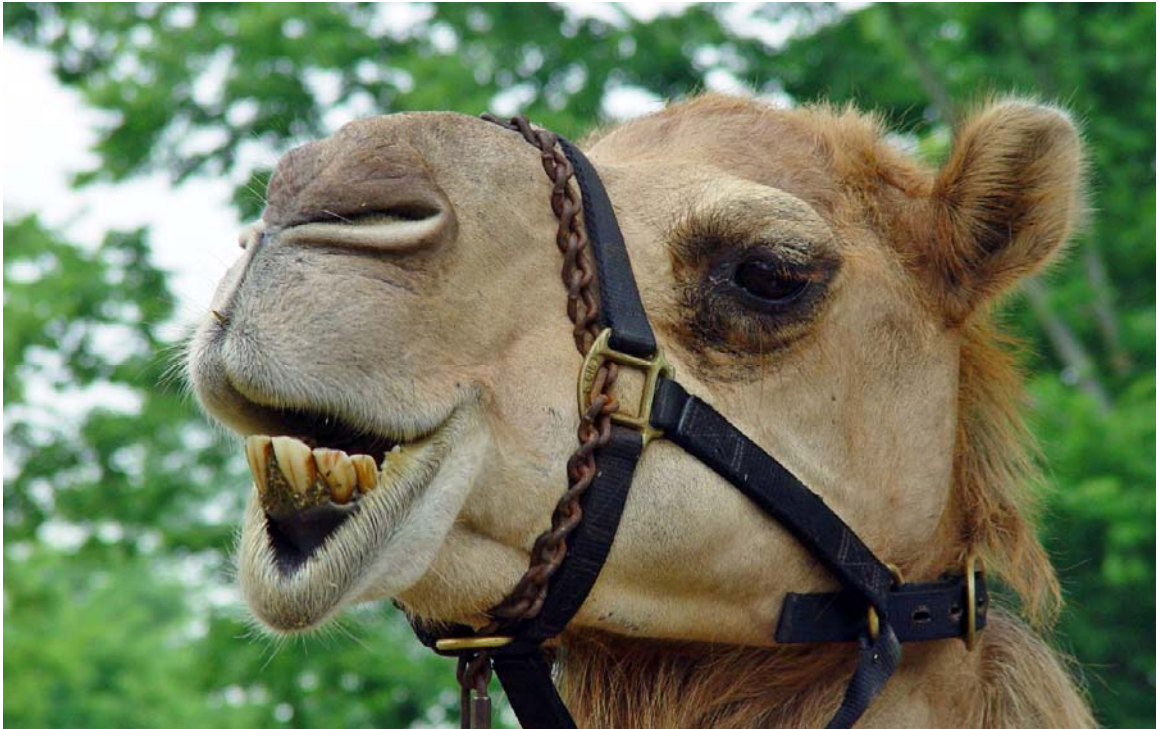


Los Dientes de los Animales





Los dientes son huesos que ayudan a los animales a masticar la comida. ¡Hay dientes de todos los tamaños y formas!



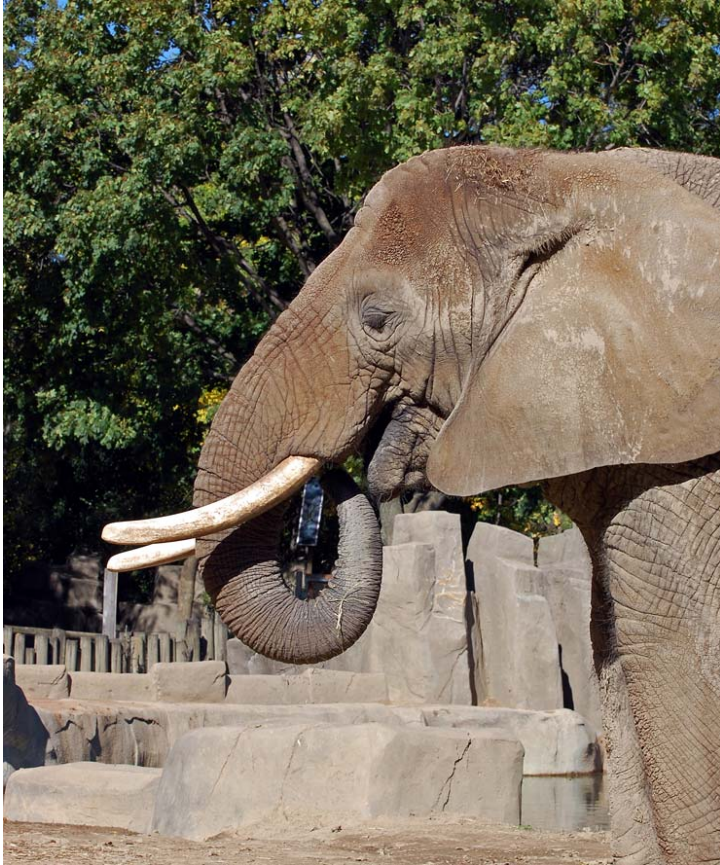
Los caimanes tienen dientes afilados para atrapar la comida como peces, serpientes, y venados.



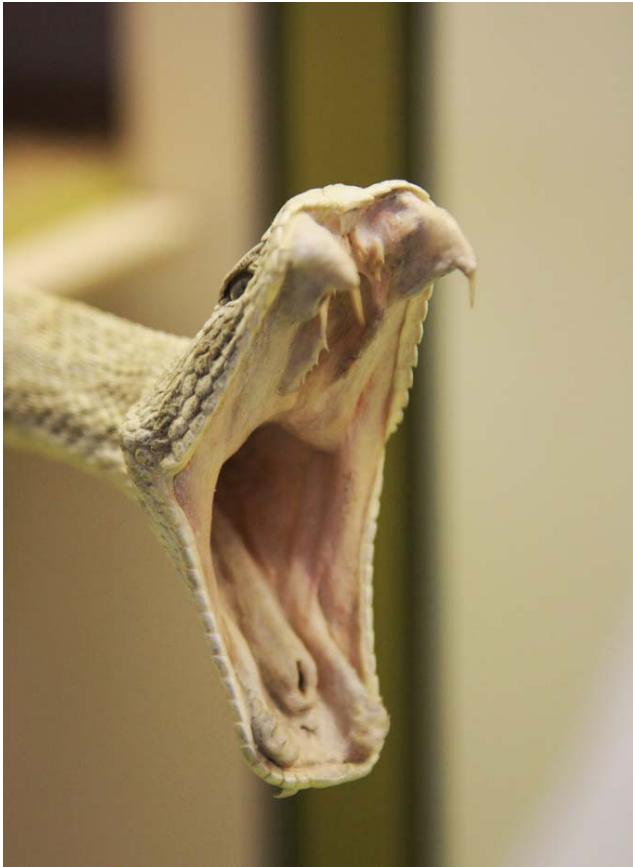
Las vacas y los caballos tienen dientes planos que les ayudan a masticar el pasto y otras plantas.
