \frac{4i}{2}$$

$$= 1 \pm 2i$$

Check these solutions by substituting them into the original equation.

Answer: The solutions are 1-2i and 1+2i.

The equation may not be given in standard form. The general steps for solving using the quadratic formula are outlined in the following example.

**Example 10:** Solve: (2x+1)(x-3)=x-8.

Solution:

Step 1: Write the quadratic equation in standard form.

$$(2x+1)(x-3) = x-8$$
$$2x^{2}-6x+x-3 = x-8$$
$$2x^{2}-5x-3 = x-8$$
$$2x^{2}-6x+5 = 0$$

**Step 2:** Identify a, b, and c for use in the quadratic formula. Here

$$a = 2$$
  $b = -6$   $c = 5$ 

**Step 3:** Substitute the appropriate values into the quadratic formula and then simplify.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(-6) \pm \sqrt{(-6)^2 - 4(2)(5)}}{2(2)}$$

$$= \frac{6 \pm \sqrt{36 - 40}}{4}$$

$$= \frac{6 \pm \sqrt{-4}}{4}$$

$$= \frac{6 \pm 2i}{4}$$

$$= \frac{6}{4} \pm \frac{2i}{4}$$

$$= \frac{3}{2} \pm \frac{1}{2}i$$

Answer: The solution is 32±12*i*. The check is optional.

**Example 11:** Solve: x(x+2)=-19.

**Solution:** Begin by rewriting the equation in standard form.

$$x(x+2) = -19$$
$$x^{2} + 2x = -19$$
$$x^{2} + 2x + 19 = 0$$

Here a=1, b=2, and c=19. Substitute these values into the quadratic formula.

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

$$= \frac{-(2) \pm \sqrt{(2)^2 - 4(1)(19)}}{2(1)}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{4 - 76}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{-72}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm \sqrt{-1 \cdot 36 \cdot 2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-2 \pm 6i\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

$$= \frac{-1 \pm 3i\sqrt{2}}{2}$$

Answer: The solutions are  $-1-3i2\sqrt{$  and  $-1+3i2\sqrt{}$ .

## **Notation Note**

Consider the following:

$$-1+3i2\sqrt{=-1+32}\sqrt{i}$$

Both numbers are equivalent and  $-1+32\sqrt{i}$  is in standard form, where the real part is -1 and the imaginary part is  $32\sqrt{.}$  However, this number is often expressed as  $-1+3i2\sqrt{.}$ , even though this expression is not in standard form. Again, this is done to avoid the possibility of misinterpreting the imaginary unit as part of the radicand.

**Try this!** Solve: (2x+3)(x+5)=5x+4.

Answer:  $-4 \pm i6\sqrt{2} = -2 \pm 6\sqrt{2}i$
